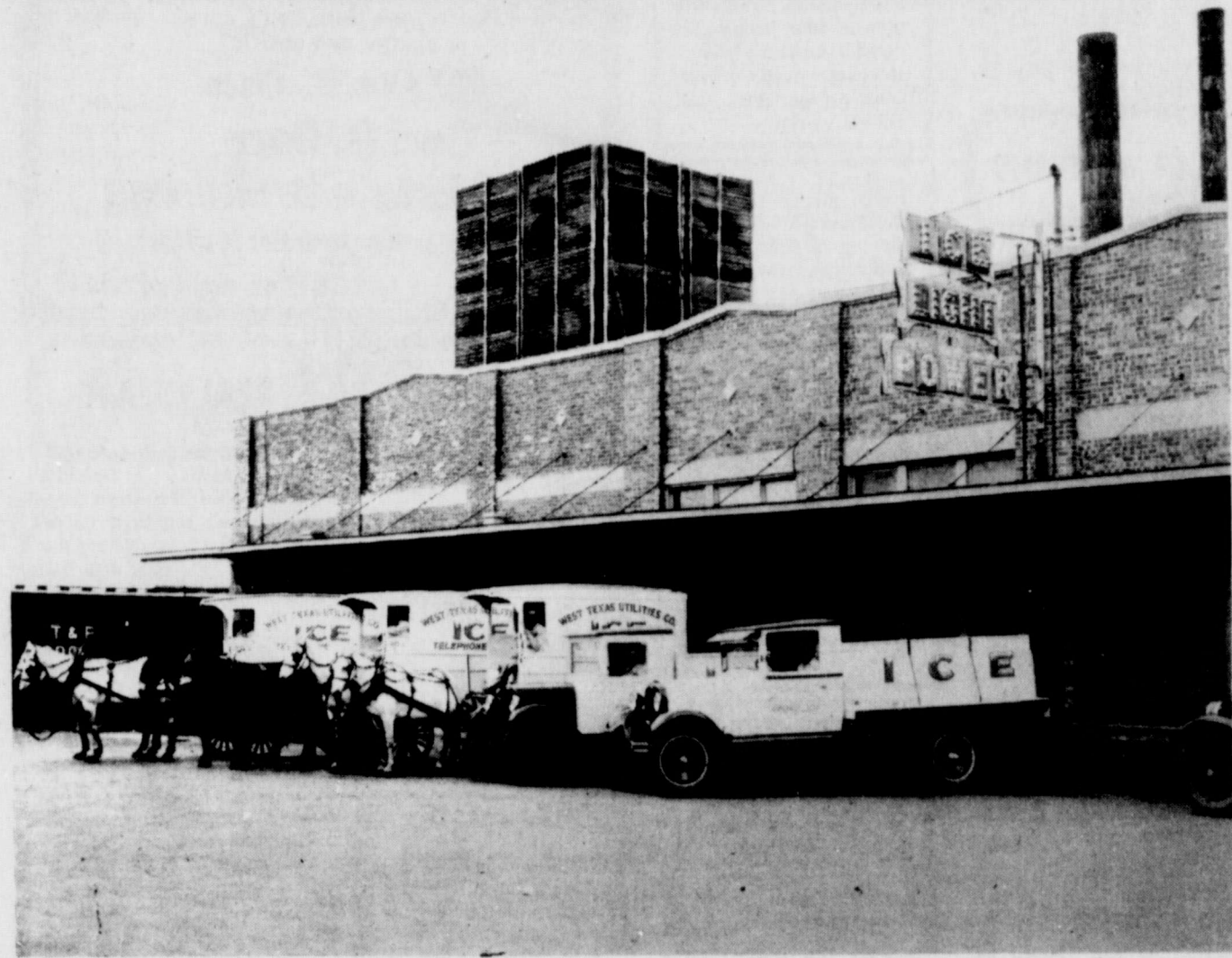

Group Formed To Urge Unity

A group of Ciscoans was organized as People for Progress and Unity to work for community harmony and progress at a meeting late Monday at the American Legion Hall.

With Joe Wheatley, local business man, as chairman, the group voted to support the candidacies of Ivan Webb and Bobby Ingram in the April 4th city election. These two men have filed for places 5 and 6, respectively.

The group also pledged to vote for the recall of Mayor Roy Cartee and Councilwoman Louise Allison and to vote against the recall of Councilmen Bill Eudy, Jerry Jeffcoat and Harold Phippen.

A steering committee was named as follows: Joe Wheatley, Mrs. Evelyn Bailey, J.W. Sittin, Ronnie Ledbetter, Ronnie Webb, Mrs. Joe Petrie and W.E. Dean.

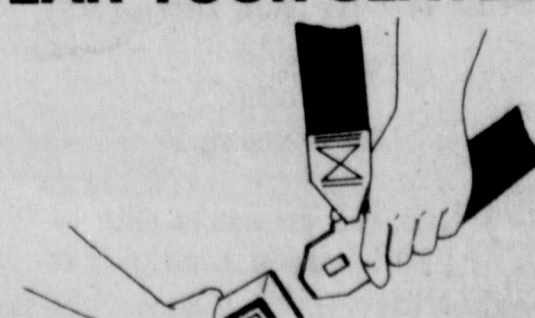
Henry Stuard Hit and Killed By Auto Tues.

Funds Appropriated By State To Complete Airport Project

Funds to complete the new runway at the Cisco Municipal Airport have been appropriated by the Texas Aeronautics Commission, according to an interview with reporters in Austin last Friday with TAC Chief Engineer Gerald Turner.

The grant of some \$70,000 in TAC funds was made possible when the City of Sonora relinquished a TAC

appropriation rather than purchase land as a safety measure of realignment and extension of their airport runway, Mr. Turner said.

"The Cisco project has dragged out several years and suddenly we had the chance to complete paving," Turner said. "We felt good to make the appropriation transfer."

The fourth, and final, TAC grant will enable the Cisco

airport to complete paving its new 3,700-by-60-foot runway, as well as connecting a taxiway and parking apron.

"It was a complete rebuild job," Turner said. Grants for the Cisco project will total \$170,000, he said.

The transferral of the TAC's Texas Airport Construction and Improvement Program funds between the two communities was an amicable one, Turner said.

He said the Sonora city manager released the funds with the understanding the community could reapply again once local airport safety problems are solved.

Those problems involved penetration of an imaginary safety zone determined by criteria established by the Federal Aviation Administration.

Turner said a mountain on the north end of the runway and a motel and light standards at the south end of the runway impeded a safe glide path into the Sonora airport.

The original \$70,000 grant given to Sonora was to be the first step toward acquiring land, realigning and extending the runway to 4,000-by-60-feet, he said.

However, when Sonora officials declined to purchase the additional land needed to resolve the safety hazards, their TAC grant was in jeopardy. TAC bylaws prohibit the commission from granting money to airports with safety code violations, Turner said.

"Their choices are to stay at the present location or move to another site," he said. "If they elect not to acquire additional land, then they're stuck with what they've got."

Turner said the new paving at the Cisco airport should last 20 years if properly maintained.

Its completion comes at a key time, when increased oil activity in the area should step up activity at the airport, he said.

In other TAC action Friday, the board elected newly appointed Commissioner George M. Underwood of Dallas as its vice chairman. Underwood was appointed to the board by Gov. Bill Clements in January.

The land developer's current term expires on December 31, 1981.



This Camp's Fun, And I'm Not Kidding

Jimmy Riddle of Cleburne, District Representative of the Christian Record Braille Foundation, is back in Eastland County at this time visiting a number of the blind persons whose lives are enriched by his group.

"There are about 40 legal blind persons in the Eastland County area," states Mr. Riddle. "At this time, one of the things I would like to do is to locate any more young people of adults who wish to attend one of our week-long summer camps. The Adult Camp in Texas will be held at Lone Star Camp in Athens, June 28th, July 5th. The Youth Camp will be July 19-26 at Nameless Valley Ranch, Leander, Texas, in the hills north of Austin. The Youth Camp includes ages 9 through 19, and the Adult Camp ages 20 and over. There is no cost to blind persons for the week's camping, and insurance is carried for each camper.

There will be different activities at each camp, depend-

ing on facilities and equipment. There will be horseback riding, beeper baseball for the children, hiking, crafts, swimming, and a talent program.

"These camps are operated by a well qualified staff. Special safety precautions are taken in all areas of the program. Before the camp, counselors and the staff are trained to deal properly with blind persons safely and enjoyment of the program, can be assured. One counselor is assigned to each four campers, and a Medical staff is on duty 24 hrs. each day."

Mr. Riddle worked with the Youth Camp last summer and stated that he really enjoyed it. "It's really a thrill to see the youngsters having so much fun. Some of their comments were: 'It's the best camp in the world!' 'I like swimming and I love desserts!', and: 'This camp's fun and I'm not kidding!'."

National camps for blind children began in 1967 with one camp and 23 visually impaired campers. During the

past 14 years over 14,400 campers have attended 266 camps. This program, which has found such favor, is designed to place emphasis on the ability rather than the disability of visually impaired individuals. An attempt is made to increase the self-confidence of the camper, and develop an appreciation of God's love and care for him.

The work of the Camps is supported by contributions from public-minded individuals and organizations. Wills, trusts and annuities have provided some of the funds. No tax money or Government aid is received for this program. The USA office of the Foundation is in Lincoln, Nebraska, with a Canadian Office in Victoria, B.C. There are now 29 locations for the Blind Camps operating in the United States, with 2 in Canada.

Others services of the Christian Record Braille Foundation include personal visitation, a lending library, full-vision books, magazine

service, and Nu-Vision camps with modified programs for disabled blind youth. At these camps, counseling is often on a one-to-one basis.

Mr. Riddle, a personable young man with children of his own, explains that he was a teacher before going into this kind of work.

"It grows on you," he says. "You become terribly interested in doing what you can."

He makes periodic trips through a large area of North Texas to contact any blind person who wishes the services of the Foundation. The materials he supplies are available in Braille, large print, and records. There are no charges for any of these supplies. One of the special services is the Bible in Braille to anyone wishing it. Most people are startled at their first glimpse of the Braille "Bible" - it consists of a number of volumes which, if stacked together, reaches higher than six feet.

"We are happy that we are able to provide so much material and so many services," says Jimmy Riddle. "We are especially thankful to the Eastland County peo-

STRAIGHT ANSWERS FROM THE D.P.S.

I am often asked if there is a permit or if I can give permission to drive a car without a valid inspection sticker until the necessary parts can be obtained for repair so that it will pass inspection for a new motor vehicle inspection certificate. There is no permit available that will validate an expired inspection certificate and I don't have the authority to give permission to violate the law.

As you are aware, your inspection sticker has a number on its face. This number designates the final full month of the inspection year in which the sticker is valid. However, the sticker remains valid through the fifth day of the following month.

The way people usually get into trouble with expiring stickers and defective vehicles is by waiting until near expiration time to get their vehicle inspected. You can get your vehicle

inspected prior to the deadline - even prior to the final month if you so desire. Most certainly you are pushing your luck to wait till between the first and fifth of the month. This is sometimes done in order to gain one month's time on your inspection fee.

Not only are you required to display a valid inspection certificate at all times, but also you are to maintain all inspectionable items in legal condition throughout the year. If you do keep all items in legal condition you shouldn't have any problem meeting the deadline. However, the early part of the final month is a much safer time to start getting an inspection than the latter part.

Some of you have heard about a thirty day sticker that a police officer can put on your windshield. Sometimes a person asks to use this sticker when they encounter problems at expiration time.

This is not permissible. They can only be used under the following condition. If your vehicle is damaged in such a way that an inspectionable item must be repaired the investigation officer may remove your present sticker and put on one which is valid

for thirty days. This does not give you the right to operate a defective vehicle, but it does allow you thirty days in which to repair your vehicle and have it inspected again.

As is the case with many dates and deadlines, a person creates his own problem by waiting too long.

Create Your Own Jeans

COLLEGE STATION-- Create your own designer jeans--and save lots of money, advises Becky Sanders, a clothing specialist.

Before trying, however, there are several things the homemaker should consider, she says.

Mrs. Saunders is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

TAKE A HARD LOOK

First, investigate the designer jeans patterns available.

A review of the instruction guide sheet will either encourage or discourage you to continue.

Consider your time and sewing skills for such requirements as special seams, fly-front zipper, waistband, yokes, pockets, and/or decorative trims.

KNOW MATERIAL NEEDS Next investigate your area's supply of suitable fabrics and needed trims, along with the cost of these items.

Fabrics to consider--in various weights and fiber contents--include denim, corduroy, polin, sateen, chino, ticking, duck and other sturdy fabrics.

Necessary notions might include heavy jean zippers, heavy-duty thread and machine needles (size 18) for topstitching, sturdy front-pocket lining, snaps or button fasteners and/or rivets.

UNDERSTAND FIT

A good fit is important for any sewing project, particularly for jeans.

Purchase patterns by the full hip measurement.

If possible, it is wise to compare the pattern to a good-fitting pair of jeans (in a comparable fabric) that has been ripped apart.

Also, remember that some fabrics may stretch slightly during wear--or shrink each time they're washed.

Always preshrink fabric before cutting it to avoid surprises later due to excessive shrinkage, relaxing grainlines or limper textures.

COPY SPECIAL TECHNIQUES

For a professional-looking garment, copy ready-to-wear techniques such as narrow seam allowances and contrasting topstitching such as orange on blue denim.

Also, special techniques include reinforcing zigzag bar tacks and decorative pocket appliques or embroidery.

ADVANCED SEWING

After you master fit and basic construction techniques, you can create different looks by changing front and back pockets, the type of seams, front or back yokes, adding waistline pleats, and/or the flare of the leg.

Census Reports Texas Growing

COLLEGE STATION-- Preliminary 1980 census figures point out what most Texans already know—the state is growing by leaps and bounds.

Texas' population is now pegged at 14,150,575, a gain of almost 3 million people, or an increase of 26.38 percent,

since 1970.

The new census figures also show Harris County with the largest population in the state at 2,395,365 persons, followed by Dallas County with 1,551,032.

In contrast, Loving County in Far West Texas has the distinction of being the most

sparsely populated with only 91 persons, points out Jack Jones, community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Counties with the greatest percentage growth from 1970 to 1980 were Hood County, 164.9 percent; Montgomery County, 158 percent; Fort Bend County, 149.4 percent; Collin County, 114.8 percent; and Rockwall County, 104.8 percent.

A further look at census figures shows that of the state's 254 counties, 42 have more than 50,000 people while 50 have populations of 5,000 people.

But, while a number of counties were showing rapid population gains, there were also those that lost people during the 10-year period, notes Jones. Forty-eight counties fall into this category, and 42 of them lie west of a line from Wichita Falls to Laredo.

Final 1980 census figures to be released later this year may vary widely from these early counts, cautions Jones. But the fact that the state is having growing pains is one thing that will not change.

All this means more pressures on cities and communities to provide needed services for their expanding populations, says Jones. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and its community development programs stand ready to lend a helping hand to community officials and leaders who need assistance in studying problems and formulating solutions.

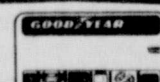

Senator Glasgow Reports
 By Senator Bob Glasgow



On February 26, the Human Resources Committee passed out unanimously Senate Bill 310. I am the author of this bill which authorizes the State to appropriate funds to Community Mental Health and Mental Retardation Centers for the construction of needed facilities such as halfway houses and activity centers. At present, local centers can use only local funds for construction and this places a heavy burden on our counties. State funds presently are often used to pay lease or rent on facilities. In many cases, the state and local governments will find it much more cost effective to build adequate facilities rather than continue renting.

The legislation makes no appropriation of dollars and the appropriation for projects must be passed by the Legislature. Local centers must put up 20% of the construction costs though the value of land the center owns may be used as an in-kind match.

If the constructed facility ceases to be used for mental health and mental retardation service delivery, title rests with the state. At the present time the bill is awaiting action on the Senate floor.

The Human Resources Committee has also acted upon other important legislation concerning the delivery of health and social services in Texas. Of special note is Senate Bill 200, which coordinates the efforts of county health departments and the State Department of Health.

Many of you from Hood, Jackson and Parker counties will be interested in a hearing scheduled for March 9, 1981, in State Affairs. This committee will hear my bill to repeal legislation that

allowed the inclusion of contributed capital in the rate base. This has been out of the dispute between Tennant Utility and its customers in those counties.

Skunks Can Be A Problem

In rural areas where skunks find plenty of food and shelter away from man, they do little harm and in fact, are very beneficial to farmers and ranchers because of the harmful animals that they consume. The diet of skunks consists of 50% insects and grubs, 25% mice and other small rodents, 10% vegetable matter, and 15% a mixture of spiders, millipedes, centipedes, reptiles, amphibians, birds and eggs.

However, when these animals den in areas close to man, their foul-smelling musk (a clear, golden yellow sulfide fluid known as n-butyl mercaptan) is a disturbing nuisance. Another problem stemming from population of skunks is that they, along with foxes, are a major rabies reservoir and can infect domestic animals as well as people. Skunks that are out in the daytime or that are aggressive should be treated with caution for they could be suffering from a transmittable disease.

In many Texas cities and towns, skunks sometimes live under houses or out-buildings. The safest means of removing the animal is to trap it, and the common garbage can may be used as the trap. The garbage can is placed in an area frequented by the skunks. Then, the lid is removed, and bait such as pork tallow, old hamburger, or sardines is placed inside with a wide board propped on the can to form a ramp which will allow the skunk to walk up to the rim of the can. After he jumps down to eat the bait, he will not be able to get back out of the can so the lid can be replaced and the animal transported to a safe place or destroyed. Normally, skunks will not release their scent in a dark, enclosed space so there is less chance of scent contamination when the garbage can trap is used.

Bi-Polar Seminars Scheduled at Tarleton

Two Bi-Polar Seminars have been scheduled by the Tarleton State University Office of Continuing Education and the Pecan Valley MHRM Regional office. The seminars are scheduled for April 30 and May 1-2.

According to Barbara Williams, Continuing Education Director at Tarleton, the seminars are designed to help people discover their strengths, using personality inventories completed by the participant and four close friends or relatives and evaluated by computers. Data provided by the five questionnaires will be used to determine which of eight personality patterns the person is in. At the seminar, Dr. Dulaney Barrett, Director of Consultation and Education for Pecan Valley MHRM Region, will discuss individual personalities and help participants develop a better understanding of their strengths and potentials, and are better able to understand others and consequently create more skill in communicating."

The concept of Bi-Polar has been developed from more than 16 years of research and dedicated practice, according to Mrs. Williams. "More than 20,000 people have attended the seminars and many corporations, churches, and schools in the country have used Bi-Polar to train their staff, executives and members," she said.

A participant in a seminar held at Sul Ross State University said recently, "it really changed my attitude about myself, my personal drives and also how I work with my employees. I'm sold on these seminars and think anyone in a management position or working with a lot of people should participate in one."

The cost of the seminar is \$69.00 and the deadline for the April 30 session is March 6. Packets should be picked

up at the Office of Continuing Education in the TSU Home Economics Department prior to the deadline. The registration fee includes printed materials, computer evaluation by Bi-Polar, Inc., lunch, and coffee. The first seminar will run from 8:30

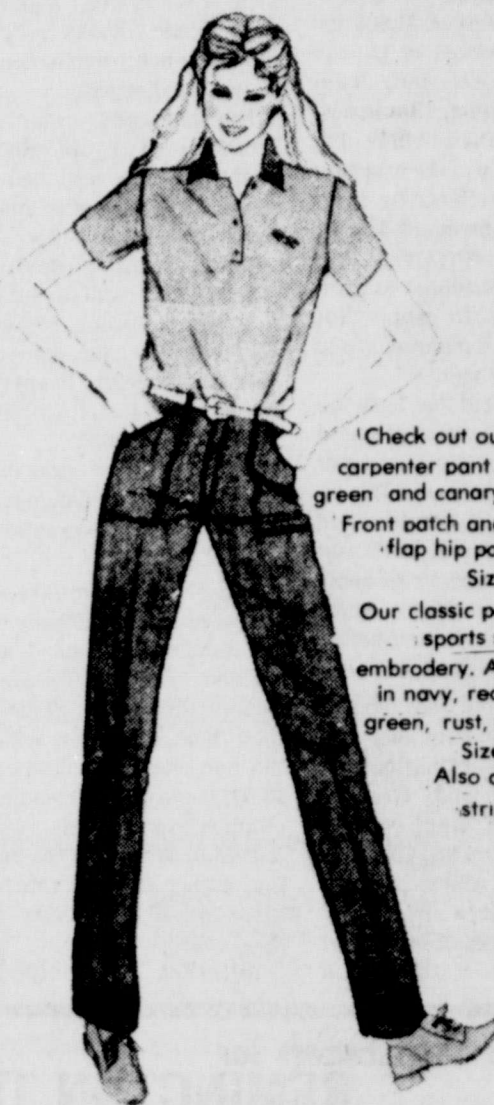

Program Makes Citizens More Aware Of Tax Advantages

Autin-Kenneth E. Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced a statewide program to make citizens more aware of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

The public education program involves the State Property Tax Board, local tax assessors throughout Texas and the print and broadcast news industries, Graeber said.

He added that the awareness program consists of two elements, the first of which involves distribution of a comprehensive 12-page pamphlet entitled, **Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities**, while the second phase of the program consists of efforts by news media to inform all Texans of tax rendition deadlines and the procedures and requirements to apply for homestead exemptions and productivity values.

Graeber said that local tax assessors are cooperating in this part of the taxpayer education program. The efforts are being conducted in March to provide sufficient time for taxpayers to apply for all tax relief to which they may be entitled before tax rendition deadlines.

To qualify for most homestead exemptions and productivity valuation for agricultural land, Graeber noted that applications should be made to each jurisdiction which taxes a particular piece of property before the rendition period ends. "Most of the state's

local taxing units have rendition deadlines of April 1 or April 30 and failure to make timely application may cause loss of the tax relief until the next tax year," he added.

"In 1982, when the new Property Tax Code will be fully implemented, all taxing jurisdictions will have a rendition deadline of April 1," Graeber said.

Free copies of the **Taxpayers' Remedies** pamphlet are available by contacting local tax offices. Supplies are limited, however, and may be quickly exhausted in some jurisdictions.

The pamphlet covers a broad range of tax-related matters and is designed to help Texans become more knowledgeable on how the property tax system operates. If a local tax office runs out of copies, citizens may request single copies by writing the State Property Tax Board at P.O. Box 15900, Austin, Texas 78761.

SPTB officials indicated that the following categories of homestead exemptions are available:

--General Homestead. Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of their homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption from assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

--Persons 65 or older. Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owed in any one year cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979 or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is later. An annual application to the school tax office is required.

By local option, school districts, cities and counties may offer additional exemptions to elderly homeowners of not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead.

--Disability Exemption. Citizens who are totally disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only. A property owner may not receive both this disability exemption and the \$10,000 exemption for the elderly.

School districts, cities and counties may offer an additional local option disability exemption of not less than \$3,000 off the market value to the residence homestead.

--Disabled Veteran or Qualifying Survivor. Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 from the assessed value of any property they own. The amount

depends on the percentage of service-connected disability.

This exemption may be applied against the value of any property owned on January 1 of the year in which the application is made. The disabled veteran must be a Texas resident and complete an annual application at local tax offices. Only one property may receive the exemption and VA or armed forces documents verifying disability are required.

Land which is being utilized for agricultural purposes may be eligible for tax relief. Qualified landowners hold the option of having an agricultural or open-space land valuation applied to their property. Details on what types of land may be taxed on productivity rather than market value are available in local tax offices or in the **Remedies** pamphlet.

City Sales Tax Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock, Wed., Feb. 18, 1981, said 960 Texas cities shared nearly \$100 million in city sales tax rebates in Feb.

Bullock said his office sent a total of \$91.5 million to cities levying the optional one percent city sales tax.

He said the Jan.-Feb. payment to cities this year is more than \$30 million higher than the same period last year.

Quarterly sales tax filers - including holiday sales in the last quarter of 1980 - generated the higher amounts of revenue to the cities, Bullock said.

January - February city sales tax rebated for 1981 total \$124.7 million, compared to \$60 million during the same two-month period last year.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller.

Eastland Co. Receives Over \$20 Million In Farm Product Sales

The market value of agricultural products sold by the 1,074 farms in Eastland County amounted to \$20.1 million for 1978 or an average of \$18,668 each, up from \$14.8 million in 1974 with an accompanying increase in production costs, according to a preliminary report of the 1978 Census of Agriculture released today by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce.

A breakdown of the county's total agricultural sales for 1978 followed by that for 1974, is as follows: Crops, \$8.8 million compared with \$6.6 million; livestock, poultry, and their products, \$11.2 and \$8.3 million.

While the value of gross sales rose, the farmers' costs also climbed since 1974. For example, expenditures for feed for livestock and poultry for 1978 were \$3.5 million compared to \$3 million; costs of gasoline, diesel and other petroleum products were \$1.3 million compared to \$725,000. Farm energy costs of all types totaled \$1.7 million for 1978. The estimated market value of machinery and equipment per farm increased from \$11,857 to \$18,153.

Of the total farms in the county, 131 had gross sales of \$40,000 or more and 674 had sales under \$10,000. Farms operated by individuals or families represented 92 percent of the total; farms operated by corporations accounted for 1 percent. Some 90 percent of the operators owned all or part of the land they operated.

In 1978 the average age of farm operator was 52 years. Since 1974 the proportion of operators listing farming as their principal occupation changed from 52 percent to 42 percent. Data in the reports for acreage and inventories for 1978 and 1974 are generally comparable; however, improved coverage in 1978, especially of smaller farms, should be taken into consideration in making direct comparisons of farm counts. Dollar values have not been adjusted for changes in price levels.

Other results of the census show the 1,074 farms counted in 1978 had an average size of 426 acres. For 1974, 1,117 farms were counted with an average size of 420 acres. The land in farms totaled 457,889 acres in 1978 and 469,677 acres in 1974. Crops were harvested from 55,285 acres in 1978 and 56,950 acres in 1974.

The inventory of cattle and calves changed from 61,087 in 1974 to 46,449 in 1978; the number of hogs and pigs changed from 4,088 to 7,841. Hens and pullets of laying age decreased from 9,558 to 3,871.

Acreages of crops harvested for 1978 and 1974 were as follows: wheat, 937 acres vs. 2,928 acres; sorghum for grain, 6,879 acres vs. 6,556 acres; hay, 16,754 acres vs. 16,398 acres; land in orchards, 3,049 acres vs. 1,847 acres; peanuts, 26,555 acres vs. 28,493 acres.

Production of peanuts for 1978 was 39.3 million pounds compared to 32.6 million pounds in 1974.

The figures are for farms qualifying under the defini-

tion: Any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold, or normally would have been sold, during the census year.

The agriculture census was conducted in 1979 to obtain data on the Nation's farm production and sales for calendar year 1978. Information from the farm cen-

sus, the 21st of a series which began in 1840, will be used by Federal, State and the county agencies, agricultural colleges, agricultural and business groups, and farmers to help make a variety of decisions about agricultural programs and policies.

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

Arkansas Tech Recruits CJC Offensive Tackle

Finding replacements for departing seniors Kenny Bell and John Utley, two line cogs in Arkansas Tech's offensive machine last fall, is one of the top priorities in the recruiting plans of Tech Head Coach Harold Steelman, Offensive Coordinator Charley Wade and Offensive Line Coach Tom Rutledge.

Rutledge also happens to be Tech's head coach. And, so when the word came to Russellville that Jimmy Smitherman of Crane, Texas, a 6'2", 230 pound offensive tackle last fall at Cisco Junior College, not only was a likely football prospect but an outstanding discus thrower as well, Coach Rutledge utilized his best sales technique to persuade the young Texan to settle in the Arkansas River Valley.

Smitherman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Smitherman of Crane, enrolled at Tech at midterm and will join the

Wonder Boys for spring football practice in March. "I was considering several schools when the call came from Arkansas Tech," Smitherman states. "Coach Rutledge did a good job convincing me to come to Arkansas."

Last fall, Smitherman was a starting offensive tackle on a Cisco team that was 10-1 and a 15-10 winner over defending national champion Ranger Junior College in the Peanut Bowl at Breckenridge. Coached by Bill Anderson, Cisco was ranked among the Top Ten junior college football teams in the nation last year.

The previous spring, he attended Odessa Junior College where he participated in track. He was second in the discus in the state junior college meet with a toss of 164 feet. He was regional champion and a state finalist in the shot and discus his senior year at Crane High School. He holds the school's record of 59'9" in the shotput and 179'2" in the discus.

Smitherman lettered four years as an offensive tackle and defensive end under coaches Joe Allen and Bob Hinds at Crane High. He was team captain his senior year.

"We are glad that Jimmy Smitherman decided to continue his academic and athletic careers at Arkansas Tech University," Coach Steelman said. "Jimmy comes from outstanding programs at Cisco Junior College and Crane High School. He has already fit into our program, and we look forward to our association with him over the next two years."

Five other Cisco graduates have preceded Smitherman to Tech. They are Mark Smith, an all-conference safety in 1978 who remained as a student assistant coach the following year; Lew Thompson, last year's starting strong safety; Gary Klumpp, a defensive tackle on the 1979 squad; Terry Ray, a linebacker and Matt Thornton, a defensive tackle.
