
The Sanguinet company's bid \$107,209.79 was the lowest of six bids submitted, Supt. James Couch reported. High bid was \$139,000.

Comanche Peak Nuclear Plant To Open In '82

Estimated dates for operation of the Comanche Peak nuclear plant have been revised to 1982 Ifor Unit 2. and the estimated cost of the plant has been changed to \$2.235 billion, or \$972 per kilowatt, Texas Electric announced today.

The new cost estimate is an increase from the \$1.7 billion estimate made in 1977. The change in schedule means an estimated delay of about one year for each unit.

TESCO President Bill Marquardt noted that even at the higher cost, Comanche Peak will still mean substantial savings to the company's customers compared to what they would pay for electricity produced by natural gas





THOUGHT FOR FOOD BY GOULD CROOK

About Cheese We should call cheese the original health food. Ounce for ounce it has the same protein value as meat, fish or poultry. 3 ounces of cheddar has about the same protein as 3 large eggs, 3 ounces of cooked chicken or beef pot roast. Also, it is readily digestable.

As with all dairy products, cheese is perishable and should be kept well wrapped and refrigerated.

Unsliced cheese keeps better than sliced because air doesn't

get to it as easily. A few things to remember when cooking with cheese. Use low heat, high heat makes cheese tough and stringy. Avoid long cooking periods, it's better to simply have it melt. Add cheese at the end of baking time when used a topping for casseroles. The best oven temperature between 325 to 375 degrees. Another answer to prevent cheese from toughening or hardening while the casserole bakes is to cover the cheese with a generous layer of bread or cracker crumbs.

One day I was making scalloped potatoes and in the middle of it discovered I had no American or cheddar cheese but that I did have some swiss. The potatoes were delicious, so I've used swiss again and again.
