A Letter From the Publisher Cisco is on two important thresholds. One is the upcoming 100th birthday which will be properly marked by a Centennial Celebration, which deserves our combined all-out participa-

The second is what is undoubtedly going to be "another boom" for the city and area, as growth continues and expansion emerges, as industry, business and the resulting people come to enjoy the many benefits of this key Sunbelt spot.

It would seem that if for no other reason, the citizens of this good community have every right to expect that all will be in order when these thresholds are crossed. Evaluation and examination is good, and since it should begin on a personal basis, we'll address that direction and begin with a personal soul-searching.

The Press stands accussed in some quarters of failing to present both sides of issues at City Hall. This is a serious accusation and it bothers us. If this be so - and we certainly don't imply that we have all the facts - then we immediately want to publicly apologize, because we see our responsibility as providing all the information we can, "on all sides."

For a long, long time, we've hoped that there weren't "sides", and that differences could best be worked out by the individuals involved, and properly reported by the Press, people who know their job, the people, the town, and in our opinion, do a good job.

But if there are "sides," and if the Press hasn't been airing "both sides," then there's more than us at fault. There should be only side: THE CISCO SIDE.

After a weekend of "ear-to-ear" telephone calls from Cisco citizens, we're convinced that the citizens have a right to expect some very specific things. (And as a tax payer and civic booster, the Press certainly considers itself a "citizen.")

First of all, it would appear that the city's present form of government (commission, city manager) is a fact of life. It was adopted several years ago, and apparently the time limit for questioning the election and/or the method of establishing that government has passed.

And recent indications are that attempting to change it back to the mayor/commission form could probably endanger the city's home-rule status-and conceivably plunge it toward general rule designation which could strip it of many of the privileges it now enjoys.

The possibility is frightening that the state legislatures would set tax votes and other key

So it would appear that acceptance of the present form of government is the first order of business. And that the second order would be to follow the city charter, in letter and spirit.

Which brings us to the Press article in question. It states in part: "The regularly scheduled meeting of the City Council on Tuesday night, Jan. 13, was not held for lack of a quorem of members." It would seem the people of Cisco have a right to know why there wasn't a quorem. Very important business was conducted at the meeting specially called for Wednesday evening.

The article closes with what appears to have been a brief discussion after the meeting ended, at which the city manager told a councilperson that the particular topic wasn't on the agenda and couldn't be discussed, and further that it would only be discussed under council order.

Remote observers might see this as quite a bit of petty gobble-gook; and frankly, it undoubtedly appears the same to not just a few locals too.

So it would seem that we might all do our Cisco well by forgetting "about sides", and thinking about what's best for Cisco; and be about working together with what we have. It's generally understood that under a city manager form of government, the council should harmonously and with the best interest of the city, adopt policy, which the city manager, an employee, should with his staff and employees, carry out.

It might mean taking a lot of "ourselves" out of city matters, and putting more of co-operation into our thinking. It's a fact that "things move slowly" at the City Hall, and perhaps that's the way it should be, because when many of us attempt to "speed things up", we invariably get into problems. The City is a separate intity, and deserves the best management it can get, to provide the services the citizens deserve and expect.

At best serving on boards and commissions is a thank-less task and everyone who offers to serve, deserves our respect and support. If we are unhappy - there's an election every year.

The Press is for Cisco. The only side it wants to

print is the Cisco side.

Centennial Time might be a good time for each of us to join hands, work together and help make this an even better place to live in the second 100 years .- H.V O'Brien.

#### STRAIGHT ANSWERS FROM THE D.P.S. by Jerry Mathews

(Ed. Note: This is basic information. We recommend that local drivers read it, reread it, have young people read it and all become very familiar with the situations.)

My last article concerning traffic control signs at city street intersections brought about a need for discussing the right-of-way laws for the intersections where there are no signs.

Prior to discussing what the law allows, I want to mention an aspect that is not allowed. A few years a go a change in the right-of-way laws did away with the first vehicle into the intersection having the right-of-way concept. This no longer is true. The first vehicle into an intersection has no bearing on who is to yield the right-of-

There are four basic rules that need to be understood in order to know who must yield the right-of-way at an intersection.

First, at intersectins where there are traffic signs erected, drivers are required to obey them.

The second rule deals with intersections where a single lane street or a street of only two traffic lanes intersects with a street which has three or more lanes or is divided. In this instance I am describing an intersection where there are no signs to govern the movement of traffic and so the smaller street must yield the right-of-way to traffic on the larger street.

The third rule deals with intersections where there are no signs and one intersecting street is paved and the other is unpaved. Traffic on the unpaved street must yield right-of-way to traffic on the paved street.

The fourth rule concerns intersections where the streets have the same number of driving lanes and the surfacing of the streets is the same.

Here, a driver is required to yield right-of-way to traf-

fic on his right. Another part of the fourth rules deals with an intersection where one road terminates at the intersection. In this instance the intersection has no signs. the surfacing is the same, but one road ends at the intersection forming a "T" intersection. Traffic on the terminations roadway must yield right-of-way to traffic

on the through roadway. In all instances that I have mentioned you will notice that the right-of-way is not given because of one street being a U.S. or a state highway which is intersection with a city street.

Highway designation does not enter into determining who must yield the right-ofway, but instead you need to consider signs, size of intersecting streets, surfacing, or "T" intersection.

There are two other points

I want to make in dealing with right-of-way. In Eastland the drivers on some streets "assume" they have the right-of-way. I suppose it's custom that drivers on Main Street (U.S. 80) assume that they have the right-of-way over side streets as well as do drivers on Commerce, Sadosa, Seaman (Tex. 6), and others, but this is not the case. Each intersection has to be dealt with by the rules that have been discussed.

The other point I want to make is that the law doesn't give the right-of-way to anvone.

Instead it states who is to vield the right-of-way. A good driving practice is to assume that you never have the right-of-way until you can tell that the other driver has given it to you.

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

When Muscovites saw an Orthodox priest on their television screens last month it was about as startling as if the Soviet network had broadcast an American sex

Even though Father Dmitri Dudko was confessing to crimes against the state, the impact of his appearance was enormous. It was the culmination of a conflict between the official ideology and religion, which, despite its dramatic intensity, was barely noted in the West.

For six years Father Dudko was the unofficial leader of Russian religious dissidents. He gave daily sermons in a small church near Moscow and they were secretly reproduced in the underground press and distributed in cities and towns of Soviet Russia. Collections of the twice sermons were published in the West.

In them he spoke of the of transformation Russian Orthodox Church "Bantustan into a consciousness." He spoke of the fact that believers are barred from employment and housing; of the unconscionable practice of authorities of removing religious children from parents and of the fact that believers do not enjoy even the basic rights of the average Soviet citizen guaranteed by the constitu-

In early June of this years Father Dudko was arrested

The leadership of the official Russian Orthodox Church supported the sentences and proclaimed their loyalty to

The position taken by the official church did not surprise anyone in the U.S.S.R. It was the logical result of the most successful action conducted by the KGB in religious circles since the war. Ordered to infiltrate the clergy, KGB agents occupied the most important posts in Russian Orthodox Church, whose leadership is like a department of the party central committee.

Collaboration with the regime has become an every day practice even to the censorship of sermons and the closing of churches. For example, after two main Orthodox cathedrals were closed down in Riga and turned into a planetarium warehouse. Metropolitan Leonid of the Riga Orthodox Church was decorated with the Red Banner Order. This order is given for great service to the

Soviet state.

Wednesday, Only on Patriarch Pimen of All Russia, head of Orthodox Church, received the Order of Lenin, the highest Soviet award. The citation said the award was for his "struggle for peace". But Patriarch Pimen was known to have had two meetings with Father Dudko, whole he was in KGB custody, shortly before he made his "confession" on television.

Infiltration of the Moslem clergy was even more effective. As a Soviet journalist and writer, I had an opportunity to meet the great Mufti of the Moslems of Soviet Middle Asia and Kazakhstan. After a visiting delegation of foreign Moslem clergymen had departed, the Mufti said with a smile to a group of Soviet journalists and party functionaries: "The show is over. Now we can drink and enjoy ourselves - we are among friends."

Nevertheless, events of the 15 years have demonstrated that the Soviet war against religion in fact has been lost. While the regime plays these games with the official churches, unofficial religion has grown throughout the country and has gained millions of supporters. Baptists and Adventists, who broke off relations with representing committees their faith in the Soviet bureaucracy, have become so influential and disturbed officials have established special departments to combat religion in every provincial branch of the KGB

throughout the U.S.S.R. Konstantin Cherneko, one of the most powerful men in today's Politburo, told the All-Union Atheists' Society Conference: "Over and over again we encounter the same problem; what can we offer in opposition to the New Testament? This summer the party

came up with a traditional answer: in three months, 250 Baptists and Evengelist Christians were arested. The most tragic fate was suffered Vladimar Shchelkov, leader of the Seventh Day Adventists in the U.S.S.R. The 84-year-old Shchelkov was arrested for the 11th time and sentenced to four years in a labour camp. All that was found in his home after an intensive search were 20 copies of the New Testament

Shchelkov was sent to a camp at Yakutiya in northern Siberia, noted for its harsh climate.

A Christian Evangelist recently released from this camp informed colleagues that Captain Bobentsov, a camp official, even took away the old man's warm clothing and Bible. Shchelkov was forced to perform hard labor alongside the other prisoners and, after several days of hard work, he

But the regime's harsh treatment of Christians has not brought the anticipated results. Even according to state statistics published in the Soviet press, the number of believers in the U.S.S.R. is growing.

on the newsstands and selfish pleasure is the goal...Please God, rekindle a new spirit within us, a new awakening.

That's a prayer offered by the president of a huge Bible publishing company, Sam Moore, urging Americans to stand behind President Ronald Reagan.

Moore's company-Thomas Nelson Inc.-spent \$50,000 for newspaper "advertisement" which ran in the Wall Street Journal and Nashville's two newspapers, The Tennessean and Nashville Banner. Moore said he decided to publish the message-entitled "A Prayer for Our President"-in the Journal to reach the nation's business community.

"The three leading presidential candidates -President Carter, Ronald Reagan and John Anderson - all claimed before election they were born-again Christians in this country," Moore, 50, said in an interview.

"We ought to be the salt of the earth, but these people were divided among the canidates. Some Christians aren't talking to other Christians because of the candidate they support. There's infighting in the house of the Lord."

Moore said he thought of the prayer because "our nation is suffering from a great malaise right now. As a people we need to open our eyes and see what's happening to us.

"We as a people ought to pledge our honor, integrity, support and lovalty to our president. We need to give a good day's work for a day's pay. And, we need to go back to our spiritual heritage. Our country needs God."

Americans should praise the country's strengths rather than bemoan its weaknesses, Moore said.

"I want to tell people to look at the positive side instead of the negative," he said. "We've only got one president and we can't tear him up without destroying ourselves. Constant tearing down is no good ...

"Like my son - I'd been on his back for a long time about all the things he was doing wrong. He was only 14 and one day after I'd been on him a long time, he looked me in the eye and said, 'Dad, can I do anything right?' When he walked out the tears started dripping down my face."

Born in Lebanon, Moore then named Sam Ziadi- dreamed of becoming a doctor. He attended the Evangelical High School in Beirut and met an American doctor who the executive said opened his eyes to God.

"I thought medicine and the money it would bring would make me happy," he said. "But I was a very unhappy man."

The doctor, Moore said, left his practice in the United States and built a hospital in Bethlehem for the Presbyterian Church.

"He gave it all up to go out to the Middle East and heal the wounds of the broken-hearted and the homeless," he said. "I said, 'There is a happy man.' That was the beginning."

Moore, whose company last year recorded \$35.8 million in sales, said he accepted God for good the day his friend was shot.

"I saw him lying there with blood coming out of his ears, and I said to myself, 'What's happening to us all?"

"And I remembered a man I knew who was poor but went to bed singing and woke up singing. I realized he had the joy of the Lord," Moore

Bullock Tuesday handed Texas lawmakers details of his forecast of money available to finance state government for the next two years. He said the state will receive \$27.9 billion in revenue from all sources during the biennium starting September 1, 1981.

Bullock told members of the Legislature "good economic news more than offsets the bad news in economic projections for 1982-83, but warned the impact of a new national administration cannot be assessed at this time.'

Bullock predicted the state's economy would perform better than the nation's primarily on the strength of Texas' energy industries and energy resources.

The analysis showed that personal income would grow by 25.4 percent, retail sales would be up 26.2 percent and

Bullock said the total amount available for certification and spending from major funds by the Legislature will be \$19.4 billion, a figure that includes a projected \$568.9 million surplus from the state's current budget.

The state's five major funds -- the General Revenue fund, Available School Fund, Omnibus fund, Motor Fuels and Highway funds are expected to total \$18.9 billion. Special funds will account for \$7.3 billion and revenue from non-expendable funds will total \$1.7 billion.

The bulk of the state's income --\$17.3 billion or about 62 percent--will come from tax collections. The remainder will come from special funds, including federal payments, fees for licenses and permits and interest from investments and state-owned lands.

Sales tax, the analysis showed, will bring \$3.1 billion in 1982 and \$3.5 billion in 1983. Oil and gas taxes for the two-year period are expected to total about \$5

He also noted that his revenue estimates have become more accurate in the past few years and the percentage of error for estimates of the General Revenue fund was only minus 1.4 percent for the first two years covered by the estimate provided the Legislature in 1979.
