
It burst into flames, he said, and the charwreckage measured about 36 inches tall. Holder said




Less than two months ago, city manager John Boland and five city employees quit their positions with the City giving similar reasons. In his resignation, Boland cited irreconcilable differences with the majority of the council over policies promoted by Mayor Roy Cartee.

Eaves said his resignation was not related to Boland's, although the problems each encountered "might be connected."

Mrs. Smith, who has been acting city manager since Boland resigned in June, reacted with little surprise and felt sure that the remaining police officers could handle the job.

Eaves said his resignation, effective August 29, was also due to a lack of patrolmen, but he does



not view the walkout as a protest. He said when he became police chief in July 1979, he had eight patrolmen. Two other police officers resigned recently, and the three officers and the chief resigning Monday leaves Cisco

with three officers. Eaves said the patrolmen resigned because the city wants to go to one-man instead of two-man shifts. He said the officers felt they could not work under those conditions and resign-

Because of the disagreement over the number of patrolmen needed. Eaves said he thought it was better that he resign as well.

"I was not pressured or asked to leave. It was my own choice," Eaves said.

Mrs. Smith accepted the written resignations, saying personnel matters are administrative; the council did not have to act on them.

Mrs. Smith is working on a proposed budget for the council to review September 2, including a proposal that the police department consist of five or six patrolmen, one fulltime investigator and one chief, for a total of seven or eight people. Eaves said he does

not know whether he will stay in Cisco; he does not yet have other employment.

Reynolds Ferguson both joined the Cisco Police Department November 1979 and Glenn has been on the force three years.

College Station-As Texas communities struggle to provide essential services like sewer and water systems, the question is always the same: "What's it going to cost?"

Such communities now have the opportunity to determine these costs without spending thousands of dollars in consulting fees.

By using budgeting assistance from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, local leaders can determine the most cost-efficient methods of providing such services as fire protection, sewer systems, solid waste disposal, health clinics, water systems, ambulance services and transportation for the elderly.

How much will an ambulance service in our rural area cost? Which is more economical for us, a green box dumpster garbage collection system or a house-tohouse system? How should we route our school buses in order to save money and yet provide efficient service?

"We don't make these decisions for community leaders, but provide them with budget facts and possible alternatives," points our Dr. James I. Mallett, Extension Service state leader in community development. 'From that information they can make a decision, not by guess or estimate or politics. but by hard, solid data

"Rural development efforts directed toward creation of rural job opportunities have been quite successful, and now many areas which experienced a population decline from 1950 to 1970 are beginning to grow.'



Following the afternoon children's crusade, the team followed a tight schedule by traveling via bus to Pingtung where they held two nightly crusades in the huge stadium in Pingtung. The group was gratified with the response of the approximately 20,000 who attended the crusade. Team members gave all who attended a Chinese Bible.

The couple will reside at Sunday afternoon, July 20, the Knoll Apartments in the group traveled to Tainon, Austin following a wedding Taiwan, arriving at 3:00 in trip to Galveston and the the afternoon. The group was invited by the mayor of Tainon to a welcoming ceremony at the City Hall. They were then driven to the large city gymnasium for a program presented for them by school childrens choral groups, orchestra and other performances. School was in session at this time of the year. After the program, the group was invited to a luncheon prepared by the city officials. The American team was surprised and overwhelmed when asked to walk single file from the large gymnasium to the city square. There the street was blocked off and as they walked single file they were instructed to stop before school girls who were all dressed in black skirts and white blouses. A flower corsage was pinned on each team member.

Performances including a Chinese Dragon dance was then presented in the city square for the American team. The group was then asked to walk again single file through an archway of flower decorated arches held on each side by 3,000 girl students from the schools of Tainon. Mrs. Cleveland stated, "We were overwhelmed at the tremendous, unexpected welcome by this city in the southern part of the Free Republic of China. The four blocks of walking under the beautiful flower strewed archway led us to the site of the outdoor night crusade where an unestimated thousands of Chinese assembled for the night crusade. Hundreds responded to the message presented them through the ministry of S.K. and Nora Lam Sung. Chico Holiday, a former American night club singer and now a full time gospel singer was the featured singer for the crusades team evangelistic

On July 23 the team left the Free Republic of China from the Taipei International Airport, for Manilla, Philippines. The group held two evening crusades in the Grand Ballroom of the Phillippine Plaza Hotel. The day after arriving in Manilla a typhoon struck the Manilla area. The government requested all people to remain at home. Mrs. Cleveland said, "This was my first experience to be in an area lashed by 160 mile an hour typhoon. The hotel, Phillippine Plaza, was located by the bay. The huge hotel was a safe and welcomed shelter as huge ocean waves lashed the large brick wall along the bay and bent the tips of the tall palm trees. I watched the storm and the torrential downpour from the huge windows of the hotel which overlooked the ocean. I was

grateful for our safety. "The storm abated by nightfall and several thousand Philippines braved the elements to attend the second night of our crusade in Manilla.

July 26, we departed

Manilla again for Seoul, Korea. Sunday our team attended the largest church in the world, the Korean Assemblies of God Full Gospel Central Church, pastored by Rev. Paul Yongii Cho. The church holds seven services each Sunday in order to accommadate the 110,000 members. It also televises all its services. The church building is enormous. Sections are divided in the balcony and ear phones provided for each to hear the message presented by choirs and the pastor in the visitor's own language of their particular country.

While in Seoul, the team visited the Angel's Haven Orphanage for fellowship with the children and teachers. Also members of the team visited Prayer Mountain where Korean Christians have dug caves in the side of the mountain. Here 24 hours a day Christians gather, individually or in groups, for intercessory

The final destination was Honolulu where the team spent four days in fellowship and rest at the Hawaiian Regent Hotel on Waikiki. Op-

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
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9 Amendments Due Nov. Vote

AMENDMENT NO. 1 Senate Joint Resolution 35, proposing a constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or city of their domicile on a shared basis to

serve public convenience.

The proposed amendment authorizes the legislature to permit state and national banks to establish and operate electronic teller machines located away from the banks' buildings. A bank would assign to each participating customer a unique form of identification, such as a card or identification number, so that the

INFORMED VOTING

customer could use the machine to communicate with the bank in confidence. Without the assistance of a bank employee, the customer could withdraw or deposit money, transfer money between accounts, or perform any other banking function. The use of a machine permits a bank to provide services for its customers at convenient locations away from the bank building and at times other than normal banking hours

The amendment would permit a bank to place machines in the county or city in which the bank is located or, if the bank is

located in a city that lies in two or more counties, to place machines in both the county and the city in which it is located. The amendment provides that a bank must be allowed to share with other banks in the use of a machine that is located in its area if the machine is not located at another bank's office, and that a bank may share in the use of a machine with savings and loan associations or credit unions located in the same area.

BACKGROUND Article XVI, Section 16, of the Texas Constitution, prohibits state and national banks from participating in branch banking, which is

banking at more than one location. That prohibition, which dates from 1904, is the result of a distrust of branch banking based on reasons that include concern for the stability of banks, fear that many banks could fail in a short period, desire to control the influence of large banking interests, and fear of a banking monopoly.

The federal courts have ruled that an electronic device that performs banks functions and that is installed away from the primary location of a bank is a branch bank. Texas courts if faced with that issue probably would reach the same result. An opinion of the attorney general indicates that the use of machines to perform banking functions is branch banking and is therefore unconstitutional.

The legislature passed this proposed amendment to lift the constitutional ban on the use of unmanned teller machines and enacted legislation for the use of those machines in anticipation of the adoption of the amendment.

While national banks are subject to the paramount authority of the United States, they are also subject to the laws of the state in which they are located unless the state's laws impair or destroy the national banks' efficiency as federal agencies or conflict with the laws of the United States. The United States Supreme Court has held that a state may prohibit national banks from participating in branch

Distrust of financial organizations is shown by the fact that before 1904 the Texas Constitution prohibited the incorporation of banks by the state.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

banking in the state.

1. Unmanned teller machines allow customer to transact business at convenient locations and at any time

2. Because each bank has the right to share in the use of the machines, a bank will be able to serve a larger area than it currently serves. Competition among hanks will increase

3. The use of unmanned teller mahcines allows banks to better compete with savings and loan associations, which currently may have more than one business location while banks are restricted to a single loca-

AGAINST:

1. The cost of installing a network of unmanned teller machines would probably be passed on to the consumer, raising the costs of services currently provided by the banks.

2. The amendment provides a method to circumvent the long-standing prohibition on branch banking in Texas.

3. Instead of increasing competition among banks, the use of unmanned teller mahcines will allow a large bank to serve the entire community and to force banks operating on a small profit margin out of business, ultimately decreasing com-

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Dove Hunting Outlook Varied

AUSTIN - Mourning dove hunting during the state's North Zone season opening Sept. 1 may range from exciting to dismai, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The North Zone covers approximately the northern two-thirds of Texas. In general, dove prospects are good in the eastern half of the North Zone and poor in the west.

Biologists said that in terms of numbers of mourning doves statewide, the 1980 season may be outstanding. Dove Program Leader Jim Dunks said call-count surveys showed an increase in the statewide breeding population for the third consecutive year.

Also, a nationwide survey indicates a 12 percent increase in the nation's breeding population of mourning doves, part of a 10-year upward trend, Dunks added.

However, field biologists point out that the continuing drought in Texas may cause many of the native birds to leave some areas before the season opens because of a lack of food, and birds migrating from the north may not stay long if food is scarce.

The Dallas/Fort Worth area seems to be the dividing line, with East Texas looking much better because of recent rains and the availability of waste grain for food. Shooting around watering and feeding sites may be outstanding in some areas because of the drought con-

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ditions. Biologist Hayden Haucke

of Paris said the Northeast Texas dove situation looks better than last year, with plenty of birds and ample food. "We had an excellent wheat harvest this year, and there is plenty of waste grain around," Haucke said. "Also, by the time the season opens there will have been quite a bit of maize harvested, which will pro-

By contrast, biologist Tommy Hailey of Breckenridge said just the opposite is true in a large chunk of the state roughly

bounded by Fort Worth, Wichita Falls and Abilene. "There's very little grain left for doves, only a little wheat stubble and maize. I expect most of that to be gone by Sept. 1 and a little croton weed will be all that's left," said Hailey. Likewise, biologist Jim

Dillard of Mineral Wells said from that city up through the dove hunting hotspot areas of Montague, Clay and Wichita Counties no significant concentrations of doves have been observed.

Regional Director George Litton of Waco said Central Texas looks a bit better. "We

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have quite a few birds right now, but the problem is that food plants have matured quicker during the drought and food may be real scarce by Sept. 1."

The dove situation in the Panhandle-South Plains area looks pretty good, according to Vernon Morse, manager of the department's Gene Howe Wildlife Management Area at Canadian. "We apparently had a good hatch of birds this year, and forage conditions also are pretty good," Morse said. "But as usual, most of the doves probably will migrate to the south of us by mid-September.



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
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
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
