A.E. McNeeley Builds Telegraph for Festival

A.E. McNeeley, a local senior citizen, built the telegraph which is in operation this weekend at the Folk Life Festival being held in the Agriculture building of Cisco Junior College.

Mr. McNeeley operated a telegraph for 50 years and two days while he worked for the railroad in Texas. He worked in Waco, Stamford and DeLeon. He became a regular operator in 1916.

"Back then you did everything," according to Mr. McNeeley. He operated the telegraph, sold tickets, loaded freight and was the brakeman. He said the only man with just one job was the engineer. He also said everyone had to take exams about every two years.

On June 6, 1907, Mr. McNeeley said a bathtub and fixtures were shipped on the Texas Central Railroad Company from Dublin to Cisco to Big Springs for 25 cents. He said in the late 1890's and early 1900's "you could ship most anything for 25 cents."

He married a Gorman girl and moved to Cisco in May of 1941.

In the past, Mr. McNeeley has taught the International Morris Code; played the violin in the background while Ernest Tubbs sang and played the guitar in Glen Rose, Texas, while the picture

show reels were being changed; and he played with the late Ray Judia, a well-known musician of this area.

A live oak tree was dedicated to the memory of the late Milton Humphreys, long-time member of the faculty at Cisco Junior College who died April 22, 1980, as a highlight Wednesday of annual Ranch Day activities at the CJC campus.

A suitable bronze marker was unveiled by Mrs. Humphreys as a climax of the ceremonies. Fred Mullinax, president of the CJC Faculty Association, sponsors of the program, served as master of ceremonies. He read a letter from Lady Bird Johnson, who had been invited to attend the program. She is a family friend as the late Mr. Humphreys served at one time on the White House public relations staff of former President Lyndon Johnson.

The plaque noted that Mr. Humphreys was loved by students and faculty as a man with "genuine warmth that enriched the lives of all who knew him."

C.W. (Whitey) Davidson, retired Navy chief petty officer who described himself as CJC's oldest student, read an original poem in tribute to Mr. Humphreys. Mr. Davidson said the late teacher encouraged him to attend CJC, and he will graduate next month.

A prayer by Gary Adams, head of the Church of Christ Bible Chair at CJC, opened the program, and the dedicatory prayer was given by Rev. Stephen Wheeler, Pentecostal church minister.

IWU Reflections in Perspective

Approximately seventy five percent of the world's commercial date production is in that wedge-shaped strip along the western bank of the Shatt al Arab below Basra, Iraq. It is interesting to note the familiar brand names of American firms on the sheds and warehouses where the harvest is tallied.

In meeting up with a nomadic Bedouin in the heart of the desert, one is likely to be offered a feast of dry roast mutton...and dates. High in natural sugars and in protein, it is a staple of the diet of the majority of the people in the middle East.

For export to nearby countries the dates are cleaned and compressed into brick-like blocks and then packed into wooden crates which are wrapped in burlap. In the sun-drenched ports along the Arabian and Iranian coasts, the advent of the date harvest season is heralded by the swarms of flies which seem to follow the dhows which deliver their surgary cargo in the early autumn or late summer.

Another harbinger of the approaching date harvest in Iraq is that of the arrival of the "East Indian Date Fleet". Usually in mid- to late August the "fleet" begins to glide quietly into the Shatt al Arab where they lie in anchor until the passing of the monsoon season in October or early November.

Arriving under minimum ballast, only enough to provide rudder control of the stately sailing vessels, they present a lovely sight. The majority of them are constructed along similar lines. They are nothing more than immense dhows. Built of teak, and many of them three-masted and "square-rigged", their being anchored in line along the bank of the river gives one the impression that they sailed right out of the seventeenth century. High in the bow, with a very wide sweep of the hull from the prow to mid-ship, and with even a higher stern where all the cabins are situated, and with all brass polished to mirror brilliance; they present an almost majestic appearance.

In late October I had the privilege of witnessing "The sailing of the East Indian Date Fleet". The vessels had very quietly slipped their moorings during the earlier part of the month and had, two by two sailed up-river to Basra for their cargo, returning to anchor again in anticipation of "the sailing". They had anchored considerably up-river from Fao.

It was late afternoon - almost sundown. Sitting with an engineer of the Oil Company on the low levee which pro-

tected the Company's Staff Camp and offices, I was enjoying the drop of a few degrees in the temperature. And the very slight breeze from the northwest. We caught a view of the fleet coming slowly 'round the bend in the river. Each vessel, and there was least fifty of them, was under full sail. And a more majestic sight it has never been under my pleasure to observe. In total silence, and with every shred of canvas set to the breeze the fleet, like a line of stately ladies glided downriver, into the Gulf, and finally over the horizon. Many of the topsails...and not a few of the vessels sports three masts...were coloured a pale blue, pink or green. And in the silence, we almost expected at any moment to see ship's gun appear at the ports along the upper deck.

The East Indian Date Fleet had taken its cargo, and had departed. As silently and unobtrusively as they had arrived, they'd gone. They would not return for a year, but they would return. They have done so for more than a hundred years. And some of these stately ladies of the Fleet appeared to have been in the inaugural voyage more than a hundred years ago.

Eastland County Wildcats Set

CJS Energy Co., Brownwood, will drill No. 1 Jessie Bilbreds as an Eastland County wildcat five miles west of Cisco.

The planned 4,250 foot venture is located on a 127-acre lease.

It spots 2,900 feet from the north and 1,020 feet from the west lines of Section 7, Block 2, BBB&C Survey.

Rodman Petroleum Corp., Odessa, No. 1 Talley is a planned 3,600-foot wildcat for the area two miles northwest of Ranger.

Location is on a 60-acre lease, spotting 660 feet from the south and 3,730 feet from the east lines of John P. Rohus Heirs Survey, A-415.

Southeastern Resources Corp., Rising Star, No. 1 Kincaid is a planned 4,100 foot wildcat.

It will be drilled eight miles northeast of Cisco on an 80-acre lease.

Drillsite is 2,444 feet from the south and 1,405 feet from the east lines of Section 51, H&TC Survey.

Same firm will reenter to 3,500 feet No. 1 Mitchell, abandoned wildcat eight miles north of Rising Star.

Location is on a 95-acre

lease, spotting 1,100 feet from the south and 467 feet from the east lines of Lot 11, Thomas Fennell Survey, A-137.

The project was plugged March 17 as World Producers Inc. No. 1 Mitchell.

Four-R Oil Co., Cisco, staked two wildcats six miles west of Cisco on the Estelle Aycock 92-acre lease.

Each test has a proposed depth of 500 feet.

No. 1 Aycock spots 150 feet from the south and 650 feet from the west lines of D.W. Bint Survey, A-915.

No. 2 Aycock will be drilled 1,200 feet from the west lines of the same survey.

Kahan Energy Corp., Cisco, filed application to deepen to 3,800 feet, wildcat depth, at a project two miles north of Eastland.

It is No. 1 Carroll, located on a 205-acre lease.

Drillsite is 2,173 feet from the south and 467 feet from the east lines of Section 14, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

The well was completed on May 18, 1978, by the same firm from perforations at 3,868-94 feet. Old total depth is 3,740 feet.

C.B. Hazel, Inc., Ranger, will reenter, to 1,500 feet No. 1 F.L. Johnson abandoned wildcat four miles south of Eastland.

Location is on a 350-acre lease, spotting 1,252 feet from the south and 1,810 feet from the west lines of W. Mitchell Survey, A-382.

It was originally drilled as Rickles & Corbett No. 1-B F.L. Johnson.

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Homemaker's Tips

The gardens and home fruit orchards look beautiful around the county. The prospects for a good fruit crop looks very promising.

Drying of vegetables and fruits is returning in popularity. If you are thinking about buying a food dehydrator, you might like to try drying in the conventional oven or sun first to see if your family likes the taste of dried foods. Food dehydrators can be a very expensive purchase, so read the use and care instructions with several models to compare times. Consider the cost of operation, and the frequency of use.

Drying foods can save money and time.

Drying is one of the less exact methods of preserving foods because the way that you do it depends on the climate where you live and the equipment you have at hand. Drying practices have changed little through the years - nearly everyone can dry some food at home - and, at little, or no energy cost.

You've never dried any foods? No problem. Begin with herbs and fruits, and you can soon dry onions, celery leaves, dill weed, parsley, green pepper, zucchini, green beans, apples and sweet potatoes. These foods can be oven dried - often immediately after the oven has been used for baking.

Many homemakers feel that home dried foods are superior in flavor and color to similar bought foods. One of the "secrets" might be that you're working with small amounts of fresh food - and you plan for relatively short storage periods (of 6 months to a year).

Features of Dried Foods. One of the joys of dried foods is convenience. Their storage requires little space and it is simple to reach for the container on the shelf when 2 spoonful of chopped onion or green pepper is needed for a sauce or casserole. Another important feature of dried foods is that they are safe to use, Dr. Johnson comments. They retain their quality for many months - IF you remember to fasten jar lids tightly in

place. Remember - don't ever put a wet spoon into your dried food - or you'll defeat your purpose.

The high caloric and nutritive values of dried fruits may best be understood if you realize that it takes 5 1/2 pounds of fresh apricots to yield one pound when dried. Eighteen medium apples weighing about 6 pounds dries out to about 1 pound...so dried fruits go a long way.

Some dried food specialties are very popular - fruit leathers, beef jerky, or salmon jerky. Often making "fruit leathers" is a good way to use overripe fruit by pureeing it, adding sugar (if it is orange or pineapple) pouring onto a sheet or tray and allowing it to dry. Sun drying takes two or three days, depending on the temperature and humidity. Just test for doneness. Beef or salmon jerky is made by slicing into strips and adding salt (to fish) and seasoning to beef. It may be prepared by either sun or oven drying.

It is important to remember that drying is not the total answer to all food preservation just because it sounds easy. There are trade-offs. Natural vitamin C is lost during the drying process, but since Americans do not rely on dried foods for vitamin C in their diet this should not be a problem.

The proper packaging and storage of dehydrated foods is extremely important. If not carefully packaged all your efforts will be in vain. Dehydrated foods are usually free from insects when removed from dehydrator or oven. Sun dried foods could be contaminated and should be packaged and placed in the home freezer for 48 hours to kill any possible insects or their eggs. All dried foods should be packaged as soon as they are cool into dry, scalded, insect-proof containers...or in plastic bags, tightly sealed. The containers should immediately be stored in a dry, cool, and dark place.

Don't forget - rehydration is necessary before using dried foods. For fruits and

some vegetables, it may take up to 2 hours.

to eat...that would be poor use of family money and time.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Hasty Fruit Cobbler
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 cups fruit and juice
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup milk or cream
Mix flour, sugar, baking powder and milk or cream. Dot a baking pan with butter or margarine. Pour mixture into pan. Pour some juicy fruit on top of the batter such as canned berries, cherries, peaches or pineapple. Fresh stewed fruit may be used. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

Local Peanut Raisers Want Program Extended

Eastland County peanut raisers have joined others in the nation in asking that the present peanut program be extended.

The banks in the county have been urging citizens to

contact their representatives urging that the program be continued.

Here's an example, written by Cindy Carlton, and containing the basic facts. It has been used as a model, expanded upon or modified to get the important message across.

"I'm writing to let you know how the peanut farmers in the Southwest feel about the peanut program. We feel it will be very harmful to the farmers and the consumers if the program is done away with. The peanut program has been working better than they ever believed it would when they put it into effect. Why, mess up something that works?"

"We want to know what we can do to see that the program is not deleted. Please let us hear from you soon, because we do not intend to set still and quiet while our livelihood is being taken away from us."

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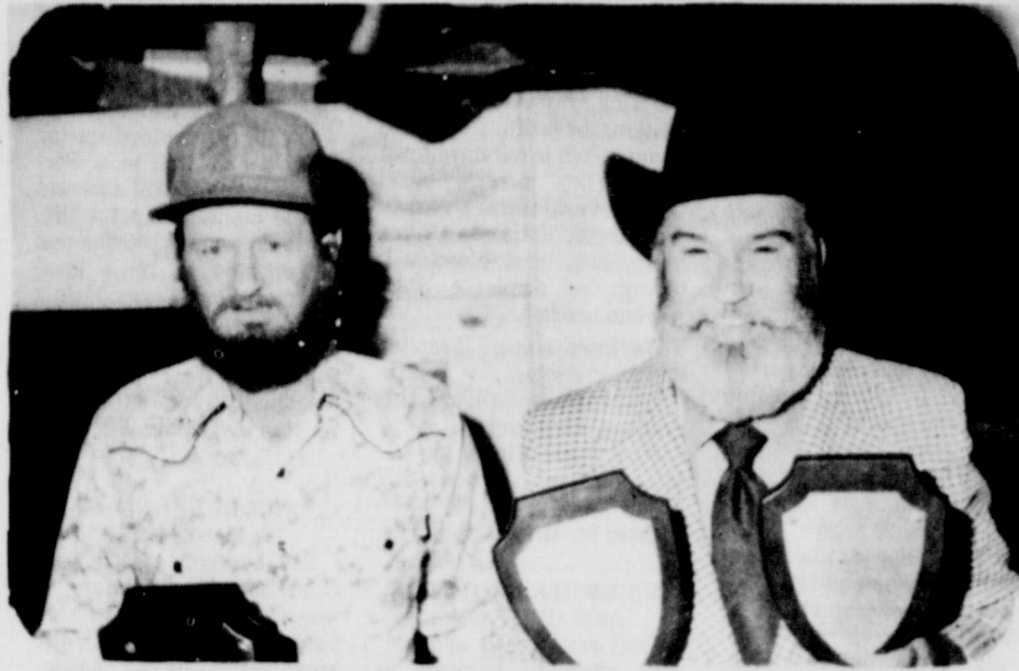

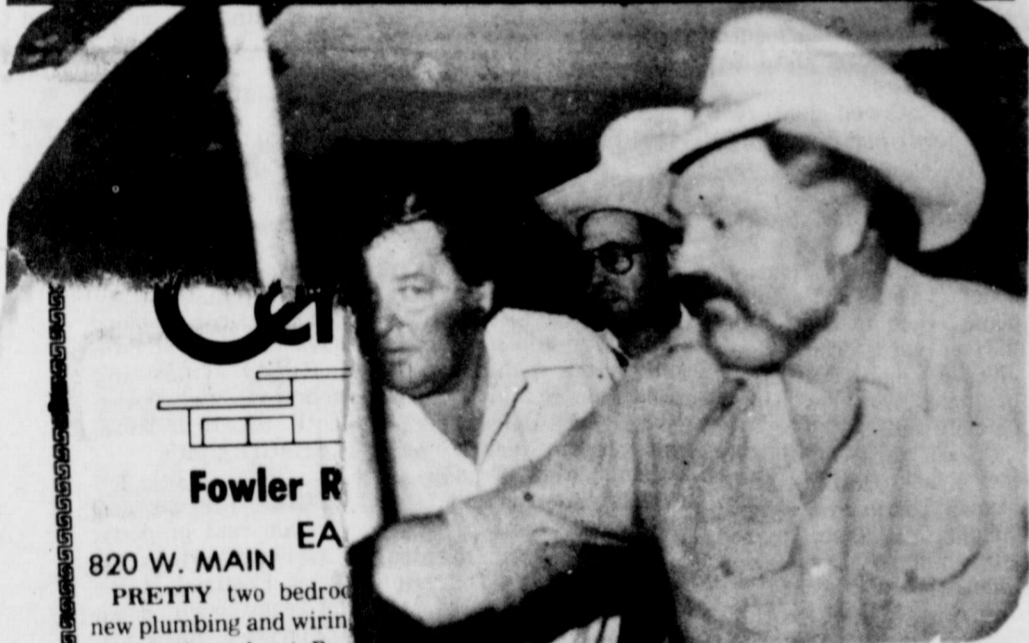

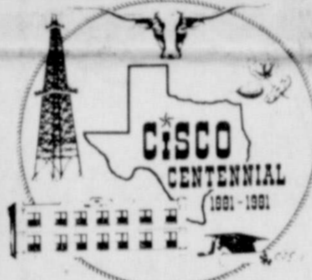

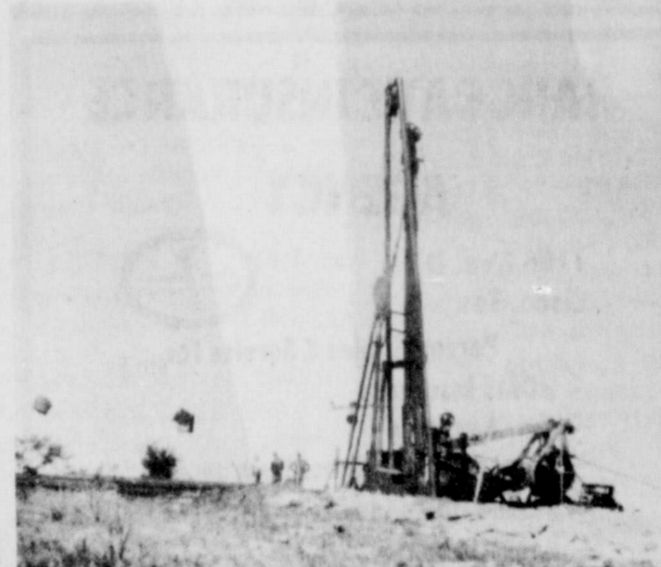

CISCO CENTENNIAL: 1881-1981

Located about three miles north of Cisco lies what was once known as the world's largest swimming pool. The pool was a non-filtered pool. The pool went from two to five feet, then came over the bridge and went to twenty feet.

The area around there was really one great big recreation hall for people of all ages. There was a miniature golf course, a huge roller-skating rink, and another famous thing was the zoo. There was also a huge park which had a bandstand which nearly always had some band playing there.

One of the most fascinating things that happened there was the Fourth of July celebration. People would come down from neighboring towns to stay all day; and that night, watch the fireworks being fired.

The pool was owned by the American Legion, but was operated by Mr. E.L. Jackson; and there was really no trouble operating it when it wasn't filtered and was only changed twice a year, and that means once in summer and once in winter. But for some reason, the pool was sold to a local citizen of Cisco. But the City of Cisco decided that they needed to increase the revenue, deciding to charge a fee for the water being put into the pool; which before, the water was free. So, instead of paying for the water and getting a filtration system put in, he closed it down. So eventually, everything else was closed down, also. Everything is still here, but there is nothing fun down there because of it.

town was moved and built along the railroad. The early ways of travel were by horse, buggy, and railroad. The farmers would bring in fresh vegetables, fruits, eggs, milk and butter into town to trade. The people of our town were very efficient in providing their own means of support.

The early churches in Cisco played a major part of history in giving people fellowship and blessings and the personal strength to go on with their lives.

Mr. W.B. Starr of Cisco was the person who perfected the famous Starr Spanish Peanut, and it is still grown in several states at the present time.

My grandmother, Mrs. M.D. Bailey, who is ninety-two years old, lived in the country outside Cisco and can remember the dark black cloud that has become known as the Cisco Cyclone that occurred on April 19, 1893. Her mother and father saw the storm coming, and they took the family to the cellar; and the next morning when the mail carrier came by their house, he stopped and told them that Cisco had almost been wiped out by a storm. Her father brought his wagon and team in Cisco to offer help to those in need.

If you should look in the weather history records, you will notice that Cisco, Texas, has the first recorded cyclone to hit a populated city or town in North America.

Our town has continued to grow and so has the oil production. It is now one of the leading oil producing areas of our country.

Our town for many years had the largest swimming pool in the United States and plans are being discussed to restore the beautiful park area.

We have a great college, Cisco Junior College, that is famous throughout for its Wrangler Belles.

Our town has the greatest civic clubs that could be found anywhere in the world.

They have worked to beautify our fair town by planting trees, making and hanging beautiful flower arrangements in our downtown area. They have a blood drive several times a year to assure the citizens of our community that blood will always be available when anyone needs it.

We have a good hospital and good doctors.

ROCKWELL BROTHERS AND COMPANY

Rockwell Bros. and Co. was officially founded in 1902. The man that started the chain was James Martin Rockwell. He went to work in the lumber business in 1882 for M.T. Jones at Jones lumber yard when he was nineteen.

There was at one time yards in Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas. In 1978 yards were in Albany, Big Spring, Breckenridge, Cisco, Coleman, Colorado City, Friona, Hamlin, Hereford, Lueders, Plainview, Rotan and Portales, N.M. The company's main office is in Houston.

Henry Martin Rockwell, son of the founder, was a president of the company until his death in 1978, and was active in the philanthropic endeavors of the Rockwell Foundation. W.A. Russell is executive vice president. The Rockwell Bros. & Co. buildings are recognized in any town by the "Rockwell Orange" paint. Mr. Reese says he can remember the orange paint since 1911.

In the 1890's, Henry Rockwell, Sr., purchased the yard here in Cisco and many others. The first yard that was purchased was Cisco, then six months later, Albany's yard was purchased. At the height of his business career, he had purchased thirteen yards.

Cisco was, at one time, the head office for all the yards. The original land the yard sits on was purchased from T&P Railroad. The tracks used to go directly into the yard where the office loaded carloads of lumber and other merchandise.

Mr. Rockwell had two sons, Cecil and Henry Jr., Cecil was not a business-minded man, so Henry took control after his father's death.

They moved to Houston, bought a home and set up a home office to control the thirteen yards. They wisely invested money in many business ventures which paid off well.

Cisco's yard was run by Mr. Frank Harrell for 37 years. There are several buildings in Cisco named after him such as Harrell Fine Arts Building at Cisco Junior College. Also, Rockwell Bros., via Mr. Harrell, sold the cement for the dam, once considered as the largest hollow dam in the world and also considered an engineering wonder.

The main things they sold at the yard were paint and lumber.

In the late 1800's, John J. Cisco, passed the loan for the railroad to come through Red Gap, Texas. In his honor they changed the town's name to Cisco. The railroad was used to carry millions of bones out of Cisco. Buffalo, cattle and sheep bones were mainly what they carried out. There were about three rail cars full of bones carried out each haul.

There were many interesting moments in Cisco's history; but one of the most well known is that of the cyclone that came to Cisco, Friday, April 28, 1893. There were many incidents that occurred before the cyclone hit. One of the many incidents was that of a man who said the old master told him something bad was going to happen Friday. Twenty-eight people were killed in the cyclone.

Another famous moment in Cisco's history was that of the Santa Claus bank robbery. The bandit came in the bank dressed in a Santa Claus costume and took two children hostage. Later the man was hung on a telephone pole behind the Eastland theater. There

were several bandits involved. The Santa Claus bandit's name was Marshal Ratliff. The other bandits involved were Robert Hill, Henry Helms, Louis Davis. Davis was fatally wounded during gunfire and died in a Fort Worth hospital. Hill was sent to the penitentiary for life. He later won his pardon and is reported to be a good citizen of West Texas. Helms was executed in the Texas penitentiary.

THE E.L. GRAHAM MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

In 1920, during the oil boom, Humble had about 3,000 employees living and working in Cisco. They built a small hospital in "Humble Town," on East 21st Street; and Dr. Emmett L. Graham, a young physician and surgeon who had come to Cisco in 1919 and married a local girl, Nova Shelton, was made chief physician.

The hospital was remodeled and modernized again by Dr. Graham in 1943; it served the people of Cisco for some fifty years.

Shortly after I was born, April 26, 1969, the people of Cisco built a new, 35-bed hospital and named it the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, after the doctor who had worked so diligently for so many years. My daddy, James E. Smothers, was the secretary of the Hospital Board when the new hospital was built on Highway 80 West. He died just one week after the new hospital was formally dedicated.

Important Crime Bill Soon To Be Law

A House sponsored by Senator Bob Glasgow in the Senate has just passed the Senate and is on the way to the Governor's desk to be signed. This bill would close a loop-hole in the aggravated rape and aggravated sexual abuse statutes.

"This bill is in response to an aggravated rape case that was overturned by the

Court of Criminal Appeals even though the victim was severely injured in the attack," stated Senator Bob Glasgow.

The case the Senator referred to was the State v. Rucker case in which the Appeals Court stated that the injury of the victim, although severe, did not meet the definition of serious bodily injury that would constitute aggravated rape.

During the floor debate, Senator Glasgow stated that

Lloyd London Tells Rotary Of Three Growing Businesses

Growth of three Cisco-based companies from small beginnings into enterprises of world-wide aspect with royalty and mineral interests, principally of oil and gas, involving many millions of dollars, was sketched for the Cisco Rotary Club Thursday noon by Lloyd London, who recently left the presidency of a Conifer, Colo., bank to become associated with Robert Kamon in the operation of the Golden Triangle Royalty and Oil, Inc., one of the three co-existent firms. The other two are the International Royalty and The Black Giant.

London, who formerly headed the trust department of the First National Bank in Cisco, spent more than a year in the rarefied atmosphere of a Colorado mountain community near Denver, before yielding to the attraction of an oil business career whose scope and opportunities he finds much more challenging. His duties are concerned principally with the financial and investment phases of the company's operation.

He still retains his interests and directorships with the Conifer, Colo., bank and a sister bank at nearby Bailey. The banks are located high in the mountains not far from Denver, in unincorporated communities governed by the county. The character of the communities - neither rural nor urban in the accepted local sense - corresponds to wealthy suburban estates of

not less than one-acre building sites, scattered over a high mountain valley, each providing its own water and sewage disposal systems.

Control of the Cisco-located companies was acquired a few years ago by Robert Kamon, son and successor to a long-time Cisco oil man who pioneered significant Eastland County oil and gas operations, and whose firm belief in the deeper oil prospects of this area is being realized in current and growing discoveries.

Golden Triangle's operations, London explained, are two-fold - domestic and foreign. Its activities abroad are located principally in Australia among areas of new and substantial production developing in Queensland province. The firm has also acquired big areas for exploitation in Honduras.

Its domestic operations, also considerable, are located in Texas - some in Eastland County - Kansas, Kentucky and Louisiana.

Stock of the company, which in March 1979 sold at two cents per share, has now increased in value to more than \$3.00 in recent transactions, and is listed daily in the Wall Street Journal's over-the-counter quotations.

The Golden Triangle's stockholder letter of February 27, 1981, lists "issued and outstanding shares" of 13,132,733, of which four million are "trading shares".

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Subterranean Termites

Recently our office was called upon to investigate the appearance of a large number of winged, black insects. They were found to be a swarm of Termites reports Gordon Woolam, Extension Agent - Pest Management. Subterranean or Ground-Nesting Termites are by far the most important destructive insect pests of wood.

Termites are found throughout the United States, but are most active and destructive in the temperate parts of the country. Termite damage results in millions of dollars spent on control measures and repairs each year.

Subterranean Termites are social insects that live in colonies or nests in the ground. Each colony is composed of three forms - Reproductives, Workers and Soldiers.

It is the Reproductive or winged forms which are most commonly encountered by the Homeowner. This is often the first indication of a Termite colony. Flights or

swarms of the winged Termites occur most frequently after the first warm days of spring, often following a warm rain. However, they may occur at any time during the Spring or Summer.

These winged Reproductives are formed in well developed colonies. The winged forms mate and return to the soil to find a suitable site for establishing a new colony. Most of these perish, but some pairs do survive to begin new colonies.

Most Termite infestations in buildings occur because wood touches or is close to the ground, particularly at porches, steps or terraces. Cracks or voids in foundations and concrete floors make it easy for Termites to reach wood that does not actually touch the soil.

The primary form of control is prevention. Prevention begins at the building site. All stumps and wood debris should be removed before and during construction. Burying such material

will only contribute to Termite infestation. Other preventative control measures include chemical soil treatment prior to construction, proper construction techniques to avoid contact of wooden materials with the soil and proper ventilation beneath buildings.

However, for most Homeowners it is too late for preconstruction prevention. Ridding existing structures of Termite infestations is a major problem in Termite control. The major principle of preventing Termite infestation in existing structures is the same as that in pre-construction - eliminate conditions which permit the passage of Termite from soil to the woodwork of the building.

Buildings should be periodically inspected for evidence of Termite attack. This is a good practice and should be done regardless of how completely preventive measures were employed during construction. Sanitation practices such as removal of all wooden materials from underneath and adjacent to buildings and filling cracks and expansion joints in concrete with cement grout.

There are a limited number of chemicals available to the Homeowner for controlling Termites. However, because of the complexity of application and need for thorough application, it is advisable to obtain the services of a commercial applicator. It is important to hire a reputable applicator, who offers a warranty with his service. For additional information, contact the County Extension Office.

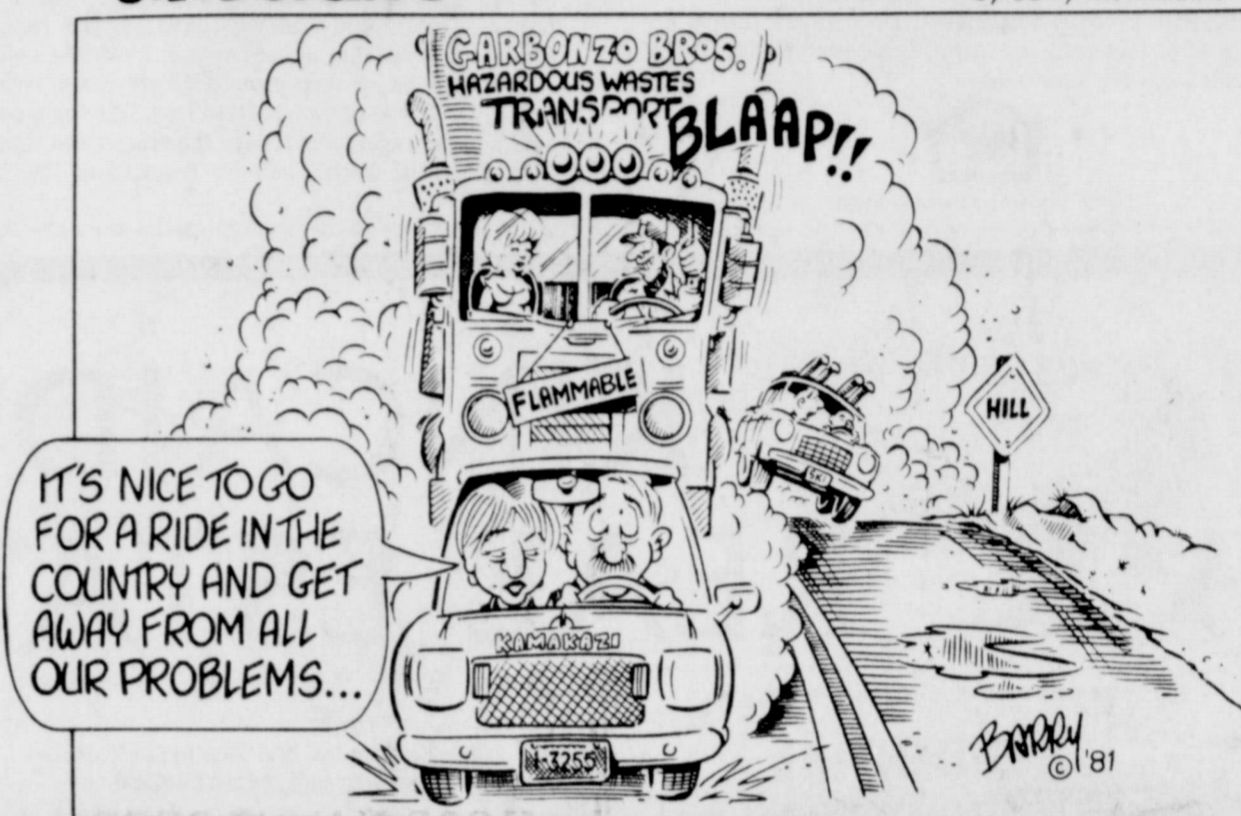

Catfish & Minnows to be delivered May 5

Persons that have ordered Channel catfish and minnows this Spring from the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District can expect delivery Tuesday, May 5th, if they placed their order in Eastland.

Delivery will be made to the Eastland Football Field parking lot on Highway 80, beginning at 2:30 p.m. Postal cards with more specific times will be mailed to those

having placed advanced orders.

The only container needed is a large cardboard box, etc. to place the plastic oxygenated bag into. The purpose of the container is to protect the bag from sunlight, punctures, and sudden shock. A large cooler works well for this purpose. The bags will be about 30 inches long and should be transported laying down, not standing on end.

The fish can be expected to live for several hours in the bags, depending upon the temperature. It will be necessary to "temper" the fish with pond water before releasing into the pond. To do this, simply dip small amounts of pond water into the bag until it is full. Then tip the bag over into the pond in about 1 foot of water and allow the fish to swim out, or pour gently, into the water.

Kendrick Easter Pageant Honored By AP Story

Across the nation on Easter Sunday, the Associated Press had an excellent article about the Kendrick Easter Pageant and Religious Museum. Webb City School Superintendent Ron Barton, a former Eastland resident, sent this clipping from the Joplin (Mo.) newspaper:

In 1964, the Kendrick family sold its 30,000 chickens and founded the Kendrick Family Easter Pageant, where amateur actors portray the life of Christ on an outdoor stage that is longer

than a football field. But the Kendricks didn't stop there.

The stage is next to "Texas' Only All Religious Diorama and Museum," featuring scenes from the Old and New Testaments. That building is in front of the future site of a life-sized Noah's Ark. The ark will be near the future Tower of Babel, a short distance from where a cafeteria will be built in the shape of a star and feature "Christian" food.

"It's all controlled by the

man upstairs," said Phil "Shorty" Kendrick, 46, who says the Lord came to him 16 years ago while he was driving an egg truck and told him to turn the 100-acre chicken farm into an enormous stage for an Easter pageant.

He told his parents about the vision, and they agreed to convert the farm, just east of Abilene in North Central Texas.

The pageant begins at 3:30 a.m. and ends at sunrise Easter morning.

Some people even find their way to Jesus at the pageant," said Phyllis "Mom" Kendrick, Kendrick's mother. J.H. "Pop" Kendrick, who died last July, is entombed aboveground in front of the 16,500-square-foot building housing the diorama.

"It excites me to do this part," said Kent Bridges, a

20-year-old college student who will play Christ this year. "I try to live as best a Christian life as I can. It gives me a spiritual blessing. I think it helps others."

People from every state and eight foreign countries have filled the guest books with glowing comments, and Texas Monthly magazine called the pageant the best outdoor show in the state.

In fact, Kendrick said, only one negative comment ever was entered in the books, and "that was obviously from a devil worshiper. You could tell by the wording."

The size of the crowd comes to the play varies with the weather, the price of gasoline and the mood of the times, but the average is about 10,000.

The Kendricks take an offering but charge no admission. They sell concessions to

those who arrive the night before to sleep in front of the stage.

The 400-foot stage features a miniature River Jordan and has 10 sets and special lighting effects.

"Some say this is sacrilegious," said Kendrick. "But this does to religion what television did to radio. What difference is there between a preacher standing up and preaching and us preaching this way?"

Eventually, the family wants to expand into a religious theme park in which visitors would move by boat among different attractions through a model of the floating garden of Babylon. The park would feature the Tower of Babel.

"Every amusement park has to have a sight-seeing tower," he said.

The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria:

(1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU)

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, or (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any further date.

This notification of the public is in compliance with the Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act" as a means of keeping the public informed.
