Hearing Slated For Gov't Grant On Application

The West Texas Council of Government has scheduled a hearing for 11 a.m. Wednesday, Jan. 21, in Abilene on the City of Cisco's preapplication for a block grant project, City Manager R.J. Turpin reported Thursday. Mr. Turpin plans to attend the meeting.

The application for a \$600,000 grant for use in a Cisco street and sewer improvement program is being handled for the city by Barber and Traylor Associates of Tyler, and the pre-application is the initial step in seeking approval of the project, Mr. Turpin said.

Rumors that the program would require 50% matching funds are entirely false, Mr. Turpin said. He added that, if approved, the grant would come 100% free to the taxpayers of Cisco.

and Lake Bernie. The matter of purchasing equipment for the street department, including a self propelled street sweeper, a new backhoe machine, a truck mounted asphalt distributor, and a self prodiscussed. Mr. Turpin said the equipment would be paid for with revenue sharing

The equipment would enable the city street department to do a much better job of building and maintaining streets, Mr. Turpin said. Additional bids are being requested to be opened soon. Bids also will be sought to sell surplus police vehicles

and scrap metal. The meeting was called by an order signed by William J. Eudy, mayor pro tem, and Councilman Harold Pippen and Jerry Jeffcoat so the sewer line project could be built in time for the scheduled opening of the new White Elephant Inn, it was pointed

The regularly scheduled meeting of the City Council on Tuesday night, Jan. 13, was not held for lack of a quorem of members. Only Mayor Roy Cartee and Councilwoman Louise Allison showed up for the meeting. All members of the council except Councilman Raymond Whitley attended the Wednesday meeting.

Following the business agenda at the special meeting, Mrs. Allison made a statement in which she noted that she has heard that petitions asking for a recall election were being circulated and that she would like to be advised immediately if and when such petitions are filed with the city secretary.

Mr. Turpin told her that this matter was not on the agenda for the meeting and she would have to place it on the agenda for a future meeting and that he would not comply with her request unless specifically instructed by Council order.

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





Iranian homes are constructed each in an individual compound generally similar in shape and size to our "lots". The lot is enclosed in a wall, usually a minimum of eight feet high.....many times much higher. The Persian prizes his privacy, and his security. Many of the walls are topped with broken glass imbedded in a course of concrete atop the wall which is constructed of brick, concrete block or adobe.

While the homesites are usually a bit larger than those to which we are accustomed, they all carry the same identification. They are always referred to as "gardens". One does not speak of his "yard" in Iran. It is his garden. And hidden behind those walls are sometimes the most beautiful arrangements of lawn and beds of flower beds one can imagine. And without exception they are tended by a full- or part-time gardener who is considered to be a member of the household staff of servants. On larger estates the gardener is housed, along with his family within the compound.

Our residence in Heheran was one of 210 homes which were built during an acute housing shortage on 1959 by IBEC (International Board of Economic Consultants), a branch of the Rockfeller Foundation. All the homes were built inside a single walled area on the upper toe of the slope of the Alborz mountain range which runs generally knorthwest-tosoutheast (mostly easterly-westerly) to the north of the city. And while all the homes were enclosed within the larger compound, each home had its own garden wall. And built, as has been described as "to American standards with a Persian accent", the garden walls were low enough that "wall-visiting" between neighbors was not only possible, it was a not uncommon practice.

Our residence, as were all the others in the section which, although it was officially identified as "Sahebgherranieh Niavaran" was known throughout the city as "IBEC", faced toward the city. Being situated almose 2,000 feet above the city, the panoramic view of Teheran was little short of spectacular. And with the mountains rising almost abruptly and majestically to a height of 14,000 feet behind us, we were against a magnificent backdrop. And the slope of our garden was such that it was graded into three lovels, and while the front was toward the lower slope the generally used entrance was in the back. And we had a full-time gardener.

My Lovely Wife affectionately named him "Old Baggy Pants" when he first came to take care of our garden and greenhouse. With what reached a total of 185 potted plants, one can appreciate originally the importance of the greenhouse which was constructed in the northwest corner of the garden and alongside the servants' quarters. Old Baggy Pants made a full-time job of it.

But he was known lovingly to everyone as"Baba", which is a sort of nickname which we'd use in the familiar term of "Dad". I never learned his surname. And we did not have quarters for Baba. He lived in two-room adobe structure not too far away. His home was inside a rather large fruit orchard where his wife served as "Bhadji" (housemaid) in the home of the owner. Baba lived there with his wife and their lovely teen-age daughter, Pari. We financed Pari's schooling as a seamstress, but more of that at another time. This story is about Baba.

When he first came to work for us, our cook-houseboy learned that he "thought that he was bout 81 years old" Baba, a meek, sweet, kindly little man was almost totally illiterate. And he was faithful. Regardless of the weather, and one year we had a total snowfall of 96 inches, he was there each morning. In winter, to mind the potted plants in the greenhouse-in summer to tend the grass and the flower

Dressed as he was in castoff clothing which was given to him (we made our contribution), MLW's nickname was not inappropriate. Baba, (however, never knew what she called him for the first year or two of his ten years of service. And she dropped it. He was just "Baba". Meek, always smiling, dependable little old Baba.

Baba had bad knees. I suspected cartilage failures. And as age crept inexorably upon him, the knees became worse. He began leaning upon a hand-made crutch. We begged him to allow us to put him into a hospital for surgery. Our personal physician told us that he could arrange for the surgery if we could encourage Baba to allow it. Baba was a devout Moslem. His faith would not allow any man to tamper with God's creation to the extent of cutting on the human frame. Allah would take care of everything. And if it were the will of Allah that he spend his remaining year apartial cripple....it was the will of Allah. Not to be questioned; to do so would be to question Allah's wisdom.

After ten years of service, we retired Baba. Our cook and bhadji said that they could take care of the garden....and they did. So, retired Baba at half pay, which amounted to \$13.33 (his retirement pay) per month.

Although Baba was illiterate, he knew the passing of time. Each month, toward the end of the fourth week, Baba would be sitting on the curb near the entrance to the IBEC compound. We'd stop, hand him his pittance, and he'd kiss our hand and thank us profusely while giving thanks to Allah for

When we departed Teheran we informed our successor of the arrangement with Baba. He promised to keep up the payment of his retirement. We hope that he did. We loved Old Baggy Pants, and we are convinced that he loved us. And we doubt that any bombastic propaganda can change his opinion....nor that of millions of other "Baba's" in Iran of Americans, generally.

Homemaking Hints

Ceiling fans probably reached their all-time low in popularity about 20 years ago when their heavy motors reportedly were used for boat anchors. This is hard to believe today when they are among the most desired home appliance.

Though many ceiling fans were bought for their looks at the beginning of the recent nostalgia craze, owners soon realized a fan's value as an energy saver on both cooling and heating bills.

I, from experience, agree with those who say you can be quite comfortable in the summer in an 80 degree room with a ceiling fan running. Therein lies the energy savings. While air conditioning units are gluttons of energy, the average ceiling fan uses less than 150 watts. That is less energy than is used by most home vultibulb ceiling light fixtures.

Ceiling fans are certainly making a big comeback because of their energy saving features.

What should consumers watch out for? It is important that you consider such items as blade revolutions per minute (RPM), warranty, motor construction and custom features. Beware of "ceiling fans" that aren't really fans. Some are only decorations with no motors

Isn't a fan only good in the summer? No. Fans can be used year around. During the spring and fall you can open your windows and keep the cool air circulating. During the winter months, by using the fan on low speed, the gentle circulation will move the warm ceiling air down to the floor which will produce a warming effect and cut down on your heating costs.

Some fans have a rerversible motor. The reverse can be useful in several situations. When you use a large fan over a table or desk the reverse could be used so papers aren't blown or food isn't cooled off. There are two type of reverse mechanisms. One is a change in the pitch of blades. The other is an actual motor reverse. Not all fans have reverse options. The standard air flow is down from the fan blades, across the floor and up the walls. When you reverse the air flow, the air is pulled up, across the ceiling and down the walls.

One very important consideration for consumers is the warranty. All the ceiling fans that I have seen have at least a one year manufacturers warranty. Some manufacturers warranty their fans up to five years.

Where is the best place for a fan? Any room where you spend much of your time. By centering the fan in a room, you get the best effect from the air movement.

You may be concerned that a fan requires an unusually high ceiling. They used to! But now fan manufacturers all make their fans for installation in 8 foot ceilings. Most of the fans have a 7 foot blade clearance. Even if you have a light on the fan, there will be a 6 foot to 6 foot 4 inch clearance under the light.

If you are considering a ceiling fan for your home, you may be wondering what size fan to purchase. It depends on the size of the room. If the room is 12 x 12 foot or less and has an 8 foot ceiling, a 36 inch blade fan is large enough. Generally a room that is up to 24 foot in length will need one 52" fan. The 52" fan is usually used in living room, family room, and patios. If the room is over 24 feet in length, you wili need two 52 inch fan.

Ceiling fans vary greatly in price, starting around \$100. Most of the cost variation has to do with





A Salute To RUTH CARTEE

Mention the Senior Citizen's Center in Cisco. Eastland, and Rising Star and almost immediately you will hear the name of Director Ruth (Mrs. Roy) Cartee. For Mrs. Cartee, during her five years with these programs, has endeared herself to the more than three hundred people who attend. And few programs have been as popular as the Nutrition and Recreational and Educational project funded by the West Central Texas Council Junior College, with Dean John Muller as Supervisor. Judge Scott Bailey is the project Chairman for Cisco, and Eastland will elect a Chairman in the near future. Rising Star has an all-volunteer program, with potluck dinners and many worthwhile Anyone who visits the Nutrition Program - where good meals are served three

days each wook to persons over 60 years old - comes away with a multitude of impresisons of Ruth Cartee. Ruth is a trim, attractive woman with an invincible smile, and she manages to appear unruffled during all situations. As the crowds converge on the Corral Room of the Laguna Hotel in Cisco, her duties range fram greeting visiting dignitaries to checking out the food in the kitchen. She has an uncanny way of materializing just in time to adjust a crackling microphone, wipe up something which has spilled, or help carry dinner trays to persons to weak to stand in the serving line.

It is easy for Ruth Cartee to greet the Senior Citizens as old friends, for many of them were neighbors during her childhood in Cisco.

"Among my former teachers who attend the Centers are Lela Lloyd and Ella White," she says.

Ruth remembers her youthful days in Cisco as serene and happy ones. Her Grandparents, on both sides of her family, were pioneers in the area. Her father's family, the Hibberts, settled near Breckenridge in the early days, while her Mother's family, the Carlisles, established a farm home in the Bedford Community, N.E. of Cisco. Some of the best days of Ruth's childhood were spent on the Carlisle farm, with her Grandmother leading out in

interesting activities. "I suppose I first learned to appreciate Senior Citizens," Ruth remarks, "During those good times with my wonderful Grand-

Ruth's father, Charles Hibbert, helped construct the dam at Lake Cisco. The family had two daughters besides Ruth, Wanda and Jean. During these years Ruth attended the Nazarene Church with her family, and became a member of this

Church. After graduation from Grade and High School in Cisco, Ruth attended Business College in Springfield, Missouri. By the time she finished this training World War II had begun, and she was offered a job as Chief Bookkeeper in Western Union in Abilene.

Western Union was a busy place in those days, with Branch Offices in area towns. Messages - both happy and tragic - flashed back

While working in Abilene Ruth met a young man who impressed her - Roy Cartee, the Red Cross Field Director at Camp Barkley. This personable native of Kansas was busy with his work, but not too busy to notice this pretty girl. They were Married in Chapel I at Camp Barkley, and soon afterward Ruth traveled with Roy to assignments at Ft. Hood and Lubbock Airforce Base.

When the war was over the young couple moved to Manhattan, Kansas, and Roy fisnished his Degree at Kansas State University. Soon afterward the Cartees began work for Boeing Aircraft Co., with Ruth working in the Security Section. The last twelve years of this work were spent in New Orleans, La.

During these years Ruth's Mother died, and her sisters married and moved away from Cisco. At the present time her Father resides in Cisco Nursing Home.

While working in the large cities Ruth remembered her happy, peaceful childhood in Cisco, and she kept mentioning to Roy what a pleasant life they could have there someday. So in 1973 they left Boeing, and decided to live in Cisco. In 1977, upon the retirement of Kathleeen Lamb, Mr. Cartee became Director of the Eastland County Red Cross. In 1980 he

as elected Mayor of Cisco.

His work for the community has included volunteer work for the Senior Center.

Ruth credits Cisco Junior College with much of the expansion of the Senior Citizen's Program. "Ralph Glenn, as Director, had been leading out with Recreation and other things before I took the job in early 1976. Dr. Norman Wallace and other College personnel were very helpful in the planning. Judge Scott Bailey has always encouraged and supported the work. The business people of the towns, the Program Directors, the volunteers and the good publicity in the newspapers have all contributed to the success of the projects."

In Cisco the College provided a location for the meetings in the Corral Room of the Laguana Hotel, and many Eastland people attended there until their own Center was remodeled in late Nov. of 1980. A wing of the old Dr. Carpenter Hospital is now the Center in Rising Star, thanks to many hours of work. All these places have been renovated, and brightened with attractive decor and furnishings. The redecorating of the Laguna Hotel was celebrated by a large Open House on Feb. 15, 1979. The Eastland Open House was Dec. 1, 1980.

Shortly after Ruth Cartee began her work as Director, Lillie Smith of Cisco became the first Green Thumb worker. The Green Thumb Program, financed by the Farmer's Union, gives Senior Citizens opportunities to work in a number of special jobs. Among these are the local Program Directors, who plan interesting events for the groups. Annie Rendall directs in Cisco, Vinita Miller in Eastland, and Marjorie West in Rising Star.

Among other special project is Telephone Reassurance, with Jo Phillips in charge, Thelma Tickner in Games and Crafts, and Nellie Housh in Ceramics.

"The workers and volunteers are the most dedicated people I have ever Cartee. Take our cooks, for example. What would the Nutrition Program be without good food? Mrs. Verda Reed and three other cooks prepare meals which taste like good home cooking. At this time they prepare both Cisco and Eastland food, which amounts to around 250 meals most days. We recently acquired a van with which to transport meals to Eastland.'

Along with many memories of Open Houses and special celebrations at all the Centers, and awards for her work, Ruth Cartee has an ever-expanding lists of services, functions, and programs. These include:

The 80 Plus Club, which has more than 100 members. Visits by Congressman Charles Stenholm, State Rep. Joe Hanna, and County Officials.

Programs by Health Nurses.

Programs by Janet Thomas, Extension Agent. Ceramics - one of the most popular projects.

Exercise Classes. Birthday parties and Anniversary parties, Christmas programs.

Telephone reassurance checking on members who might be ill. Participation in parades,

the County Fair, and Senior Citizen Bazaar. Take out meals for ill or

handicapped persons. Art Classes. Programs by various Minister, Churches, Schools,

and the College.

Much music of various types - dinner music, the German Band, stringed instruments, the regular choir, and special singers. The Star Brite Band of Rising Star an ever popular group. The Treadwell family musical

Games such as dominoes, '42, and others.

Naturally people come to the Centers for the good food and the programs, but there is another very important ingredient to be found. You sense it when Ruth Cartee greets all who come through the door as if they were

honored guests arriving at a special party. This welcome seems to touch even the most sad, neglected and discouraged visitors, drawing them back toward life.

For you can't come week after week and eat with people without caring something about them without celebrating life a lit-


