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

Of the top ten counties Eastland carried 9.9% of the state total with 52,824,000 pounds of peanuts produced.

Total state production of peanuts for 1979 was 533,025,000 pounds from 309,000 acres harvested. Of the total peanut production 310,000,000 pounds were irrigated and 223,025,000 pounds were non-

Texas ranked third in the U.S. in 1979 peanut production following Georgia and Alabama.

Planting starts in late March and ends in late July with harvesting beginning in early August and ending in late November.

The largest production of peanuts is mostly in the Cross Timbers and South Texas areas.

One day last April the Convention Center at Dallas was suddenly filled with representatives from as many nations as the United Nations-about 200 countries. For this was a General Conference meeting of Seventhday Adventists, and these delegates-elected from more than 3 million Church members-had come to help plan the work of the Church. But, unlike the United Nations, there was an atmosphere of peace in this medley of languages and national costumes. Elder Neal C. Wilson, General Conference President, was elected for another term, as were most officers.

Noticably missing were the Cuban delegates, who had been waylaid and imprisoned by Castro's police.

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
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But there were members from Russia, the Iron Curtain countries, and Communist China. For many there were emotion-packed reunions with old friends from the vast network of medical, educational, evangelistic, disaster relief, publishing, radio, television, and other humanitarian

work of the Church. Between such large meeting, held each five years in different parts of the world, the overall work is directed from the General Conference Headquarters in Washington, D.C. Under this leadership are Divisions, Unions, Conferences. Districts, and Churches, with each congregation a link in the chain.

All Ministers, from the General Conference President to local Pastors, are paid the same modest salary, and do not handle Church finances. Each local group elects a Treasurer who disperses the tithes and offerings which support the work.

In addition to local Elders, Deacons, and other officers, each Church has a Community Services Director, who leads out in activities to help people of the area. Sometimes this involves assisting persons who need clothing and food, sometimes it is the sponsoring of educational or medical programs. These may include courses in healthful cooking or nutrition, health screening, or Five Day Plans to stop smoking. In case of a disaster in the Eastland County area, such as a flood or tornado, a Director can call in some of the Church Disaster vans from the Southwest Union. These are fully equipped to feed, clothe, and give other aid to victims. Church members believe this type of work demonstrates the outreach of God's love for all

Seventh-day Adventists consider themselves Protestants, in the sense that their organization resurfaced after the Reformation movements begun by Luther, Calvin, John Wesley, and others. They also believe that God has a number of true followers scattered in all Churches at this timepersons who are living up to all the light they have. These faithful ones will be "called out" into one Fold during a tumultous series of events which have now begun. During this time the True Church will begin a correct and timely message to the world-the Three Angel's Messages of Revelation 14. Another identifying mark of the True Church is believed to be members who "Keep the Commandments of God and the faith of Jesus." (Rev.

The present-day organization had its beginning in New England in the 1840's, under revivals of Bible study, prophetic discussions' and preaching. A number of early leaders and converts came from the Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, and Christian Churches. By 1863 these leaders had so many points of agreement that they joined together in a Church group. Some of the early pillars of faith were: belief in the Bible as inspired of God, as the rule of faith and conduct, salvation by grace and righteousness by faith in Christ, a distinction between the moral laws stated in the Ten Commandments and the Ceremonial Laws, the belief that immorality is not inherant in man, but will be given at the return of Christ to those who are worthy, and the desire of the Church to bear a timely message of reformation and the return of the Lord. The remarkable unity of the Adventist movement in its scriptural beliefs has con-

tinued until this day. Other basic concepts of the Church concern the nature of God, described as a personal, loving, all-powerful Being who longs to save everyone on earth whom He possibly can. Church members are taught that the work of religion is a right relationship with God, and the restoration of His image in the life. The highest revelation of God is in His Son, Jesus Christ.

The Church teaches that is is against the nature of God to force the will of man. Mind control is from an evil Being, called Satan or the Devil. God is not to blame for the evil in this world, for the Devil is responsible for all this.(Matt. 13-28). When the time is right, God will

destroy the Devil and eradicate evil.

At the beginning of history the Devil enticed the human family to join him in his rebellion against God. Since then the Devil and his evil angels have remained here on this earth, continuing to deceive God's creation. The Church teaches there is no 'Hell' burning somewhere in the Universe, but that evil will finally be destroyed here on this planet, where it is contained.

God devised a plan to win back humanity. The plan involved the gift of His Son, Christ, to die for the human race. This was necessary not only to redeem humanity, but to refute Satan's false charges that God was unfair and unjust. Much of the charges of Satan involved the moral laws of God-the Universal standard of Righteousness. Known by word of mouth before they were written at Mt. Sinai, the first four Commandments of the Ten Commandments set forth man's duty to God. The last six express what his conduct should be

toward his fellow man. It is understood that the Ten Commandments simply define sin-they cannot give salvation. But "New Testament Christians', the Adventist Church believes, will have these laws 'written in their hearts', out of love to God and what He has done.

The Church believes that when God intervenes in human history to destroy evil, Christ will make a personal return to earth to take His people to Heaven. This group will include the living persons who have accepted Christ, together with the righteous dead-who will be resurrected. The Bible pictures death as a sleep from which all will be resurrected. (1 Thess. 13:18, 1 Cor. 15:51-54.) Then, one thousand years later, God's people will be returned to live on a recreated earth, from which all traces of evil have

been eliminated. The symbol that shows one has chosen God and wants to be a member of that perfect society is baptism, an act of immersion in water, signifying the burial of the old life and resurrection to the new. And while waiting for the perfect society that God shall establish, a person should live an enlightened, unselfish life-for there will be no selfish people in God's Kingdom. There is no better way to spend the time than helping relieve the suffering evil has caused, while at the same time giving the good news that God has an answer to man's problems.

Since no person has the power within himself to live that sort of life, God has a special Helper available in the world-the Holy Spirit-to

guide His people. The work of the Holy Spirit is what it has always been-to lead peo-

ple to follow Christ. Seventh-day Adventist also believe that God gave the gift of the Sabbath(the 7th day of the week) to man. This is a time of special communion and fellowship with Him-a spiritual rest which links the first Sabbath in Eden to the eternal rest in the Earth Made New.(Heb. 4-9)

There are only a few Seventh-day Adventist members in Eastland County, and one Church buildingat Rising Star-which is not in regular use. The Rising Star Church was begun in the early 1960's, when a young doctor-Steve Seminuekcame to the town to practice medicine. Medical work is considered very important by the Church, and Dr. Seminuek was apparently a fine example of the Church traing schools. His work made many friends, and the town was shocked when the Doctor became ill with a brain tumor.

B.A. Butler, who now lives in Cisco, was the Rising Star newspaperman at that time, and he learned that the Doctor did not have enough money for the medical care he needed. Mr. Butler wrote an editorial about the situation which was extremely effective, for thousands of dollars poured in from all across the country. Unfortunately the Doctor could not be saved, but this kind act meant much to him before

his death. Eventually most Church members moved away from Rising Star, and ones presently there attend the Brownwood Church. Others in the County go the the Church in Breckenridge, which has an attractive new building on the corner of Sunset and Elliot Sts. Pastor Bob Elliott, who lives in Mineral Wells, cares for the Breckenridge Church,

assisted by Ed Boyd, local Elder and Administrator of the Town Hall Estates Nursing Home. The Breckenridge Church is planning to open an Elementary School in September, adding to a number of similar schools in

the Texas Conference. Visitors are welcomed to the mid-week Bible Studies or Sabbath Services at the Church. Sabbath School begins on Saturday morning, 9:30 a.m., consisting of music, participation by members in programs, and Bible Study. A number of translations are used in the Church, with the King James and Revised Standard Versions usually preferred.

The 11:00 a.m. Worship Service consists of more music, and a sermon by the Minister or layperson. Communion, which is held quarterly, is open to all who care to participate. New members are accepted into the Church by profession of faith, by transfer, or by baptism. They are encouraged to grow spiritually by Bible study, Church attendace, prayer, and practicing a Christ-like life. Devotion to the family unit is stressed, with unfaithfulness considered the only valid grounds for divorce. Even then it is considered better to restore an erring partner than to abandon him.

The Church believes in total abstinence of alcoholic beverages, but also teaches that true temperance involves choosing what is good, rather than simply avoiding evil things.

The Church understands that religion should in no way be legislated by the State. Yet the Church owes its religious freedom to this country, and cooperates with it whenever possible. The Church counsels its members against joining Labor Unions or Secret Societies, feeling that these may bind the conscience of Christians.

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
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Doris Franklin Launches Successful Private Business

New Locally Owned Business-TRANS-SEC **ANSWERING SERVICES**

While many small businesses are being swallowed up by conglomerates these day, Doris Franklin of Cisco has launched a successful, privatelyowned Secretarial and Bookkeeping Service called Trans-Sec Answering Services. (Soon to be known as Petroleum Complex). This business, begun in Feb., 1980, is located in a roomy building at 900 W. 8th Street in Cisco. Included in the facilities are three offices for lease, all redecorated with attractive carpeting and other features. A conference room is also furnished for the convenience of customers. Besides the secreterial, answering, and bookkeeping services offered by Trans-Sec, there a number of other innovative features. These include Records Research, Notary Public Work, Copy Work, Piece or Job Typing, RRC forms, Dictaphone-single mike or conference, Check Collection. Monthly and Qtr. Reports, Sales Tax, Federal Withholding, Federal and State Taxes, Payroll and Customer Billing, W2 forms, Monthly Income and Expense Statements, and General Ledger and Payroll Journal Reports. Doris Franklin has two assistant who work on these various duties as the need arises.

Doris, small, blonde and energetic, is still remembered by many people as the Office and Store Manager of Norvell Miller Grocery of Cisco. During the time she worked there her husband, Bob Franklin, operated Franklin and Sons Roustabout Service, giving him contact with a number of oil companies. After his unexpected death in April, 1979, Doris decided the time had come to establish a business of her own.

While remembering my husband's realization of the needs of Independent Oil Companies, and after working for oil-related businesses for several months, I understood how many businesses with out-of-town headquarters have a need for an office and part-time services here. This was the beginning of the Trans-Sec business

At the present two companies, Big Sky Drilling and Allred Drilling, operate their oil interests from this location. But Doris notes that she also welcomes small accounts, and that all receive personalized services.

"Generally it's the Independent Operator who is exploring and finding oil in this area," she states.

As Doris discusses payrolls or pulling rigs with one of these customers it is hard to realize that her whole life hasn't been related to oil work. It's hard to realize, too, while noticing her blonde hair, that she is part Comanche Indian, and descended from Chief Quanah Parker.

'Some French and Irish got mixed in before I was born," she smiles.

The latest reunion of the Quanah Parker clan was held near the Wichita mountains at Cache, Oklahoma. There Doris ate pound meat, listened to Indian stories and songs, and met scores of relatives. She describes the reunion as "beautiful".

She came back rested for dictaphones and telephones and ready to do battle against the Windfall's Profit Tax, which she says is strangling out the Independent Oil Operators and Royalty Owners.

Doris birthplace, in 1938, was far from Oklahoma and Eastland County-"At a place called Sebastian, which doesn't even belong to the

United States anymore!" Anyone from El Paso can name that place quickly-a settlement on the Chamizal Zone, on land deeded to Mexico during the Presidency of

Lyndon Johnson. Doris was one of triplets, with a brother dying at birth. Her surviving sister now lives in Austin, and a brother-Troy Galyean-lives

in Cisco. "My father was a construction foreman who moved all over the State of Texas. I attended seventeen different High Schools before I graduated!

At this time Doris played the oboe, drums, and piano and was given a Music Scholarship to San Marcus University. But she found the business courses much more interesting, and began to major in them. After two years of college she went to work in retail merchandis-

Soon she married Bob Franklin, a young Army man stationed at Austin. The next 23 years, until Bob's retirement, saw the couple and their children stationed in many parts of the world, including England, Scotland, Germany and Okinawa Seventeen years, in all, were spent overseas, with Bob-a Spec. 6 in the Army-making two tours of duty to Viet Nam. During the last time he was on the U.S.S. Corpus

Christi Bay rescue ship. The Franklins had six children: Lee, Kenneth, Donnie, Tommie, Tammy, and Robert. Two of the sons are in the Army now, two are with oil companies, and the daughter, Tammy, and 7

year old Robert are at home. Upon Bob's retirement from the Army, the family moved to Lake Buchannan, where Bob ran a commercial Fishing Boat business for three years. Then they moved to the Cisco area, and purchased a home at Scranton.

"I believe all our moving around," Doris says, "Had a lot of value to myself and the children. We learned a lot of things about life, and how to adapt to any situation. That's what life is all aboutand that-s what I've had to

'This business, when I began it, was totally my own idea." Doris pauses a moment. "And what I was basically aiming at was to encourage oil and gas research and production

A number of people with business interests stop by, for Doris maintains an oilfield employment service anong with her other activities. In the front room of the building most traffic pauses beside a corner rimmed by desks, office machines, and a switchboard, with Doris calmly stirring around inside. She pauses to discuss matters with persons who come by, and sometimes the people include her own two sons.

Control Armadillos

A very common animal seen in gardens and flower beds is the armadillo. The armadillo is in the anteater family, so it has no front teeth. If you see armadillos in your yard. and you notice scratch marks on your trees, it is a sign that they are digging around for insects in the yard. They will often scratch the base of your trees with their claws.

Armadillos are insect feeders primarily and are seen even more frequently in yards that are infested with grubs. They can sometimes literally tear up flower beds. Freshly watered areas will attract armadillos because the moisture makes the soft loose and causes bugs to come to the surface for air.

The best control is to shoot the animal. Or for the more adventurous, run up on the armadillo and catch it. The cannot bit but do have

powerful claws. Before shooting, be sure to check with the police department on the use of firearms inside the city limits. Armadillos are not intelligient animals, so they can be easily caught in a live trap as long as the trap is in their pathway

Better Oil Recovery Methods In Development

More than 300 billion barrels of crude oil will remain in known oil fields when they are no longer able to produce

with today's methods. "This is the easiest extra oil to 'find' but the toughest to recover," explains Pete Kelly, Exxon company, U.S.A.'s Production Department engineering manager.

A popular misconception holds that oil exists in large underground pools or lakes and that the wells simply suck the crude from the ground like a strow drawing soda. Unfortunately, oil is trapped in porous rock, and the reservoir holds oil more like a sponge, making re-

covery of a large percentage of the oil very difficult. Conventional oil production methods, on average, only recover about one-third of the oil in place.

Oil companies have been researching "enhanced recovery" methods for years in hopes of developing processes that will recover additional oil that remains "locked" in fields at the end of their normal productive lives.

Estimates of the amount of oil which can be recovered by enhanced recovery processes vary widely. Kelly estimates that at current world oil prices about 20 billion barrels may feasibly be tapped. This extra oil would increase 20 billion barrels may feasibly be tapped. This extra oil would increase America's remaining reserves by 70 percent and would help sustain U.S. oil production, which is currently three billion barrels

per year, he says. 'But enhanced recovery methods are expensive and high risk investments because they are complex and basically unproven," Kelly

Exxon is experimenting with three enhanced recovery methods:

1. Thermal: Steam is injected into the reservoir to heat heavy, molasses-like crude so that it will flow.
