That was a pretty good showing considering the dry weather last year which caused poor quality pecans.

And we thought it was dry last year. This year has really been dry except for the month of May. Eastland has recorded only 10.72 inches of rain in 1980 and 6.65 of that came in May. The few little showers we have had since summer began, totals 0.58

inches. Unless we have some heavy rain fall, this will be the sixth straight year of below normal rainfall. The average annual rainfall for Eastland County is about 28 inches. During the last 12 months going back to September 1, 1979 we have had only 13.83 inches of rain.

During the hot, dry summer months range fires are always a problem. Fire is the great hazard to rangeland and everyone has a stake in preventing range fires.

The rancher depends upon vegetation to produce livestock which ends up as steaks and other meat products. Fishermen and water enthusiasts want clear rivers and lakes for fishing and water sports. Those who enjoy hunting need the forage produced on rangeland to provide cover and food for wildlife.

Thousands of acres are burned by wild fires each year. These ranges must be managed properly to reestablish forages. Burnedoff land should be deferred from grazing the rest of the year and the following growing season.

County Eligible For SBA Assistance

Eastland County is among the 178 Texas counties now eligible for disaster recovery assistance because of drought and other extreme weather conditions, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced today.

When land is not deferred, livestock eat forage down to the ground. This keeps plants from building up food reserves and completing reproductive cycles, thus killing many plant species. Doves, quail, deer and other wildlife, unable to find the type food they need, move to other areas, and serious erosion problems

may develop because of continual lack of cover. As far as wild fires are concerned, the old saying that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" still holds true.

Motorists should snuff out cigars and cigarettes and place them in the car's ash tray instead of throwing them out the car window. Recreationists should be careful with camp fires and should never leave them unattended.

Landowners can protect their ranges by building fire guards. Sprayers and other fire fighting equipment should be kept in good repair and readily available for any emergency.

Because we all have a part in preventing range fires and much to lose in case of fires, let's all comply with all safety measures and immediately report all fires.

"SBA disaster recovery loans are available to agricultural produers in the affected counties who have suffered crop and livestock losses," said SBA Regional Administrator Mercurio Martinez, Jr. "The loans are low-interest and many compensate losses not already covered by insurance or other disaster or deficiency payments."

The administrative limit restricts business disaster loans to the actual amount of the damage or loss, up to a maximum of \$500,000. Larger loans may be considered in some cases and must be approved by the regional SBA office. The interest rate on the loan is either 5% or 8¼%, depending on whether SBA determines that the producer could receive credit elsewhere from commercial or non-federal sources. Martinez noted that it is not necessary for a producer to be turned down by a bank before applying for SBA assistance. Loan maturity is based on individual needs and repayment ability and has a maximum of thirty







Pretreat oily stains on man-made fiber items. Ground-in soil may also need to be treated.

To wash, use a permanent press or knit cycle if available with appliance. Otherwise, use a warm wash and cold rinse; slow agitahome the 28th of August. tion or short wash time and slow spin speed. The Cisco Independent School District serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 70 cents in grades Kindergarten through the Sixth grade. Lunch for grades seven through 12 is 75 cents. Students may buy breakfast for 35 cents for all grades. Children from families whose income is at or below those shown in the scale below are eligible for free meals or meals at the reduced price of 10 cents for lunch, and a reduced price of 10 cents for breakfast.

Children from families whose income is higher than that shown in the annual income scale may be eligible for free or reduced meals if

they have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30% of their annual income, special educa-Sunday,
