

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Families with two money earners face unique challenges in managing their money. Although two incomes have helped push median family income to over \$18,000, or 34% more than for single earner families, more money doesn't necessarily mean fewer problems.

First of all, the second paycheck doesn't always go as far as people thought it would. It costs money to earn money. Some of the costs of earning a second income are obvious ones: taxes, insurance, social security and other expenses, transportation, and extra clothing. But, there are also hidden

costs.

Income Tax - When there are two earners, the "marriage penalty" of the progressive income tax system affects family income. When this happens, the first dollar of the second income is taxed at the same high rate as the last dollar earned by the first earner. For example, if a husband earns \$15,000 and his wife earns \$8,000, her first dollar is taxed at the same rate as the last dollar he earned, not at the same rate as his first dollar. The effect is higher taxes.

Spending For Services -Another "hidden cost" of two incomes is increased spending for services usually provided by the family itself. The growth of fastfood establishments is testimony to the growing number of families who eat many meals away from home because time and energy for meal preparation are limited. Housekeeping services are also brought by some two-job families. As more money is spent for services, less money may be left over to meet other expenses or for special purchases.

Avoid Over-Spending - Having two pay-checks can lead to unrealistic expectations about what money can buy. Families who know a second income will be only temporary should time any longterm credit purchases carefully. When the second income stops but installment payments are still due. serious financial problems can arise. Even is the second income is permanent, couples should exercise caution in spending beyond their means and their needs. Spending Plan - Two-job families can receive maximum satisfaction from their money if they base their financial decisions on open and communication

thoughtful planning. Establish financial goals both spouses agree on, and set realisitc time tables in achieving them. Discuss how to handle in-coming money. Should it be "his", "hers", or "ours?" Some alternatives include:

-pooling all the money into one account and paying everything from a single account with special allowances for each spouse. -letting each spouse control his/her own income with contributions for household operations or with each responsible for paying specific items each month.

Designate who will take responsibility for paying bills. Try out this system and be willing to make adjustment in it if things don't work out.



"I demand equal rights!" yelled the goose And the pig just grunted. And they painted "unfair" picket signs and marched round and round the little red hen, shouting obscenities.


When the government agent came, he mid to the little red hen, "You must not be gready." "But I carned the bread," said the little red







STRAIGHT ANSWERS FROM THE D.P.S.

Question - Why doesn't Eastland have more stop signs?

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I contacted an Eastland official about the above question and learned several things. First, a survey was made a few years back to determine an approximate cost for signing Eastland's intersections. The cost of signs, installation, etc. would have been staggering. Also, maintenance for so many signs as well as an ever present need for replacements would constantly be an added expendature for the taxpayer

The possible need for more signs was approached from the safety standpoint too. It is possible to have too many traffic controls. If traffic flows smoothly through an intersection without accidents occurring you probably don't need any other control

by Jerry Mathews than the intersection right-of -way laws. However, if a

certain location developes an accident problem, more control is needed. There were only a few problem intersections in Eastland when the sign study was made. Mr. Victor Cornelius provided Eastland with several dozen signs and they were used in the problem areas. (Some examples are along W. Plummer towards the Crestwood addition) Fact is, signed or unsigned, there is no intersection which is free of rules as to who must yield the right-of-way. I



In contrast to the 1979 optional standard mileage rate of 1812 cents, rate per mile for 1980 is 20 cents for the first 15,000 miles of business travel in your automobile. The rate has increased to 11 cents from 10 cents for business travel of more than 15,000 miles or when one's automobile is fully depreciated.

The standard mileage rate of 9 cents per mile is permitted as a deduction for charitable, medical or moving expense purposes.

A taxpayer should determine his actual transportation expenses (according to IRS guidelines) before deciding whether to use the standard mileage rate or to use his actual transportation expenses.

That's the number for Eastland County Dispatch, and Chief Dispatcher Bob Mercer reports that the five-year old organization continues to offer 24-hour communications and emergency number service.

Dispatch was established with the cooperation of all the cities and the county, and \$60,000 grant. All are still participating except the City of Ranger. A board governs the operation, and a subcommittee of lawmen set down the standard operating

procedure. Dispatch offers of a broad range of services to the police departments, the sheriff's office and to the

public. The Chief Dispatcher is in charge of the message center operations, insuring that the S.O.P. is adhered to and the equipment is maintained and supplies are on hand.

There are five full-time employees, and each works an eight-hour shift, 40 hours a week. They are beside Mercer, of Olden: Jourdine Miller of Cisco; Bob Burkett of Eastland; Sherry Arriola of Eastland; and Rebecca Crain of Gorman.

The Center maintains three major radios: a county frequency with a 50-mile radius; an inter-city-mutual aid with a 75-mile radium; and 37.180 remote transmission from the courthouse; and course Citizen Band, Channel 9.

The Center has teletype facilities funded by the Texas Department of Public Safety, with Texas-wide and nationwide net-works Data centers available include drivers license,

vehicle registeration, state and national stolen property listings. The message capabilities

affords Dispatch contact with all Texas police departments, sheriff's departments, and all states (except Hawaii). police and sheriff departments, as well as with 125 foreign countries through Interpool. Wanted persons and stolen

property data may be entered into the state and national networks from the Eastland County center.

Mr. Mercer reports that the center keeps 15 logs, which reflects growing use of the facilities, which also includes other emergency services explosive. including chemical and nuclear reports as well as night business telephone file number and Skywarn (weather) reports. The message center in 1980 recorded 316,985 pieces of business for an average of 381 a day, 36 an hour or one every minute and a half.

By towns, public service calls were logged like this: 39% Cisco; 28% Eastland; 10% Sheriff; 20% dispatch; and about 3% gorman-Rising Star-Ranger.

The day shift gets about 43% per cent of the load; evening 38%; and night 20%

Overall there's been about a 17 per cent increase in Dispatch traffic from 1979 to
