Agenda Calls For City Council To Study Strict Water Rules

The City Council will 1,000,000 gallon day in authorize emergency measures to curtail water useage at the regular semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night, Mayor Roy Cartee reported Fri-

City officials ordered the water topic placed on the agenda for the meeting after the amount of water being used daily began inching near the city's maximum pumping capacity. Mayor Cartee said the water pressure in town dropped to an alarming 54 pounds Thursday night. Eighty pounds minimum is needed for safe fire protection, the mayor said.

Figures supplied by the City Water Department showed that July water consumption has ranged from a low of 1,608,000 gallons on Juy 10th to a high of 1,968,000 on July 3rd. Ten of the first 16 days of July had water consumption figures exceeding 1,700,000 gallons.

Mr. Cartee said the Water Department advised him that in no circumstances could they handle more than 2,000,000 gallons in a day. "Our old water system would never be able to stand up under it," they said.

The city had only one by the school districts tax assessor that the district would increase its overall value for 1980. This increase in value would result in the district being able to cut the tax rate; yet, still produce the revenue needed to run





County Judge Scott Bailey has proclaimed July 25-31, 1980 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Eastland County, at the request of Ernest Reich, Eastland County Farm Bureau presi-

This marks the 37th annual National Farm Safety Week, Co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture

The theme for the week is "Personal Protective Equipment - Protects.

In his proclamation, Judge Bailey said "accidents involving Texas farm and ranch residents at work, in the home, at play, and on roads and highways accounted for over 300 fatalities, thousands of painful injuries, costing millions of dollars in 1979.

The 1979 Texas Farm Bureau Accidental Death Program records show that or reduced the severity of a

large percentage of these injuries. In addition, many work-related illnesses and chronic health problems could be mitigated by use of the appropriate respirators, impervious garments and hearing protectors when such protection is needed.

Concluding his proclamation, the Judge urged all farm and ranch families and those who serve agricultural producers to: ready safety articles, items in magazines and newspapers which feature safety; read and heed instruction manuals and product labels; be informed on what to do in case of emergencies such as severe weather, fire, poisoning, bleeding, drowning, etc.; Take the Defensive Driving Course; Hunter & Home Firemarm Safety Courses; Take the Basic First Aid Course. He then emphasized the need for taking the CPR Course which is special instruction on external cardiac compressions administered manually, alternating with mouth-tomouth resuscitation in order to stimulate the natural functions of the heart and lungs to save the life of a heart attack or accident vic-

The Accidental Death Program, underwritten by the Texas Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Company, is an optional service offered to county Farm Bureaus and their members. Currently, 197 county Farm Bureaus are participating in this program. Less than a dozen counties have not had a

claim. Under this program, members may receive benefits to \$1,000 for each member and spouse, plus \$500 for each member's unmarried child under age 25 living in the insured's household, attending school, or in the armed forces.

There is no exclusion with this insurance, provided the accident occurs while membership is effect, and the death occurs with 90 days after the accident. Claims must be reported to the home office in Waco or to an authorized agent within 20 avs after the accidental death of the person covered. Since the Accidental Death Program began on November 1, 1971, thru October, 31, 1979, TFB has paid

1,801 claims totaling According to the TFB Safety Department sevenyear (1973-80) study of FB accidental deaths; the public streets and highways have been the "big grim reaper" with auto-truck causing 834

rcycle/minibikes - 45 deaths; bicycles - 6 deaths; and pedestrians - 33 deaths, for a total of 918 traffic related causes.

Other causes and numbers of deaths of FB members for the recent seven-year study are as follows: Firearms -144; Drownings - 100; Falls -99; Tractor - 67; Aircraft Crash - 61; Fires and Burns -47; Electrocutions - 29; Machinery - 27; Explosions -20; Poisonings - 18; Animal -17; and choke/strangle - 7. Newspapers Of Eastland County

Bree. cheen, H.D. Vermillion, Jim Ewell, Joe Cook, Dwain Dennis, Charles G. Norton, Joe Stephen, Lynn Crossley, Marvin Hutto, Carl Garner and Victor Cornelius -- and a whole lot of others -- are the giants who have been associated with newspapers in Eastland County at one

First mention of a newsin the county, organized in 1873, was a Commissioners Court legal bid notice to build the jail. ordered in February, 1879, EASTLAND REVIEW. In 1884 the court ordered a legal to appear in the EASTLAND ANCHOR.

Since then a lot of newspapers have come, merged, sold, gone and stayed. There are five in the county in 1980: THE GORMAN PRO-GRESS, published by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Bennett and son, Lonnie. They bought the PROGRESS in 1974 from Col. Gene Baker, who owned and operated it from 1944 when he bought it from Clara

The four others are published by Mr. and Mrs. H.V. O'Brien. They are the CISCO PRESS, edited by Hallmark; THE Herrell RISING STAR, edited by Donham; THE RANGER TIMES, edited by Betty McGree; and THE EASTLAND TELEGRAM, edited by O'Brien. The newspapers and a commercial printing department operated by Hale Dunson are operated as Eastland County

The RISING STAR was purchased from B.A. Butler in 1972. He bought it from Doc Sellers and operated it for 18 years. Over the years, Butler had edited papers in Cisco and Eastland and other towns.

The PRESS, TELEGRAM and TIMES were purchased from J.W. Sitton in July, 1968. He had bought THE PRESS in 1948 from a local corporation headed by the late Charles Kleiner and published it alone until November, 1961, when he bought the TIMES and TELEGRAM from O.H. Dick and Joe Dennis. They had bought the two papers from Walter Murray in July, 1950. A central offset plant was initiated in Eastland in 1971. THE CARBON MES-SENGER, long owned and operated by Merritt Dunn in Carbon was consolidated into THE TELEGRAM in 1970. Mr. Dunn bought the MES-SENGER from Mr. Davis in 1925 and operated it 45

Chances are that there are dusty, old documents in safes at every news office in

history. Ours, coupled with several of Boyce House's books (principally "Oil Field Fury") make fascinating reading. House came to Eastland County in 1920 from Memphis, as a young editor to work for R.K. Phillips, who came from Weatherford, at THE OIL BELT NEWS. House wrote extensively of the then slowing oil boom, popularized and promoted a horned toad into Old Rip with a 31-year sleep and went on to become a Texas-wide chronicler of wide readership. With a typewriter, VIVIU promised and delivered: "I give you Texas and the Great

THE OIL BELT NEWS had a pressman who had been a business manager for O. Henry's magazine, "The Rolling Stone.

Southwest

A postal report in April, 1924, shows B.A. Butler editor and W.D. Breecheen, business manager of the OIL BELT NEWS.

In 1928 the EASTLAND ARGUS-TRIBBUNE was sold by Edmund Walker to Walter Murray who owned papers in Ranger, Breckenridge and Mineral Wells. He got a second-class postal permit for THE RANGER TIMES, subscribed for AP wire service and bought out the RANGER RECORD in 1919.

Second class mail permit for THE EASTLAND TELE-GRAM was issued April 5,

1925. Frank Jones established the County Eastland CHRONICLE in 1931 and sold it to Murray (Times Publishing) in 1934.

In 1928 W. Charles Kellum bought the DESDEMONA GUSHER from Hall Walker (for \$500.) and moved it to Eastland as the Eastland County INDEX. (Records aren't clear on what happened to the INDEX.)

Dick and Dennis bought Murrary's papers in 1950 EASTLAND and the COUNTY RECORD from H.D. Vermillion in 1951. In 1955. Dick sold his interest to Floyd Casebolt, but later bought back into the partnership with Dennis.

The newspaper business in Cisco dates back to 1892 when a man named Warner L. Wilson established the Cisco Apert. Mrs. George Langston, who

wrote a history of Eastland County in the year 1904, had this to say about The Apert: "In 1892, Mr. Warner L. Wilson established a new paper in the town of Cisco and gave it the unique name above. The Apert, which has always been Democratic, is the oldest printing establishment in the county under one management. Mr. Wilson is a native Texan and Houston is his birthplace. While he is a staunch Democrat, he entertains liberal views and is generous toward those

who differ with him." In the year 1895, The Cisco Roundup was established by Frank Verson. A community-

minded man, Mr. Verson organized the first public library in Cisco-the forerunner to the present Cisco Public Library, which operates under the ownership of the 20th Century Club.

The two early day weeklies were merged into the old Cisco Daily Press as the oil boom spread to Cisco in the years between 1915 and 1920. The News Publishing Co., owners of the city's first daily newspaper, was headed by the late B.S. Huey. It was printed in a building that later became the Judia Theater and the A-G Motor

In 1924, a man named A.B. O'Flaherty, an! ex-linotype operator out of New Orleans, La., who boasted a Kentucky ancestry, took over the Daily News and later acquired a majority of the stock in the company. O'Flaherty built the existing newspaper building in Cisco in 1927 and installed a modern Duplex flatbed printing press. In 1929, he sold the newspaper to the Marsh-Fentress chain of Waco and Austin.

In 1934, The Free Publishing Corporation was formed by the late Charles J. Kleiner and the late Harry Reynolds with B.A. Butler, as editor and publisher. The Free Press began as a semiweekly with offices in the building now occupied by

Graham Motor Company. The Press was the outgrowth of a community battle between the late A.S. Hickok and Lone Star Gas Company, during which time the Hickok company built a gas distribution system in Cisco.

Finding advertising in a depression economy inadequate, The Press upped its publication pattern to daily. In 1937, The Press bought The Daily News from the Marsh-Fentress people who were withdrawing from the small daily field. Operations were transferred to the present Press building.

In 1941, Butler tgurned over his interests to O'Flaherty, who had established a newspaper in San Angelo and disposed of it. O'Flaherty operated the consolidated newspapers until 1948 when the Free Press Publishing Corporation was purchased from Kleiner, Reynolds, O'Flaherty and others by J.W. Sitton and the late Ted

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Homemaking Tips

The most common topic of conversation these days is the weather. And, it has certainly been very hot this past month. There are some precautions people should take to avoid hot weather problems.

If you becme overexposed to the sun or everexert during extreme heat and humidity this summer, you may get heat cramps, heat exhaustion, or possibly even the rare but serious

Avoiding these hotweather complications is more than simply a matter of staying in cool or airconditioned areas and walking on the shade side of the street - as important as those precautions are. You'll also need to pay attention to medically sound preventative steps.

1. Wear loose-fitting, light colored clothing that reflects the sun's rays and allows for better sweat evaporation, and wear a wide-brimmed hat for added protection.

2. Avoid sudden changes of temperature, such as dashing from an air conditioned building to a hot sidewalk or car. Before getting into a car that's been parked in the sun, open it up for a few minutes.

3. Stick to cool drinks and food, and salt your food liberally. Salt tablets are seldom necessary if you have a well-balanced diet. If you feel the need for salt tablets, check first with your

4. Don't overeat. Don't overindulge in alcoholic drinks. Your body system needs extra water in hot

weather, whether or not your thirst sensation increases. Drink water often, even when you don't feel the urge.

5. Acclimate yourself by limiting exposure to the sun or strenous outdoor activities to just 15 minutes on the first hot day, adding 15-30 minutes each day over a week or ten days.

6. Avoid outdoor physical activity between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. whenever possible.

7. When you exercise in the heat, take a 5-10 minute break every half-hour. Don't exercise just before or after

8. Drink plenty of water or salted lemonade when you're exercising. You many have heard that drinking water when you're hot and active will bring on stomach cramps, but it is not true; you need to keep up your water intake to replace what you're losing in sweat - so drink when you're thirsty.

9. Also take extra precautions when-ever the humidity is high during a heat wave. When the relative gets above 60%, the air won't absorb as much sweat as your body needs to get rid of, and by 75% relative humidity, it won't absorb any. This, coupled with high temperatures, is particularly dangerous.

10. If the weather is hot and dry, you may not feel sweaty, but in high temperatures you indeed are sweating; the dry air is evaporating the sweat so effectively that you don't get damp skin or soaked clothes. Drink plenty of water; don't be lulled by the false idea that you're not losing any.

11. Take extra care when the official temperature is higher than 85 degree F. If the official temperature is, say, 95 degree F, it may be well over 105 degree F on a tennis court or in your backvard garden, even in the shade. Official reading are often taken from towers or high buildings.

12. If you are on a low-salt or salt-free diet, or if you have a chronic disease, heart disease, hypertension, diabetes, or lung disease, for example - high heat and humidity will put an especially heavy burden on you. Consult your doctor before engaging in any unusual activity or changing your salt intake.

13. If you do feel the effects of the heat and humidity unexplained stomach or arm and leg cramps, extreme fatigue, nausea, headache, or dizziness - get medical attention as soon as possible.





mites, or red spiders, are probably the most difficult pests to control in vegetable gardens. With hot dry weather gardeners should be on the lookout for this pest by checking the underside of plant leaves if your vegetables are still surviving the

Although spider mites will attack almost any plant, among their preferred hosts are beans, tomatoes, peas, eggplants and corn.

Actually, spider mites are not insects but are eight-legged relatives of ticks and spiders. Their small size, about 1/60 of an inch, makes them difficult to see without a magnifying lens. They range in color from red, green and yellow to white and brown. Spider mites deposit their eggs on the underside of leaves. These hatch in about five days. There may be 10-15 or more

generations per year Mites can cause considerable plant damage by sticking their needle-like mouthparts into leaf tissue and sucking out the juice while injecting a toxic substance into the leaf. Heavy infesta-

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tions will cause leaves to appear blotched or spotted, turn pale or yellowish in color, curl up, turn brown and eventually drop off. A thin webbing may cover leaves and stems.

Begin a control program as soon as spider mites are detected and before plant damage is obvious. A light infestation of spider mites can be reduced and kept at low levels by spraying plants with a strong stream of cool water every few days.

If chemicals must be used, select from such effective materials as Kelthane and diazinon. Two to four applications may be needed at five-day intervals. Always follow on the pesticide label. May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm late in the evening. Females are laying eggs and white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on roots of bermuda grass and St. Augustine grass in home lawns. Once

measures should be taken. Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Eastland County will need to treat between mid-July and early August. Timing of application is critical for adequate

grubs begin feeding control

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square feet of lawn. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at the chemical container label. The granular form is easier

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where grubs are feeding.



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
