

Contour Strip Cropping Holds The Soil On The Slopes

Contour strip cropping—the planting of alternate strips of cultivated and close growing crops on the contour-holds fertile soil and increases crop yields.

To be most effective, some of the strips must be kept in close growing crops. A thick matting of grass filters the water, increases absorption and penetration, and slows down the movement of the runoff water. By keeping the soil and more of the water on the hillside, crop production is benefited.

When rows are run on the contour, each furrow acts as a miniature dam, holding the water in check so that more of it can soak into the ground and be stored for use of crops during periods of light rainfall. Contour cultivation distributes water over the field eliminating concentration in low areas where

Contour strip cropping makes possible a better balance between soil-building and harvested crops because fields are smaller. Less power is required for farming round the hill on the contour. With longer rows, there are less turns.


