Wood, whose teams have won seven state football championships, will speak at the opening session at 9 a.m. on "Coaching Relationships.





Have I told you about the island of Lavan? More than a thousand miles almost directly south of Teheran; it is some two and a half miles wide and thirteen miles long and runs northwest to southeast some twelve miles off the coast of Iran in the Persian Gulf. A typical "salt-plug" island, it was thrust up from the seabed a few hundred thousand years ago. The currents and the wind have shaped it from a craggy wall at the northwesterly end to a calm, gentle sandy beach on the southeast. There's a beach which is contained in a sort of cove on the northerly side of the island and which is a nesting ground for giant sea turtles. As I recall, the maximum elevation on Lavan is a tad less than fifty feet above main sea level.

Short grass, weeds, wildflowers and a few trees grow on the island. Among the trees are banyan trees which reportedly were set out by the Portuguese when they controlled the Gulf back in the fifteenth century. Their control was maintained by a chain of forts, the almost undiscerniable ruins of which are found about midway along the northern shore of Lavan Island. A much more modern fort, built by the Arabs in the late eighteenth century stands near the principal of four villages and commands the lee end of the island.

Each of the four villages has its own character. The main village is under the autocratic control of "Hajji Yusuf", one of the two personages on the island who have made the "Haj" or pilgrimage to Mecca. And one village of perhaps two hundred souls lies directly across the island from the ruins of the Portuguese fort. Known as the "Black Village", it is said to have been founded by African slaves who were left behind when the Portuguese departed. While the relations between all the villages are quite cordial; intermarriage with people from the Black Village is taboo; an attitude unique among the most of the Arabs I've known.

Until oil was discovered in Iranian waters ninety miles to the southeast of the island, it ws known a s"Sheik Shwaib Island". It still is so identified on many charts and maps. Mentioning the fact that it was becoming an oilfield development base to Sheikh Rashid of Dubai once, he observed with a smile; "Yes; I know Sheik Shwaib Island. It is actually my island. I allow His Majesty, the Shah to claim it, but the people are my people.

Until the coming of people who searched for oil .... and found it....the principal if not the sole industry and source of livelihood on the island was that of pearl-fishing and the sale of mother-of-pearl. Pearls abound in oysters along the reefs off the island. The oysters are pried from the seabed by divers who work without any modern equipment without which no American diver would think of entering water with a depth of more than ten feet. They are hauled aboard dhows, taken to the island where the pearls are removed and the shells are piled into a great common heap. At regular intervals traders put in at the island and purchase the shells. Pearl buttons and decorative mother-of-pearl are made from the shells. That particular aspect of the industry died with the advent of plastics, I am afraid, But when I first visited the island there was a huge mound of shells near the beach at the southeastern end of the island. The stench! Thank goodness for a prevailing northwester by wind! Hajji Yusuf, needless to say, purchased the pearls. He was said to be quite wealthy.

Hajji Yusuf did not hold an absolute monopoly in the dealing in pearls, though. He had a competitor in Hajji Ibrahim;

"There will be a lot of disappointed employees at the end of the month," Bullock said of the emergency pay raise approved by the Legislature.

Bullock said its a sin that employees will get so little from a pay raise that will cost the state so much-\$86 million for just seven months from February through August, the end of the state's current budget year. Bullock said, "We spend

who held sway over the "Number Two Village" at the other end of the island. Hajji Yusuf, though, had a slight edge over Hajji Ibrahim. Near his village ... inside the village, in fact .... was a shallow well which yielded brackish water. The other villages depended upon underground cisterns for their water supply. Those cisterns were excavated in the centers of shallow basins which could be found about the island. Water from the sparce rainfall was channelled into the cisterns, the most of which were very large and all of which were lined, "walled", if you will, with crude but very sound concrete made from materials prepared at the site.

When the Shah launched his "war on illiteracy" in the late sixties, it was considered to be politically expedient to include Lavan in the program. A Literacy Cprpsman who had been trained as an elementary teacher was sent to the island of Lavan, which by now had become a not insignificant part of the Empire. All well and good. The people were pleased to have such attention. Along with his chest of classroom supplies, the corpsman had the usual white tent which he pitched near a huge banyan tree in the village. I met the young man shortly after his having arrived to launch his battle against the inability of the people to read and write.

A very nice, neat, soldierly-bearing young corpsman; he was faced with a problem. Nobody on the island spoke the Persian language! And he spoke no Arabic, which was the language of the people of Sheik Shwaib. I never learned how he came to cope with his problem, but his white tent became a fixture in the village. As did he. Hajji Yusuf spoke with pride of "My Teacher". Perhaps he learned Arabic; who knows?







## Senator Glasgow Reports

The activity in the Texas Senate has increased as the number of bills filed and being considered has increased


Amongst the bills that I have recently introduced was a bill that would repeal the sales tax on public utilities that businesses have to pay.

Under the present state law, commercial buisness is the only class that has to pay a sales tax on utilities. Manufacturers, processors, producers of farm products, producers of oil and gas, and residential users do not pay this tax. Yet, every small business in the 22nd District



that sells goods and services pays the tax. This bill would end this discriminatory tax. Last week a bill that I sponsored was passed by the Senate and referred to the House. This was a bill that set the penalties for theft of oil and gas equipment as a felony second rather than be-

ing based upon value. With the increase of oil and gas activity, there has been an even greater increase in oil and gas equipment thefts in the State. According to law enforcement officials, losses from oil field equipment thefts in Texas were estimated at least fifty million dollars in 1980.

Accepting the false promises of the quack, they believe they can regain "youth, vigor and charm" or "lose ugly fat-no counting of calories-no exercise" or have "nerves soothed while miraculously being cured of whatever ails them.

Many books-many are often best sellers-as well as newspaper and magazine articles or advertisements give misleading or false information. The printed word can be very misleading-people

often believe anything they see in print. Some writers completely are unscrupulous: twisting the truth, making claims without a shred of scientific evidence, and quoting true scientists out of context.

## **Charles Stenholm Reports on President's Proposed Budget**

WASHINGTON. D.C .-- President Ronald Reagan's proposed budget cuts, outlined to Congress here Wednesday (February 19,) are "a strong move in the right direction and represent an approach that I have advocated since first coming to Congress, Charles W. Stenholm said today.

"I certainly agree with the general direction the President's budget takes," Stenholm said, commenting on the Reagan speech, "even though I have some unanswered questions." Stenholm singled out the projected \$122.4 billion deficit outlined in the proposal. "It seems to me that if deficit spending has caused inflation for the past four years then it stands to reason that it will continue to cause inflation," he said. Stenholm said the President had presented a challenge to Congress for an alternative plan "which offers a greater chance of balancing the budget." The 17th District Congressman said he would respond to that

challenge by looking at other areas in the federal budget "that could stand further cuts and at some of the

President's proposed cuts. "The budget that Congress finally passes must be as fair and equitable to all Americans as possible," he continued. "No single segment of the federal expenditure can be considered untouchable and there are several areas that I am closely examining at the present time that I think might possibly be eliminated altogether." Stenholm said he thought

the President's proposal would receive a fair, bipartisan examination by the Congress. "There isn't a Congressman or Senator on the Hill who shouldn't know by now that the American people really meant what they said at the polls in November. We have to drastically cut federal spending and take whatever other steps necessary to curb runaway inflation and we have to do it now."

"Alcohol sometime will be the only fuel we have left for the automobile and is what we should have used in the first place instead of gasoline," Waag said. "In effect, we can get it from the sun's rays.

'Alcohol, of course, has been used as fuel for many vears in race cars, but before we use it on the highways, we really need more research on potential problems. And the necessary

research is under way at Iowa State University. Agricultural engineers Stephen Marley and W.F. Buchele have tested wet grain in a 72-horse-power tractor to determine what proportion of alcohol works best with water as a primary fuel, not as a separate injection or in gasohol. The scientists report finding 90 percent ethanol and 10 percent water - 180 proof alcohol - as the most efficient mixture.

Some farmers also are doing research, burning wet grain alcohol, from'160 to 190 proof in their tractors and trucks. If injected properly, Waag said, it should cause no problems and, in fact, should improve engine per-

formance over gasoline. However, Waag cautioned, Whether you use alcohol as the main fuel or an alcoholwater injection moisture, it must be put under proper pressure rather than by suction. Under no circumstances must you disturb the proper air-fuel ratio. Too much air burns out valves."

Using either wet alcohol as a main fuel or the injector serves the same advantage gasohol has over gasoline, Waag said.
