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IWU Reflections In Perspective

KUWAITAIR identifies the National Airline of Kuwait, and is a welcome logo on the hull of a jet airliner...to those who are familiar with the line. It is an exceptional airline, in almost every respect.

Operated and maintained by British Overseas Airways Corporation, the carrier serves practically every major city in the Middle East and has schedules to the majority of the major cities in Western Europe. It is an airline which one flies with confidence.

The cockpit crews are, almost without exception, British while the cabin staff is made up of girls from many countries. Perhaps the majority of the stewardesses are Lebanese. Kuwaiti women will not serve in that capacity, nor would their fathers permit it even if they wished to do so. Kuwaiti women, for the most part, still dress in accordance with traditional Arab custom. Wearing a hostess' uniform just wouldn't be in keeping with their standards.

Boarding a Kuwaitair flight in Dubai on one hot, humid summer's afternoon, we were faced with quite an extended delay. The plane was almost filled to capacity (a Boeing 707), and was scheduled to stop in Qatar and in Bahrain en route to Kuwait. The delay was caused, it seemed, by a discrepancy in the passenger list. There was one more passenger in first class than the manifest called for while the economy cabin was short by one. A check of tickets was in order. A somewhat unusually obese gentleman had deposited himself along with an assortment of bags and bundles in a first class seat while his ticket called for him to be in the rear section. That sorted out, and the gentleman moved...without portage at all...and we were airborne.

Landing in Qatar, we were instructed to remain aboard the aircraft. After all, we were somewhat behind schedule. And being behind schedule was not in keeping with the standards of service of Kuwaitair. Anyway, we were perfectly content to remain aboard the airconditioned aircraft. And to prevent a recurrence of the problem in Dubai, the stewardesses began checking tickets as the boarding passengers came aboard. Also, it saved time.

One man boarded in first class. In a fresh, spotless, white 'dish-dasha' with an 'aba' (robe) of ecru-coloured soft material heavily trimmed with gold braid, the smallish man who wore a neatly trimmed almost snow white beard had 'Royal Family' stamped all over him. 'Ruling Family' is the term used there, though.

Seating himself in the inside seat on the left side of the craft, one ahead of me and across the aisle, he handed his ticket to the stewardess when she requested him to do so. And then, in a low but firm voice he began what could only be described as a tirade at the hostess. She was a lovely, neatly uniformed young Lebanese with whom I'd flown many times before. And, being Lebanese, she spoke fluent Arabic.

She appeared to be shocked. And well she could have been. The old gentleman called her every foul name in the Arabic language...and Arabic can be very explicit. The girl's face flushed, then tears began trickling down her cheeks. She could only stand and take the dressing-down.

The passenger ended his scolding with an explanation. She had addressed him in Arabic. And, having done so, she must without doubt be an Arab woman. And, being an Arab woman, she should know that no woman who was anything but pure scum would ever speak to a man...without having first covered her head! When he had ended, apparently having made his point...at least to his satisfaction...she apologized and retreated to the galley to dry her tears.

As we taxied out for takeoff, the Defender of the Faith turned to me (I was by this time the only other passenger up front) and asked if I would be so kind as to fill out his 'landing card' which would allow him to pass Immigration authorities upon landing at his destination which was Bahrain, only twenty minutes away. The old boy couldn't read nor write.

I took his card and his passport, and was somewhat surprised to see that his Diplomatic passport, issued by the Government of Qatar identified him as Prince Saif bin Ahmed al Thani. He was the brother of the Ruler of Qatar! Couldn't read nor write, but he knew Koranic Law.

The story has a humorous finale. On the following morning I again boarded Kuwaitair for Teheran. And the same cabin crew was aboard. When we stopped in Abadan I strolled to the door where the little lady of the day before was standing, chatting with the girls from the other section. As I approached, I put on what I thought would be a fierce scowl. Laughingly, she grabbed a newspaper and pulling it over her head as a scarf asked... 'Will this do?'

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Remembering that the Social Security Program originally was based on the concept of being an income supplement program (not a retirement program) and was designed as a "pay as you go" program, we can easily see that a serious shift in the program's balance has occurred since its inception in the 1930s.

The system itself is not broken beyond repair, but does need some mending. The political question facing the Congress is: At which end of the see-saw do you either add or subtract weight to achieve the necessary balance?

We must first face the political reality that even mentioning the reduction of any benefits in Social Security causes most reelection-minded

Congressmen to stop dead in their tracks, even those of us who realize that the program has become overburdened with social welfare-related programs never originally intended. It is not popular to point out to voters that they have a responsibility to provide the major portion of their retirement income, either through other pension and retirement systems, or savings, and that the government can't do it all without increasing taxes.

So, in reality, benefits are likely to increase over the years, particularly since payments are now tied to the rising cost of living.

On the other side, the workforce that is trying desperately to support the program, cannot be expected to

continue to carry the full load and continue to bear larger and larger increases in the cost of the program.

Some changes, such as taxing of Social Security payments, which I oppose, are not the answer. Changes in the long-range future of the program should come in incremental stages. I agree with the recent report by the National Retired Teachers Association and the American Association of Retired Persons when it recommended that: Whenever benefits are reduced or *deliberated* (and I would place personal emphasis on the latter) or the rules governing eligibility or benefit computation are changed in any manner, lengthy transition periods must be provided to protect the reasonable benefit expectations of people."

If the program is on an unbalanced see-saw, we must not ignore that inflation is the crucial fulcrum — or balancing point — in the center.

Until inflation, with its ramifications on either end of the Social Security see-saw, is brought under control, neither the worker nor the beneficiary is going to be positively affected.

At that time, change, in whatever legislative form advisable, can be gradually phased-in to restore balance to a system that is vital to our ever-increasing elderly population and other deserving disabled and survivor beneficiaries.

Texas Crude Production Over 78.2 Million Barrels In October

Texas oil production averaged 2,523,608 barrels daily in October 1980, up from 2,500,386 barrels daily in September 1980 and down from 2,644,843 barrels daily in October 1979.

The October 1980 allowable totaled 109,116,566 barrels. The preliminary October summary indicated Texas oil production was 28.3 percent under the allowable for the month.

Texas crude oil production totaled 78,231,856 barrels in October, according to a preliminary report released today by the Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division.

The figure compares with final compilations of reported September 1980 production totaling 75,011,588 barrels and October 1979 production of 81,990,123 barrels.



LISTENING TO (and watching) the pro football last Sunday afternoon caused us to look in retrospect and try to determine how Blake Bolton, coach of the Memphis (Texas) High School Cyclone, would have reacted to such terms as play action passes, game plans, the blitz, flex defense, prevent defense, specialty teams and flea flickers. He was at the helm of the Cyclone in the late 1920s.

Blake's football field at the Hall County Fair Grounds was without a sprig of grass anywhere. There were no

seats so folks stood along the sidelines, being careful not to get over the bounds marker. Rainy or snowy weather produced some very muddy afternoons on Blake's gridiron.

Blake, who was out of Texas A&M, had one play that's still around - the old Statute of Liberty. He used the single wing offense and mostly ran the ball. Eight or ten passes per game was the high.

The rules have been changed somewhat since Blake was fielding his high school champions. For ex-

ample, if he sent in a substitute the new player would have to wait until after a down was run before he could deliver any message Blake was sending in. If a man had equipment trouble, the referee went with him to the sideline to make sure there was no talking between player and coach. And if you came out of the game, you had to wait until the next quarter before you could go back in.

How do we know all of these things? We played end on some of Blake's teams. And, after finishing high school, we covered games for a year or so for The Memphis Democrat, the local weekly newspaper. There

was no press box, of course, so reporters took a clipboard and followed the offense team out in the middle of the field. It gave you sort of a big shot feeling to follow the action from the middle of the field.

Once, during a muddy afternoon game, one of the teams lined up to punt. The ball sailed over the punter's head, landing almost between our feet. And before we could react, a swarm of players covered us and the ball. It was pretty embarrassing for the newspaper reporter who, covered with mud, had to retrieve his pencil and clipboard and cover the rest of the action in a state of disrepair. Fans at the game cheered and seemed to enjoy our embarrassment.

Back to the Sunday television game, we couldn't help but wonder just what George Allen meant when he kept talking about the quarterbacks and their play action calls. . . . And what in the world would you say "flex defense" is? . . . The old Cowboys lived up to their reputation for pulling seemingly lost games out of the fire, huh?

ONE OF THE bonuses of being a country newspaper man is being able to drop in here and there without being invited because you're looking for news. And we enjoy coffee sessions with old-timers and comparing notes about current events and discussing world problems.

Just the other day, six or seven of us got to talking about the Iran hostage situation over coffee cups.

The group felt that in the beginning (Hindsight is often better than Foresight.), the United States should have taken over the Iranian Embassy with about 100 people, ordered all other Iranians in this country sent home, and sent word that "we're ready anytime you want to talk."

The group seemed to oppose paying 24 billion dollars in ransom money and suggested that we send word that "you'll get fair treatment and everything that's legally due you if you release our people promptly."
