Deliverying Cookies 1981 Renditions & Exemption **Requests Must Be Returned** To Tax Office By April 1st

Exemption Requests must be turned in to the Cisco ISD Tax Office by April 1, 1981.

THE SENIOR CENTER.

Property that was not on the tax roll during the 1980 tax year: but was completed or added to after January 1. 1980, must be rendered for the 1981 tax year according to state law. If you have acquired new property, please check prior to April 1, to see

if you need to render it. All homestead exemption requests must be turned in by April 1, 1981, in order for

All 1981 Renditions and the property owner to receive his or her exemption for the 1981 tax year.

If you are a homeowner in the Cisco ISD, you are eligible for a \$5,000 exemption along with an additional \$10,000 exemption: if you are over--65 year of age or disabled.

If you have any questions concerning the exemptions available or whether your property should be rendered: please check with the Cisco ISD Tax Office before April 1, 1981.

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Two By Two - still unique individuals

Although twins are enjoying a new focus of attention, it's important to remember that each is a unique individual with rights and needs, says Dorthy Taylor, a family life education specialist.

TWINS IN SPOTLIGHT

If you think you're seeing or hearing more about twins these days, there may be several reasons.

Twins have always intrigued family researchers, parents and people-

children, search for their natural families, the interest in phenomenal similarities of separated twins has reached an all-time high, she

Ms. Taylor is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

· Why are twins so special in the human species? Mankind naturally has paid special attention to its offspring. When the offspring as a whole does a "doubletake" in terms of attention given, the specialist explains.

In addition, there are more twins these days than in the past, Ms. Taylor says.

When fertility drugs were introduced in the early 1960's, there was sudden increase in multiple births.

TWIN STATISTICS

Birth rates of twins are different in various parts of the world, among different aged mothers and among dif-

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Twinning rates for whites average about one of every 90 births. For blacks the average is about one of every 73 births.

Scandinavian rates are one of every 62 births, and Yoruba tribe in Nigeria has the highest rate: one of every 25 births. Orientals tend to have the lowest

living-twin rate. Experts are not quite sure why, but older women are more likely to produce two or more eggs at a time.

Women between ages 35-39 are three times as likely to have twins as women under age 20.

Furthermore, because of medical advancements and improved health care, more twins survive today.

TWINS OF OLD

Our fascination with twins will probably remain so for years to come, just as it has historically.

Twins have played an important role in Biblical history, mythology and literature. Skakespeare featured twins in several of his comedies, probably because he was the father of fraternal twins himself.

FRATERNAL OR IDEN-TICAL?

What is a twin? There are two different kinds, fraternal and iden-

Identical twins begin as a single fertilized egg which divides and becomes two identical fetuses.

Fraternal twins - the vast majority - result when two mature eggs are released by the mother and fertilized at approximately the same

Fraternal twins can be different in numerous ways sex, looks and size.

TWINS 'TEACH' SPECIES While we are fascinated by twins, we can also learn about the human being from twins, Ms. Taylor points out. Over the years genetic and

behavioral studies have used twins for comparative research.

EACH TWIN UNIQUE While twins receive atten-

tion from the world, their parents are facing a twofold challenge - that of childrearing and that of rearing twins as two separate, individual children.

Providing an environmen for individualism, uniqueness and independence for each twin is difficult when two children are in the same physical environment, share similar family experiences, are the same age, are in the same stage of growth and development and share special bonds that other brothers and sisters may not understand, Ms.

Taylor says. Parents can promote uniqueness and individuality among twins by treating them as individual children, dressing them different, doing things with each one, encouraging separate. classrooms and evaluating each for his own accomplishment - not comparing, the specialist advises.

Our Turkoman bhadji (housemaid) was a youngish widow with four sons when we first acquired her. The eldest son was in his early 'teens, and with two of his brothers lived with relatives in the village of Ishmael, high in the alborz mountains above the city of Qazvin. The youngest boy was maybe four years old, and lived with his mother in "The Mahdavi House." We had leased the house from Madame Mahdavi, who requested that we accept Moelli as our bhadji.

The story of the development of the sons would fill a good book. A story of boot-strap self-improvement, it was interesting to watch unfold. The names of the sons were, in inverse order of age, Amhed, Mahmoud, Hussein, and Hossein. For quite some time we rarely saw the child Hossein. He kept strictly to himself...perhaps by order of his mother. He either played in the small park ourside the garden or inside Noelli's quarters. He was allowed, again by his mother's chioce, only into the kitchen of our house. He and his mother took their meals in the kitchen.

While the house was "fully furnished," the kitchen was conspicuously devoid of extraneous furniture of any sort. The usual built-ins (it was one of 209 houses built by the Rockefeller Foundation), a butane range and an electric refrigerator together with a rectangular table completed the furnishings in the kitchen. There was not a single chair. And this paucity of furniture in which to rest a wee bit tore at the hearstrings of My Lovely Wife. Forthwith, she acquired two ordinary wooden "straight chairs" and presented them to Noelli. After all; she and Hossein could not be expected to take their meals standing at the kitchen table.

While Noelli was very grateful for the chairs, and put then to use immediately, they were not used to facilitate the taking of their meals. While she and Hossein luxuriated by sitting "at rest" in the chairs...they insisted insisted on placing their food and drink on the kitchen floor where they sat crosslegged and ate from the good china.

Now I have an affinity for highly spiced foods...on occasion. the principal occasion for my dousing some of my food with hot pepper sauce of the "Tabasco" variety consists of those meals when we have rice, soup, stew, beans, dried blackeyed peas, mashed potatoes, scrambled eggs or roast beef. I rarely use it on sliced tomatoes or dessert of any sort.

Hossein, probably peeking from behind the kitchen door into the dining room had observed "Agha" sprinkling the bright red stuff on his food. And, like all small children, he had longed for the day when he'd be grown up and maybe very, very wealthy with maybe a hundred rials in his pocket and could indulge in sprinkling the forbidden sauce on his food. Not that we forbade them anything in the way of food. Noelli never used the Taasco. Entirely too hot for her taste. And she, not we laid down the rules as to what Hossein could or could not eat from our pantry. Noelli knew that Hossein would not be able to go with the hot stuff, but never gave him the benefit of sampling it.

Came finally the day when the little bottle was emptied, and was relegated to the garbage can. Hossein retrieved same, knowing that no one would object to his scrounging a little empty bottle from the garbage. And there must have been enough left for him to just taste. He'd pretend for a moment that he was "Agha."

The first we knew of his having satiated his curiosity was when we heard his almost animal-like screams coming from the courtvard between the house and the servents' quarters. Dashing to the kitchen door, expection to find his mangled little body lying on the tile we encountered Noelli...laughing fit to be tied. And there was poor little Hossein, by that time only crying uncontrollable.

He'd sampled the Tabasco. It was so hot it brought tears to his eyes. When he rubbed his eyes...well, you know the rest. And Noelli was saying in her mixture of Turkish, Persian, Russian and a few words of English that Hossein had learned his lesson about forbidden fruits.

But from that day until we departed Teheran eleven years later, there was nothing in our pantry which was called "hot sauce." It was "Hossein Sauce." And Hossein grew to be a tall, handsome young man. Without ever again sampling the hot stuff, I'm quite certain.

Bids without the required check or proposal bond will not be considered. The City will notify the successful Bidder, in writing, within 30

days after the date of open-

ing bids, of its acceptance of

his proposal. The successful Bidder will be required to furnish a Performance Bond and a Payment Bond each in the amount of contract, written by a responsible surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas and satisfactory to the Owner, as required by Article 5160, V.A.T.C.S., as amended by H.B. 344, passed by the 56 Legislature. Regular Session, 1959.

All lump sum and unit prices must be stated in both script and figures. The Owner reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to waive formalities. In case of ambiguity or lack of clearness in stating the prices in the bids, the Owner reserves the right to consider the most advantageous construction thereof, or to reject the bid. Unreasonable (or "unbalanced") unit prices will authorize the Owner to reject the bid.

Bidders are expected to inspect the site of the work and to inform themselves regarding the condition of the site.

Attention is called to the fact that there must be paid on the project not less than the general prevailing rates of wages. The Contractor must abide by the Wage and Hour Laws of the State of Texas, and must pay not less than the legally prescribed rates for Eastland County. The Contractor will post prevailing wage rates on the


