

"How the U.S. Was Faked Out by Moscow's Finest Spy' by Ilya Gerol

Soviet master spy 'Abel' But one of the journalists was laughing quietly to was so good that he wasn't himself through the whole Just before Christmas performance. His name was 1971, Moscow journalists Kiril Khenkin.

He was laughing because he knew something that the entire American intelligence system hadn't found out, something that the average Soviet citizen would never know: this little man who had just finished speaking wasn't a famous spy; he wasn't even Rudolf Abel.

The real Rudolf Abel died in 1948 and was buried in Moscow in the 'German Cemetery'. The real name of our speaker was Willy Fisher. Kirill Khenkin had known him when they attended spy training school together more than 40 years before.

In 1973 Khenkin emigrated to Israel. Subsequently he published a small book in Russian called the 'Upside Down Hunter'. The book attracted little attention and was read primarily by a handful of Russian emigrates. It presented facts that many of us in the Soviet Union already knew but were afraid to mention. I spoke once again with 'Rudolf Abel' in 1972 when he was a guest of the Riga newspaper where I was then working. I recall how he said in a tired voice: 'One does not have to know everything. There are things that are better forgotten.' One of those 'moles' was the double-agent Alexander Orlov. From the end of the (Continued On Back Page)


The major CofC program project for 1981 is expected to be taking a leading role in the observance of the City of Cisco's 100th birthday. Working has already been started on the centennial event.

## **Convenient Times**, Places

Adult education classes are held in a variety of loca tions-public school buildings, neighborhood activity centers, churches, older adult centers, libraries, community or junior colleges, hospitals, military bases. and even places of employment. Often, classes are provided in facilities called adult learning centers. Staff members at learning centers provide individualized instruction to meet the unique needs of adults who function on different instructional levels.

Since adult students often have numerous home and job related responsibilities, adult education programs try to make it easy for the students to fit their classes into an already tight schedule. Learning centers operate on flexible day and evening schedules that allow students to study when it is convenient for them. Students who have transportation or child care needs can usually be referred to an appropriate source for assistance. Teachers, counselors, and aides at the learning centers work with students individually and in small groups.

Adult education classes may also be arranged to meet work schedules of participants. If an industry or business would like to offer adult education classes to its employees, arrangements may be made to schedule classes at the work site. Some employers provide



released time equal to the amount of time the employee is enrolled in a course.

## Adult Education Programs

Several types of adult education programs may be offered.

Adult Basic Education is designed for persons who would like to learn to read and write or improve their basic academic skills. The class helps the students learn reading, writing, and math skills through the eighth grade level. After completing basic education programs, students are able to read the daily newspaper and popular magazines, handle their family finances better, and often show improved performance in their jobs.

Men and women in adult basic education study instructional materials that are on their own level, and they progress at their own speed. Adult basic education students often enter other adult education programs after completing a basic education class.

Because learning is a lifetime activity, education of adults is a major function of schools and colleges in Texas. One of the main objectives of adult education is to recruit and instruct many of the 3.9 million Texas adults without a high school diploma or its equivalent.

As the new year arrives and we hang a new calendar in the office or near the telephone at home, it probably doesn't occur to us that those 12 pages of numbers are one of mankind's great inventions. Our calendars divide up in a fairly orderly fashion the time it takes our planet Earth to make one revolution around the Sun-a journey requiring just a bit less than 36514 days. To be more exact, the solar year measures 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, 45.7 seconds. But don't be fooled by the calendar's apparent simplicity. The job of partitioning this rather peculiar period of time so that mankind would have some sort of schedule to live by wasn't easy. It took centuries of experimentation to arrive at those 12 pages of numbers, which are still far from perfect when you consider that the various months have 28, 29, 30 and 31 days. These months of differ-

ing lengths often complicate the keeping of business records but just imagine trying to get along without a calendar. How would one know when to go to the dentist, when the school vacation begins, what day in the week Christmas falls on? The calendars of the

earliest civilizations were based on observations of the phases of the Moon, creating a series of months of approximately 291/2 days. The ancient Egyptians were among the first to discover that the Earth travels around the Sun in about 12 lunar months. They constructed a calendar based on this astronomical

cycle. The Romans later borrowed the idea and created an improved 12 month calendar. But political leaders began meddling with the calendar. They are suspected of having added extra time to the annual calendar to possibly bring in more taxes or to lengthen the term of office of certain officials.

step with the new one by 11 Just prior to the beginning days. To bring the British of the Christian era, Rome's calendar had gotten badly out of step with the seasons. If a Roman believed his calendar, the spring equinox was in the middle of the winter! In 46 B.C., Emperor Julius Caesar, with the help of an astronomer by the name of Sosigenes, decided to straighten things out, or so he thought, and issued what came to be known as the Julian calendar. Caesar gave six of the months 31 days, five of them 30 days, February 29 days three years in a row, with 30 days every fourth year, which was named Leap Year. To get the new calendar adjusted to the seasons, the year 46 B.C. was extended to 15 months. Quite understandably, 46 B.C. came to be known as 'The Year of Confusion.' So far so good, except that Caesar and his astronomer had proceeded on the assumption that the solar year was exactly 365 days, 6 hours long. This introduced an annual error of almost 11 minutes, 15 seconds. Not much of an error, one might say, but considered over a long term it meant that at the end of 128 years the Julian calendar was lagging behind the Sun by an entire day The 1580's A.D. arrived before anything was done about this and by then the Julian calendar was off by about ten whole days. But fortunately the time required for the Earth to orbit the Sun had been determined accurately. Pope Gregory XIII gets the credit for applying this knowledge to the probvlem, solving it, and using his influence in 1582 to promulgate the calendar that we use today. In order to bring the new Gregorian calendar into step with the solar year, the Pope took the drastic action of dropping ten days. The new calendar went into effect the day after

October 4, 1582; thus instead

of the next day being Oc-

dar Stone on display in the National Museum of Anthropology in Mexico City. In the center of a disc 12 feet in diameter is the face of the Sun God. Around it are seven concentric circles, with the spaces between them crammed with abstruse symbols which indicate to scholars that whoever directed the intricate carving of the Stone was aware of how many days it took the Earth to make its annual orbit around the Sun.

of Rochester, N.Y., staged a crusade for the Thirteen-Month Calendar. The proposal got as far as a hearing at the League of Nations in Geneva, but no farther as it was felt that the changeover would be far too compoicated.

The World Calendar Association, founded in 1930 by a New Yorker, Elisabeth Achelis, would keep the present 12 months but divide the year into four equal quarters. Each quarter would begin with a 31-day month and include two others of 30 days each. This gives each quarter 13 weeks or 91 days, which adds up to 364 days. An extra Year End Day would bring the total to 365. Every fourth year an additional day would be inserted between June and July, taking care of Leap Year and providing a mid-year holiday. In 1956 this idea got as far as a committee of the United Nations, but suffered the same fate as had the Thirteen-Month Calendar before the League of Nations.

Althouth either of these calendar reforms possibly would have advantages once in operation, the idea of attempting to get the whole world to suddenly change its 400-year-old method of keeping track of the months, weeks and days appears to be just too much for government officials and especially the average citizen to accept. Thus it seems very unlikely that in the foreseeable future we will be tossing out Pope Gregory's handiwork and installing an untried substitute.

So perhaps the easiest way of solving the problem of a calendar with months of varying lengths is just to continue to teach our children that ages-old rhyme:



Some students need minimal preparation. while others may attend a GED class for a year or longer. Students are encouraged to take any or all of the five sections of the test whenever they and the teacher feel the results will be positive.

The GED certificate, which signifies successful completion of the tests, may be necessary as a job qualification. It also may qualify the student for college or technical school admission.

tion, which began in 1789, France briefly abandoned the Gregorian system of timekeeping for one of its own, a 12-month calendar modeled after one used in ancient Egypt. The months were given fanciful names such as Germinal and Thermidor that were associated with the seasons or the weather, and each month was assigned 30 days. The exception, called Vendemiare, which occurred in the autumn, had 35 days three years in a row with 36 days the fourth year. The French innovators even changed the length of the week from the conventional

seven days to ten days, and divided the day into ten hours, the hour into 100 minutes and the minute into 100 seconds. The greatest problem area in this complex chain seems to have been the ten-day week. For ages, festivals, market days and religious observances had been geared to the seven-day week. Many Frenchmen simply refused to go along with the so-called improvement. A decade of confusion came to an inglorious end when the whole grand scheme was swept away in the widespread governmental reforms of Emperor Napoleon I.

Other calendars of note were developed independently in the Western World by the Mayas of Guatemala and the Yucatan and later by Mexico's Aztecs. One of the most famous calendars in existence, and certainly the most stupendous, is the 24-ton so-called Aztec Calen-



"On the twelfth day of Christmas my true love brought to me ... " Or is it "Gave to me"? Anyway; it applies to the twelfth day following Christmas.

And the twelfth day of Christmas is "El dia de los tres reyes" in most Latin countries. "The Day of the Three Kings". Taking a leaf from the notebook of the Armenians, the Latins commemorate the legendary day on which, following the birth of Jesus, the three "kings" (wise men from the East) discovered the Holy Child of Bethlehem. They brought gifts of gold, myrrh and frankincense. I don't think that the New Testament lists the gifts in exactly that order; but, whatever.

Now, traditionally in cities and towns and villages throughout the Latin American world three kings appear in the streets, distributing gifts to the children who line the route. One of the "kings" is supposed to be mounted on a white horse, although I cannot find any reference to the steed in any of the Gospels. Makes for a more impressive entry into the village, though. The other two of the gift-giving visitors walk along with the horse. And all three of them toss handfuls of goodies to the laughing, cheering children. Now and then a child (by prearrangement by its parents, no doubt) is given a right significant gift.

Many years ago in Venezuela I happened to be in the oil company camp village of Concepcion, some thirty kilometers inland from Maracaibo on The Day of the Three Kings. I'd forgotten that it was actually the Twelfth Day of Christmas, but was instantly reminded when I came upon the procession. Dressed in their concept of the garb of Oriental Rulers, the three were doing their bit to bring happiness to the throngs of children. but the "Jefe" of the Kings was not riding a snow white charger. His prancing steed was a donkey.

Well; perhaps it was actually more befitting the real meaning of the Twelfth Day following the birth of the Babe of Bethlehem. The donkey is a humble, but reliable beast of burden. And without him, life in many parts of the world would come to a standstill. I shall tell you why I say that, one of these days.

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
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### **Funeral Services** For Finis E. Erwin **Held Saturday**
