

Prevent Wood Decay in Homes

siding.

Home construction technology has increased tremendously during the past few years. Yet, many homes are being built without proper attention to preventing future costly repairs, points out Chuck Stayton, area wood products specialist for the Texas Agricutlural Extension Service, Texas A&M University

System. Lumber, plywood and other wood products used in construction are all subject to wood decay. This decay, caused by numerous fungi that break down the wood and feed on it, can lead to structural failure and expensive repairs.

"The best control of wood decay is keeping wood products dry in manufacturing, shipment and use," Stayton contends. "When the moisture content of wood is kept below 20 percent, most decay fungi are not able to decompose the wood.'

Basic construction faults cause most decay problems in homes and other buildings. These mistakes allow excessive moisture to enter from the ground level or from rainfall.

Stayton notes six specific precautions to take to prevent soil moisture from entering a house.

"First of all, install wood siding at least 6 inches above finish grade. Make sure all other wood material is a minimum of 8 inches above the ground unless it is pressure preservative treated.

"Secondly, provide an 18-inch or higher clearance between floor joists and the soil in crawl space areas. Greater distance is even more desirable.

"Third, slope the outside grade away from the house to allow proper drainage. Ditching or drainage tiles may be necessary for some locations

"A fourth step is to install one square foot of vent for each 150 sqaure feet of enclosed crawl space. Place vents opposite each other and as near corners as possi-

"Next, use four to six mil polyethelene soil covers directly on the soil in enclosed crawl space areas and under all slab construction.

"Finally, take special precautions with earth filled porches, patios and flower planters, keeping the soil 8 inches below the level of all house structural wood members. Slope patios and porches away from the house to prevent standing water," adds the specialist.

Stayton also recommends six precautions in roof construction to prevent wood

To begin, use wood shingles of a highly decay resistant species or some that are pressure treated when in high decay hazard regions. Also a minimum slope of 4 feet in 12 feet is needed to prevent water backing up under the

shingles. Secondly, provide enough roof overhang to sweep runoff away from the house. A 30-inch overhang is needed in regions of high temperature and rainfall such as the Gulf Coast of Texas.

Next, extend shingles at least three-fourths of an inch beyond wood members at the eave and rake of the roof to prvent rain water from flowing down the roof and curling under the shingle edge. Facia and rake boards should be pressure treated or of a high decay resistant

species. The fourth precaution is to make sure gutters are sloped toward downspouts to insure proper drainage. Keep gutters and downspouts free of leaves or other debris and allow them to empty onto splash blocks or into drain-

Next, raise the siding 2 inches above the shingles at the intersection of two stories or between dormers and roof surfaces. Insert metal flashing which extends under the shingles and Beta Sigma Phi Finally, provide ventila-



Prevent Animal Related Accidents

Farm animals may be responsible for up to 10 percent of all farm and ranch injuries, with children often the victims.

Knowing and using proper farm animal handling methods can prevent many of these injuries, points out Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

He emphasizes the need to "use" known safe practices. Curiously enough, notes the engineer, even Bible scriptures warns that "know how to charm a snake is of no use if you let the snake bite first."

Most animal-related accidents involve violation of simple, commonsense procedures, Nelson points out. So, he emphasizes a number

of guidelines: -Teach children to treat farm animals and pets with kindness and respect.

> -Always expect the unexpected when handling animals -Don't permit anyone to

animals. -Let animals know when you're around-don't startle

tease, abuse or mistreat

-Keep small, unsupervised children away from animal pens and pastures.

Discourage youngsters from reaching through fences or pens to pet or feed animals. Some animals may bite or toss their heads, jamming a child's arm against the fence or pen.

Nelson says many accidental injuries are also related to animal-care equipment. That means giving close attention to the

-Keep walking and working surfaces used in tending animals clutter-free and clear of ice, manure, mud and other substances to reduce the risk of falls.

-- Keep pharmaceuticals and barn chemicals in a safe, preferably locked, storage cabinet where children can't get at them.

Put them as well as such things as tools and buckets away promptly after use.

-- Keep pens, ladders, fences and chutes in good condition.

Shock hazards are also a real threat in wet or damp environments of animal confinement pens and buildings. Make sure all electrical equipment is in good shape and properly grounded, emphasizes Nelson. Check wiring, service and switch boxes, outlets and extension lines, and repair faulty

Silos, manure pits and feed storage locations should also be off-limits to children. Keep them locked, Gasses and vapors given off from these materials have killed many people. These locations are also hazardous to adult workers, so proper ventilation or respiratory protective equipment is a must.

Knowing all of these practices, though, means little if they aren't followed, emphasizes Nelson.

Reflections In **Perspective** By I. Will Ussery

One of the first questions which arises when one is considering relocation to an overseas post is that of medical facilities. That question is foremost when one is going on "family status". And that was the condition of our assignment to Teheran, Iran.

Although I had no indication that we were going into that sort of situation during the six months of my "bachelor status" service in Iran, it had been determined that medical treatment by highly qualified physicians was indeed available. At that time, the majority of the doctors of medicine had been educated and trained in either Western Europe or the United States...or both. Dentists, strangely enough, were for the most part graduates of the Dental College of the Heidelberg School of Medicine in Germany.

It had been determined that "Pars Hospital", situated almost in the heart of the city of Teheran was operated according to somewhat Persianised American standards. The principal practitioner was a product of the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, and had served his internship in Philadelphia General Hospital. Pars catered largley to the western population of the city. Or to clarify that ... to the people from Western countries.

Somewhat unexpectedly upon my return to this country for my annual Christmas Break it was learned that I would return to Teheran "for a period of time not to exceed one year", accompanied by my wife and younger daughter. The availability of suitable and adequate health facilities posed no great problem.

Upon having established residence in Teheran, our first encounter with a hospital was with one far from the downtown facility of Pars Hospital. It was with the Reza Shah the Great Memorial Hospital, which was situated up the slope of the mountain range from what had once been the village of Tajrij (pronounced "Tazhrish") which had long since been swallowed up by the expanding city but which still clung to its nominal identity

When we leased our first residence from an Iranian lady who seemed to be extremely wealthy, and whose family was of quite some political significance, the place was in the hands of a "Bhadji", or housemaid who came from a village which was owned by the landlady. She was simply serving as a caretaker for the house and garden. And Noelli (about the nearest we can come to Anglicising her name) came from the village of Ishmael, high in the mountains of Turkestan Province above the city of Qazvin. Qazvin was some hundred miles to the northwest of Teheran.

Madame Mahdavi, the landlady, requested that we engage Noelli as our Bhadji, but was not insistent about it. "If she does not work out; I shall send her back to the village. She does not speak your language, nor does she know how to prepare your food. But she knows the house, and will keep it clean for you. She will do your laundry, and will run your errands. And Noelli is honest." That final qualification we found to be infinitely correct. So; knowing that we'd have to have a Bhadji, we accepted Noelli.

After about three months, Noelli came down with what could be described in country terms as "the vapours". Listless, tired easily, and a loss of appetite. We insisted she see a physician. She did just that.

After a brief period of treatment, she informed us (through our driver, who spoke Turkish... Noeilli did not at that time speak Persian) that the doctor had told her that she must have surgery. We went to see the doctor, who told us that Noelli had an infected kidney, or one which did not function, or something. In any case, it must be removed. So be it. And where would he recommend she go for the surgery? Why, to Reza Shah Memorial Hospital, which was right almost next door to the out-patient clinic where he practiced.

We went with Noelli to the hospital, and were agreeably surprised at the spic-and-span cleanliness of the place. Extravant use of ceramic tile and stainless steel in the construction of the hospital made cleanliness quite easy. And it appeard that the staff took full advantage of that aspect. The hallways and rooms were spacious, and the nurses and other staff members were dressed in crisply-starched uniforms.

We we were in the process of booking our housemaid into the hospital, under the auspices of the physician, the Administrator of the facility came forward. It seemed that the presence of a foreigner in his hospital was something of a rarity. We explained our presence. "Only" your Bhadji? Why do you not take her to one of the charity hospitals operated by the government?"

We stated with strict firmness (and not witout a bit of indignation) that Noelli was our Bhadji, indeed. But that we loved Noelli as though she were a member of our family. And we wanted her to have the best care available.

He appreciated our point of view, and held our magniminity in esteem which amount almost to awe. "But the cost, Agha. It will be expensive". "How expensive?" We asked. "Oh, it could cost as much as twelve, maybe fifteen thousand rials (\$200.00)." "Then, how much of that do you wish us to pay in advance, as a gesture of good faith?"

Oh, no, Agha. You are American. Your generosity overwhelms me. And your concern for your Bhadji is most unusual. There is no thought for a moment of any advance payment. You are indeed a most kind man. It will be a pleasure to have your Bhadji in our hospital'

Noelli spent something like two weeks in the hospital recovering from her surgery, which was perfectly successful. And the total bill came to something just under two hundred dollars.

Three months later, as we were making arrangments to move to another house where we remained for ten and a half years, Madame Mahdavi gave Noelli her choice of either going with us or remaining with her house. We were sitting on the patio when Madame made that decision. Noelli stepped across to stand behind My Lovely Wife's chair and placed her hand on MLW's shoulder. She had made her decision. And she stayed in our household until we departed Teheran those

We often wonder what has happened to Noelli. With the help of her four sons (the youngest was only five years of age and was living with her at our place when we went there), Noelli purchased a modest home not far away. She was a widow, and was the strict matriarch of her family. And as we wonder about Noelli, we cannot see her accepting the "Hate American" adminition of the present leaders of her country. Who knows?

Our most outstanding experience with hospitals in Teheran involved our daughter, who suffered what was diagnosed as "spontaneous pneumothorax - 80 percent collapse of the lung". The physician to whom our then family doctor in Teheran had sent us recommended surgery, but immediately. We went into mild panic.

From the doctor's office we called-with his permission and complete endorsement-Colonel Johnson at the U.S. Army Hospital which was operated there for the American military forces and for the Foreign Service personnel. We described our problem, and he was quite sympathetic.

"But Bill, we do not have a thoracic surgeon on our staff. If she can travel, we can place her aboard a "Med-Evac" plane for West Germany where the surgery can be performed. But with eighty percent collapse, that is highly unlikely. In an emergency, and this appears to be that, I would place one of my patients in the hands of a local surgeon. I can recommend one who is a colleague of both Doctor Cooley and Dr. DeBakey (Widely known surgeons of Houston)." "And who is the surgeon whom you would recommend?" Why, Dr. Mohammed Ali Sheikh. Shall I call him for you?"

It was not necessary. I was calling from Dr. Sheikh's office. The surgery, performed the following day, was most successful. And when she was taken to the Chief of Thoracic Surgery of Methodist Hospital in Houston two months later for a checkup, that surgeon exclaimed..."Dr. Sheikh! You could not have been in better hands. Please give him my best regards when you see him again".

Senator Bob Glasgow of Stephenville is co-sponsoring two measures that would give relief to local counties.

One measure would restore lateral road funding to the counties and the second measure would increase the county's share of receipts

The lateral road fund measure is also cosponsored by Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls and Senator Kent Caperton of Bryan.

"Until a veto by the Governor of lateral road funds two years ago, the counties had relied on lateral road funds since 1933 to aid in the construction and maintenance Senator Glasgow.

According to the Senator, the amount of the funding for all counties in the State will be 7.3 million dollars, that amount to be divided between the rural counties of the State. This is the same amount that was appropriated from motor fuel tax revenues prior to the veto two years ago.

The measure increasing the county's share of license tag receipts is co-sponsored by Senator Glasgow and Senator Traeger of Seguin.

According to Senator Glasgow, the measure would give the counties the first \$300,000 from license tag receipt funds collected and one percent of those funds thereafter. The present law gives each county the first \$50,000 and then one half of revenue from license tag the amount collected thereafter with a maximum ceiling of \$175,000 to be kept by each county.

"During the past few years, the counties have been caught in the crunch between high inflation; and as in the case of the cut-off of lateral road funding, less funds with which to conduct its business," state Senator

"The important thing to of county roads," stated note also is that the restoration of the lateral road fund and the increase in the county's share of license tag receipts will not increase taxes or create new taxes,' noted Senator Glasgow.

Glasgow noted that if we did not help the counties, they could be forced to either critically reduce the quality and extend of their county services or to increase local county taxes," stated Senator Glasgow. "The citizens of the counties deserve neither," added the Stephenville Legislator

The emergency Pay Raise For State Employees Bill was the main topic of discussion during Senator Glasgow's weekly conference press call on Mon-

The bill had just passed the Senate when the press conference began. It passed on a 2nd and 3rd reading. This was the first bill passed by the Senate this session.

The Senate passed a 6.8% pay raise and now the bill is headed for the House. In the House, the bill be assigned to committees and then their readings will begin. Quick action by the house is expected.

Senator Glasgow cosponsored the bill in the senate and is in favor of 6.8% amount. The house could lower the amount, although it is not expected to be lower than 5.1%. The raise should come between 5.1 and 6.8%.

There is a minimum of \$50 on the raise. The bill calls for \$50 or an increase of 6.8% which ever is larger.


The pay raise bill icludes College but not Junior College Educators, Secondary or Elementary Educators.

The Lateral Road Fund is under consideration this week. It is now on the floor. This fund was started in 1939. \$7.3 million is divided by 254 rual counties to repair roads. The amount is usually to small to use for construction, therefore equipment is usually purchased. The money for the fund comes from a portion of the Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax.

For the past several years ****** the Lateral Road Fund has been frozen due to the fact that the agency that distributed the funds were closed and no one else was appointed to the handling of these funds. The purpose of the Governor's Bill is to unfreeze these funds.

> Three of the Governor's appointments were approved by the Senate on Monday also Barry Lillian Anderson was appointed to the Governing Board of the Texas School for the Blind, Bryan Walker and Carl Cyfert were both appointed to the Advisory Council on Youth Safety. All three appointees are from Denton.

Senator Glasgow will be placing another press call next Monday around the same time.


'More than 16,000 postal workers across the nation were hurt when they fell or lost their balance, and ice and snow was the primary cause of those accidents.

Applications are received and postmarked no later than February 1 and September 1 of each year. Applications are then reviewed by advisory panels comprised of experts in the field. Their recommenda-

tions are reviewed by the Commission's Assistance Review Committee, with final awards made by the full 18-member commission in April and December.

Nonprofit tax-exempt organizations, units of government and educational institutions may apply for financial assistance awards to sponsor arts programs.

The Texas Commission on the Arts serves Texas - its arts organizations and its

people - by providing coordination, information and financial aid for art programs. TCA's primary goal is to serve as a catalyst for making the arts accessible to the public.
