

TEN YEARS LATER.....

A "tongue-in-cheek" statement made in August, 1971, to suggest that Cisco limit its population to 8,000 landed Manager Gene Abbott of the Chamber of Commerce in a political advertisement last Sunday - nearly ten years later.

It was in mid-August, 1971, that Congressman Omar Bureson, who has since retired, wrote in his weekly column from Washington about the efforts of towns to attract more and more population. The article concluded thusly: "There seems to be a lot of engineering in everything except people. Instead of the 'bigger and better' and 'the more the merrier,' the problem is what is to be done with people, of which there are going to be plenty for a long time. The question is the quality of life and how to preserve that quality instead of quantity, that no one has yet come up with a very satisfying answer."

Mr. Abbott, who had just gone to work as Cisco CofC manager, liked the "quality instead of quantity" idea, hence his suggestion - Cisco should limit its population to 8,000 - not a one more."

It was Mr. Abbott's idea to work for quality in all civic matters and growth would naturally follow. He threw in the "limit of 8,000" to attract attention. And attention is what it attracted. National publicity followed.

The Dallas Morning News commented editorially as follows: "For nearly a half century, Cisco (Eastland County) has advertised itself as 'Home of the World's Largest Swimming Pool.' It now envisions another distinction: 'The Only Town in the World that Won't Be Big.'"

"Its present population is around 4,000. CofC Manager Gene Abbott proposes that 'we limit our population to a maximum of 8,000 . . . that when we reach 7,500 the only way anyone can become a citizen of Cisco is to make application and be approved by a screening committee.'"

"Cisco is known for its fine climate, good schools, outstanding recreational facilities and small local industries using local people. It has a church (22) for every 200 people."

"Abbott predicts that in the next decade thousands will leave the headaches of metropolitan areas and settle down in communities like Cisco. There are signs that this is already happening."

"Abbott merely wants to prevent a migration of city headaches along with city people. His idea of screening new people is novel, but the overall objective is old: A community of comfort and convenience rather than bigness and wealth."

"Of interest to Dallas, Corpus Christi, Fort Worth, etc., is Abbott's final comment: 'Our only busing problem is getting our kids in from farms and ranches.'"

D.E. Scott, who wrote a well known column headed "Cross Roads Reports," observed that "what many towns need is a screening of the residents they already have, and departure for such as are polluting the local environment."

The Abilene Reporter News quoted Abbott, along with the story, as follows: "Abbott admits that he is not too serious about his proposal but plans to submit it to the city council. It started out as a jest and I'm sure it's still a jest."

In any event, a half page ad in last Sunday's Press, paid for by Citizens for Better Government, took issue with Abbott for the statement and with public support of the Chamber of Commerce.

The city charter provides that the City Council MAY appropriate a tax of up to two mills per \$100 valuation (a mill is a tenth part of a cent) for Chamber of Commerce purposes. The CofC has never used that much tax money. The CofC is "everybody's business and deserves the support of everyone, and the tax allowed is pretty small even for a large taxpayer."

Mr. Abbott, a native of Cisco, served as president of the Chamber of Commerce in 1962 when he headed a local gas distribution company. A "promotion in jest" that he suggested landed Cisco on a lot of front pages that year. That idea was for Cisco to observe Daylight Savings Time when it went into effect on the east coast.

It was incredible how much publicity Cisco received. Perhaps it is time for Cisco to stay on standard time and let the rest of the state go DST. Later, Mr. Abbott promoted a rain dance by civic leaders in Indian dress and a drought condition was relieved.

Mr. Abbott is recognized throughout West Texas as an outstanding CofC executive and has served as president of the WTCofC Managers Association and as a member of the board of directors a good many years. He is often called on for talks on CofC work. He works closely with the Texas Industrial Commission and others in seeking industrial prospects.

The CofC's 15-person board of directors, elected by the business and civic leaders of the community, lays out a work program each year, and Mr. Abbott follows their orders. This year's main project, of course, is the community's Centennial.

Yes...the CofC has long worked for an adequate community airport. This work has obtained for Cisco substantial funds from the Texas Aeronautics Commission. And the funds that the TAC uses to improve Texas airports is derived from a state tax on aviation gasoline - not property taxes.

The CBG's half page ad was anything but positive.-JWS

"I am a candidate for Place 5, Cisco ISD Board.

"Unlike the City election, there are no burning issues in this race. The reasons I filed for the school board: (1) in a democracy the voters should have two or three or more choices for each place or office; (2) my experience could be helpful as a member of the board.

"My daughter, Cynia, is a freshman at CJC. My son, Buck, is a freshman at Cisco High.

"I am a member of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce; vice president, Lobo Booster Club; volunteer athletic trainer for the Cisco summer baseball program.

"I graduated second in the class of '54 from CJC. In 1965 I taught night classes, government and business, at CJC. I served in the US Navy during the Korean conflict, and received an honorable discharge.

"I completed 20 years in the school business. Besides teaching a class for the handicapped, my experiences range from fifth grade math to associate professor of physical education. Also served as School Business Manager, principal, and director of special education. And eight years as a head football coach, from high school to the San Antonio Wolverine semi-pro club. I have considerable experience in a moonlight capacity as an Insurance Adjuster and as Law Clerk. I am a contract Loss Adjuster and Sales for the Federal Crop Insurance Program, USDA. And an estimator for protective coatings.

"I never sail under false colors: (1) I am oriented towards the consumers of any program (students) and the program "mechanic people" (teacher); (2) I strongly support old fashion discipline and justice.

Record Turn-Out Forecast For City Election Here Saturday

A record turn-out of voters has been forecast for Saturday, April 4, at the Corral Room of the Laguna Hotel as citizens of the community elect two City Council members, ballot on five recall propositions, select two public school trustees and two hospital board members.

Observers were predicting a turn-out of 1,200 to 1,500 voters. The polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. The usual election rules and regulations as prescribed by law will prevail.

ballot provides for voters to choose councilmen for Places five and six. Two candidates are running for Place Five-Ivan Webb and Audye Wagley. There are three candidates for Place Six-Randy Linn, Jay Maples and Bobby Ingram.

Mr. Webb is a young business man and a native of the community. Mrs. Wagley, a retired school teacher, is a life-long resident of this region. In the other race, Mr. Linn is a young man employed by Allsup's Convenience Store

and Mr. Maples is a young man employed by Oil States Rubber Company. Mr. Ingram, a young retired Army sergeant, is employed by Chaney Butane Co.

Mayor Roy Cartee and Council Members Louise Allison, Jerry Jeffcoat, Harold Pippen and William J. Eudy are listed on the recall section of the city election ballot.

This was the first time in the community's 100 years that voters were being asked to vote a recall ballot.

A.C. Warren, appointed

election judge by the city council, told The Press that he will be assisted by Alternate Judge Carl Gorr and four clerks. Official observers representing several of the candidates were expected to be on hand during the day.

In the public school trustee election, the ballot lists three candidates for two vacancies. Incumbent Willis Parker, local rancher, is unopposed for Place Four. B.D. Trice opposes Incumbent Johnny Cagle for Place Five. Both are local business men.

Mrs. Wilson Smith was named judge of the school trustee election.

There are three candidates for two vacancies on the board of the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. They are Bruce Stovall, Armo Chambers and Dell J. Crockett. Mr. Stovall operates an oil field service business, Mr. Chambers, incumbent, is an owner of Cisco Funeral Home, and Mr. Crockett is minister of Redeemer Lutheran Church. Douglas Fry will serve as judge of the hospital board election.

A total of 52 absentee ballots for the city and hospital elections had been cast at 5 p.m. Monday at the City Hall, according to Acting City Secretary Ginger Parker. Seventeen voters had marked school board ballots at the school's downtown business office. Absentee voting was to end at 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 31.

Considerable interest has been generated in the city election where voters could possibly recall the mayor and four council members, leaving the city with only two elected officials. In that event, however, it was believed that present council members would remain on the job until an election could be held to choose their successors.

The ballots for the three elections will be in both English and Spanish to comply with state laws.

Voters who have questions about the voting rules which govern city elections or about the Texas Election Code may find their answers in the following information furnished by A.C. Warren, City Election Judge. Carl D. Gorr is the Alternate Election Judge.


1. Registered voters who are legal residents of Cisco may vote between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Saturday, April 4.
2. Bring your voter registration certificate with you if you have it. You may vote if you are otherwise qualified however, even if your certificate is lost, misplaced or left at home.
3. You should not bring with you to the polling place (Corral Room) any "premarked" sample ballot.
4. No electioneering or loitering is permitted near the Corral Room while the polls are open.

IWU Reflections in Perspective

A couple of weeks or so before Thanksgiving (Oh, yes; Americans often observe the usual holidays to which they are accustomed "at home" when they are living in foreign countries) we began wondering what we'd do for a turkey. Returning from a drive into the city on a Friday, we saw the solution. There, right there along the street running along the foot of the mountain between Sahegherranieh (where we lived) and Tajrij, were two village tribesmen sort of loose-herding a mixed flock of turkeys and geese along the way.

With the help of our driver, who understood their dialect, and after considerable haggling we settled on a price for a turkey which we'd be permitted to select from the flock. 300 rials, or about \$4.75, in hand paid and we could point out the turkey, watch the tribesman catch it, and take it home with us. Alive, of course.

We cooped the gobbler up in the furnace room and Noelli and Reza, the cook-houseboy, "fed him out" on table scraps and wheat. Wheat was available in one-kilogram packages at the supermarkets. By the time another year or so had passed, "butterball" turkeys had been introduced to Iran, along with freezing. But the year following our having enjoyed our first turkey Noelli took care of Thanksgiving in her own, inimitable manner.

As we've mentioned, Noelli was a village girl. Although she became a "Khanum" (Madame) to be reckoned with in her own circles, purchased a tiny one-room house in Tajrij (which she leased after the novelty of spending an occasional weekend in it has passed), owned a flock of sheep and had money to loan, she was still the village girl at heart.

Whatever the season, Noelli appeared to be dressed in a complete wardrobe at all times. The basic article of clothing began with pajama pants which were just a touch more than ankle-length and were made usually of cotton material with a striped pattern. Over this garment was worn a collection of skirts and blouses, and usually a short coat or coat-sweater which matched none of the other clothing. And the scarf, of course. Long since, I had supplied her with a half dozen Arab "shemaghs", including at least one of heavier material. That became her regular winter headdress.

Madame (MLV) decided that Noelli should dress in a manner befitting a housemaid, and had her tailor make some cotton uniforms for her. Noelli was duly appreciative. And she wore the uniforms, over the pajamas and at least one of the skirts and blouses. Sometimes she would roll the pajama pants to her knees, exposing black, heavy stockings.

Early in the Fall of the second year Noelli was with us, she asked to be allowed to go to her village for a visit. We told her to take a couple of weeks off and to do just that. At that time, she could go by bus to Qazvin. From that city she hired a taxi to take her to the small town of Ab Hasht. From Ab Hasht she hired a mule and a boy to lead the animal up the switchback trail to the village in a high bowl-shaped valley in the mountains. The trip took two days.....Teheran to the village of Ishmael.

We never knew how Noelli occupied her time during her forays to the village, but she must have spent countless hours sitting in the sun, relating the wonders of the city and of the household of the "Faranghi" (foreigner). That observation was based on the fact that she was tanned to the shade of an old saddle when she returned.

And the deep tan was not all that she brought when she stepped out of the rickety taxi which had brought her from the bus station. A carpet or two, bundles of goodness only knew what, at least half a dozen chickens, a supply of handmade brooms.....she was ready for another year's stay in Teheran.

And where she had them we never knew, but early on the following morning we were awakened by the gobbling of a turkey. The sound could only come from one place; the furnace room. When breakfast was served, we mentioned that we thought that we distinctly heard the sound of a gobbling turkey. Noelli smiled broadly, and confessed that she had brought not one turkey; but two of them. She would feed them, and we would not have to buy one off the street for our up-coming feast.

Needless to say we didn't need an alarm clock from that day until Thanksgiving.

Much attention has been paid this past year concerning the Governor's Crime Package and the "War on Drugs" proposals. I am the sponsor of one of the measures and cosponsor of several in the Senate.

It should be noted that these are not the only crime measures being considered in the Legislature. Several democratic Senators are sponsoring various crime measures of their own and there are several officials or associations that also have crime packages or bills that they have been responsible for.

remove technical barriers in the Code of Criminal Procedure and allow the jury to learn more concerning the circumstances and law of the case. The second would allow the judge to instruct the jury concerning the laws of parole before they considered punishment.

Another measure would enhance the penalties for offenses committed against the elderly and the handicapped. The offenses would be raised one grade level.

The last measure would deny probation to those committing certain serious offenses and offenses in which a deadly weapon is used.

The District and County Attorney's Association also has a package of bills. There are twelve bills in their

package and deal primarily with reform of the Code of Criminal Procedure and procedural aspects of the trial of a case. I sponsor one of the bills that deal with reformation of sentences in death penalty cases.

As you can see there are officials, associations and legislators that are involved in legislation that seeks to combat crime. These efforts cut across party lines and across philosophical lines.

Of the ten bills in the Governor's Crime Package, seven are sponsored by Senate Democrats. All five of Ross Perot's "War on Drugs" bills are sponsored by Senate Democrats.

The efforts to combat and to deter crime is a bipartisan effort. The Attorney General and those associations with crime measures should also be recognized for their efforts.

Homemaking Hints

By Janet Thomas

What should we eat to stay healthy? Hardly a day goes by without someone trying to answer that question. Newspapers, magazines, books, radio and television give us a lot of advice on what foods we should or should not eat.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has published "Dietary Guidelines for Americans". These guidelines are: 1) Eat a variety of foods, 2) Maintain ideal weight, 3) Avoid too much fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol, 4) Eat foods with adequate starch and fiber, 5) Avoid too much sugar, 6) Avoid too much sodium, 7) If you drink alcohol, do so in moderation.

These guidelines are suggested for most Americans. They do not apply to people who need special diets because of diseases or health problems.

Food alone cannot make you healthy. But good eating habits based on moderation and variety can help keep you healthy and even improve your health.

Frequently, we receive calls at the Extension office by persons wanting information on which foods contain high or significant amounts of sodium which should be eaten in moderation or avoided in low-sodium diets.

Table salt is the most common source of sodium. Many foods contain added salt because of the processing through which they are made ready for consumers. Some of these sources are: Preservatives in ham, bacon, frankfurters, frozen or dried fish and dried beef. Brines used in corned beef, sauerkraut and pickles also have significant amounts of sodium.

All mixes such as dried fruit-flavored drink mixes, pudding mixes, cake mixes, and biscuit mix as well as commercially baked goods contain sodium.

Quick cooking cereals and processed cheeses contain disodium phosphate. Sodium benzoate is used as a preservative in sauces, relishes, and salad dressings.

Drinking water may contain sodium without tasting salty. Your local board of Health or water board should be able to give you the sodium content of your water supply.

Some other sources of sodium we don't normally think about are the "stick-um" on postage stamps and envelopes also have sodium in the glue. Low calorie carbonated drinks may be higher in sodium than the regular carbonated soda drinks.

Sodium is very important and our bodies need the right amount. Too little sodium is just as hazardous to our health as too much. Sodium plays a regulatory role in our body's metabolism. Sodium compounds are responsible for maintaining osmotic pressure between cells and surrounding fluids. Sodium is important in maintaining the pH (acid/base balance) of the blood and other body fluids. Sodium compounds produce alkalinity in the small intestine which is necessary for digestion.

Excessive consumption of sodium may increase the retention of body fluids. Research has indicated that high sodium intake contributes to the development of high blood pressure. Also reduced perspiration resulting from today's limited activity and extensive use of air-conditioning

necessitates chronic excretion of excess sodium by the kidneys which may contribute to their eventual malfunction.

To avoid too much sodium in your daily diet, learn to enjoy the unsalted flavors of foods. Cook only with small amounts of added salt. Add little or no salt at the table. Limit your intake of salty foods such as chips, salted nuts, popcorn, pickled foods, cured meats, etc. Read food tables carefully to determine the amounts of sodium in processed foods and snack items. Check with your medical doctor concerning your body's requirement for sodium.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

When I am in a hurry I have to have cookies ready to go at the "last minute". Boiled Cookies are a favorite of mine. They are quick to prepare for they do not have to be baked in the oven. They are delicious!

BOILED COOKIES

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup margarine
1/4 cup cocoa
1/2 cup peanut butter
3 cups cooking oats, uncooked
1/2 cup pecans, chopped
2 teaspoons vanilla

In large sauce pan, combine sugar, milk, margarine and cocoa. Blend and bring to a boil on surface unit. Stir and let boil about 2 minutes. Add peanut butter and stir until blended. Remove from heat and add uncooked oats, nuts and vanilla. Beat until well blended and thick. Spoon onto wax paper and mixture can be packed in a greased pan and cut into serving pieces. May be considered either candy or cookies. Yield 3-4 dozen pieces.

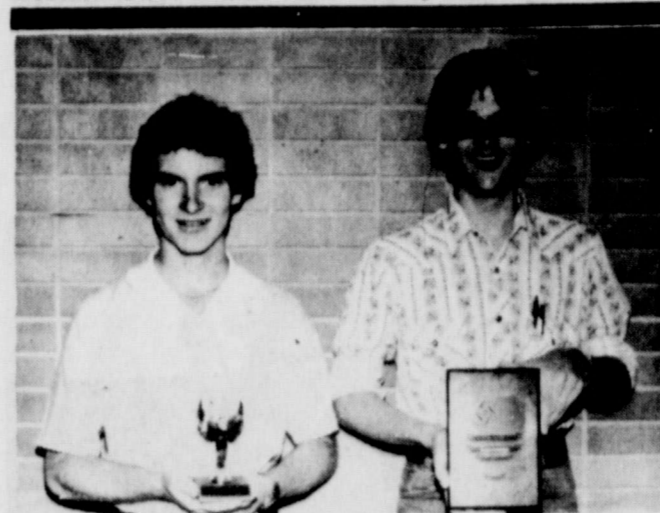


Jerry Slaughter Gets Promotion

About the Senior Citizen's Center....

People for Progress and Unity have noted that misconceptions concerning the Senior Center sponsored by Cisco Junior College plague the minds of some local residents. In order to correct misinformation that has been circulated recently, we take this method of sharing facts taken from records of the Senior Center which are kept at the college and open to public scrutiny.

The Senior Citizens' program in Cisco is now and has been from its beginning a community service project of Cisco Junior College. Senior citizen's organizations must be sponsored by a sub-division of state government in order to obtain federal funds. Cisco Junior College qualified in this respect and volunteered to sponsor such an organization for the Cisco area. The Senior Center of Cisco became a reality on August 1, 1977, when the college assumed the sponsorship and provided quarters in the college-owned Laguna Hotel. Federal funds for the local Senior Citizens' organization are dispersed through West Central Texas Council of Governments.

Hampered at the beginning by a lack of sufficient funds, the Center received a boost of \$984.00 from the City of Cisco under the administration of Mayor H.C. Brown who is a strong supporter of the project. When the nutrition program was begun in 1978, Dr. Brown volunteered the use of the facilities at his clinic where meals were prepared for the Center's participants until such time as the hotel kitchen could be refurbished and equipped to serve the Center.

In late 1978 the college was awarded a federal grant through the West Central Texas Council of Governments' Agency on Aging which made possible the renovation and remodeling of the hotel quarters occupied by the Center. Total cost of the remodeling was \$26,825.00, seventy-five per cent of this total in the amount of \$20,126.00 being paid by the federal government. The remaining twenty-five per cent in the amount of \$6,709.00 was paid by the college.

The Center is currently operating on a yearly budget of \$73,281.00. The federal government pays \$46,896.00 and the remaining balance comes from participants who pay-as-they-are-able for the hot meals served at the Center and a contribution of \$4200.00 from the college.

John Muller, Director of Institutional Development and Special Programs at Cisco Junior College has the overall responsibility of administering the Senior Citizen's operation and overseeing the Laguna Hotel. Mrs. Ruth Cartee is hired by the college to direct the activities at the Center. The Center has been well received by the elderly people of the area and provides many badly needed services and activities for them.

It should be noted also that a budget of \$73,281.00 is a boost to the economy of the Cisco area. Salaries of the workers at the Center total \$30,566.00, the director of activities receiving the largest of these in the amount of \$10,019.00 per year.

The total program costs the college not only in money but in the tremendous amount of time necessary to administer the program. It is truly a "labor of love" brought about by civic-minded college administrators and regents who have a deep concern for the welfare of the older citizens of Cisco.

People of Progress and Unity support the Senior Citizens of Cisco and commended Cisco Junior College for this worthy enterprise and for the many other community services provided the residents of the Cisco area. We believe in giving credit where credit is due. It is our desire that such worthwhile programs will long be continued in Cisco.

OBITUARY

The City of Cisco died last night at approximately 9 p.m. of neglect and apathy. Born May 21, 1881, Cisco died just 47 days before her 100th birthday.

Cisco endured many hardships throughout her lifetime, but grew and prospered for the most part over many years. Although she was struck and almost destroyed by a tornado in 1891, she survived. However, over the years, she contracted various diseases including personal greed, selfishness, dirty rumor, half-truths, malicious gossip, and even bankruptcy. Still she survived until confronted with the cancerous diseases of Apathy and Argumentiveness.

Her present doctor, along with his head nurse, both of whom were retained in yesterday's city election, were astounded at the death of Cisco.

The doctor, who has been on the case only a year, said it wasn't his fault, as he hadn't done anything yet. He had tried to protect her from any strenuous activity such as street, sewer, or water line construction, and from any further burdens such as new business which would require services from her (Cisco). He had also tried to ward off any grants that would have required strenuous activity on the part of Cisco in the near future.

The doctor's head nurse, who had only been on the case four years, said she had not received enough information yet to start giving Cisco any kind of help.

Services will be at 4 p.m. Monday, if we can find enough interested citizens to make it worthwhile.

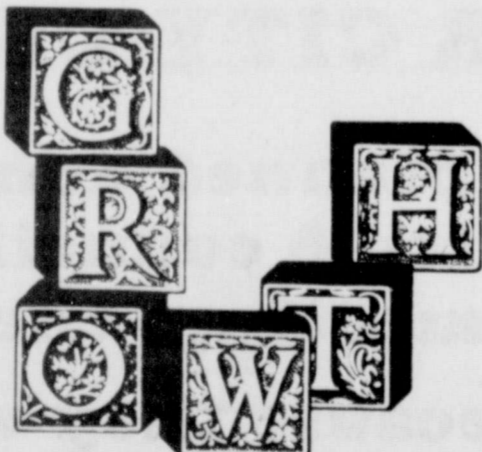

Questions And Answers About Property Taxation

Q: Why do we have a property tax? Who does the money go to and for what purpose?

A: The property or ad valorem tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas. Cities, counties, school districts and special taxing authorities such as municipal utility districts, junior college districts, etc., collect a property tax to pay for the operation of community services such as fire and police protection, street construction and repair, utilities, and public schools.

Q: Who controls the property tax?

A: The property tax is the only tax which is locally controlled, locally generated and locally collected. Locally elected and appointed officials—those most responsive to the needs of individual taxpayers—direct the property tax system in Texas.

Q: What steps or stages are involved in the property tax administration process?

A: There are four basic steps in the property tax process, which together take about 13 months to complete.

The first stage begins on Jan. 1 of each year. This is the development of tax

values by the tax assessor for the taxing jurisdiction and it usually continues through July. This stage includes the rendition period—the period during which you, the taxpayer, are responsible for asserting your rights.

The second stage in the tax process is the meeting of the board of equalization (BOE). The purpose of this board is to review the values which the tax assessor has listed for the property in the jurisdiction. Board members try to insure that values are accurate and that equal values have been set for the same kinds of property. The board of equalization process usually takes place in late July or August.

The third stage occurs when the jurisdiction's governing body (city council, school board, commissioners' court, etc.) meets to adopt a tax rate which will be applied to the values approved by the BOE, normally in late July or August.

The fourth stage in the tax process is tax collection, which usually begins in September or October and continues through the following January. Jan. 31 is the deadline for paying taxes, and on Feb. 1 taxes become

delinquent. Property owners who have not paid their taxes before Feb. 1 will find that penalty and interest charges have been added to their tax bills. (Several jurisdictions in Texas—particularly cities—have tax calendars which begin on April 1 or even July 1. Their tax cycle will not follow the dates outlined above.)

Q: Why should I render the value of my property to the tax assessor?

A: By law, property owners must render the value of their taxable property to each jurisdiction's tax assessor during the rendition period (Jan. 1 to April 1 or 30 for most taxing entities). Apart from the legal requirement to render, there are three reasons why it is to the taxpayer's advantage to do so:

1. By filing a rendition, you will place into the record your opinion as to the value of your own property.

2. If you do not render your property, the tax assessor will do it for you, as the law states he must. He does this by making his own estimate as to the value.

3. Through rendering, you create a responsibility on the part of the tax assessor and board of equalization to notify you if they intend to increase the value of your property over the amount you have rendered.

Q: What if I disagree with the value the tax assessor places on my property?

A: If you have rendered your property, and if the assessor has disagreed with you by raising the value you

rendered, he must notify you of the time and place of the board of equalization (BOE) meetings for the taxing jurisdiction he represents. You then may appear before the board of equalization and explain why you believe the value assigned by the assessor is incorrect.

Q: Under what circumstances will the BOE make an adjustment in my taxable value?

A: First, if you can find and submit evidence to the BOE which indicates that the value assigned to your property exceeds local market values, then you would be entitled to a reduction in valuation. Second, if you can show that your property is being valued higher than similar properties in the jurisdiction, you should be entitled to a reduction in the value assigned even though the assessor's estimate did not exceed the actual market value.

Q: Aren't a number of exemptions available to help reduce my overall tax bill? When and how do I apply for them?

A: There are several exemptions available under state law to help provide you with tax relief. School districts must provide a \$5,000 exemption from the market value of your residence homestead, and must provide an additional \$10,000 exemption from market value to homeowners 65 and older and to those with total and permanent disabilities. Counties must offer a \$3,000 residence homestead exemption for the portion of the county tax rate levied for

flood control or farm-to-market roads. All jurisdictions must offer an exemption from assessed value of from \$1,500 to \$3,000 for qualifying disabled veterans.

Cities do not have constitutional authority to offer a general homestead exemption, but cities, counties, school districts and special taxing districts may offer optional homestead exemptions to those who are elderly or disabled. You should check with your local assessor(s) to see if optional over-65 or disability exemptions are available in your area.

Q: I have heard that the elderly are entitled to a tax freeze. Is this true?

A: Resident homeowners who are 65 or older are entitled to a freeze on the amount of their school taxes. If you qualify for the over-65 homestead exemption, your school district tax bill on your house and yard cannot increase as long as you apply for the exemption each year. While your property may increase in value through the years, the taxes which you owe in any one year cannot be greater than the amount you owed in 1979 or the first year you qualified for this exemption, whichever is later.

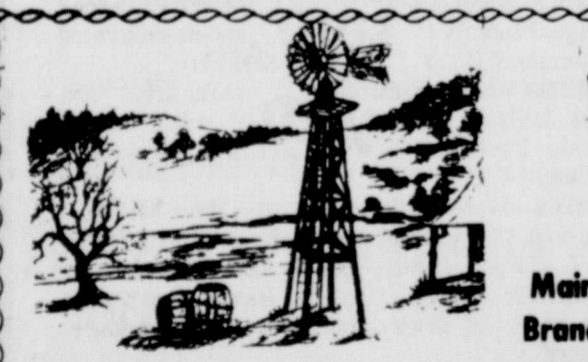

I, as a citizen and voter, challenge the statements and inferences contained in the political ad paid for by the Citizens for Better Government.

On the subject of taxes. The sad condition of our streets, sewer and water lines, and the dwindling, hap-hazard water supply for

our town, has lasted through numerous city administrations, not to mention a few city managers. Would it not be reasonable to assume that inadequate funds or the unwillingness of townspeople to spend funds to alleviate the situation, is the problem?

A favorite political ploy is to insinuate that the burden of taxation rests solely on the shoulders of the elderly and the poor. Fact: Industry and business (including utility companies) pay from 50% to 60% of the total school and city taxes collected annually. The remaining 40% to 50% is shared by the citizens and taxes are levied as to the amount of owned taxable properties. The less one has, the less one pays.

I have never met a senior citizen who was a free-loader. They do not wish to pay more than their share nor pay taxes and get nothing in return, but they also know that what we are getting in the way of city services is no bargain.

Our city airport is not a frill. It gives needed access in and out of our town for business and industrial representatives. With the increase in oil activities in our area, and with the industrial movement to the southwest, would it not be prudent to give these flying opportunities a good place to land? Government funds plus the contribution of individuals and local businesses have provided the construction at the airport. Maintenance costs will be offset by usage fees charged to those who use the airport.

Any city facility that encourages business growth helps everyone. As for "extending the runway to the Conrad Hilton" — that is a little superfluous; however, I do know of instances when incoming oil men had to land at Breckenridge and Eastland, because our airport facilities

were inadequate. If the citizens maligning the airport wish to assume the major portion of our city taxes, the best way to do it is to discourage growth of industry and business. The contributions by individuals and businesses, previously mentioned, have been in the form of man-hours, equipment and supplies. These contributors give more than lip service to their desire for an improved city.

It would be difficult for me to believe that dishonesty exists in our city government or is rife among the townspeople. Distorted facts, recalcitrant spenders, fearers of the future, and even a little incompetence — but dishonesty? Truth is on the record books at city hall and they are, by law, open to public inspection. Why not get your facts from its source?

We can fight each other or fight the city's problems. I prefer a positive approach, therefore I am endorsing the candidates of hope, those who have been previously endorsed by People for Unity and Progress. It is not a long term lease. May I also urge those who have indicated an unwillingness to vote for sheer frustration, to vote — and vote as though the future of Cisco depends on it — BECAUSE IT DOES.
