The Longhorn Restaurant, located at 505 East 8th Street, will be opening under new ownership here in Cisco on Monday morning, September 22, at 5:30 a.m. Jim and Wanda Groves are the new owners of the restaurant and invite

everyone to come by and see what they have done with the Longhorn.

The Groves are from the East Texas area near Gilmer and Longview. Before moving to Cisco about three weeks ago, Jim

Groves was employed by the Schlitz Brewing Company; however, he has seven years of prior experience in the restaurant business.

He operated two restaurants in the Lewisville and Carrollton areas.

The Groves are Baptists and have one son who lives in Garland. Jim and Wanda are living in Cisco at 301 East 7th Street.

The Groves stated they plan to serve good home cooking at the Longhorn and they are there to serve the people. Customers will have their choice of how they would like to order: a-la-cart, buffet or to-go.

The kitchen of the Longhorn has been completely replaced with all new equipment and the old stools and bar-type counter have been removed from the dining area and it is estimated to seat approximately 60 people. A new all-stainless-steel salad bar and steam tables have been added to the restaurant.

The Longhorn will be offering cafeteria style service where the customers can see what they are going to eat before ordering. A businessman's lunch will also be offered along with other regular menu items which will include steaks, Mexican food and some seafood items.

Jim Groves stated the restaurant will be closed on Sundays so "we can go to church with the other people in Cisco." The hours of the establishment will be 5:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday thru Saturday.

The Groves also stated they welcome anybody to go into their kitchen at any time and see how clean it is, because they are sticklers for cleanliness.

Wranglers Defeat UTA Arlington J.V. 23 To 9

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers upped their season record 2-0 here Thursday night as they defeated the University of Texas at Arlington Junior Varsity 23-9. UTA is 0-2 in season play.

The Wranglers dominated the first half of the game, scoring 23 points before going to the dressing

rooms. They scored once in the first quarter of the game and piled up 17 points in the second quarter.

The first touchdown was made the first quarter on a two-yard run by CJC quarterback John Farris. The extra point kick failed making the score 6-0.

UTA drew within three points of the

Wranglers in the first quarter with a successful 31-yard field goal by W.K. Brenner, making the score 6-3 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, CJC's Keith Pantalion scored on a one-yard run. Quarterback Farris added two more points on a two-point conversion after the touchdown making the score 14-3. Later in the quarter, John Cox upped the score to 17-3 with a 32-yard field goal. CJC's final points were added to the scoreboard before half-time when Wrangler Allen Harris intercepted a Kraig Hopkins pass and returned it 48 yards for the touchdown. The extra point attempt failed leaving the half-time score 23-3.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but UTA made the final points of the game late in the fourth quarter. With four minutes left in the game, UTA quarterback Hopkins connected on a 39-yard desperation pass to Darin Warbush. The pass for the two points failed making the final score of the game 23-9 in favor of the Cisco Wranglers.

The Wranglers will next face the Ranger Junior College Rangers in the Lion's Club Benefit Bowl Saturday, September 27, at 7:30 p.m. in the Buckaroo Stadium at Breckenridge. RJC recorded its third straight victory of the season Thursday night as it defeated the McMurry Indians junior varsity by the score of 52-0. CJC defeated McMurry in its season opener 20-0.

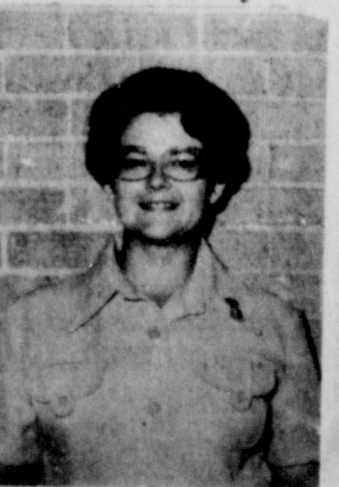

IWU Reflections In Perspective

Now, about this thing under which our illustrious Editor put into the paper our last effort. I. WILL USSERY. H.V. O'Brien is a very kind, gentle sort of person, normally. And he possesses a great sort of natural dignity and respect for all with whom he associates which would preclude his using a nickname (Bill)...or the full name with which I was christened...Isaac Weldon.

I subscribe totally to H. Allen Smith's proposal that no man child should be named until he is at least nine months of age. By that time the mother has come off the kick of naming the child for his uncle...Marmaduke Wilberforce. And the father has managed to assert his fatherhood by commanding that the child be named "George Milton, for a bartender I once knew in St. Louis".

Me? Not that it is of any significance; but I sort of lucked into being the first male-child of my generation. Terrible burden to bear, when you come right down to thinking about it. One of these days I am destined by pure biological fortune to become the patriarch of the tribe. Can't avoid it, if I am so fortunate as to live long enough. And I've managed, but the grace of God, to have lived just that long.

The man who presided at my christening was my great-grandfather, Isaac Newton Reeves. Ordained in Nashville into the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1853, he served his Faith...and what he hoped to be his country as Chaplain of the 16th Mississippi Regiment, Confederate States Army. Let's not for a moment, re-fight the War Between the States, but "Uncle Ike's" commission to that duty occupies a prominent place among the much lesser important trivia on the wall of my "pouting room".

So; this child, firstborn male, must be named ISAAC. And to go along with that first name must be at least one other name. Ever notice the names of men born during the period of prominence of political figures? Think for a moment of the people whom you've known who were named "Woodrow". Most of them born during the term of office of Woodrow Wilson. "Calvin"? Not many Republicans around, but Calvin Coolidge was not a totally unpopular president to this part of the country.

Well; there was a prominent politician in Texas 'round about the time I was born. Joseph Weldon Bailey held a succession of State offices. And both my father and Uncle Ike were strong supporters of J. Weldon B. Ergo; this child was christened, with considerable pride (which would have turned into much...equally much...disappointment had they known how he turned out)...Isaac Weldon. Simple as that.

Now H.V. O'Brien was born when I was 21 years old. By that time I'd somewhat shaken the dust of Carbon from the soles of my Friendly Five shoes. His father I knew. A legendary character, he was. But in his growing up, H.V. didn't know me. He'd heard me called "Weldon", and "Bill". The explanation of the latter was carried in a recent issue of his paper.

Being the inveterate gentleman that he is, H.V. dignified the name with which I was tagged upon the birth of my son by making it "Will". I'm truly appreciative of that. My father was known to many people by that name. And I shall not live long enough to make my footprints fit into his.

But, call me what you like (so long as it is printable). And so long as you spell it correctly. I have many Arab and Iranian friends who insist that my name...the surname part...is a corruption of a popular name in their society: "Assari". Strangely enough, I felt somewhat complimented to receive mail addressed to me as "Agha e Assari", or "Sayid Assari". Anyway; to repeat...call me what you like. Just spell it correctly.

Eastland Gas Well Completed

An Eastland County wildcat drilled five miles west of Rising Star has been completed as a Caddo discovery.

It is Palo Petroleum Inc., Dallas, No. 1 Gibbons, spotting 467 feet from the north and 844 feet from the most westerly west line of J. Syfrett Survey, A-1557.

The well had an absolute, open flow of 1,620,000 cubic feet of gas daily with a gas liquid, hydrocarbon ratio of 340,000-1 of 43 gravity.

Production is from perforations at 2,449-52 feet, treated with 250 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 3,347 feet.

Sentinel Petroleum Corp., Hurst, will drill two Eastland County wildcats.

No. 1-K Autry is a planned 3,900-foot test for the Mangum, West (3,100) Field.

It will be drilled five miles southeast of Cisco on a 40-acre lease.

Location is 2,173 feet from the north and west lines of Section 27, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Other venture is No. 1-B Hugh Bushnell, a proposed 3,850-foot test for the Foster (Marble Falls) Field eight miles northwest of Rising Star.

Drillsite is 1,938 feet from the south and 1,305 feet from the west lines of Mary Ann Clark Survey, A-51.

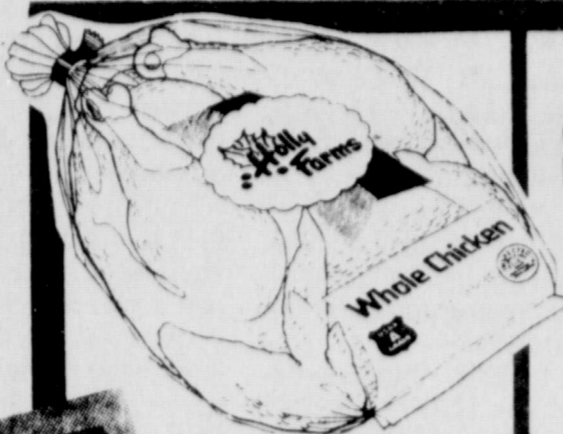

No strangers to this area, owner-manager Ray Cammack, his charming wife Veryl and daughter Charlene, who is in charge of the business office, are making their 18th annual Canadian tour during 1980.

The carnival is sponsored by the Eastland Lions Club in conjunction with the Eastland County Fair which is scheduled to open on October 2.

Fair grounds will be located at the Eastland County Livestock Raisers and Sheriffs Posse property north of Eastland. The same location that the Eastland County Livestock show is held.

Cammack head a carnival work force of some 250 people who move the show on 50 semi-trailer trucks and dozens of other vehicles. Neatly packed aboard the caravan of vehicles are concessions, midway stands and rides which range in size from the animated kiddie rides in Kiddieland to the giant Sky Diver and Super-Loops on the midway to the Scottier arena for bumper cars.

Thornton Feed Mill Is Subject Of Lions Talk

Thornton Feed Mill has upgraded its facilities during the past few years in a continuing effort to serve the community in keeping with business principles laid down by the late J.L. (Punk) Thornton more than half a century ago.

That was a statement by Frank Barrett, manager of the firm that he and his wife, Dana Thornton Barrett, own and operate, in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club. Lion Charles Clark, program chairman, presented the speaker.

It was in the late 1920s that the late Mr. Thornton came to Cisco to manage the Bankhead Feed Mill and Cotton Gin for Sweetwater Cotton Oil

Mill. After working a few years as manager, Mr. Barrett said the business was leased by Mr. Thornton. A few years later, in the 1930s, Mr. Thornton was able to buy the mill.

Operating the mill and feed store during the depression years was often difficult and Mr. Thornton often credited the late Kay Kimbell, Fort Worth industrialist, with giving him a helping hand.

Mr. Barrett noted that J.W. Stevens started work for Punk Thornton 45 years ago and except for time-out during World War II he has been with the firm continuously.

In 1940, the Sweetwater Cotton Oil Mill ceased operating the gin. At about the same

time, Mr. Thornton installed a large elevator and two grain bins, giving the mill a storage capacity of 90,000 pounds. The front storeroom and office were added in the late 1940s.

In 1952, Punk decided the mill could best serve its customers by making pellet feed and he installed equipment and began making his Circle T brand feeds. A new building, now called the cube room, was added along with a big molasses tank. A seed house was added in 1958, and a new grain bin was built in 1960 to increase storage capacity to 1,000,000 pounds. The cleaning building was built a year later.

Fertilizer tanks of 270,000 pounds capacity and ton spreaders were added to the growing equipment list in 1972. Another storage bin holding 775,000 pounds was built in 1976, and truck lift equipment that can handle 48,000 pounds was obtained a year later.

Truck and trailers for heavy duty long-distance hauling were obtained in 1978, and last year an 81-foot elevator was built to replace an old and small bucket slow-type machine. The new elevator was built by Mr. Barrett and Robert Guenther of the mill staff.

Two storage bins holding 870,000 pounds have been added this year, giving the mill a total of 3,500,000 pounds of storage space.

Mr. Barrett said the mill has 15 employees with a yearly payroll of about \$155,000. "We are proud of the fact that most of our people have been with us many years," Mr. Barrett said. Mr. Stevens leads the group with 45 years, followed by Herman Threet, 28 years, Mozelle Phillips, 23 years, Drucilla

Stillwell, 19 years and Isaac Jones, six years.

Mr. and Mrs. Barrett agreed that the mill's greatest asset is "the employees."

Thornton Feed Mill grinds and mixes a variety of feeds. They sell more than 150,000 pounds of bird seed each year along with a special Circle T worm feed. The Cisco mill is one of two or three in the nation that pulverizes feed. They sell livestock medicines, garden seed, tack except saddles, and the like. The plant's weighing scales are inspected and certified and often used by the DPS.

For most of the plant's half century, a huge bulletin board out front enables area farmers and ranchers to advertise their needs and wares. Numerous benches and chairs are utilized by customers.

Guests at the luncheon included Mrs. Barrett and Mr. Stevens.

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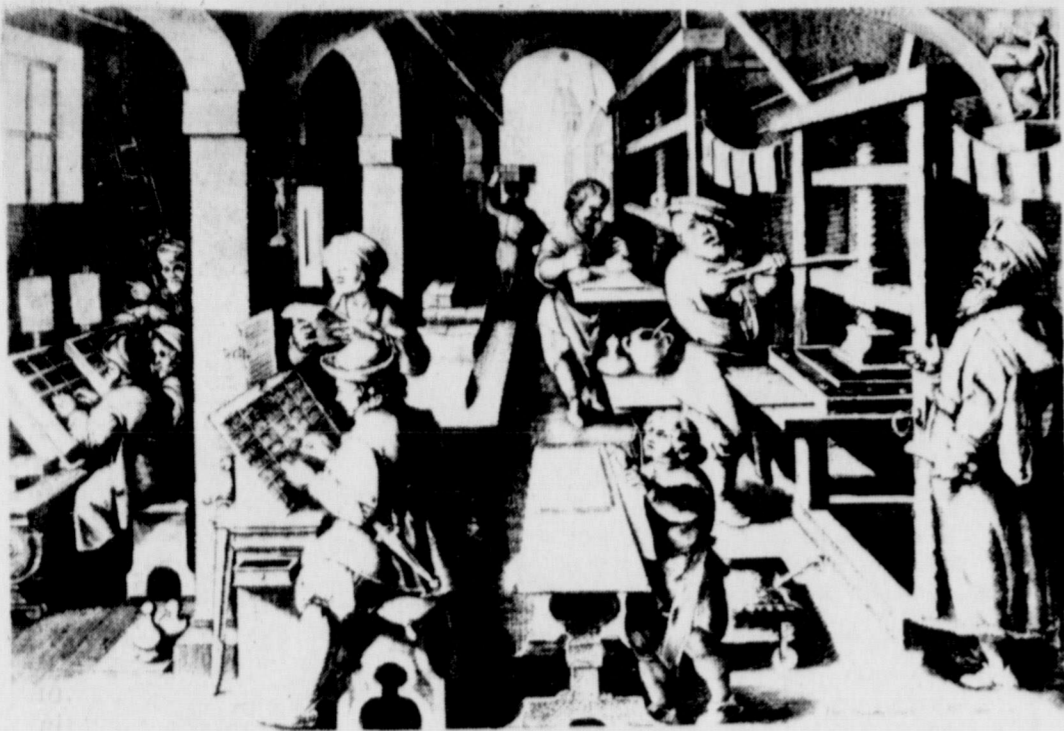

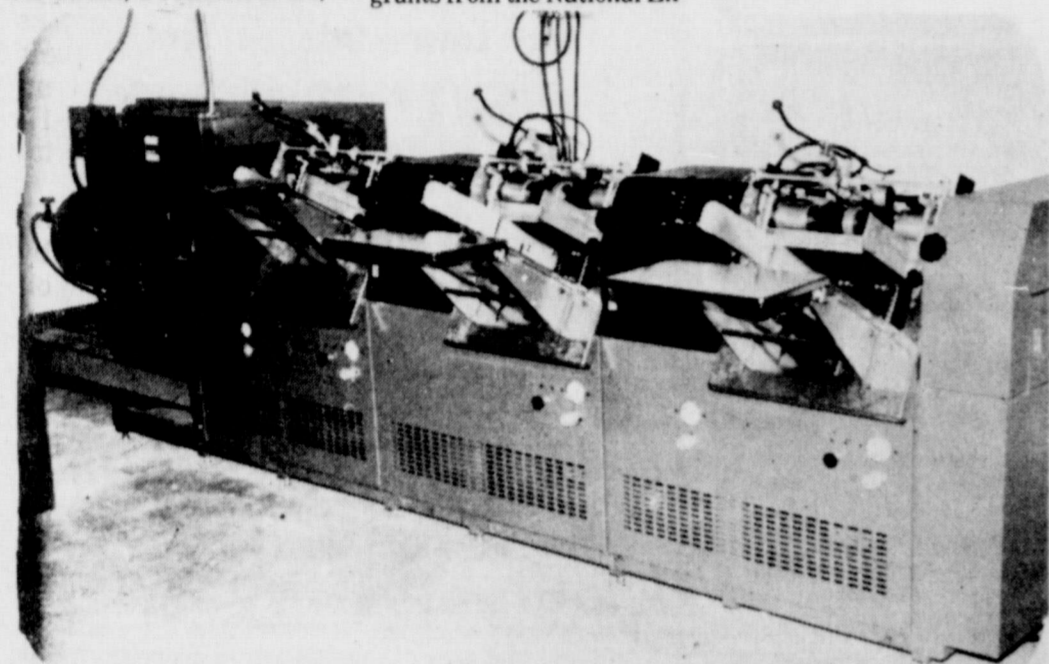

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INFORMED VOTING

AMENDMENT NO. 9

House Joint Resolution 54, proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the conversion of marital community property into separate property.

The proposed amendment of Article XVI, Section 15, of the Texas Constitution would allow spouses to agree in writing that the income or property arising from one spouse's separate property will be the separate property of that spouse. An agreement could encompass both property existing at the time the agreement is made and property to be acquired in the future. The proposed amendment also would allow property to be acquired in the future to be included in a written partition of marital property into separate interests, permit persons to partition property before being married, and create a presumption in the constitution that the scope of a gift of property from one spouse to another includes all income or property that might arise from the property that is the subject of the gift.

BACKGROUND

The proposed amendment would change some of the legal effects of the Texas marital community property system and create new procedures for deviation from that system.

The central concept of the body of marital property rights law called the community property system is that all property acquired during a marriage, other than property specifically exempted by law, becomes the community, or shared, property of both spouses.

The notion of marital community property rights originated with Germanic tribes, was taken by conquering Goths to Spain and France, and was subsequently exported to Spanish and French colonies in the New World, where it was the law of Texas during the periods of both Spanish and Mexican domination. Texas adopted Spanish law when it became a republic in 1836 and elected to retain it with

regard to land and slaves when a statute was enacted in 1840 adopting English common law as the general body of legal principles for all other purposes. The constitution adopted at the time Texas became a state applied the community property system to all property, real and personal, and that system has survived virtually intact to the present, excepting some changes in management and disposition of marital property as a result of statutes and judicial interpretations and excepting the allowance of partitioning as a result of the adoption of a constitutional amendment in 1948. Seven other states (Arizona, California, Louisiana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, and Washington) determine rights in marital property through some variant of the community property system.

It can be argued that the community property system anticipated in the modern movement toward legal equality by several hundred years, although its early applications may indicate the desire to protect a wife from the excesses of her husband by granting her separate, enforceable property rights as much as they indicate a recognition of the equal contributions that both spouses can make to a marriage. Whatever the motivations of its earliest advocates, in its modern forms the community property system, characterized by treatment of spouses as equal, or nearly equal, partners, is often considered to more accurately reflect prevailing attitudes about marriage than does the English common law system of marital property rights. In Texas, each spouse has an undivided half interest in property acquired during a marriage, except property gained through a gift, bequest, or inheritance to one spouse and except for certain compensation made for personal injuries to one spouse. A spouse may, without the consent of the

other spouse but subject to some limitations, manage and dispose of the property that he or she brings into the "community," but the ownership of the property and its sale proceeds reside in the community. In contrast, under traditional common law theory, a woman's personal property becomes her husband's at marriage, and she has no ownership interest in his property until his death.

The community property system does not, of course, meet the perceived needs of all married Texans, and periodic attempts have been made to create alternative arrangements for the ownership, control, and disposition of marital property. One attempt held unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court resulted in the 1948 constitutional amendment authorizing partition of community property into separate property. The courts have construed the amendment narrowly, requiring, for instance, spouses to partition property into separate interests before entering into an agreement creating another form of joint ownership of the property. A partition may include only existing property, and only persons already married are eligible to partition. Although the constitutional provisions in the two states were identical until 1970, Texas and California courts long ago reached opposite conclusions about the nature of income from separate property--Texas courts holding that the income is community property and California courts ruling that it is separate property.

These are the rules that the amendment is to change. In addition, the amendment would establish a complementary rule that the fruits of the property that is a gift are presented to be included in the gift.

Persons likely to benefit from the amendment include couples desiring to make separation agreements pending divorce who would be able under the amendment

to divide income they anticipate receiving before the divorce. By permitting prenuptial contracts to stipulate that income from separate property is separate, the amendment would allow a previously married person to preserve, before beginning a subsequent marriage, the income of his or her separate property for the heirs of the previous marriage. Also, the presumption that a gift includes any fruits of the gift would enhance the position of spouses seeking favorable federal tax treatment through the process of gifts to each other.

ARGUMENTS

FOR: A system of marital property law should provide general rules for determining rights in property and then allow, as the amendment would do, considerable freedom for persons to make alternative property arrangements when they perceive doing so to be in their best interest.

2. Benefits derived from property should be owned by the spouse who owns the property without which the benefits would not exist, as the amendment would provide and as is the rule in another major community property state.

3. The amendment would reduce the complexity of the process of converting community property to separate property and would eliminate the need for periodic agreements to continue a policy of ownership begun in a previous agreement.

AGAINST:

1. The community property system has served the citizens of Texas well since the time of Spanish rule, providing a system of rights that promotes the welfare of the vast majority of spouses, and no compelling reasons have been given for altering basic rules of the system, as the amendment would do.

2. The degree of deviation from the community property system permitted by the amendment is so great that it could foster the creation of an entirely different system

of marital property law in Texas. This would provide considerable confusion for both married persons and administrators of the law, who would be equally unfamiliar with the implications of a new system.

3. Because it requires new formalities as safeguards, the amendment would enable an unscrupulous spouse to extract valuable property rights from the other spouse; it would also encourage the making of irrevocable decisions about property rights based on speculation about future needs and the extent of future assets.

Huge Red Barn Near Cisco Burns

An Eastland County landmark, a huge red barn two miles east of Cisco on the south side of Interstate 20, was destroyed by fire early Wednesday morning.

Cisco firemen said the barn and outbuildings were ablaze when they arrived about 2 a.m.

Burdett Hitt, who ran goats and cattle on the property, said the barn had recently been purchased by Shirley Mahan of Arlington, who had placed about a thousand bales of hay in the barn. The hay, along with his cattle trailer, were lost in the fire, firemen said.

Mr. Hitt said the barn was a traffic-stopper, with people often stopping along the highway to take pictures of the barn.

The barn was originally owned by R.Q. Lee, a Texas state official in the early 1920s. No cause has been given for the blaze, but young people have recently been chased from the barn after reportedly holding "pot parties" there.

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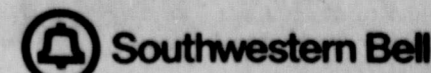

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GORDON SPOT

It looks like the Eastland County Fair is going to be the biggest and best ever. In addition to all the things we have had in the past there will be the big Lions Club Carnival each day, the free chili supper on Thursday evening and the youth talent show on Saturday.

Other attractions at the Fair will be the competition and judging of home crafts, baked goods, preserved foods, handicrafts, clothing, living plants, and agricultural and garden produce. There will be the art show, the pet show, and the hay show. And, then there will be commercial and educational exhibits and the big concession stand with lots of good food. Good musical entertainment is planned for Thursday and Friday evenings.

The date of the Fair will be October 2, 3, and 4.

Gardeners can get-back-to-basics and save money too by developing an old stand-by - the compost pile. And

with fall approaching, plenty of leaves will soon be available for composting.

With transportation costs pushing the price of peat moss and other bulky types of organic matter higher, the backyard compost pile or compost bin is becoming more and more important.

With most Eastland County soils lacking in organic matter, composting is an excellent way to add humus to the soil while at the same time disposing of unwanted plant material from the yard and garden.

Leaves, straw, lawn clippings, sawdust, garden debris and even shredded newspapers can be converted into usable humus through the decomposing process. These composted material will make both clay and sandy soils more suitable for growing vegetables and ornamentals.

It is usually best to have three compost bins - one being filled, one in the process of decomposing, and another ready for use. The most workable size for most gardeners is a 4 feet by 6 feet bin, with one side hinged or removable for easy access.

Gardeners should select a convenient site near a source of water, yet out of sight of the outdoor living area.

Start the compost pile by spreading a 6 to 8 inch layer of debris. Top this with a 1 to 2 inch layer of soil or finished

compost. Sprinkle about two cups of a complete fertilizer over each layer of soil and organic matter to encourage bacterial action and hasten decomposition. Manure or blood meal may be used instead of fertilizer. Water thoroughly; then add the next layer as material becomes available.

Repeat the layering process until the pile is 4 to 5 feet high. Keep the center slightly lower than the sides to aid in retaining water. Keep the pile moist for rapid decomposition; however, avoid saturation or bad odors may develop.

To speed up decomposition

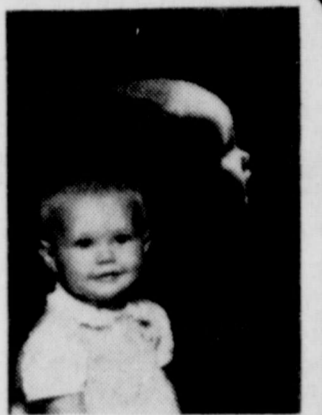
and insure that wastes on the outer edge of the bin have a chance to break down, turn or mix and restack the pile every 60 to 90 days. Do not add new material once the pile is turned; rather start a new pile in a nearby location.

For better aeration and faster decomposition, spread fresh lawn clippings and shredded green materials into thin layers. When adding dry leaves to the compost pile, wet them thoroughly before adding soil. A shredder will convert twigs and small branches into smaller particles for faster decomposition.

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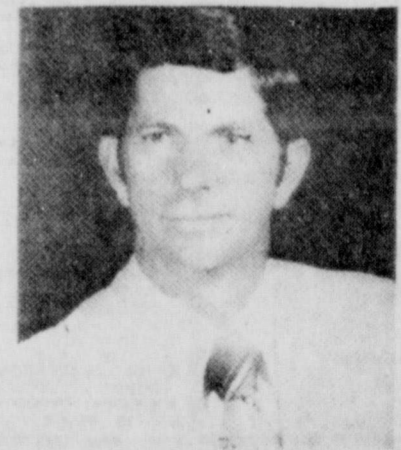

Stoppag Measure On Windfalls Profit Tax

The \$1000 tax refund for Royalty Owners and two-barrel exemption for strip-wells approved by the Senate on July 23 is only a stopgap measure, say Officials of the West Texas Land and Royalty Owners Association, based in Snyder, Texas. The measure, characterized by some Eastland County Royalty Owners as "Just a pile to ease the pain", is still a "start in the right direction", according to Billy McCormick, President of the Association.

The proposed refund of the Windfall Profits Tax, which would be achieved through a tax credit, was approved by the Senate as part of a package of tax changes designed to raise an additional \$4.2 billion in fiscal 1981, which starts Oct. 1. The measure must be approved by a Senate-House Conference Committee before it can be considered by the House. Information is not available as to when the committee will consider the Senate version of the bill.

There are tunnels through rivers, bays and mountains. If you haven't been through one you possibly haven't traveled very much. The Washington representative for the West Texas Assn., Carol T. Crawford, says it is very important for Royalty Owners and other interested persons to contact members of the Conference Committee as soon as possible after they have been named. They should be told that although the proposed refund is quite short of what it should be, their favorable vote to include the \$1,000 refund would be appreciated. Send letter or card to: Chairman Committee on Finance U.S. Senate Washington, D.C. 20510

Subjects which can be included in a letter are: How the Windfall Profits Tax affects your income, what it has done to your living standards, your opinion on what should be done about it, and finally - if relief from the tax is not provided, what the outlook for your future is. A recent survey conducted by the West Texas Association indicates that of all the royalty owners in the southwest region of the United States, over half are over 65 years of age.

"It has been argued that because royalty owners are not 'producers' they cannot contribute to expanding oil production," stated President McCormick. "We believe the reverse is likely true. Unknown millions of acres of land with oil development potential are privately held. Owners of such lands number in the hundreds and thousands. All will now be making decisions whether to lease additional land for production, or hold it until such time as they may claim the full value of their mineral rights. Landowners, knowing that their mineral rights will appreciate over time, may well decide to retain these rights for future generations."

McCormick, who recently met with Senators Benson and Boren, plus members of the Senate Finance Committee, told the group: "The \$1,000 tax credit proposal can only provide modest assistance. We urge that you and your colleagues press for the total exemption of royalty interests, or alternatively for the exemption of royalty interests up to certain levels of production. We understand that passage of such an exemption provision will require an immense educational effort on our part as well as yours. But we have confidence in your ability to successfully represent before your colleagues the interests of the millions of royalty owners to tragically ignored during last year's debates."

Cities Receive Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said that Texas cities levying the optional one-percent city sales tax would receive \$25.5 million in rebates for September.

Bullock said this month's city sales tax allocation pushes the 1980 payments to more than \$418.5 million, compared to \$364.5 million paid to cities through October of last year.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state sales tax and is rebated each month by the Comptroller to the cities where it is collected.

Circle Is Snuff Sign

A small harmless looking circle on a hip pocket is the first symptom of a major health-threatening epidemic. The circle, made by carrying a snuff can, is a more obvious symptom than a chewing tobacco pouch. But both show that the user is sucking on chemicals that can cause cancer, the Texas Medical Association says.

Bad breath, discolored teeth and white patches of skin called leukoplakia inside the mouth or throat are a few other signs of the epidemic that has spread to many groups of young people and adults.

Some people start using chewing tobacco and snuff as a replacement for smoking. But they merely are trading one set of health hazards for another, TMA says.

DEER ABUNDANT BUT SMALLER DUE TO POOR FORAGE

Recent rains resulting from hurricane activity will have little effect on deer herds in Southwest Texas and the Rio Grande Plains, according to Dr. Dwight Guynn, area wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Some new plant growth will be generated from the moisture received, but most of the damage has already been done by the extended drought, he points out.

"It's a classic case of too little rain received too late to be a great deal of help," Guynn says. "Some deer on the brink of starvation will be saved, but the number won't be significant."

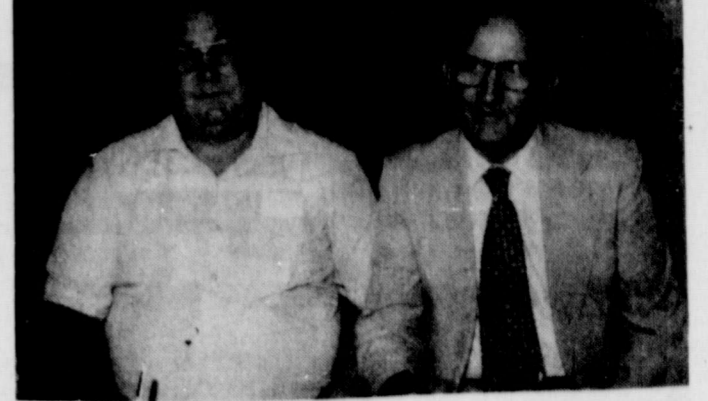
Guynn continues to emphasize that over population of deer in certain areas has resulted in large starvation deaths, up to 60 percent in some parts of the Hill Country and South Texas. Even with such losses, Guynn says ample deer will be available in most areas of Texas for hunting this fall.

"There should be plenty around, but hunters will be confronted with more smaller, inferior deer which have survived the drought but suffered its effects," he explains. "Antlers may be somewhat smaller this year due to the lack of nutrition which occurred this summer when bucks were developing them."

Guynn stresses that good antler development is directly associated with proper nutrition, a luxury that deer and other wildlife species have been virtually without most of the year.

Families living in a home on a farm, in the open country, or in towns of up to 10,000 population may qualify if they cannot secure credit from regular commercial lenders.

Grand Jury To Consider Case

Justice of the Peace Carlton Holder, serving as magistrate for an examining trial, ruled Wednesday that there was sufficient evidence to ask an Eastland County District Court grand jury to study the case of the State of Texas vs. Johnnie Earl Hargrave of Cisco.

Mr. Hargrave, who was arrested last July 24th after police found approximately an acre of marijuana growing on a farm he owns south of Cisco, had asked for an examining trial to determine if evidence was sufficient for prosecution. He was represented by Robert Rose, Dallas attorney.

The decision by Mr. Holder came after District Attorney Emory Walton and Attorney Rose questioned only one witness, Sheriff Johnny Morren. The examining trial was held in the commissioners' court meeting room at the courthouse in Eastland.

Sheriff Morren told about the visit of officers, including himself and a deputy, Texas Ranger George Frasier and two highway patrolmen, to the Leon River area south of Cisco. He said that Hargrave told them that the marijuana did not belong to him but since it was on his land he would take responsibility for it.

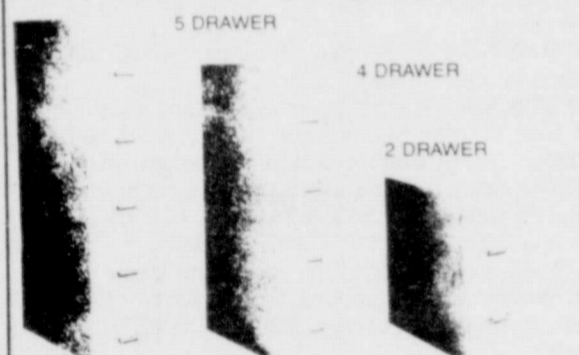
Mr. Morren said the marijuana was pulled up and brought to Eastland. After it dried, he said the leaves weighed some 41 pounds. A DPS laboratory at Abilene tested the material and determined that it was marijuana, Mr. Morren said.

The district attorney said the case would be presented to the 91st District Court grand jury late this month. Hargrave is at liberty under a \$5,000 bond.

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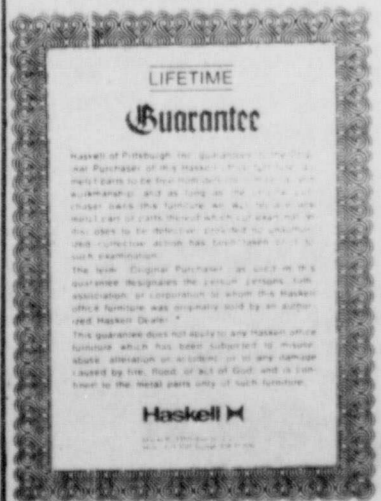

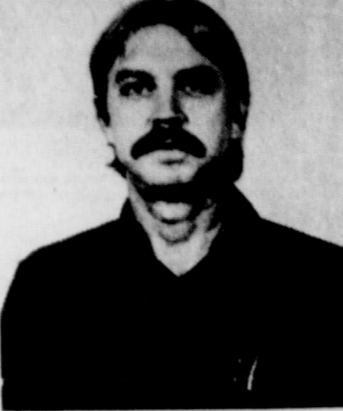

Monte Lewis has been hired as an instructor of history. Mr. Lewis has been working on his Ph.D. at North Texas State University, Denton, since fall 1978.

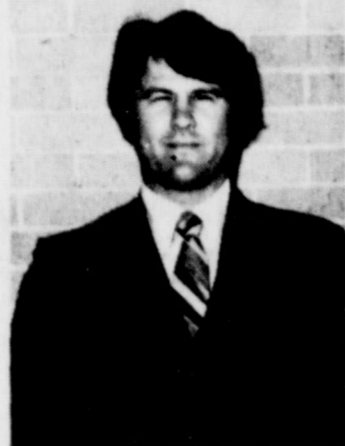
Mr. Lewis was an instructor of history and political science at Tarrant County Junior
