**Equipment Problems
Cause Pressure Drop**

A leaking water valve that caused a three-hour shutdown for replacement at the College Hill station resulted in a pressure drop of some 60 pounds Sunday morning, Acting City Manager Marilyn Smith reported Monday.

The drop to 20 pounds, which is 60 pounds below the desired minimum margin, was regarded as serious enough for Mayor Roy Cartee to request local church ministers to make pulpit announcements and request residents to stop all outside watering.

It was afternoon Monday before the city pumps could build the pressure back to 80 pounds, Mrs. Smith reported.

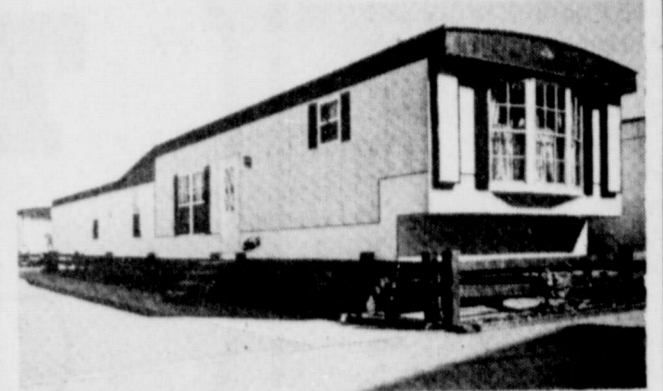

Ranger Establishes Railroad Museum

When the Missouri-Pacific Railroad closed its depot in Ranger, the depot building, which was built in 1919 during the oil boom and considered the most beautiful between Ft. Worth and El Paso, was

given to the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the Ranger Industrial Foundation to be used as a public facility.

Plans for the red brick building include leasing a

baggage room and office on the south end to the railroad and moving the Chamber of Commerce office into the building, with the remainder of the large building to be used as an oil boom era railroad museum.

The building is to be repaired and preserved and the surrounding grounds are to be landscaped.

Photos, memorabilia, and relics of the "World's Largest Oil Boom" and the railroad that served it are to be displayed and preserved in the museum.

This project didn't just happen, it was brought about

by the work and negotiations of a citizen's committee and the people of Ranger.

Some sizeable donations have been made to the museum already and efforts are underway to secure a caboose to park beside the depot building.

Anyone who would like to contribute an old photograph, momento, or artifact to the museum should contact Stubby Warden at the Chamber office. Any item pertaining to the history or folklore of Ranger would be greatly appreciated and the donor will be acknowledged.

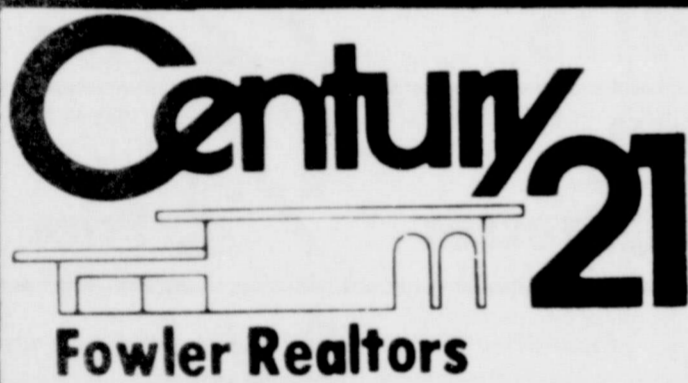

Small Royalty Owners W.P. Tax Zapping

The Royalty Owner's Congressional Hearing on the Oil Windfall's Profit tax, which was held in Austin on Thursday the 17th, was a stormy but informative meeting according to Doris Franklin of Cisco.

Mrs. Franklin of Trans-Sec Answering Service, a Public Stenographer who works with local Oil Companies, was accompanied to the five hour meet by Mrs. Troy (Joyce) Galyean of Cisco.

There was apparently no more Eastland Eastland County representation at the gathering, which included about 5,000 angry Royalty owners, the heads of Independent Oil Companies, and farmers and ranchers from all over Texas and Oklahoma.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Texas called and directed the meeting, which was open to the public. Five minutes per speaker was allowed, and about 30 private citizens plus a number of Government officials spoke to the crowd. Political leaders at the meet included Senator Bentsen, Congressman J.J. Pickle, Senator David Boren of Oklahoma, and Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent. Noticeably absent were Congressman Charles Stenholm and Texas Gov. Clements, who have both expressed total opposition to the Windfall's Profit Tax. (The Tax, however, had all-out support from President Jimmy Carter as it was pushed through Congress.)

At the opening of the hearing, Bentsen stated that when the tax was first proposed, the plan was to use it as a "heavy club" to prevent Oil Companies from profiting excessively from the decontrol of domestic oil prices.

"But today that same club is being wielded against hundreds of thousands of small royalty owners in producer states like Texas and Oklahoma," he said.

Texas Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent said the ryalty owners are suffering because other Americans, greedy for Texas gas and oil, won't share the burden of developing more energy supplies. Because of Federal regulations, they are receiving Texas natural gas for about one-sixth for what we pay Mexico and Canada, he said, and Texas oil for one-half of what it costs on the world market.

"Gentlemen, Texas consumers in general, and Texas small royalty owners in particular, have gotten the double-whammy!" he declared.

Bill McCormick of Snyder, President of the West Texas Land and Royalty Owner's Association, said he believed Congress failed to realize the effect the tax would have on the rural property owner who leases his land to big oil companies for one-eighth or less interest in each barrel of oil.

"Therefore, the Association recommends the exclusion of royalty interests from the windfall property tax," he said in a prepared statement.

A number of private citizens, indicating that they spoke for th 600,000 oil well royalty owners in Texas, stated that they are being robbed with an unfair and probably unconstitutional tax on crude oil. Many of them are old, ill, and need the money for survival. Examples of royalty checks cut from \$460.00 per month to \$160.00 per month were stated.

Roy Wheeler of San Angelo, said he and other members of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas fear the tax is a step toward national land use controls. Joe B. McShane Jr. of Monahans, president of the National Stripper Well Association, said the tax will cost the nation a lot of oil be-

ing recovered from wells that now produce barely enough to show a reasonable profit. And heads of Independent Oil Companies, similar to the ones who develop and produce most of the oil in Eastland County, stated at the hearing that they are being forced into a crisis situation because they do not have the financial resources to ride through the tax such as the large oil conglomerates have. About one-third of the oil production all over the state is being taxed away, and only about 15 per cent of this is actually earmarked for developing new energy resources. Major companies who produce crude and then refining and retail it can recover their losses through higher prices. Small oil producers and other royalty owners have no recourse.

Doris Franklin stated that she found a tremendous lot of bitterness against the Government at the meet, and even felt that some irate citizens were "using the gathering to make a mockery of the Government". She felt, however, that the hearing will have profitable results, because "The message will go back to Washington in a way that all can understand. The life of Eastland County," she added, "will be vitally affected by what develops along these lines. I really can't think of anything more important to all of us."

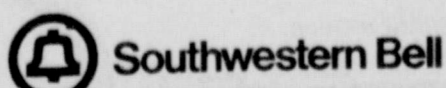

Evelyn Donham-County Journalist

Evelyn Donham is one of the young Eastland County journalists who uses her talent in a very practical way-the writing and production of an area newspaper. As Editor of the historic, 90 yr. old "The Rising Star", she is responsible for a lot of the work involved with each issue.

Rising Star, like other towns of Eastland County, has its own special flavor, and the paper reflects the interests of its readers. With its location near Brown and Callahan Counties, the paper reaches into communities across the County lines.

The 1980 Census lists Rising Star as having a population of 1180 persons, but there are quite a few people living on small acreages near the City Limits. In spite of the oil development pressing upon it, the town has managed to keep the serene look of a rural trade center. Interesting older buildings flank a long main street, and tree-shaded homes cluster nearby. A number of Rising Star residents are Senior Citizens, but another segment of the population is very young. It is the restless young adults who leave Rising Star, and then wish they could go home.

"People tell me I am always happy," Mrs. Donham smiles. "I enjoy all aspects of the newspaper, especially the day-to-day contact with people. You never know what will happen next in this business! In a small town, you don't have major spectacular news events, but nevertheless the news contained in the paper is the way most people keep abreast of what is happening in their town and community. Many people don't want to bother with attending the City Council and School Board meetings, but are concerned-and keep up with issues through the newspaper."

The newspaper is also important to out-of-town

subscribers, to folks who have lived in or around Rising Star at one time and enjoy keeping up with friends and relatives. I think we have an advantage over most big, metropolitan newspapers in that we are able to focus more on our local people. Something that might be overlooked in Dallas might be headlines here. And we really try to highlight our fine young people, especially in school related activities.

"Another aspect of the newspaper I personally enjoy is writing feature articles. There are so many talented, interesting people living here that I never run out of interesting stories. Everyone has a story to tell-if I will just take the time to sit down and listen."

"The actual paste-down of the newspaper is always a challenge. Sometimes it's like a big jig-saw puzzle. When I begin, it looks like it will never all fit into place. But as I work, the pieces somehow fit together."

Oddly enough, Mrs. Donham's early life and training was not involved with journalism. She was born to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kipp in Feb., 1952, at Brenham, Texas. She attended public school at Giddings, which is located between Houston and Austin. Following her graduation she attended Sam Houston State University in Huntsville. While there she met and married Mike Donham, whose home town was Rising Star. Before long the young couple moved to College Station, where they both attended Texas A. and M. University.

In 1972 they moved to Rising Star, and Evelyn took some courses at Cisco Junior College.

"One thing kind of unusual about my education," Evelyn says, "is that I never once took a Journalism course. My major was Medical Technology. Somewhere along the line I

Cleatus Rattan

Life is about normal in Cisco this summer. Reporters from distant newspapers and TV Stations, smelling blood, have been wandering about and pointing cameras at various citizens. In the wake of such happenings people sometimes forget the most important news around Cisco and Eastland County. The real news is: there are creative people around, and these shapers and movers will have a lasting impact on life in this area.

Fortunately, in the Eastland County newspapers, a poet doesn't have to aim a gun at someone to land on the front page. The writing of C.J.C. Professor Cleatus Rattan has been noted several times, although he insists his successes are modest. Cleatus is usually thought of as a poet, although he has had publications in three categories: criticism, poetry, and fiction. During the time of his most intense work he has co-existed peacefully with Cisco, and is beginning his twelfth year at the College.

The Professor has many attributes of the Good Life - lovely wife, three sons, and a piece of land which would please Thoreau. And, very importantly, he continues to distill his impressions of life and bottle them into capsules. It's a difficult and sometimes lonely work.

The interest of Cleatus Rattan in poetry is a long standing one, and not without certain discouragements in which he becomes the severest critic of his own work. He was absorbed in poetry in his undergraduate days at S.M.U., and at North Texas State University. After he received his Bachelors and Masters Degrees from N.T.S.U., he went on to other Academic work. His thesis for his second M.A. Degree in English, earned at Hardin Simmons University, was entitled *The Poetry of Stephen Crane: A Critical Re-Evaluation*.

Although Cleatus began writing poetry almost ten years ago, only during the last two years magazine and book editors have begun to publish or "pick up" his poetry with any degree of regularity. In these last two

years, ten of his poems have been published in various books and prestigious literary and academic magazines. One poem, a panegyric about his father-in-law, was published in the book *Images From The High Plains*, edited by Dr. Jerald Craven at West Texas State University. Two others were published in *The Texas Anthology*, a book published by the Sam Houston State University Press, edited by Dr. Paul Ruffin.

The magazines which have published Cleatus's poems are: *The Texas Review*, *Sam Houston Literary Review*, *Sands*, and *The Pawn Review*. All of these are Texas publications except *The Pawn Review* which is published in Kansas. *The Sam Houston Literary Review* is published by the Sam Houston State University press. The others are privately owned.

Of all Cleatus' recent accomplishments he was probably most pleased when he was asked to give a reading of his poetry at Sam Houston State. The students were very receptive to his poetry.

The critical articles which he has written have also dealt with poetry. *The Texas Review* recently published two of his articles on modern poets. One dealt with a book of poems, and other works, by Rainer Schulte. Schulte is an internationally known poet who teaches comparative literature at the University of Texas at Dallas. The other article analyzed the works of Michael Anderson, a young poet from California. Two other articles have been accepted by *The New Mexico Humanities Review*. These articles reviewed the recent books by Elizabeth Southerland, a California poet who is the protegee of Kenneth Rexroth; and a book by Hal Lenke, a poet living in Arizona.

Recently Cleatus has turned his attention and efforts to fiction, and he is presently writing a novel. One chapter has been accepted for publication in *The New Mexico Humanities Review*, although it will not appear until 1981. A second chapter is presently being considered for publication. Cleatus is

hard at work this summer trying to finish the book, but he says that he cannot predict when he will have it completed. All writers will appreciate the dedication which drives an author to work during this heat wave!

But a number of things keep Rattan working - his fascination with words, his reach for horizons, his desire to record life. And the durability of his work offers a marked contrast to much of the summer news.

The Active Consumer

Many consumers say that by writing their legislators today, they may be able to save at the supermarket tomorrow.

Scientists say those chemicals could be all that keep us from losing up to half our crops every year.

Without the protection the chemicals provide, many growers would find it tough to stay in business. That could cause food prices to grow like nobody's business. In the last 30 years, crop protection chemicals have helped growers reduce the



cost of feeding the average American family from 23 percent of disposable income to 17 percent.

Many active consumers are writing their legislators asking them to take action on issues that could make food prices pretty hard to swallow.

Writing your legislator may be a way you can help keep food prices from eating away at your income.

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OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

Did you know your kitchen can be your own personal beauty bar? Why, in the 'olden' days a gal couldn't pick up cosmetics on a whim and so she had to make her own. Why don't you try some yourself? They are certainly cheaper and just as effective as the expensive 'store boughten' brand.

That old favorite, Castor Oil, which was often used to threaten kids more than anything else, is just great for dry hair. It smooths out those split ends and makes the hair lustrous and glossy.

Just put the oil over the hair and work in gently. Wrap the head with a steamy towel for about 30 minutes and then shampoo. Of course, it will take several washings to get it out. Use vinegar or lemon juice to rinse and this will take away the itchy odor.

If you have oily hair, you shouldn't use castor oil...but do use the lemon juice or vinegar at least twice a week when you shampoo. It is even touted that lemon juice rubbed into the scalp will do away with dandruff conditions. And if you are a blond (naturally or otherwise) use the juice of two lemons in a glass of warm water after your shampoo to bring out those beautiful highlights.

Incidentally, if you have a fresh scar...use that castor oil and rub it on every night and the scar will loose its

redness and start fading.

If your hair appears dull and ugly, use mayonnaise (not salad dressing) for a hair conditioner. Massage a handful of mayonnaise into the hair and leave it on 30 minutes with a hot towel wrapped around it...then shampoo.

Olive oil is also a fine hair conditioner. Warm three ounces and apply it lightly but firmly to the scalp. Comb through the hair and wrap hot towel around...leave for 30 minutes.

The Aloe Vera plant is also great to use for skin blemishes. Just break a leaf off...and rub on the blemish. You can also use this plant if you have a burn. I always keep this plant growing nearby to use for cuts and burns.

Avacado is supposed to be a great skin beautifier. Of course, at my house they are eaten like apples...but if one goes a little bad...rub it on your face...and wait for the results.

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How To Make Prize-Winning Jam

Does it take a special "knack" to make prize-winning jam? "No," say fair judges, who pick the winners. Using fully ripe, high quality fruit, a good recipe and following procedures exactly are the secrets of blue-ribbon success anyone can copy.

Judges look for smooth, thick jam with bright color and excellent natural fruit flavor. Jam should be slightly softer than jelly.

For perfect jam that can win approval from fair judges or your family, use this recipe for Spiced Peach Jam and follow these tips:

— Use high quality powdered fruit pectin. A recipe with powdered pectin eliminates guesswork and allows you to use fully-ripe fruits, for best flavor and color.

— Measure accurately. Top quality results depend on exact amounts of fruit, pectin, acid and sugar.

— Use a large, flat-bottomed pan, so jam will cook quickly and not boil over.

— Make only one batch at a time.

— Time cooking exactly.

— Stirring and skimming for five minutes helps distribute fruit evenly in the syrup.

— Check fair rulebook for jar size. Most call for standard 1/2-pint jars or glasses.

SPICED PEACH JAM

5 cups prepared peaches (about 4 lbs.)

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1 tablespoon grated lemon peel

1 large cinnamon stick

7 cups sugar

1 pkg. Jel Ease Fruit Pectin

Wash and sterilize 8-oz. jelly jars; scald lids and



Wash and pit fully ripe peaches; peel, cut into pieces and grind. Measure fruit into 6 to 8-quart saucepan; if necessary add water to make 5 cups. Add lemon juice, peel and cinnamon stick. Measure sugar into large bowl; set aside.

Combine pectin with fruit mixture. Cook over high heat until mixture comes to a hard boil, stirring constantly. Add sugar all at once. Cook and stir over high heat until mixture comes to a full rolling boil (one that cannot be stirred down). Boil hard 1 minute.

Remove from heat; skim and stir with metal spoon or skimmer for 5 minutes to remove foam. Remove cinnamon stick. Ladle into hot jars, leaving 1/8-inch rim at top*. Immediately wipe jar rim clean, place hot lid on jar and screw metal ring on firmly. Check for seal in 12 hours. 7 to 8 cups.

*To seal with paraffin: Ladle jam into hot jars, leaving 1/2 inch at top. Cover with thin layer of

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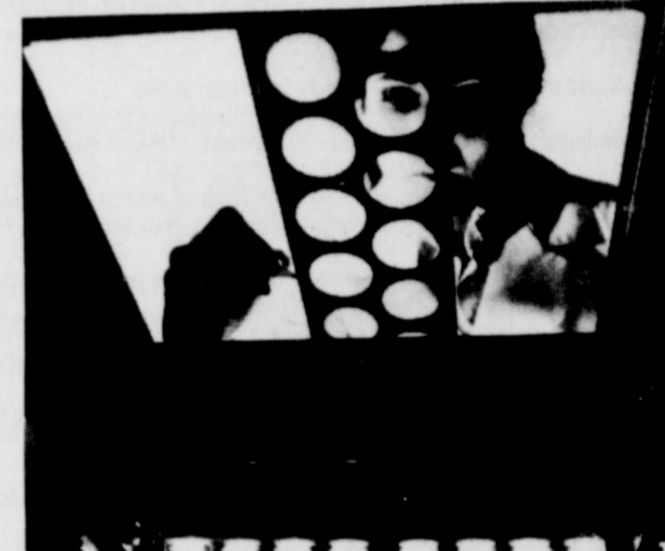

Health Views

DID YOU HEAR THE ONE ABOUT THE TRAVELING SALESMAN?

There are a lot of jokes about traveling salesmen (and saleswomen), but their problems are really not funny. Especially since some of them affect their health.

Think about it. A traveling salesman is in his car anywhere from 6 to 8 hours per day, five days per week. That's 30 to 40 hours a week in which he's getting little or no exercise. At night the salesman may spend another 2-6 hours doing paper work at his desk. And then he finally settles down to a strange bed that is often saggy. What this all adds up to is a lack of physical activity and poor posture. Poor posture by day... and by night.

Lack of exercise can lead to poor circulation and fatigue. Poor posture can crowd the lungs, inhibit breathing and tire the back, neck and shoulders.

Your doctor of chiropractic, a specialist in treating health problems related to the back and spine, has some good suggestions for the traveling person. The first few deal with maintaining the structural integrity of the body.

Since the salesman spends so much time in his car, he should choose it carefully. Look for adjustable seats, firm seat cushioning, ample leg room, seating that lets him sit on his rump and not at the end of his spine. Select a car that has dashboard instruments which can be reached without strain.

To get better sitting support for driving, fold a bath towel to about four inches wide. Place the towel across the back with the lower border just above the crests of the hip bones. This will help hold the back in a better position, decreasing fatigue and backache.

When doing paper work, make sure your desk chair is firm and supportive. Sit erect with your feet planted firmly on the floor. Change sitting positions frequently. Take some rest breaks, walk around, go to the bathroom, get a drink, do other things to break up the work pattern.

6. Take occasional driving breaks, during which you should do some exercises. Exercises might include side bends, toe touches, and squats.

Don't forget to exercise on the weekends. But don't overdo it, especially if you don't exercise during the week.

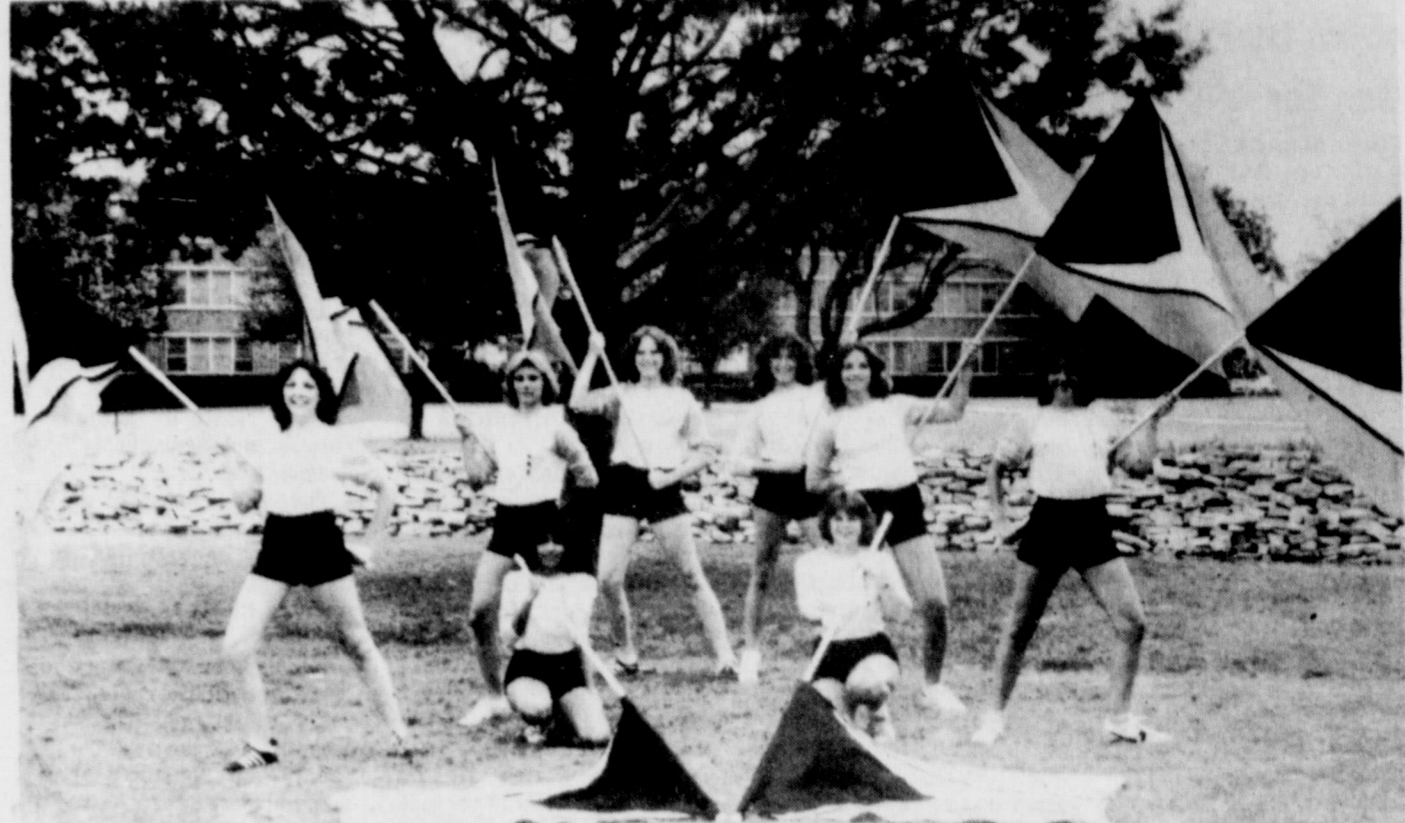

ATTENTION CISCO ISD PROPERTY OWNERS

The Cisco ISD Board of Trustees wishes to take this opportunity to explain the adjacent notice which is headed Notice of Tax Increase. The Board has previously announced a proposed tax reduction or cut for 1980 and still intends to reduce the rate. The adjacent ad which is required by recently passed tax legislation would indicate that local property owners will have an increase in their taxes for 1980. THIS IS NOT THE CASE; the 15% increase indicated is not above the 1979 tax rate; but above a maximum rate calculated by the school tax assessor in compliance with present state law.

The actual tax rate for 1980 will be set by the Board of Trustees in their August meeting. The rate set at that time will be a DECREASE in the rate from that of 1979 and will result in a lower dollar and cent amount due for 1980 from property owners of the Cisco ISD.

Two examples of the tax amounts due for 1980 are shown below:

Example A: \$20,000 property in 1977 Tax due \$197.60
\$20,000 property in 1980 Tax due \$182.00

Example B: \$10,000 property in 1977 Tax due \$98.90
\$10,000 property in 1980 Tax due \$91.00

The Board of Trustees hopes that this explanation has been beneficial to you as a property owner of the Cisco ISD and that you will contact the school tax office if you have any further questions concerning the notice.
