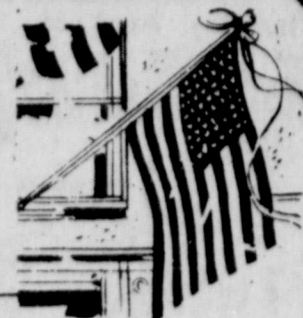

Cisco Centennial Queen and Princesses Named Monday

A Centennial Queen and two Princesses were named here Monday night to start off the Cisco Centennial Celebration activities for the city's 100th anniversary. Etta Judia, 80, was named as Queen while 80-year-old identical twins Vera Doyle and Velma McCrary were named as Princesses.

The three women were chosen from 28 nominees. Candidates had to be at least 75 years old and residents of Cisco for at least 50 years.

Lela Latch Lloyd was master of ceremonies for the festivities which began with a covered dish luncheon.

Bettye McGinness, coordinator of Centennial activities, was the guest speaker. She told of all the activities planned for the coming week and urged everyone to become an active part of the celebration. She said, "Support your Centennial. It is yours."

Mrs. McGinness emphasized there will be a free shuttle bus available for the April 25th and 26th Folk Life Festival at Cisco Junior College's Agriculture building. The bus will leave Cisco from three different locations every hour and will return on the half hour. It will be in operation on Saturday following the Centennial parade until 9:30 p.m., and

The general public is invited to the open house, labeled a "Centennial Tea" in other announcements. Refreshments will be served along with a tour of the home which is one of Cisco's earliest and finest.

According to the Historical Society, "a tour of one of the oldest and most lovely homes in Cisco is an ap-

propriate way to set the mood for the week of historical celebration."

The history of the home is quite interesting. The property was first owned by the Texas Central Railroad. When the railroad went broke, the land was sold in 1893 to the George Langstons for \$300. The Langstons then built the house on the lot for \$1250.

The Langstons sold the home to Ellen Huggins and Jane Pulley in 1897 for \$2750 and in 1899 it was sold again, this time to E.E. Kean.

Mr. and Mrs. R.J. Manchen bought the home in 1973, after the death of Mr. Kean's son, Odie, in 1971. The Manchens discovered such interesting things as brass light fixtures, a spring house covering the cistern, an old carriage house, and a charcoal burning fireplace.

The two-story house contains nine rooms. Outside, the carriage house still stands, where once it held three carriages at once. It also has a hay mow and tack room.

Mrs. Kitty McCracken bought the house from the Manchens in 1977, and is the present occupant of the home.

For the open house and tea, Mrs. McCracken will be dressed in her mother's black and white lace dress, that was used for her trousseau, and a white silk shawl that belonged to her grandmother. The dress was worn during the late 1800's and early 1900's, in Romney, West Virginia, where Mrs. McCracken's parents lived.

The Cisco Historical Society and Mrs. McCracken invite the public to the open house, to view the house and carriage house, as well as the grounds.

Council Awaiting Governor's Approval on Election Date

In a special meeting of the Cisco City Council last Friday night, the April 4th elec-

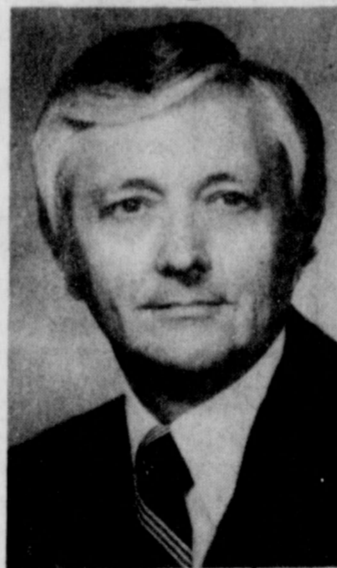
tion returns were canvassed, two newly elected council members were sworn in for

their places, and a tentative date for an election to fill the places vacated by the recent recall of the mayor and four

council members was set for May 23rd.

The election date for the vacated places was suggested for May 23rd in order to give possible candidates sufficient time to file, plus 30 days, if that date is approved. A letter was to be sent to Texas Governor Bill Clements for authorization, before any more action could be done on the election. Recalled council member William Eudy made a motion to accept that date. It was seconded by recalled council member Jerry Jeffcoat and passed unanimously.

Eris Ritchie Plans to File for Unexpired Mayor's Term

Eris Ritchie, Cisco businessman and a former CJC official and Chamber of Commerce president, has announced that he will file as a candidate for the unexpired term of mayor when the filing date is announced for the tentatively scheduled May 23 elections.

In revealing his intentions to seek the mayor's office, Mr. Ritchie issued the following statement: "During the past week I have been absolutely overwhelmed at the number of people of all ages and from all walks of life in the Cisco community who have expressed to me their desire that I offer my candidacy for mayor of Cisco. Although in the past I have entertained no political ambitions in this direction, I do feel that perhaps at this point in time I can hopefully be of service in an endeavor to promote peace and harmony in our city government and in our fine community."

Mr. Ritchie continued, "My family and I love Cisco. We've been here for twenty-two years and have sought to contribute positively in whatever ways that we could. We have been distressed by the discord and bad feelings generated during recent months, and are

very hopeful that our differences can be reconciled, so that we may all pull together as one unit for our town's betterment. We have many problems here, and the city government certainly cannot and should not try to solve all of them. But I do feel that our present form of government, duly adopted by the people of Cisco, should be given a chance to do. I will pledge my efforts towards helping achieve this goal. I do not wish to be the candidate of any political action group or any special segment of the community, but to hopefully be one that can draw support from all citizens who feel that I can fill the role of mayor adequately at this time."

Mr. Ritchie came to Cisco in 1959 as band director for the Cisco Public Schools. He served in this capacity for nine years, and then went to Cisco Junior College in a dual role of public relations director and band director.

Developing business interests during his entire stay in Cisco, he resigned his position with the college in 1977 to devote full time to his business enterprises. His company, Southwest Enterprises, markets embroidered emblems and other specialty awards merchandise nationally, with some international sales developed during recent years. The company was the supplier of souvenir embroidered patches for the Reagan Presidential Inaugural Parade this year, and for the Carter Inaugural Parade in 1977, as well as for many other nationally-known parades, festivals, and events. A second division of his company operates summer workshops for cheerleaders, baton twirlers, drill teams, and other school-age youngsters. These clinics are held in Abilene, Houston, San Antonio, Laredo, and Clear Lake City.

Mr. Ritchie has been instrumental in getting Cisco's name before the entire nation on numerous occasions. His company annually sends out mail-outs and advertising pieces into virtually every town in the country,

promoting its products for school groups. He also was prominently involved in arranging three separate appearances for the Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles in the nationally-televised Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parades in New York - 1971, 1973 and 1977. Other network TV appearances for the group resulted, including a prime-time patriotic special with Bob Hope in 1975. While director of the CHS Band, the group appeared in two Dallas Cowboys games, with one of the band shows being telecast on CBS. His Lobo Band also was a national finalist in a marching competition sponsored by Disneyland. During the height of participation in the Cisco Junior Music Festival, which Ritchie began in 1961, and the summer camps at Cisco Junior College, which he began in 1960, he was responsible for several thousand young people visiting the campus of Cisco Junior College each year.

Mr. Ritchie is married to the former Annita Hartsell, who is an ex-school teacher and former owner of the Lemon Tree Boutique, in Cisco. They have four children - Matthew Eris, 16, a sophomore in Cisco High School; Robin Annette, 12, an eighth grader at Cisco Junior High School; Holly Hart, 6, a student in Cisco Kindergarten; and Michael Christopher, age 3. He is a former Jaycee and a present Rotarian and member of the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. He is a member of the Cisco Church of Christ, where he served as a deacon, song leader and Bible School Coordinator.

Mr. Ritchie concluded, in announcing for mayor, "My former activities in the community have been in the promotional and image-making aspects. Now I would like to ask for this opportunity to function in city government with the idea in mind of contributing in whatever ways I can to the new council and its endeavor to provide our city with leadership during the next two years. I will appreciate the support of all who feel that I can do the job."

Recalled Mayor Roy Cartee explained that persons elected in the coming election will only serve out the time remaining on the vacated place they are elected to fill. He also said the office of the Secretary of State has instructed the recalled members and mayor to "keep a low profile in actions." He referred to the group as a "lame duck council."

City attorney Billy Wright said the present council should take no action on anything which might have long-range effects on the city, so no controversies would later arise over the situation. He said the recalled persons have been instructed to serve until their successors are elected.

Prior to the motion for the election date, new council members Bobby Ingram and Ivan Webb were sworn into office by acting city secretary Ginger Parker. Webb replaces Raymond Whitley at Place 5, while Ingram replaces Lucy Collier at Place 6.

Mr. Whitley said he had enjoyed his time on the council and stated if he had made any errors during that time, he would like to apologize.

Recalled-council member Louise Allison said "anybody who serves three years on the council deserves a good word." She said, "It was a pleasure to serve with Mr. Whitley, enough though, we did not always agree."

Before the new members were sworn in for the council, the election results were canvassed from the April 4th election. Election judge A.C. Warren read the figures from the election so they could be entered into the minutes of the meeting. Recalled council member Harold Pippen made a motion to accept the returns by the election judge and Mr. Eudy seconded the motion. All members present voted in favor of the motion.

Agricultural Briefs

DAIRY COWS ON TESTING PROGRAM--

More than 82,000 dairy cows from 655 herds are now on a special test program conducted by the Texas Dairy Herd Improvement Association, an increase of 11,000 from a year ago. TDHIA is essentially a herd management program built around testing and record-keeping to monitor milk and milkfat production. Feeding and breeding management are key parts of the program to increase management efficiency, points out a dairy specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Despite the jump in enrollment, only 26 percent of Texas dairymen have enrolled their herds in the program. Average milk production per cow in the program last year was 13,977 pounds and milkfat production was 507 pounds.

COUNTY TREASURERS SLATE SEMINAR--The 1981 County Treasurers' Seminar at Texas University will be held to help county treasurers perform their duties more effectively, says a county officials program specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Numerous state officials will be on hand to discuss current legislation, new banking concepts, government assistance programs, deferred compensation programs, and county and district retirement systems.

CATTLE INDUSTRY SURVIVAL KEYS--Taking a tough look at the cattle industry, a nationally recognized livestock market analyst said during the Beef Cattle Short Course at Texas A&M University this week that keys for survival of the cattle business in the decade ahead will be flexibility; discipline, or having an advance plan which allows producers to take advantage of volatility in the marketplace; and cost control, or equity preservation. From the middle of 1982 through 1986, the agricultural economist said cost of production as it relates to owning and raising a cow and calf will exceed the value received.

HORSE INDUSTRY OUTLOOK--National enthusiasm for horses has been building for the past 20 years, gradually at first and now more rapidly, the director for public affairs for the American Horse Council told Horse Short Course participants at Texas A&M University, April 6-7. More than four million Americans own horses and spend more than \$15 billion in caring for them each year. It's going to take aggressive marketing and continued support to keep the horse business alive and growing, the speaker predicted.

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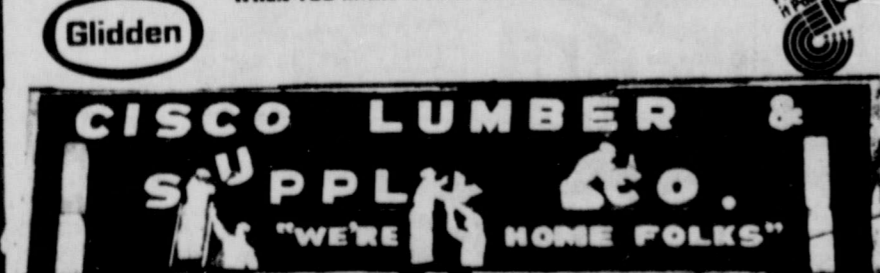

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Sermons To Be In English

The parsonage where Rev. and Mrs. Jim Hooten make their home in Eastland is warm and inviting.

The smiling, gracious Rev. Hooten and his petite, attractive wife, Peggy, are looking forward to the spring revival at the First Baptist Church beginning Sunday, April 12th and ending Easter.

Rev. Hooten has pastored this church only a short time and will be conducting the services. The sermons will be in English, but he could easily preach in Swahili. Africa was home to the couple for eighteen years. The couple moved to Eastland from Madison, N.J. Before living there, Rev. Hooten was director of missions for the First Baptist Church in Dallas for two years.

Looking backward, the Hootens were in Cisco during the years from 1959 through 1961. The eighteen years in Africa began when the family left Cisco. Missionary work was done in East Africa and included the countries of Kenya, Uganda, and Tanzania. Still ruled by the British when the Hootens arrived, they studied Swahili, a trade language, to be able to communicate with the various tribes in the countries.

At first, their children, Dee Ann, Lee David, and Kathy were very small so Mrs. Hooten was very busy with the youngsters during

the early part of their stay. The Hooten children attended English speaking schools close to their parents through the sixth grade then went to boarding schools in Nairobi to prepare for college.

Dee Ann married an "MK" (a "missionary kid") last summer. Her husband, Dan Snyder, is in medical school in Detroit preparing to be a missionary doctor. Lee David married within three weeks of his sister's wedding to another "MK". He is doing graduate work at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville to return to Africa as an agriculture missionary.

Kathy is finishing her second year at Hardin Simmons University in Abilene and is dating an "MK". Africa has influenced each of the children's lives.

The dark continent has always beckoned to Rev. Hooten. He always wanted to be a missionary and always in Africa. Mrs. Hooten's health brought them back to the states, and Rev. Hooten believes someday they will know why.

Chatting easily, the Hootens share customs and differences in our cultures. The climate of east Africa is ideal as the three countries are along the equator. There is a dry season and a rainy one, but no hot and cold seasons as we know. Dress is varied, the Hootens explain-

ed. Along the coastal areas where its steamy, the men wear very little clothing and women wear skins in back and beads in front, all below the waist.

In cities, dress is in the western fashion. Poorer villages find men dressed as westerners except they go barefoot or wear sandals made from old tires. Each tribe has its own national dress according to Mrs. Hooten.

In Uganda, the women wear a piece of cloth seven yards long. The garment has a neckline and big sleeves. The remainder of the cloth is wrapped around the women's body and tied to secure the material. When the people are converted and become Christians, they immediately change to dress as nearly as possible to the missionaries' dress.

The word "native" is never used to describe the people according to Rev. Hooten. The blacks are called nationals or Africans. The Hootens and all white are called Europeans. The missionaries' duties were to establish churches and to train Africans pastors. Once converted, the nationals strived to adopt new teachings and put aside superstitions and beliefs of centuries before them. This sometimes meant great hardships. Children and the continuance of families is all

important to the tribes. Since there are no social programs to aid the elderly, such as our Social Security, children must take care of parents and grandparents. Because many children die in infancy, couples strive for many babies. When an African accepts Christianity, he must give up polygamy. If he is married to a barren wife, great pressure is put upon him to take other wives to produce children. An intense struggle may develop between the new Christian and members of his tribes. Christianity can be painful as well as rewarding, just as it is in this country.

Western medicine is considered "very powerful". The Hootens smiled as they remembered the many, many aspirins they furnished the nationals. Also, medication for malaria, dysentery, and worms were fully given. They also dispensed antibiotic capsules but never gave injections. Rev. Hooten said it was common for people to camp outside medical compounds for days waiting treatment. He was often asked to accompany patients for treatment. It was humbling, he said, to be admitted immediately when others still waited and waited for treatment.

It is a shock, according to Mrs. Hooten, to live in

another country and realize America is not the only country in the world. Africans think we are all rich, she said. One measure of wealth is the ability to educate your children. An education automatically meant that person was sure to be rich.

Vegetables and many other foods were raised in the white highlands where the British farmed. The Hootens did without lettuce sometimes and a few other things, but usually their table was well supplied. Rev. Hooten killed all his family's meat for their table. He became acquainted with an elephant hunter and learned about a bull elephant that was destroying crops and villages. Rev. Hooten was asked if he would help in riding near by villages of the old roque's capricious and dangers visits into their small shambos (farms). He readily agreed. The hunt for the giant bull elephant took place on the shore of Lake Victoria, one of the world's largest lakes. The area was completely desolate with no villages since 1922 when an epidemic of sleeping fever caused by the tsetse fly killed everyone. Before entering the area, a government official took everyone's name. When the hunters left the area, a sample of blood was taken from each to insure no one had been infected by the tsetse flies' bites on them. (Rev. Hooten said the fly had to be crushed; a simple swat would not budge the pest).

The growth was so dense where the hunters, Hooten and three others, were that

small animal trails were used. After about two hours of struggling through the growth, the elephant could be heard in the distance tearing a tree apart.

After another two hours with much care taken to keep their scent from the elephant, Rev. Hooten said he could catch a glimpse of parts of the giant. He saw a foot almost thirty inches in girth. Next, he could hear the huge ears flopping and he heard its stomach growl.

Finally, Rev. Hooten climbed upon a large ant hill

and was looking inside the elephant's ear! That is where he shot, not once but twice, then tried to put some distance between himself and the elephant.

When the elephant dropped, it was within a few feet of him. Night was fast approaching and the Africans advised not to leave the carcass as the returning herd would find it and trample it into the ground to bury it. So, other men were summoned and frames measuring about 10 feet by 3 feet were built and fires were started.

Strip after strip of meat was cut and the elephant's meat was turned into jerky. The elephant provided food for many people for a long, long time. Rev. Hooten salvaged the tusks and they made their way home with him to America.

Experiences lived in Africa and compassion gained from people existing on life's barest necessities have nurtured the Hooten's faith.

Rev. Hooten feels he is a much richer person spiritually from his years in Africa.

Homemaking Hints

By Janet Thomas

When families start planting their gardens, that means home-canning season is almost at hand.

Now is a good time to take inventory of your canning supplies and equipment. Let me first of all stress how important it is that you do not take shortcuts or experiment in home canning. Use only tested, currently approved canning methods. If you need a new canning bulletin, call the Extension Service office for free copies of our food preservation bulletins.

Right now is also a good time to inspect your pressure canner. The gauge on your pressure canner should be checked each year to see if the gauge is registering correctly. The local Extension office has a tester and can check your gauge. If the gauge is not registering correctly, food will be either underprocessed or overprocessed.

If your canner has a lid which is equipped with a rubber gasket, check to see if the gasket fits tightly. If the gasket leaks steam, you might try turning the gasket over, stretch it gently and replace. If the rubber has hardened, you will want to replace it with a new gasket.

To remove stains and odors from a pressure canner, use one of the following mixtures and process at 5 pounds pressure for 5

minutes: 1. Juice of 1 lemon and 2 quarts of water, 2. Two tablespoons of vinegar and 2 quarts of water, 3. Handful of Irish potato peelings and 2 quarts of water.

It is strongly recommended that you use only jars and lids made especially for home canning. Never use ordinary jars such as mayonnaise or coffee jars. Standard canning jars are made of tempered glass to withstand high heat without breakage. Check your jar tops for cracks, chips and dents, and discard those with defects that would prevent an airtight seal.

Canning jar rings should be discarded if they are rusty. A rusty ring will sometimes prevent the lid being held down tightly in place and thus it will not seal. Discard any rings that are bent for these will also prevent a jar from sealing. Do not reuse sealing lids. The rubber rings on the lid deteriorates easily and prevents a tight seal.

To offset spiraling food costs, many families are turning to home gardening. This is the best way to cut food costs. The local Extension office has a good supply of home gardening and food preservation bulletins available upon request.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
Years ago, country women knew that whole-grain

bread is extra rich in flavor, nutrition and fiber. Now, medical studies have confirmed that many of you knew all along - that fiber is essential for good health.

One way to add fiber to your family's diet - without making any great changes in your cooking methods - is to use whole-wheat flour in homemade baked goods that are usually made with white flour.

Your children will be fascinated with whole-wheat Pita bread, a sandwich idea from the Middle East. Each round has a pocket that forms during baking - just right for stuffing your youngster's favorite sandwich filling.

WHOLE-WHEAT PITA BREAD

4 cups stirred whole-wheat flour
2 packages active dry yeast
1/4 cup shortening
1 to 1 1/2 cup sifted flour (all purpose)
2 tablespoons brown sugar, packed
2 teaspoons salt
2 1/2 cups very warm water yellow cornmeal
*Stir together 3 cups of the whole wheat flour, brown sugar, yeast and salt in a bowl. Add shortening and very warm water. Beat until smooth, using electric mixer. Stir in remaining 1 cup whole-wheat flour and enough all-purpose flour to make a soft dough. Knead on floured surface until smooth, about 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl cover; let rise until doubled, about 30 minutes.
*Punch down dough; divide

into 12 pieces. Shape each into a ball. Cover; let rise 30 minutes.

*Sprinkle greased baking sheets with cornmeal. Roll out each ball to 6" circle, and place 3 circles of dough on each baking sheet. Cover; let rise 30 minutes.

*Bake in 475 degree oven 8-10 minutes or until lightly brown. To serve, cut pita bread in half crosswise. If pockets are not formed, slit with a knife. Makes 12 loaves.

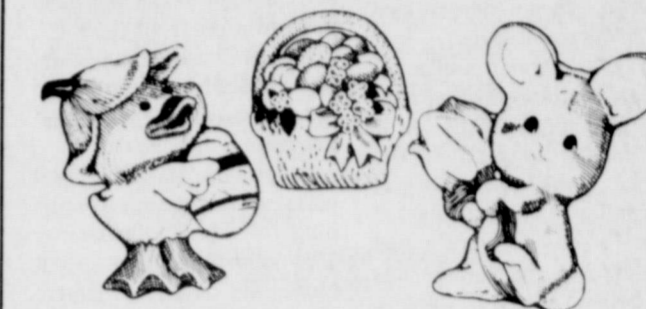

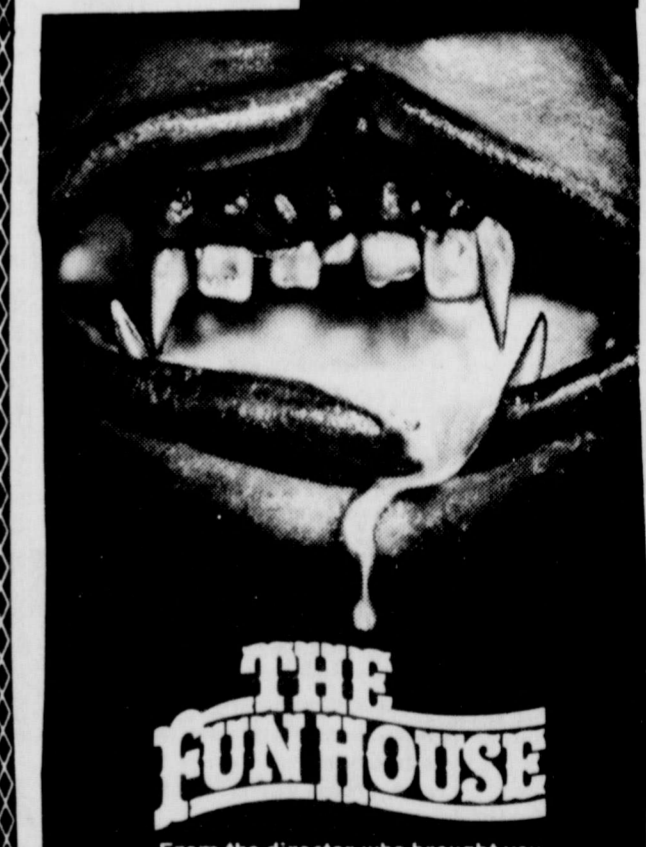

There are several bills pending in the legislature on which I would appreciate hearing your opinions.

The first is Senate Bill 880 by Brooks and is the drug substitute or "generic drug" bill. The measure would allow pharmacists in Texas to have the authority to substitute generically equivalent brand-name drugs prescribed by physi-

cians.

The bill would also provide that the physician could prohibit such substitution if he or she felt that there should be no substitution. This would be done by the physician noting on the prescription "dispense as written".

Before substituting the generic drug, the pharmacist must inform the customer of the change. Also, the pharmacist could

not charge a higher fee than he would customarily charge for the brand-name drug.

Texas is one of only two states that does not allow substitution by pharmacists of generics.

Proponents of the measure point out that the customer would have his prescription drug expenses substantially reduced.

Opponents of the bill raise the question of the quality of the generic drug that is being substituted. They argue that while the drug may have the same composition, it may not necessarily be of the same quality.

A second measure I would appreciate response on is the bill by Representative Willis to repeal the blue law.

As you know, Texans are presently prohibited from purchasing a large variety of items a retail establishment offers for sale on successive Saturdays and Sundays. This measure would repeal that law.

A bill that has been reported out of a Senate Committee deals with the granting United Parcel Service the right to make deliveries without specified routes and specified service areas when involved in intrastate deliveries. Presently, all freight carriers serve only particular areas and have designated routes, and they are regulated by the Railroad Commission.

This bill would exempt UPS from the Railroad Commission route requirements and allow them to serve any area in Texas.

There are several bills pending in the legislature amending or repealing the Property Tax Appraisal Board statutes. This statute is commonly known as the "Peveto" bill and was passed last session.

The bills range from basically a housekeeping measure by Senator Jones to a House bill by Representative Messer and others that would essentially repeal the act.

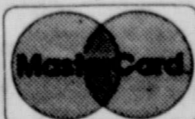

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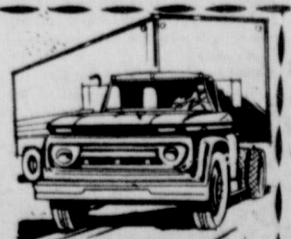
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IWU Reflections in Perspective

"Curse you, Red Baron!" We have all enjoyed sharing the fantasy of the comic strip beagle as he roars through the skies atop his dog house, pursuing the mythical "Red Baron". Except that, as the dog implies when he imagines himself "The World War One fighter pilot" the Red Baron was indeed a very real person.

Manfred Baron von Richthofen was the scourge of the skies over Flanders Fields during that war. Leading German ace, he was feared and respected...even admired by his adversaries. Mention of his name conjures up visions of propeller-driven single-place aircraft zooming, climbing, diving and turning in aerial dogfights in which the participants were seriously trying each to obliterate the other. It was not uncommon, when the encounter ended...in the case of a two-plane fight, with only a single survivor...for the victor to pay his respects to the fallen flyer with a slow "flyover" and a dip of the wings. Perhaps the air war in the skies above Flanders was the last theatre of war in which a shred of chivalry existed.

Manfred von Richthofen, feared and respected by friend and foe alike, and dubbed "Red Baron" by virtue of his penchant for flying a plane painted a vivid fire engine red was shot out of the skies and killed on 21 April 1918. It was never known how he met his death, but evidence indicates that he was shot down by ground fire from the Australian forces. His body, recovered from the wreck of his aeroplane was buried by the Australians, with full military honours.

A legendary character, the legend is kept alive in the humour of Snoopy, the comic strip beagle who apparently considers the "Red Baron" to be only a myth.

Taking advantage of our employer's policy of giving to us a vacation (when we could find the time to take it) annually with travel expenses to the States paid, we flew from Teheran to Bombay where we boarded the Peninsula and Orient liner "CATHAY" for a thirteen-day cruise to Hong Kong. With stops at Colombo, Penang, Port Swettenham and Singapore; it was a most pleasant journey.

Upon sailing from Singapore after a 24-hour stopover, there was an addition to the passenger list which was posted

on the ship's notice board. It read, simply, "The Family Richtofen" Now, I cannot recall offhand how I'd come to know it but seeing the name on the list reminded me that the Ambassador from West Germany to Singapore was a man of that distinguished name. A bit of investigation confirmed the fact.

On the second night out of Singapore the entire list of passengers aboard the Cathay was invited to attend "The Captain's Ball" in the main ballroom. We took a table against the wall on the port side of the ballroom, and had been seated for several minutes when a distinguished-looking couple appeared in the doorway. With the concurrence of My Lovely Wife I went across, introduced myself and invited them to share our table. They accepted the invitation, most graciously.

While MLW engaged the Ambassador in conversation I had a most pleasant visit with Lady Richtofen. Upon my having suggested that the name was not entirely unknown in America, and asking if there were any connection she replied, smiling, "Yes. My husband is the present "Red Baron". The barony passed to Manfred's brother when the Baron died in combat, and from the brother, who was my husband's father, to the Ambassador."

The Ambassador's correct name and title is Oswald, Baron von Richthofen. Not exactly a first name which one would associate with the derring-do of the legendary adversary of such people as the American ace, the late Captain Eddie Rickenbacker. Nor would Oswald's first love and devotion bring visions of a red aircraft roaring through the Belgian skies. Oswald, Baron von Richthofen is a farmer!

Oh, yes. The family land holdings are quite extensive, and the Baron is a very successful farmer...on a somewhat grand scale.

So, Carry on, Snoopy. The Red Baron is very real. Continue to fly your doghouse through the scattered clouds above Flanders Fields. But if you expect to engage the Baron in mortal combat it will have to be with ploughshares. Oswald is not associated in any way with flying, nor has he ever been, although he knew his uncle Manfred as a very small boy, and reverses him as do friends and foes alike. A little fantasy is good for the soul. And the Red Baron is a highly polished, gracious, courtly gentleman.

COLORS FOR NATURALS
For spring, natural fibers are featured in becoming corals and aquas, along with basic neutrals in khaki, white, black or navy. Soft pastels are a pleasing change from past seasons, along with an increased emphasis on prints.

NATURALS AS FABRICS
Fabric structures highlight the versatility of today's natural fibers. Choices range from sheers and lacy cotton knits to practical seersucker blends, silk-like shantung and linen suit weights.

NATURALS IN STYLE
Garment styles for spring and summer are softer and more feminine. Split and fuller skirts fall at mid-knee or just below. Blouses and double-breasted jackets, tiered skirts and long-waisted dresses are among featured details.

PLAN PURCHASES

Whether you're buying or sewing natural fibers, plan your purchases carefully. Mrs. Saunders recommends.

Start by evaluating last season's wardrobe. First get rid of unwearables and then determine what you need - base these decisions on what voids exist in your wardrobe.

Select the best quality fabric and garment you can afford.

Don't be misled by bargains or sales. Consider if the term is appealing enough to buy at full price.

In readymades, check the inner construction for a symmetrical and attractive outward appearance.

Also, check labels to determine ease and expense of care - along with the perfor-

mance features of various finishes.

CHOOSING STYLES, FABRICS

Select flattering styles and fabrics that feel and look terrific. If in doubt about a purchase, don't. Doubts often become disliked, seldom- or never-worn garments.

FIGURE COST-PER-WEARING

Here's one way to justify a new purchase: figure the cost per wearing. Just divide the total cost by the number of times you will wear the garment - the more times you wear it and enjoy it, the more times it's justified and the more times you will be glad you selected it.

SEWING NATURALS

Homesevers trying a new fabric for the first time ask, "How do you sew cotton...or wool...or linen?"

Answers are determined by the characteristics of the different fabrics, such as sheer or napped. Answers

also depend on style of the garment, such as flared or tailored.

You can use a variety of today's quick-and-easy - but professional-looking techniques, and it's a good idea to become familiar with as many as possible.

However, for the best results, pay special attention to three factors:

- 1) your own sewing skills,
- 2) your personal preferences, and
- 3) making sure your fabric choice is compatible with the garment design.

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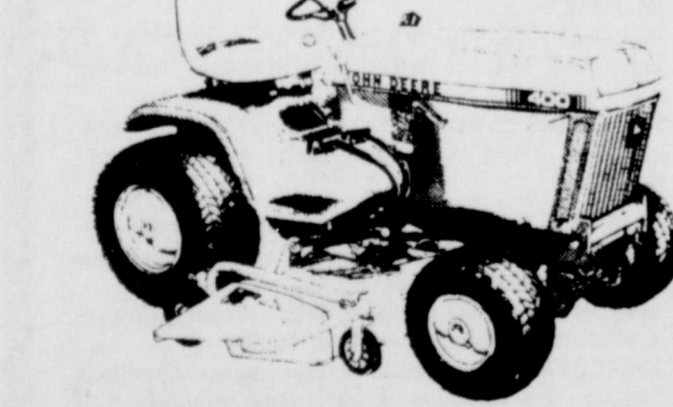

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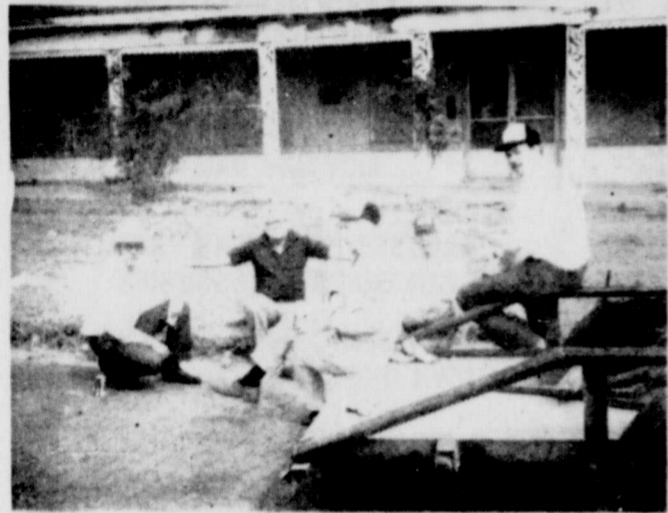


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Little League Season to Begin This Weekend

IN A BOX of discarded papers and things, Dr. Chief Brown of our town came across an interesting item - a copy of The Cisco Roundup dated Dec. 22, 1916 - nearly 65 years ago. It was the Christmas edition and the front page contained a quarter page greeting to express all good wishes for the holiday season.

Also on the front page, a two column wide ad extolled the Edison Diamond Disc Phonograph on display at the Red Front Drug, W.W. Moore, prop. "See and hear this wonderful machine," the ad said.

Another front page ad heralded the 1917 Model Dort Automobile on display at Huey Motor Co. A special in the ad noted: "For Sale - Case 30, 1915 model, has been overhauled and painted, in fine mechanical condition. Original cost \$1350. Will take less than half the cost."

Front page stories included an item about a youth who

had bled to death after accidentally shooting himself while hunting in the Lake Bernie area. He was 15 years old. . . . Another story told about W.L. Butler of the Ballard community having an accident en route to town. He was bringing three head of cattle in his wagon when an auto passed him, frightening the horses. The wagon was overturned.

Said another item: "On Monday evening, Dec. 18, Mr. and Mrs. H.L. Winchell, assisted by the Aid of the Presbyterian Church, entertained the members of the church in honor of the wedding anniversary of three church elders - Capt. and Mrs. T.W. Neal, who began life together 48 years ago and are still useful and happy; Mr. and Mrs. Gus Ward, who have lived peacefully and unselfishly for 31 years; and Dr. and Mrs. W.P. Lee, who for 26 years have been curing the physical and mental ills around town."

Rominger Hardware and C.B. Powell Tailor Shop.

Letters to Santa Claus were signed by Bertha Helen Triplett, Jewel Thompson, Opal Warren, Roscoe Milling, Orlena Vleek Milling, Jack Abbott, T.L. Lasater, Jr., and Glenn Roberts . . . J.A. Jensen Jeweler had a nice ad . . . Arid O.C. Britton advertised pigs for sale . . . "Get the John Deere Stag Sulky from E.C. McDonald. It has the one-bolt point," said another: want-ad. Mr. McDonald also urged in another ad: "Don't forget to look at the Fort Smith wagon when you need a new wagon" and "Get your lard cans from E.C. McDonald."

CUSTOMER NOTIFICATION OF HIGH TURBIDITY

Dear Customer: The City of Cisco during the month of February supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the

"Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US) for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU)

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, or (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any further date. This notification of the public is in compliance with the Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act" as a means of keeping the public informed.
