## Bank Resources At All-Time High Mark

Total resources of the First National Bank in Cisco registered a healthy gain of more than \$1,600,000 to reach an all-time high of \$26,019,753 for the quarter ending September 30, according to the bank's statement of condition prepared for national banking officials in Washington.

The growth was largely in deposits and in cash and exchange items. Deposits stood at \$23,406,238 at the end of the quarter, up about a million dollars.

The bank's loans were up from \$8,970,000 to \$9,199,650 during the quarter. Cash and exchange items gained a little over a million. The quarterly statement will be published elsewhere in The Press.

## Wranglers Hold Opponents To Only 57 Yards In The Air

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers finished the 1979 football season as the No. 1 pass defense team in the nation—and they're out to repeat that effort.

Coach Bill Anderson's squad, after four games, has

held its opponents to only 57 yards in the air—and that's three yards better a game than last year's final total.

CJC opponents have completed only 15 of 57 passes for 228 yards, but a big test is coming up Friday afternoon when the Wranglers take on

pass-minded Texas Christian University's junior varsity.

The game is scheduled for 3 p.m. in Amon Carter stadium in Fort Worth and Anderson expects the Horned Frogs to be air-minded. Other than that, the

Wranglers know little about how the JV team will operate.

Against Ranger Junior College last week, in TCU's first game of the season, the Horned Frogs lost 33-12. In that game, the Frogs' second touchdown came on a pass from quarterback Kyle Clifton to Greg Arterberry on a 12-yard play.

"We really won't know much until we talk to the Ranger coaches," says Anderson. "We do know they have good speed, good skill people, good split receivers and a good nose guard. Other than that, we're in the dark."

Ranger was a victim of the Wranglers two weeks ago when CJC snapped the Rangers' 24-game win streak with a 14-12 win in the annual Lions Benefit Bowl game at Breckenridge.

Against Tarleton State University's JV last week, the Wranglers got its own air show working in the second half as the team's leading quarterback, Bill Bayless, came into the game and completed four of seven passes for 108 yards and three touchdowns in the Wranglers' 28-13 victory.

Bayless, a 6-0, 207 pound sophomore from Palestine, has completed 55.2 per cent of his passes this season, connecting on 16 of 29 for 300 yards. He is also the total offense leader with 329 total yards and an 82.1 yards-per-game average.

Sophomore Paul Chatmon from Fort Worth continues to have the best overall average as the top receiver with 40.5 yards a game and is averaging 2.3 catches a game.

After his performance in his first game of the year last week, Wilmer-Hutchins freshman Barrett Douglas is shown on top of the receiving stats. His one-game performance included five pass receptions, two for touchdowns, and 114 yards.

Douglas also moved into the scoring lead with his two touchdowns for 12 points. Placekicker-linebacker Ricky Nunn is second in scoring by virtue of his touchdown in the Ranger game and four extra point kicks.

Sophomore Maurice Knight now has the best punting average with 39.3 yards per kick on three kicks. Matt Ligon, however, has punted 19 times for a 31.1 average.

Leading the Wranglers in rushing is freshman Lenard Montgomery of Greenville, Miss., with 20 carries and 102 yards for a 25.5 yard average.

## CHS Loboes To Face Longhorns In Early Fri.

The Cisco High School Loboes will play their second district 10-AA game of the season this Friday night as they travel to Early to face the Longhorns. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

Both teams will be looking for their first district victory following losses in their district openers last week. Cisco lost to the Eastland Mavericks 20-14 while Bangs defeated Early 12-7.

The Loboes are tied with two wins and two losses for the season of play and they are 0-1 in district play. Early

is 1-3 for the season and 0-1 in district play.

In total points for the season, Early has scored 41, two more than Cisco's 39 points. Early's opponents have scored 58 points, also two more than Cisco's 56 points for their opponents.

In reference to last week's game, Coach Rick Calhoun stated the Lobo team members "suffered mental injury and have been down on themselves" because of their loss to Eastland; however, that was only the first district game and there

are still six more.

Coach Calhoun said Jimmy Elrod was sent to a specialist who works with the Dallas Cowboys professional football team in Fort Worth on Tuesday of this week. Lobo fullback Elrod has been on the injured list since Cisco's first game this season against the Haskell Indians. He has a deep thigh bruise and has been waiting for a doctor's release before returning to play.

The Lobo starting lineup will be about the same as last week's according to Coach Calhoun. The probable lineup will be as follows: Randall Rattan, quarterback; Forrest Starr, I-back; Robert Caraway or Gary Speegle, halfbacks; Brian Fleming, full back; Chuck Cannistraci and Terry Owens, ends; Leslie Agnew, center; Kenneth Preston and Bubba Eaker, guards; Jeff Cathey and Manuel Marquez, tackles.

Defensive starters will probably include Danny Garcia, Starr, Blair Boyd, Caraway, Speegle, Agnew, Kory Wallace, Preston, Mike Sherman, Marquez and Tommy Thackerson.

Coach Calhoun said Starr and Fleming may play as safeties on the secondary with Speegle and Shane Posey as cornerbacks and Larry Adams at split-end. He also said Greg Cermin will probably play tackle some during the game.

**Notes From A Librarian's Desk**

Phoenix House of New York City recently sent us several Reader's Digest Reprints. These included "Marijuana and Driving: The Sobering Truth," "Marijuana Alert: Brain and Sex Damage" and "Angel Dust-The Unpredictable Killer."

Phoenix House is the nation's largest therapeutic community which treats drug abuse and addiction as a personality disorder that does not respond to traditional methods and cannot be cured simply by transmitting the persons dependence from one drug to another.

Phoenix House admits anyone who has had a problem with drugs and related drug problems at school or home. The only criteria for admission is a desire and commitment to change, to grow up, to solve the emotional and social problems that usually underlie behavior problems. Phoenix House is a voluntary program. People of any age are admitted. The youngest is 16 years old, and the oldest is

70. About 26% of the 700 residents are minors under 21. People usually join Phoenix House after learning about the program through agencies, schools, hospitals, and Phoenix House recruiters working in the streets.

The Public Information Office of Phoenix House conducts public awareness campaigns, alerting the public to current drug trends such as PCP, better known as "Angel Dust."

Phoenix House staff says, "Today's children confront drugs early, and youthful drug abuse is growing at an alarming rate. Between 1975 and 1978, the number of high school seniors using marijuana each day had doubled.

Recent statewide studies in Maine and Maryland found one out of every six high school students getting high on a daily basis. A study released last year reported that a quarter of a million youngsters in New York State had started using pot the year before, while 118 thousand had their first experience with cocaine and more than 25 thousand tried PCP, "Angel Dust."

This frightening increase in youthful drug abuse reflects America's tolerant attitudes towards the social use of psychoactive drugs, the decriminalization of marijuana in several states and the nonenforcement of drug laws in many others. A vocal lobby today argues publicity for the elimination of all restriction on the use of marijuana while well publicized instances of cocaine used by entertainment luminaries gives that drug a glamorous allure.

Individual adolescents are often subjected to intense peer pressure. Many become drug abusers out of need to belong and be accepted. There are few communities in which marijuana is not easily obtained, and pot is now routinely smoked in public places. What's more, the growing number of "headshops" selling drug paraphernalia gives added sanction to drug use. The message to youngsters is clear: if it's legal to buy devices to enhance the effects of drugs, then it's o.k. to use them."

## Cooperatives - Good For All Americans

Farmer-owned and controlled cooperatives play a key role in making the family farm the highly productive system it has become. During October, which is "Cooperative Month," special recognition will be given to cooperatives for their roles in economic progress of this state and nation, points out Johnny Feagan, economist in organization with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

According to Feagan, Texas boasts more than 440 cooperatives that serve some 133,000 members. These cooperatives are doing a business volume of more than \$2 billion annually.

Nationally, some 50 million Americans belong to about 40,000 cooperatives.

"Cooperatives in Texas range from farmer-owned gins, elevators and compresses to marketing, supply and credit organizations," explains Feagan. "Health, housing, insurance, electric, telephone and other service cooperatives are becoming more and more important to all Texas citizens."

According to Feagan, cooperatives make it possible for family farmers to receive more dependable markets for their products and more dependable and lower cost supplies for their farm input. They also benefit consumers by taking the lead in furnishing quality products, in developing better packaging, and in using more efficient distribution methods, all of which help hold down prices of food and fiber products.

"Cooperatives evolved from the early American spirit of working together to survive. They were organiz-

ed to compete with economic forces which threatened the economic existence of individuals. Today, cooperatives enable Americans to work together to help themselves," says the economist. Cooperatives are large and small and are located in towns, cities and in the country. Wherever they are and whatever their size, they are busy serving members, their communities and the public, contends Feagan.

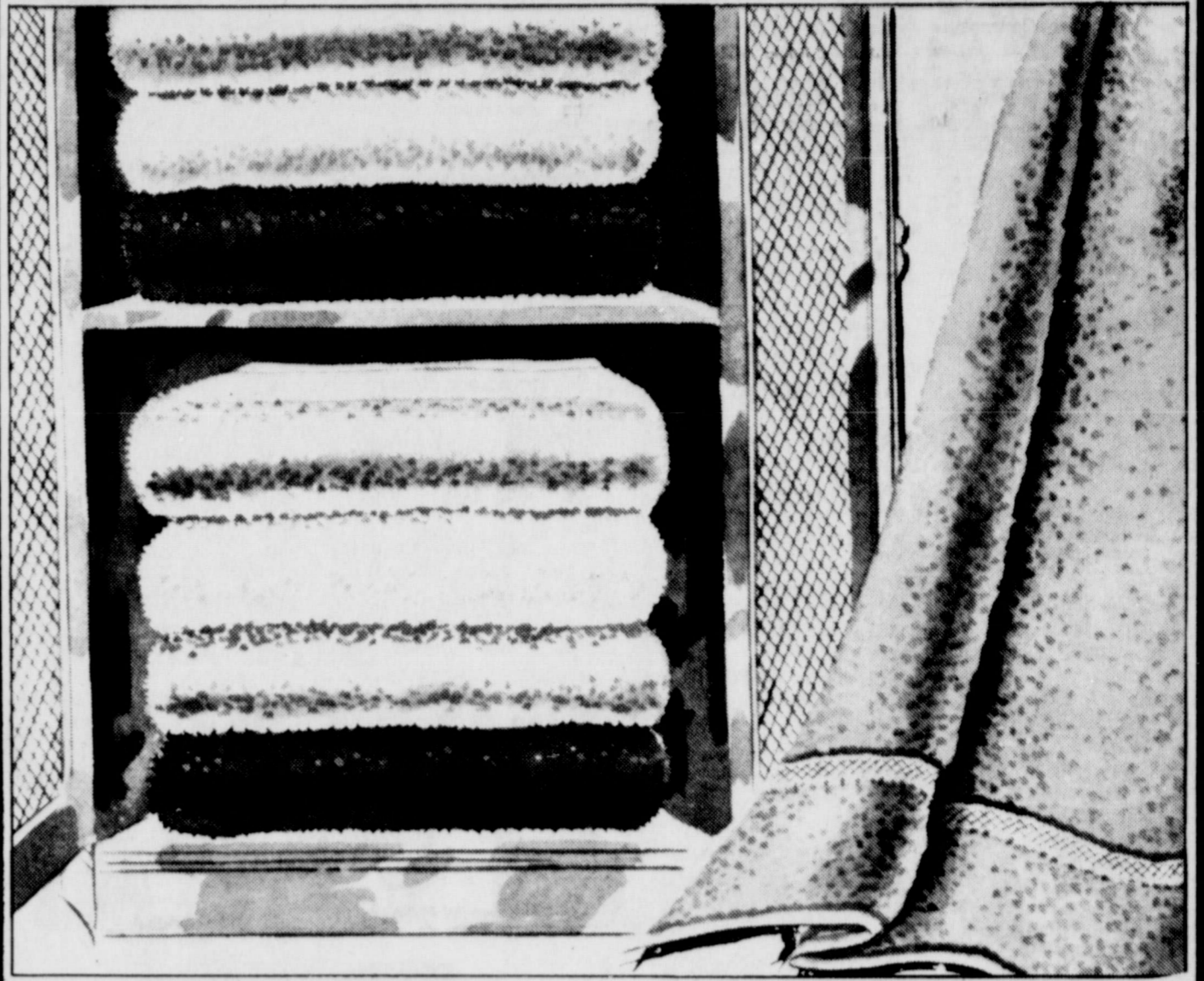

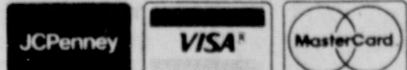

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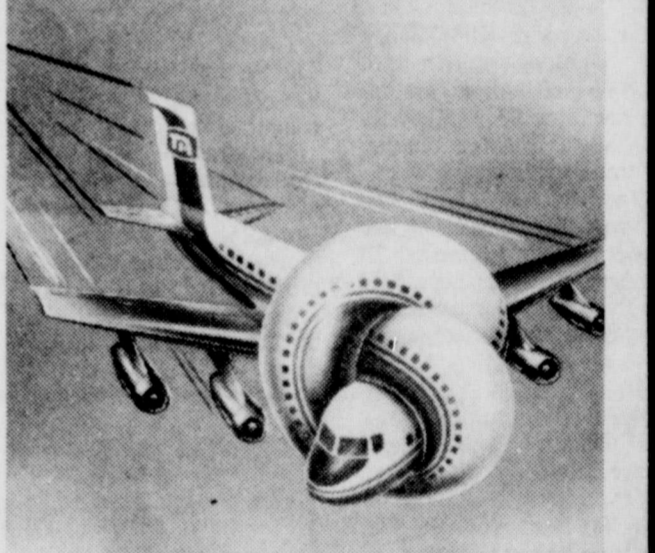

## CJC To Offer 13 Community Courses

Cisco Junior College will offer thirteen different Community Service Courses to people in the general area of Cisco during the current fall semester. ## Three Ciscoans Arrested In Federal Drug Probe

Six persons, including three Ciscoans, were arrested for alleged involvement in methamphetamine production and distribution, during the weekend by federal and state authorities.

Richard Salley, special agent in charge of the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration, Dallas, listed the six men as Bobby E. Maynard, 35, Cisco; Dennis Cotten, 30, Cisco; Johnnie E. Hargrave, 28, Cisco; Robert Brotherton, 22, Putnam; David Wayne Butler, 23, Eastland; and Leo Steelman, 28, Abilene.

The three Ciscoans were arrested around 11 a.m. Friday in Cisco by DEA agents, DPS officers, and Texas Ranger Sid Merchant of Abilene, according to DEA Officer Lloyd Clifton. The old Adams Welding Shop building on Avenue E was padlocked by the officers. Local police were not informed of the arrests.

Authorities said that bond in the amount of \$10,000 had been set for each of the six men arrested and only Steelman was still in custody at Abilene Monday night.

DPS officials reported that sealed indictments were returned by a federal grand jury in Wichita Falls recently after an investigation over two years had been completed. Federal, state and local officers in the counties involved cooperated in the investigation.

The sealed indictments listed four charges, including conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute a controlled substance; manufacture of a controlled substance; and two counts of possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance. Not all of the six men were indicted on all of the charges, officials said.

The six men will be ar-

rained before a federal judge in San Angelo at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, October 16, according to U.S. Attorney Jimmy Tallant of Fort Worth.

Maynard and Debbie Maynard, both of 402 Avenue I, Cisco, were indicted by a 91st District Court grand jury last week on charges of felony theft over \$200 and under \$10,000. They were arrested here in early September and a quantity of alleged stolen goods was found in their home. The stolen items included guns and assorted merchandise and vehicles that authorities valued in excess of \$200,000. They are free on bond in this matter.

Hargrave was also indicted by the grand jury last week on charges of unlawful possession of a controlled substance over four ounces. He was free on bond in this case.

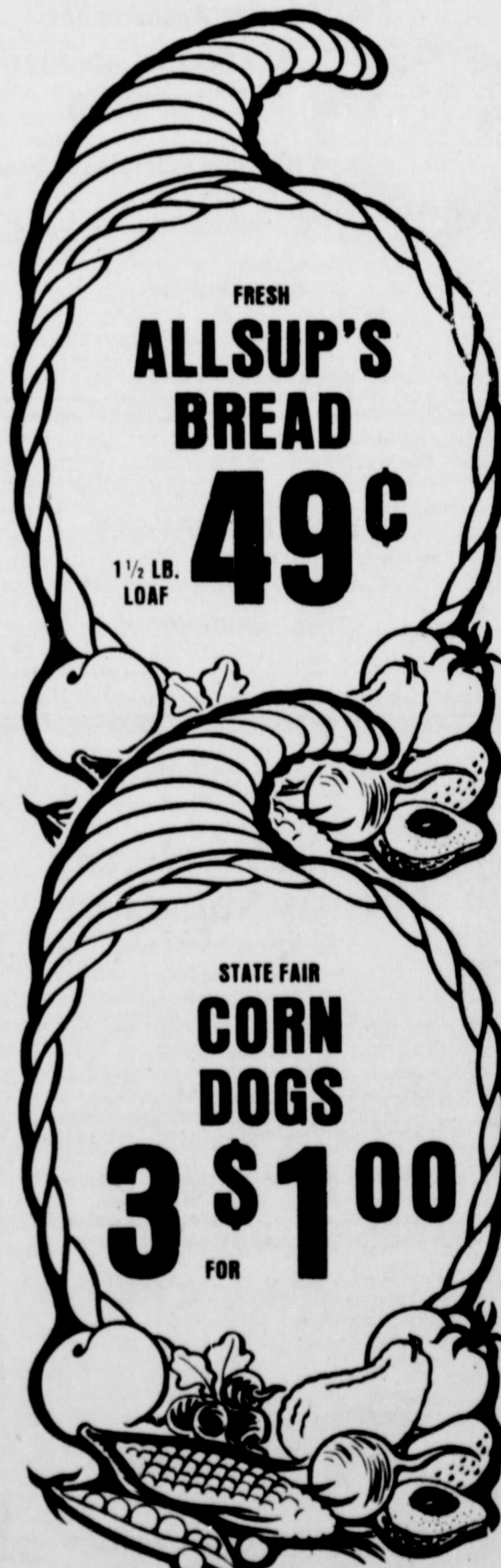

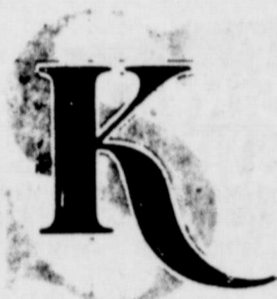

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# UFO ?????

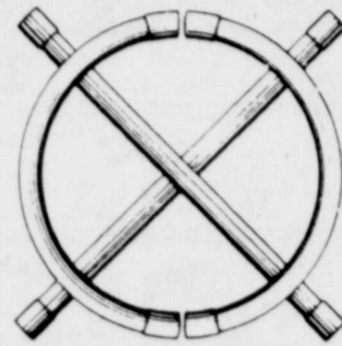

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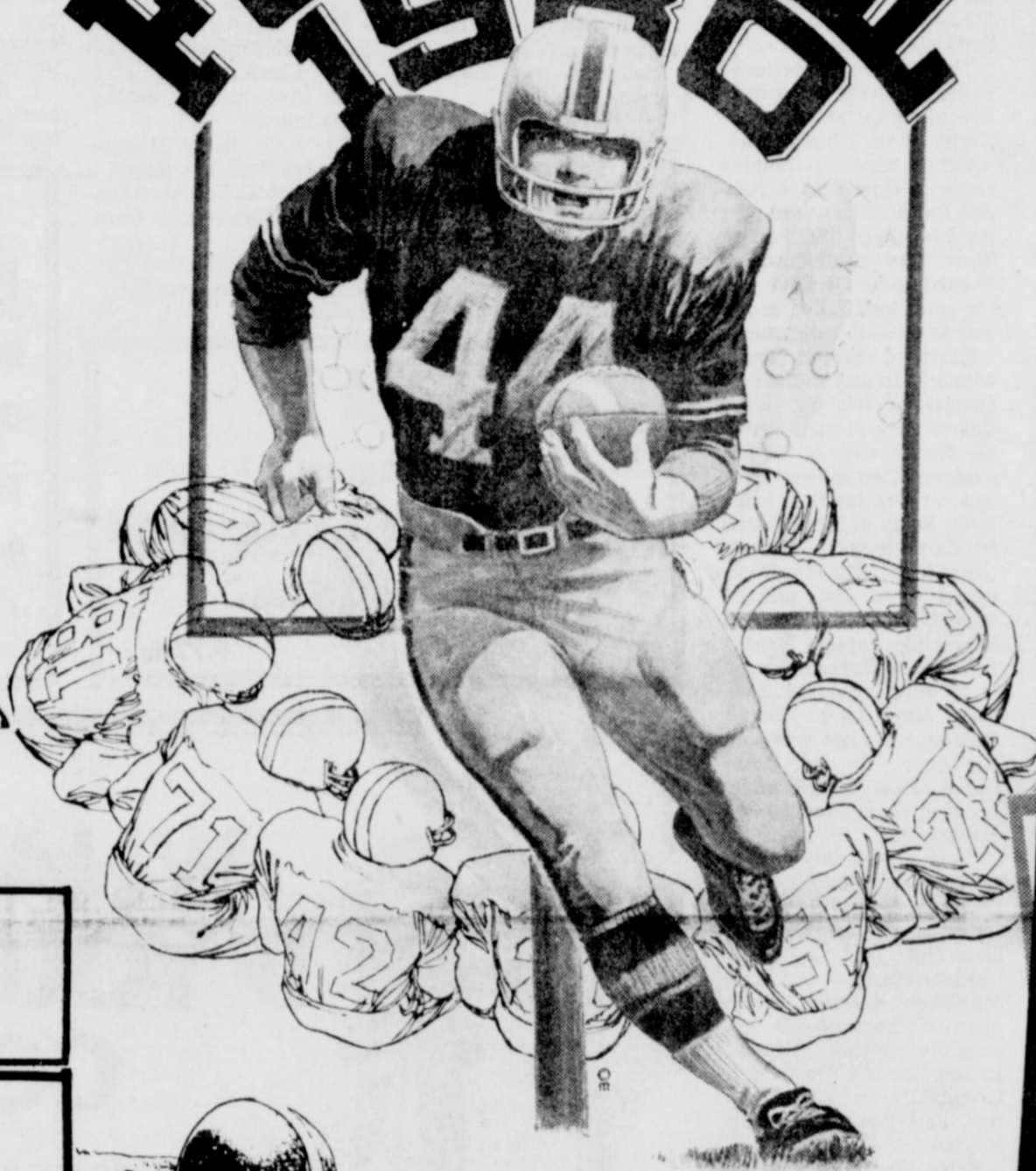

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## WHAT TO DO IF YOUR LIGHTS GO OUT


*We'll do our best to keep it from happening, but let's face it. Even with the miracles of modern technology, it sometimes occurs in the best of systems.*
