Some 60 candidates for the 1980 Cisco High School football team completed their first week of preparation Friday afternoon and prospects for a good team appear bright, according to Coach Rick Calhoun.

Workouts will continue on a twice-a-day basis during the coming week at 7:30 a.m. and 6:30 p.m.

Coach Calhoun discussed the football program and introduced the coaching staff at the weekly luncheon of the city in Dallas, Fort Worth and Abilene.

Mr. Calhoun expects other sophomores to begin moving forward in the coming week. He said the players donned pads for the first time Friday, utilizing the opening week to study fundamentals and to work on conditioning. The week was free of injuries.

Danny Kent, basketball coach and football defensive coordinator,

is the only assistant grid coach back this year.

New to the staff are Dave Henning, offense coordinator and track coach, who was active in sports at East Texas State University; Ron Mouser, junior high and junior varsity football and head girls basketball coach, who played at Texas Tech; and Tom Slagle, eighth grade football and junior varsity basketball, who hails from Tarleton State University.

In a realignment, the Lobos are in a league this year with Eastland, Ranger, Dublin, De Leon, Bangs and Early. In addition, the team plays Haskell there and Baird and Goldthwaite here.

Coach Hennig told Lions that he was impressed with the size and dedication of this year's players. The starting lineup will average 200 pounds or better, he said, but the backup players will be smaller and in short supply.

Congratulations to four Eastland County pecan growers who won ribbons at the State Pecan Show in Abilene recently. These

were pecans that were grown in 1979. They won at the County and Regional shows before competing for state honors.

D.B. Raney of Ranger won a second place red ribbon with an entry of Caddo pecans. Another second place winner was Acres of Joy Pecan Farm at Rising Star with Cherokee pecans. Tony White of Cisco won third place with his Texas Prolific pecans and James Alexander of Pioneer won third place ribbon with his San Saba Improved pecans.

That was a pretty good showing considering the dry weather last year which caused poor quality pecans. And we thought it was dry last year. This year has really been dry except for the month of May. Eastland has recorded only 10.72 inches of rain in 1980 and 6.65 of that came in May. The few little showers we have had since summer began, totals 0.58 inches.

Unless we have some heavy rain fall, this will be the sixth straight year of below normal rainfall. The average annual rainfall for Eastland County is about 28 inches. During the last 12 months going back to September 1, 1979 we have had only 13.83 inches of rain.

During the hot, dry summer months range fires are always a problem. Fire is the great hazard to rangeland and everyone has a stake in preventing range fires.

The rancher depends upon vegetation to produce livestock which ends up as steaks and other meat products. Fishermen and water enthusiasts want clear rivers and lakes for fishing and water sports. Those who enjoy hunting need the forage produced on rangeland to provide cover and food for wildlife.

Thousands of acres are burned by wild fires each year. These ranges must be managed properly to reestablish forages. Burned-off land should be deferred from grazing the rest of the year and the following growing season.

County Eligible For SBA Assistance

Eastland County is among the 178 Texas counties now eligible for disaster recovery assistance because of drought and other extreme weather conditions, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced today.

When land is not deferred, livestock eat forage down to the ground. This keeps plants from building up food reserves and completing reproductive cycles, thus killing many plant species.

Doves, quail, deer and other wildlife, unable to find the type food they need, move to other areas, and serious erosion problems may develop because of continual lack of cover.

As far as wild fires are concerned, the old saying that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" still holds true.

Motorists should snuff out cigars and cigarettes and place them in the car's ash tray instead of throwing them out the car window. Recreationists should be careful with camp fires and should never leave them unattended.

Landowners can protect their ranges by building fire guards. Sprayers and other fire fighting equipment should be kept in good repair and readily available for any emergency.

Because we all have a part in preventing range fires and much to lose in case of fires, let's all comply with all safety measures and immediately report all fires.

"SBA disaster recovery loans are available to agricultural producers in the affected counties who have suffered crop and livestock losses," said SBA Regional Administrator Mercurio Martinez, Jr. "The loans are low-interest and many compensate losses not already covered by insurance or other disaster or deficiency payments."

The administrative limit restricts business disaster loans to the actual amount of the damage or loss, up to a maximum of \$500,000. Larger loans may be considered in some cases and must be approved by the regional SBA office. The interest rate on the loan is either 5% or 8 1/4%, depending on whether SBA determines that the producer could receive credit elsewhere from commercial or non-federal sources. Martinez noted that it is not necessary for a producer to be turned down by a bank before applying for SBA assistance. Loan maturity is based on individual needs and repayment ability and has a maximum of thirty

The following formula is used in computing the amount of eligible loss on crops: ACRES PLANTED X ESTABLISHED NORMAL YIELD X MARKET PRICE - RECOVERY = ELIGIBLE LOSS. Up to 50% of the eligible loan amount may be used to pay outstanding obligations such as accounts payable, notes payable and operating expenses including reasonable living expenses. At least 50% of the loan must be held for planting and operating expenses in the new crop year.

The filing deadline for physical disaster loans is February 12, 1981. Economic injury disaster loan applications must be filed by May 12, 1981.

Eastland County will be serviced at 5555 North Lamar, Austin, Texas 78751. Martinez said that loan applications and information on the SBA program will be available also in each county ASCS office. Students Eligible For Reduced-Price Meals

The Cisco Independent School District serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 70 cents in grades Kindergarten through the Sixth grade. Lunch for grades seven through 12 is 75 cents. Students may buy breakfast for 35 cents for all grades.

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown in the scale below are eligible for free meals or meals at the reduced price of 10 cents for lunch, and a reduced price of 10 cents for breakfast. Children from families whose income is higher than that shown in the annual income scale may be eligible for free or reduced meals if they have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30% of their annual income, special education.

tion expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses.

To apply for free or reduced price lunches or breakfast, contact the Principal of your child's school.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these meals. A family who has such children living with them should contact the Principal of the school involved.

All children are treated the same regardless of the ability to pay. In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

All students will be given an application for these meals at the beginning of school. Interested parents should complete and sign the application and return to the student's school as soon as possible. Information regarding this program may be obtained from the Principal of any of the schools in the Cisco Independent School District.
