Oil And Royalty Companies Hold Annual Meetings AP 274P, an 11,923,200 acre Annual stockholder

meetings of three royalty and oil companies with substantial domestic and foreign holdings were held in Cisco at Kamon House last

Tuesday. Over 60 stockholders from throughout the United States were in attendance. The companies are International Royalty & Oil (IROC), Black Giant Oil (BGOC) and Golden Triangle Royalty & Oil (GTRO).

International Royalty & Oil's stockholders approved a recommendation for a 3-for-1 stock split to become effective in the near future. They also voted for a proposal to increase the number of authorized shares from 5,000,000 to 15,000,000 and to reduce par value from 5 cents to 1.66 cents per share. The Board of Directors also voted to increase the annual cash dividend on a pre-split basis from 2 cents to 2.2 cents per share, a 10% increase.

Richard F. Hare of Fort Worth, president, and Ivan Webb of Cisco, vice president, who were reelected, briefed stockholders on

IROC's operations in the states of Texas, Kansas, Kentucky and New Mexico, and in Australia, Turkey, Canada, and Brunei. These properties include interests under some 479 producing oil or gas wells and under 53,185,438 gross surface acres of non-producing properties. Mr. Hare said that IROC had its most successful year

of operations in 1980 when revenues reached a record \$453,888, or an increase of 78% over fiscal 1979. Net income was \$173,020, another company high. The firm's assets passed the two million mark. IROC was founded in February, 1969, and went public in 1972. It has 1,400 stockholders. Black Giant Oil Company President, Ivan Webb, an-

nounced to that firm's stockholders that BGOC has acquired an overriding rovalty interest in 115,000 acres in Honduras. Centurion Oil & Minerals Corp., Houston, holds the lease on

this property and a four well drilling program is due to begin in July, testing an anticline three miles wide and 21 miles long. There are a

number of oil seeps on the flank of this area.

Mr. Webb also reported that Lennard Oil Company of Australia is nearing the projected 8,100 foot horizon in a test well on AP 235P in Queensland, Australia. BGOC holds 50,000 net royalty acres and GTRO holds 742,424 net royalty acres in the concession, and the outcome is expected to be known soon, Mr. Webb said.

A new purchase of BGOC and GTRO is an overriding royalty interest in 17 producing wells in Barton County, Kansas. Income from this acquisition has been received since January, 1981.

Black Giant had operating revenues of \$64,969 in 1980. an increase of \$20,000 from the previous year. This firm was founded in July. 1973, and went public in 1974. 1,956 has BGOC stockholders

Golden Triangle Royalty & Oil stockholders were informed that their firm joined Black Giant as a 50% partner in the Honduras venture mentioned above. GTRO has also formed a coal subsidiary, Golden Triangle Coal & Mining, Inc., it was announced, and it is applying for a coal concession in Queensland, Australia, which is reported to contain 387,000,000 tons of high grade coking coal especially suitable for use by steel

mills. It was announced that Harken Oil & Gas, Inc., of Abilene, Texas, has purchased GTRO's half interest in

concession in western Queensland, Australia. This area contains five known drilling prospects, which Harken has agreed to develop at no cost to GTRO. GTRO retains a 121/2% net profits interest and a 2% overriding royalty. Lennard Oil Company of

Australia was reported to be near completion of a test well on AP 235P and Abbott Petroleum Company was reported to have a six well drilling program in progress on AP 251P. GTRO holds interests in both of these Australian concessions.

Presently, under 73,758,830 surface acres, GTRO holds 3,586,514 net royalty acres, chiefly overriding royalties in Australia, and 1212% net profits interest under 11,923,200 surface acres.

GTRO holds interests in 60 producing wells in the United States at present. Management announced that GTRO, along with IROC and BGOC, would participate in a new drilling program by a consortium of oil companies who are planning to drill a considerable number of wells in various promising areas of the United States over the next vear.

Reports of drilling in progress in Lee County, Texas, by Davis Resources and in Pecos County, Texas, by Exxon Corporation were given to the stockholders. GTRO, along with IROC and BGOC, have interests in both properties. Purchases of new

Johnson of the Colorado School of Mines in Golden, Colorado, is chairman of the board. Other officers are Ivan Webb, vice president and Effie Kamon, secretarytreasurer, both of Cisco. Howard Siegel of Houston serves as a Director. Mr. Kamon called attention to an article in the March 23 edition of the Oil & Gas Journal entitled "Australian Exploration Picking Up Speed."

GTRO was organized in 1975 and went public in 1976. It has 1,637 stockholders.

Stockholder reponse to the great progress of all three companies was very positive and enthusiastic. The companies will continue to issue Stockholder Letters at various times during the year ahead to keep stockholders abreast of new company developments. Company offices are located at 1304 Avenue L, Cisco, Texas. All three companies are listed on the active overthe-counter NASDAQ listings in the Wall Street Journal and in newspapers throughout the country. 






Larry Spears, Director of CCCO's Pre-enlistment Counseling Program, says, "The last few years have seen a tremendous growth of militarism in this country, and much of it has been centered in the high schools and colleges!"

This is a military aptitude test administered in 15,000 high schools by military personnel. However, the information obtained from the test goes to many offices around the country, and it is used by recruiters for years. Many schools never tell their students that this is an op-

us," a fellow scientist said, "what are you speculating as you face the mysteries of the unknown?' "Oh, Friend," the man


calmy replied, "there are no speculations or mysteries but only certainties in the realm I will soon see."

Our Turkoman bhadji, Noelli, was almost totally illiterate. She could read numerals to twenty ... maybe beyond. But she could not sign her name, nor could she have read it. But literacy is not for a moment to be associated with stupidity. Noelli was far from ignorant.

She had an uncanny knack for handling money, for example. At one time early in our association with her she loaned 20,000 rials to our driver. Now Hushang, the driver, was a man of some substance. He owned several cars which were hired, for the most part, under long-term agreements to "Faranghi" (foreigners) businessmen. But Hushang seemed always to be strapped for cash. Payments on the cars, wages for the drivers...the usual pains of the small businessman seemed constantly to beset him. So; he borrowed some money from Noelli.

I learned of the transaction when Hushang had defaulted on his "interest payments" for a couple of months. It seems that there was no fixed term for the loan, but the interest rate was 1,000 rials per month. Five percent return per month is not bad, in any league. I confirmed with Hushang that he did indeed owe the interest payments, paid them and held the sum from my payments to him.

And while Noelli was not really lazy, she did not mind taking advantage of any labour-saving procedure. As in the case of the ironing board which My Lovely Wife purchased for her. She did all the laundry for the household, squatting beside a shallow "tub" about the size of a large dishpan and rubbing out the dirt from the clothes on her hands. She did a good job of it, although she was very reluctant to use hot water. Hard on the hands, I suppose.

The Hardy Perennial - Sunday Laws Part I

By Viola M. Payne The current session of the Texas State Legislature has a hardy old perennial up for consideration and possible repeal - Sunday or "Blue" Laws. It would probably be more accurate to call them Selective Sales Laws, for they regulate buying and selling on Sunday - and in some cases Saturday. These laws come up so often for review that the Legislators are not surprised to see them back again. Sometimes lawsuits involving this religious legislation bounces through the state on to Federal Courts, where various opinions are expressed. For Sunday Law discussions are as old as Emperior Constantine of Rome (A.D. 334), and as new as tomorrow's newspaper.

Many Texans shrug off such laws and try to adjust to whatever the Legislatures come up with next, deciding that it is simpler to switch than fight over this situation. They note that many States of the Union have some variety of Sunday or "Blue" laws, whether they are en-

propiation for sectarian purforced or not. But citizens of States less rigid than Texas are amazed at the complications of our present system. In a recent series of articles about Eastland County Churches, each Church leader took a stand for religious liberty - and separation of Church and State. And for a good reason · during some time in the past each one of these will follow. religions has suffered from

persecution. The love of religious liberty is so basic that it cuts through all religions and creeds, just as it always has. All people want religious liberty for themselves. But to give it to the other fellow that person who approaches God in a different way - that requires more charity. And many people do not percieve Sunday Legislation as a threat to the First Amendment of the United States Constitution. Nor do they believe it threatens the First Amendment of the Texas Constitution, or the Sections guaranteeing no religious test for office, freedom of worship, and no State ap-



poses. But persons who have studied the situation realize that the issue is complex, and there is far more at stake than whether a citizen buys shoes - or even beer - on Sundays. So a glimpse at Religious Legislation in America would appear to be in order. A history of the Church and State separation in Texas

> Upon their arrival in America, in the early 1600's persecuted Congregationalists adjusted quickly to their new position of dominance. They incorporated laws forcing citizens to attend Church, and observe Sunday in a way the leaders considered proper. By 1629 Jews and Catholics in the new Colonies were denied the right to vote or hold public office. And the first boat of Quakers was referred to as "full of heretics and malignants." The Baptists, also, ran afoul of the local government. And life grew so difficult for Episcopalians that even the English Crown stepped in to uphold their freedom.

It is easy to criticize the

Madison, however, had known powerful opponents who pushed for Sunday legislation on the Federal level. When this agitation boiled into Congress, it was met by Richard M. Johnson of Kentucky, who fought such legislation in the House, the Senate, and late as a Vice President. Johnson noted that "Some denominations consider one day the most sacred, and some looked to another, and these petitions did, in fact, call upon Congress to settle what was the Law of God." He declared that "The United States Government is a Civil and not a religious institution," and, as such, "It is not the legitimate province of the Legislature to determine what religion is true, and what false." Rather, the Government's proper function is to protect all persons "In the enjoyment of their religious as well as Civil Rights, and not to determine for any whether they shall esteem one day above another, or esteem all days alike holy."

Judge Stephen J. Field, a bitter foe of Terry, defended Sunday Laws by treating them as Civil rather than religious legislation. This fued became more than an intellectual debate when a right erupted between the two men one day. Terry was shot twice, and Judge Field faced the charge of murder. He successfully pleaded selfdefense, and was cleared of criminal conduct. But the cause Terry had defended was approved by voters, and

the Sunday Law was stripped from California statues in 1883. Oddly enough, when Sunday observance was no longer demanded by law, attendance at Sunday worship services in California increased.

Rarely did any Sunday Law face Federal review in the 1800's. It was individual State Governments that decided the cases. But finally various issues began to filter through, some involving prayer in schools and sports such as baseball.

Finally, in 1961, Sundaylaw opponents hoped that the Supreme Court would strike down Blue Laws either as an "establishment" of religion, or as an unconstitutional infringement on the "free exercise" of religion. The Court rejected a contention that Sunday prohibitions constituted a denial of "equal protection" of the law. This left the "free exercise" question, and the right of a citizen to raise that was more narrowly construed by the Court.

So the year 1961 became a landmark in Sunday-law history, where traditional religious symbolism emerged relatively intact from a massive legal confrontation. There were a number of dissenting opinions, including that of Justice William O. Douglas. But basically the Court interpeted the First Amendment in this way:

"Your religious beliefs are protected - absolutely. But actions based upon your beliefs are protected only to the extend that they do not violate a compelling public interest."
