These included 'Marijuana and Driving: ing about the program through agencies, schools, The Sobering Truth, hospitals, and Phoenix "Marijuana Alert: Brain and Sex Damage" and House recruiters working in 'Angel Dust-The Unpredicthe streets. The Public Information Office of Phoenix House conducts public awareness campaigns, alerting the public to current drug trends such as PCP, better known as "Angel Dust." Phoenix House staff says, "Today's children confront drugs early, and youthful drug abuse is growing at an alarming rate. Between 1975 and 1978, the number of high school seniors using marijuana each day had doubled. Recent statewide studies in Maine and Maryland found one out of every six high school students getting high on a daily basis. A study released last year reported that a quarter of a million youngsters in New York State had started using pot the year before, while 118 thousand had their first experience with cocaine and more than 25 thousand tried PCP, "Angel Dust." This frightening increase in youthful drug abuse reflects America's tolerant attitudes towards the social use of psychoactive drugs, the decriminalization of marijuana in several states and the nonenforcement of drug laws in many others. A vocal lobby today argues publicity for the elimination of all restriction on the use of marijuana while well publicized instances of cocaine used by entertainment luminaries gives that drug a glamorous allure. Individual adolescents are often subjected to intense peer pressure. Many become drug abusers out of need to belong and be accepted. There are few communites in which marijuana is not easily obtained, and pot is now routinely smoked in public places. What's more, the growing number of "headshops" selling drug paraphernalia gives added sanction to drug use. The message to youngsters is clear: if it's legal to buy devices to enhance the effects of drugs, then it's o.k. to use them. They also benefit consumers by taking the lead in furnishing quality products, in developing better packaging, and in using more efficient distribution methods, all of which helps hold down prices of food and fiber products.

The old Adams Welding Shop building on Avenue E was padlocked by the officers. Local police were not informed of the arrests.

Authorities said that bond in the amount of \$10,000 had been set for each of the six men arrested and only Steelman was still in custody at Abilene Monday night.

DPS officials reported that sealed indictments were returned by a federal grand jury in Wichita Falls recently after an investigation over two years had been completed. Federal, state and local officers in the counties involved cooperated in the investigation. The sealed indictments

listed four charges, including conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute a controlled substance; manufacture of a controlled substance; and two counts of possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance. Not all of the six men were indicted on all of the charges, officials said.
