

STRAIGHT ANSWERS FROM THE D.P.S. by Jerry Mathews

I am often asked if there is a permit or if I can give permission to drive a car without a valid inspection sticker until the necessary parts can be obtained for repair so that it will pass inspection for a new motor vehicle inspection certificate.

There is no permit available that will validate an expired inspection certificate and I don't have the authority to give permission to violate the

As you are aware, your inspection sticker has a number on its' face. This number designates the final full month of the inspection year in which the sticker is valid. However, the sticker remains valid through the fifth day of the following.

The way people usually get into trouble with expiring stickers and defective vehicles is by waiting until near expiration time to get their vehicle inspected. You can get your vehicle

inspected prior to the deadline - even prior to the final month if you so desire. Most certainly you are pushing your luck to wait till between the first and fifth of the month. This is sometime done in order to gain one months time on your inspection fee.

Not only are you required to display a valid inspection certificate at all times, but also you are to maintain all inspectionable items in legal condition throughout the year. If you do keep all items in legal condition you shouldn't have any problem meeting the deadline. However, the early part of the final month is a much safer time to start getting an inspection than the latter

Some of you have heard about a thirty day sticker that a police officer can put on your windshield. Sometimes a person asks to use this sticker when they encounter

problems at expiration time.

can only be used under the following condition. If your vehicle is damaged in such a way that an inspectionable item must be repaired the investigation officer may remove your present sticker and put on one which is valid

This is not permissible. They

for thirty days. This does not give you the right to operate a defective vehicle, but it does allow you thirty days in which to repair your vehicle and have it inspected again. As is the case with many dates and deadlines, a person creates his own problem by waiting too long.

Create Your Own Jeans

COLLEGE STATION --Create your own designer jeans--and save lots of money, advises Becky Sanders, a clothing specialist.

Before trying, however, there are several things the homesewer should consider, she says.

Mrs. Saunders is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

TAKE A HARD LOOK First, investigate the designer jeans patterns available.

A review of the instruction guide sheet will either encourage or discourage you to

Consider your time and sewing skills for such requirements as special seams, fly-front zipper, waistband, yokes, pockets, and/or decorative trims.

KNOW MATERIAL NEEDS Next investigate your area's supply of suitable fabrics and needed trims, along with the cost of these

Fabrics to consider-in various weights and fiber contents-include denim, corduroy, polin, sateen, chino, ticking, duck and

other sturdy fabrics. Necessary notions might include heavy jean zippers, heavy-duty thread and machine needles (size 18) for topstitching, sturdy frontpocket lining, snaps or but-

ton fasteners and/or rivets.

UNDERSTAND FIT A good fit is important for any sewing project, par-

ticularly for jeans. Purchase patterns by the full hip measurement.

If possible, it is wise to compare the pattern to a good-fitting pair of jeans (in a comparable fabric) that has been ripped apart.

Also, remember that some fabrics may stretch slightly during wear-or shrink each time they're washed.

Always preshrink fabric before cutting it to avoid surprises later due to excessive relaxing shrinkage, grainlines or limper tex-



Reflections In **Perspective** By I. Will Ussery

What was once the thriving little trading and fishing village on the Arabian shore of the Persian Gulf and which was named Dubai has become a bustling commercial center for the entire lower end of the Gulf. And income from offshore petroleum has added to the wealth of the tiny sheikhdom.

Dubai was one of the eleven "Trucial States", a somewhat loosely formed area extending from Qatar on the north to Fujeira on the south. Fishing, pearl-fishing, trade and piracy accounted for the most of the income for the Trucial States before the British brought them into submission and in about 1854 formed them into a sort of fragmented antonomy. Each of the seven maintained its seperate identity and was governed in the same tribal fashion it had known for centuries. With an exception or two. They were forced to sign a "truce" under the terms of which there would be no tribal wars and piracy was prohibited. And the British, under a mutual protection treaty would handle all their foreign affairs. A very comfortable arrangement, and the majority of the separate states thrived in varying degrees under the arrangement. And back in the late fifties, when interest in exploring for oil began to heat up a bit, Sheikh Rashid bin Maktoum al Qassemi, the Ruler of Dubai is quoted as having said, in effect, "We are traders. We have always been traders and we shall continue. Commerce is in our blood. If we find oil; it shall be as a Gift from Allah. We shall continue our commercial efforts." And they did, and thrived.

One of the "commercial enterprises" of Dubai became a thriving trade in gold bullion. Strict currency controls in India and Pakistan had made the smuggling of gold a very profitable business. Sheikh Rashid, with typical perspicacity saw the opportunity, and became a dealer in gold. Why he has been inacurrately described as "King of the gold smugglers", he never engaged in any way whatsoever in the smuggling of gold. He was simply a dealer in gold.

Under the then regulations of the United States and England, gold could be purchased in bars from the U.S. Treasury at the fixed price of \$36.00 per ounce. But it could be purchased only by the depositories of recognised governments. And Dubai held the position of having a duly recognised State, complete with a government and a depository in the form of the National Bank of Dubai, which was a correspondent of Barclay's Bank of London. And a very sound bank it was. The Ruler was a major shareholder, of course.

Through his depository, all legal and proper, the Ruler would order gold in quantities from the U.S. That gold would be placed for safekeeping in the Dubai bank, and would be sold to whomsoever had the cash to pay for it. At a considerable profit, of course. Any merchant is entitled to a profit on his goods. And gold was Rashid's stock in trade. His attitude was expressed once in response to my direct question as to how he felt about contraband (gold was not the only thing which was smuggled from Dubai..cigarettes, washing machines, radios, regrigerators..name it). "Contraband? What, My Brother, is contraband? My warehouses are stocked with goods of a wide variety. Dhows put into my port. They pay their port fees, and they purchase my merchandise. They pay for the goods, and they sail. It is of no concern to us where they go. That is none of our business". And what is wrong with that, I ask you?

Following the completion of Dubai's airport which was built to international standards, and under the supervision of the Federal Aviation Administration of the United States; I once watched the off-loading of twelve metric tons of gold bars. On pallets, it was taken from a Caledonian Airfreighter by forklift and was stored in the Customs' shed. And the only armed guard in sight was a Dubai policeman who, armed with an old Martini 16-gauge shotgun was lazily leaning against a railing as the machines passed to and fro with their burdens of gilt (not guilt). The gold was cast in 30-kilogram bars (66 lbs). Nobody was going far into the desert carrying a bar of gold of that weight. Anyway, where would he go with

But before Rashid constructed his fine airport, complete with one of the most spacious and modern terminals to be found anywhere; much of his gold was flown from London to Bahrain where it was transferred a ton at a time to lumbering old DC-3's operated as a charter service by the oil companies in the area. That charter later grew into an airline of international repute, but that is another story.

And "Cam" Campbell was the Chief Pilot of the air charter service. A former officer in the Royal Australian Air Force, and a reformed bush pilot, "Cam" could almost perform miracles with the clumsy old "Gooney Birds" which had been the first airliners of commercial aviation. With a multiple-fracture case aboard, I once watched as he literally "jumped" his aircraft into the air from a desert strip, only 600 feet of which he used in his takeoff.

But "Cam" had a thing about hauling gold. He detested the duty. He was convinced that, with the increasing knowledge worldwide of the fact that Dubai was a gold center, some bright day a well organised plot would leave him dead inside his airplane on a desert beach while his cargo was sailing across the Gulf on a high speed launch. But complaints notwithstanding, he continued to play nursemaid...delivery boy...to an occasional ton of the stuff of which dreams are

made. Until once when, on a flight to Dubai he had to make a landing on the packed dirt strip at Abu Dhabi. One engine conked out on the approach. He radioed Bahrain, and landed safely. Bahrain assured him that they'd have a spare engine and a crew there "first off to-morrow". Cam and his co-pilot proceeded to the then new, 20-room Beach Hotel for a shower, a "gin and nonsense" and a night's rest.

"But what about the gold?" Queried his co-pilot. Cam made a very rude remark as to what could happen to the gold, ending with..."Run down to the bank (it was midafternoon) and have them contact Dubai. If they want someone to guard the gold, they can do so. I only fly it. I'm tired, dirty, sleepy and thirsty. And I am going to take care of me while they take care of their flaming gold".

Cam Campbell retired a few years later, and although he continued to fly the occasional cargo of the precious metal he was never hi-jacked. Much to his relief.



But, while a number of counties were showing rapid population gains, there were also those that lost people during the 10-year period, notes Jones. Forty-eight counties fall into this category, and 42 of them lie west of a line from Wichita Falls to Laredo.

Final 1980 census figures to be released later this year may vary widely from these early counts, cautions Jones. But the fact that the state is having growing pains is one thing that will not change.

All this means more pressures on cities and communities to provide needed services for their expanding populations, says Jones. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and its community development programs stand ready to lend a helping hand to community officials and leaders who need assistance in studying problems and formulating solutions.





Senator Glasgow Reports

By Senator Bob Glasgow

On February 26, the Human Resources Committee passed out unanimously Senate Bill 310. I am the author of this bill which authorizes the State to appropriate funds to Community Mental Health and Mental Retardation Centers for the construction of needed facilities such as halfway houses and activity centers.

At present, local centers can use only local funds for construction and this places a heavy burden on our counties. State funds presently are often used to pay lease or rent on facilities. In many cases, the state and local governments will find it much more cost effective to build adequate facilities rather than continue renting.

The legislation makes no appropriation of dollars and the appropriation for projects must be passed by the Legislature. Local centers must put up 20% of the construction costs though the value of land the center owns may be used as an in-kind match.

If the constructed facility ceases to be used for mental health and mental retardation service delivery, title rests with the state. At the present time the bill is awaiting action on the Senate floor.

The Human Resources Committee has also acted upon other important legislation concerning the delivery of health and social services in Texas. Of special note is Senate Bill 200, which coordinates the efforts of county health departments and the State Department of Health.

Many of you from Hood, Jackson and Parker counties will be interested in a hearing scheduled for March 9, 1981, in State Affairs. This committee will hear my bill to repeal legislation that



allowed the inclusion of contributed capital in the rate base. This has been out of the dispute between Tennant Utility and its customers in those counties.

If any of you have any qeustions concerning this bill or any others, please contact me or my staff.

In rural areas where skunks find plenty of food and shelter away from man, they do little harm and in fact, are very beneficial to farmers and ranchers because of the harmful animals that they consume. The diet of skunks consists of 50% insects and grubs, 25% mice and other small rodents, 10% vegetable matter, and 15% a mixture of spiders, millipedes, centipedes, reptiles, amphi bians, birds and eggs.

animals den in areas close to man, their foul-smelling musk (a clear, golden yellow sulfide fluid known as n-butyl mercaptan) is a disturbing nuisance. Another problem stemming from population of skunks is that they, along with foxes, are a major rabies reservior and can infect domestic animals as well as people. Skunks that are out in the daytime or that are aggressive should be treated with caution for they could be suffering from a transmittable disease.

towns, skunks somtimes live under houses or outbuildings. The safest means of removing the animal is to trap it, and the common garbage can may be used as the trap. The garbage can is placed in an area frequented by the skunks. Then, the lid is removed, and bait such as pork tallow, old hamburger, or sardines is placed inside on the can to form a ramp which will allow the skunk to walk up to the rim of the can. After he jumps down to eat the bait, he will not be able to get back out of the can so the lid can be replaced and the animal transported to a safe place or destroyed. Normally, skunks will not release their scent in a dark, enclosed space so there is less chance of scent contamination when the garbage can



Program Makes Citizens More Aware Of Tax Advantages

Autin-Kenneth E. Graebr, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced a statewide program to make citizens more aware of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

The public education program involves the State Property Tax Board, local tax assessors throughout Texas and the print and broadcast news industries, Graeber said.

He added that the awareness program consists of two elements, the first of which involves distribution of a comprehensive 12-page pamphlet entitled, Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities, while the second phase of the program consists of efforts by news media to inform all Texans of tax rendition deadlines and the procedures and requirements to apply for homestead exemptions and productivity values.

Graeber said that local tax assessors are cooperating in this part of the taxpayer education program. The efforts are being conducted in March to provide sufficient time for taxpayers to apply for all tax relief to which they may be entitled before tax rendition deadlines.

To qualify for most homestead exemptions and productivity valuation for agricultural land, Graeber noited that applications should be make to each jurisdiction which taxes a particular piece of property before the rendition period ends. "Most of the state's

local taxing units have rendition deadlines of April 1 or April 30 and failure to make timely application may cause loss of the tax relief until the next tax year," he

· In 1982, when the new Propety Tax Code will be fully implemented, all taxing jurisdictions will have a rendition deadline of April 1, " Graeber said.

Free copies of the Taxpayers' Remedies pamphlet are available by contacting local tax offices. Supplies are limited, however, and may be quickly exhausted in some jurisdictions

The pamphlet covers a broad range of tax-related matters and is designed to help Texans become more knowledgeable on how the property tax system operates. If a local tax office runs out of copies, citizens may request single copies by writing the State Property Tax Board at P.O. Box 15900, Austin, Texas 78761.

SPTB officials indicated that the following categories of homestead exemptions are available

-- General Homestead. Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of their homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption from assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

-- Persons 65 or older.

Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owed in any one year cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979 or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is later. An annual application to the school

tax office is required. By local option, school districts, cities and counties may offer additional exemptions to elderly homeowners of not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead.

-- Disability Exemption Citizens who are totally disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only. A property owner may not receive both this disability exemption and the \$10,000

exemption for the elderly. School districts, cities and counties may offer an additional local option disability exemption of not less than \$3,000 off the market value to

The market value of agricultural proucts sold by the 1,074 farms in Eastland County amounted to \$20.1 million for 1978 or an average of \$18,668 each, up from \$14.8 million in 1974 with an accompanying increase in production costs, according to a preliminary report of the 1978 Census of Agriculture released today by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Com-

A breakdown of the county's total agricultural sales for 1978 followed by that for 1974, is as follows: Crops, \$8.8 million compared with \$6.6 million; livestock, poultry, and their products, \$11.2 and \$8.3 million.

While the value of gross sales rose, the farmers' costs also climbed since 1974. For example, expenditures for feed for livestock and poultry for 1978 were \$3.5 million compared to \$3 million; costs of gasoline, diesel and other petroleum products were \$1.3 million compared to \$725,000. Farm energy costs of all types totaled \$1.7 million for 1978. The estimated market value of machinery and equipment per farm increased from \$11,857 to \$18,153.

Of the total farms in the county, 131 had gross sales of \$40,000 or more and 674 had sales under \$10,000. Farms operated by individuals or families represented 92 percent of the total; farms operated by corporations accounted for 1 percent. Some 90 percent of the operators owned all or part of the land they operated.

In 1978 the average age of farm operator was 52 years. Since 1974 the proportion of operators listing farming as their principal occupation changed from 52 percent to 42 percent.

Data in the reports for acreage and inventories for 1978 and 1974 are generally comparable; however, improved coverage in 1978, especially of smaller farms, should be taken into consideration in making direct comparisons of farm counts. Dollar values have not been adjusted for changes in price

tion: Any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold, or normally would have been sold, during the census

The agriculture census was conducted in 1979 to obtain data on the Nation's farm production and sales for calendar year 1978. Information from the farm census, the 21st of a series which began in 1840, will be used by Federal, State and the county agencies, agricultural colleges, agricultural and business groups, and farmers to help make a variety of decisions about agricultural programs and policies.



Maybe you have already been briefed on the gala excursion of 6-12 couples - that is, the Dixons, the Drumwrights, Heidenheimers, Abbotts, Parkers, Crofts and Gus Smothers, oranizer and expert tour guide - to Cancun, on the NE tip of the Yacatan Peninsula. If you have, fine; if not, I might say that while it was very different from our earlier trip to Mexico, we crammed as much fun into those three days as we did into the three weeks in January and early February. Of course, that made it rather frenetic. We had to leave from D/FW Airport on T.I., switch to Continental in Houston, and on the return trip, switch from Continental to Southwestern and land at Love Field, which took some maneuver-

Once we arrived in Cancun, we never stopped moving. There were numerous choices, of course, and we had to limit ourselves to a few. One very rewarding one was the glass-bottom boat trip to the Isla de Mujeres (Isle of Women - I don't know what women). The "glass bottom" didn't amount to much, since all you could see through it was the sea (at least on this particular cruise), but the leisurely pace and the sunsparkeled, indigo waters made it delightful. ed slowly around the big lagoon so we could see the long strip of beach containing an array of "posh" hotels on one side, and private homes and country club on the other shore

One novelty feature was having everybody on the top deck come down below to pass under the bridge from the lagoon to the open sea they had to lower the awnings. The island itself was pretty, and afforded good swimming and snorkeling for those who desired to indulge. Gus and Elaine chose that, while others shopped brightly colored beachwear that flapped on lines, and artifacts under the grass huts along the shore. At the sound of the third siren, you had better be back or you'd become Robinson Crusoe, at least until the next day

A "must" for lovers of antiquity, which included the Parkers and Heidenheimers, was an all-day trip to the Mayan ruins at Chichen Itza (or "Chicken Itcha", as Sut insisted on calling it). Getting the "camerero" to divvy up the bill into six or more portions was another hassle, but we got a tip from a waiter at Carlos and Charlie's, who had the system of numbering the couples as he took their

Before we arrived on the island (Cancun is connected to the mainland by bridges), it had been raining, but we were blessed with three days of bright sunshine, that allowed us to get plenty of colorful pictures - especially all the different shades of blue in that Caribbean Sea.
