The Cisco Blood Drive has been set for Wednesday, September 17, at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. A team of laboratory technicians from Mary Meek Blood Bank of Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene will be present from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

A joint organized program between Cisco Civic League and Cisco Service Club are sponsoring the blood drive. Each Cisco citizen's effort is mandatory in order to make this a successful program.

In order to insure an adequate blood supply, Cisco needs 40 pints of blood every two months. Cisco is, however, presently in debt to Mary Meek Blood Bank, so the need is great.

All types of blood are needed. There are no longer "paid" donors, except in the case of institutions using only the plasma from a pint of blood, so we must therefore depend on voluntary blood donations.

GORDON SPOT

Now is the time to check your pecan trees for weevils. The adult weevils began emerging from the soil last weekend in some areas. We have insects traps in a few orchards. The first weevils of the year were found on August 31. They do not necessarily emerge at the same time in every location. The soil condition and soil moisture helps determine the time for emergence. This is why it is important that each pecan grower examines his or her own trees.

The pecan weevil is a large weevil being brownish in color and about three-eighths of an inch in length. It has a beak about as long as its body.

Adult feeding is done prior to hardening of the nut shell. After nut kernels have hardened, the female weevil chews a hole in the shell and deposits her eggs in little

pockets in the nut. The legless, white grub hatches and feeds on the kernel from three to six weeks. When the grub reaches maturity, they chew a hole about one-eighth inch in diameter in the shell and emerge from the nut and overwinter in the ground.

Pecans are now changing in development from the water to the dough stage. If the pecan is still in the water stage when the weevil feeds the pecan will drop. The nut must be in the dough stage before the immature stage of the weevil can develop.

One method of checking pecan trees for weevil infestation is jarring of the limbs. To accomplish this, place a large sheet under a tree and jar limbs with a padded pole. Weevils will drop to the ground and remain motionless for a short period of time.

When you find an average of three weevils per tree control measures should be applied. Insecticides that are effective for weevil control are Sevin and Torak. Repeat applications as needed at 10-14 day intervals. Do not spray after the shucks begin splitting.

Honeydew aphids are a problem on some pecan trees now. They may be controlled by adding Malathion, Zolone, Cygon or De-Fend to the spray solution.

Homemaking Hints

School bells rang this week for many children across Eastland County. What an exciting time with all the school related activities getting into full swing. My own child joined the ranks of school children this year.

What better time to examine breakfast eating habits than the beginning of a new school year. This time of year tends to put everyone into a new routine.

Breakfast is important to everyone! Breakfast is more than the first meal of your day. The word "breakfast" means literally "break the fast". The morning meal comes after a 10 - 12 hour period without food, and just before your body needs food energy for a busy morning's activities. In fact, scientific studies have demonstrated that those who start the day with a basic nutrition breakfast perform better - physically and mentally - than those who start with lighter and heavier meals. And so, it's not surprising that many nutritionists consider breakfast the most important meal of the day. It's the number one meal of the day!

Nutritionists recommend that breakfast provide about a quarter of the day's nutritional needs. With today's changing lifestyles, about 60 percent of mothers of school-age children work outside the home, and over half of school-age children prepare their own breakfasts at least twice a week. As a result, the number of food items included in breakfast has decreased and quick-to-serve foods are becoming increasingly important.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
The recipes I am including this week are some quick breakfast treats for the kids. They're nutritional and can be prepared ahead.

BONUS BREAKFAST COOKIES
3/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup peanut butter
3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
2 eggs
2 tablespoons water
1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups wheat flake cereal, coarsely crushed

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Beat together butter, peanut butter, and sugar until light and fluffy. Blend in eggs and water. Add combined flour, soda and salt; mix well. Stir in cereal. Drop by rounded tablespoonsfuls onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool on cookie sheet for 2

minutes; remove to wire rack. Cool completely and store. Makes about 3 dozen cookies.

CHIPPER BANANA MUFFINS

1/2 cup mashed ripe bananas (about 1 medium)
3/4 cup milk
1 egg
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
1 1/2 cups complete pancake mix
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Heat oven to 425 degrees F. Blend together banana, milk, egg and oil; add to combined pancake mix and sugar, mixing just until dry ingredients are moistened. Fill 12 greased or paper lined medium-sized muffin cups 2/3 full. Sprinkle muffin batter evenly with chocolate pieces. Bake at 425 degree F. about 15 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm with butter and cinnamon sugar, if desired. Makes 1 dozen muffins.

GOLDEN GRANOLA
3 cups quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked
1 cup shredded or flaked coconut
1 cup chopped pecans
1/4 cup honey
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted

1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup raisins

Heat oven to 350 degree F. Combine all ingredients except raisins in large bowl; mix well. Bake in 13 x 9 inch baking pan at 350 degree F. for 25 to 30 minutes or until golden brown, stirring every 5 minutes. Stir in raisins. Cool thoroughly. Store in tightly covered container.







SHOP EASTLAND COUNTY FIRST County Hay Show Friday, Oct. 3

The eighth annual Eastland County Hay Show will be held Friday, October 3 in connection with the Eastland County Fair.

We encourage all that either produce or purchase hay to set aside bales to enter in the various classes. We need all entries in by September 13 so that we can collect core samples for analysis. All entries must be in bale form, either round or regular bales.

Classes that may be entered are: Alfalfa, Coastal Bermudagrass other Bermudas, Sorghum-Sudan and Sudan Hybrids, Other Perennials, Oats, Peanut

and Legume Mix. Any entry that does not fit exactly in any of the above will be placed according to the closest composition.

All persons residing in Eastland County are eligible to enter bales in the above mentioned classes. Ribbons will be awarded to all entries and special awards will be presented to the exhibitor of the "prize" bale in each class.

All entries will become the property of the hay show and the bales auctioned off the help defray the cost of the analysis and awards.

Any bale can be disqualified if it has objec-

tionable odor, injurious foreign material, under-cured, heating, hot, wet, musty, moldy, caked, badly shattered, badly weathered, frosted, or dusty.

Entries will be classified according to the following: maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from non-injurious foreign material, color and protein analysis.

Entries can be made to the Eastland FFA, C and D Feed, Eastland Grain and Seed, Perkins Implement and in other towns, to the local FFA Chapter and Feed and Seed Dealers and Implement Dealers.

Remember. If you feed hay, you owe it to yourself and your livestock to enter hay to determine the feeding value.

INCOMES RISING FASTER IN RURAL AREAS COLLEGE STATION

Contrary to popular belief, incomes of people living in rural areas are increasing at a faster rate than those of their city cousins. For the 1968-75 period, personal income in non-metropolitan counties increased 25 percent faster than in metro counties, points out Jack Jones, community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Jones bases this information on a recently released U.S. Department of Agriculture report, "Income Growth in Non-Metro America 1968-75."

Average per capita income, in dollars of constant purchasing power, increased \$920 in rural counties during 1968-75 compared to \$692 in urban counties, says Jones. Consequently, the income gap between city dwellers and those in rural areas shrank from \$1,651 in 1968 to \$1,042 in 1975. Among non-metro counties, per capita gains were greater in those located far from urban areas.

What caused this spurt in rural incomes during the seven-year period? Increases, in transfer payments, such as pensions and social security payments, and a stronger demand and price situation for food and energy, which boosted earnings in agriculture and mining, were mainly responsible.

Rural counties far removed from metropolitan areas showed more growth from property income (dividends, interests, rentals and royalties) and earnings from industry (agriculture, mining and manufacturing) than close-in counties, adds Jones.


