91st Court Due To Study Cisco Case This Week

Judge Jim Wright's 91st District Court was expected to consider the case of Roy Cartee and Louise Allison vs. the City of Cisco's election judge and city secretary this week after plaintiff's attorney filed an amended petition Monday.

The petition as amended simply updated the suit that was filed prior to the April 4th election, attorneys reported. The suit questioned the legality of the citizens' petition that resulted in the recall election and asked for an injunction to prevent the election. The court ruled that it was without authority to interfere in elections. The suit also asked for damages. City Attorney Wm. B. Wright, Jr., filed a general denial of all allegations last week, and Attorney James P. Farrar of Eastland filed the amended petition Monday. The court was expected to consider the case this

Offset Peanut Planting Costs

STEPHENVILLE-Due to the increased cost of planting seed, peanut growers need to give particular attention to identifying optimum planting rates as well as evaluating skip-row plan-

"Many peanut growers are concerned about the high cost of planting seed," points out Dr. Ashley Lovell, area economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Planting seed prices at \$1.25 per pound represents 20 percent of the projected total cost of production per acre, assuming a

45-pound per acre planting rate for dryland Spanish

peanuts. That's double the percentage cost for seed last

With these high seed costs, Lovell encourages growers to take a hard look at "traditional" planting rates to determine of optimum yields could be achieved through adjusting planting rates. "For instance, if 45 pounds of seed per acre is sufficient for optimum drylands yields, then planting the traditional 60 to 70 pounds is economically indefensible," notes the economist. However, the final decision must include numerous factors, such as germination, which determine the stand of mature peanut plants.

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



When the Branch Manager of the bank with which we were to do our banking in Teheran asked if I were a hunter, I was delighted. No one asks that question, normally, unless he too is devoted to the sport. And Abusaidi was indeed a dedicated

Shortly after having discovered our mutual interest, Abusaidi asked if I were free to spend a coule of days "in the mountains" in quest of chukkar partridge. I would be so, and he set the date. We'd travel in his Jeep, along with two other men of the Nimrod persuasion. We would travel to the village of Bivarzan, get in some afternoon shooting, pitch a tent in a high valley and have all the following day for hunting. Sound-

Now Bivarzan is something else. And it has an interesting history. The village is situated high on a plateau which appears to provide a footing for a range of mountains which rise to an altitude of more than ten thousand feet. The village itself rests at about six thousand.

Located right at the very edge of an almost sheer cliff, the mosque of the village overlooks a narrow valley which could almost be described as a wide canyon. Through the floor of the valley flows a narrow stream. The view from alongside the mosque is spectacular.

One somber note arises as one enjoys the view of the high mountains towering above the valley on the other side. At the foot of a cliff which rises sheer for almost 4,000 feet lies an immense pile of rubble. That was caused by an earthquake some 400 years ago, and underneath the thousands of tons of stone rests what was once the village of Bivarzan. The few survivors of the earthquake...people who were not at home when it occurred, according to Habib, the Village Headman...began the building of New Bivarzan.

Perhpas three miles across the valley, and not a hundred feet from where they built the mosque they discovered a huge spring from which flows hundreds of gallons of water per minute. To them, it was by Divine Providence that they discovered the spring, so they began the building of Bivarzan. The mosque was the first structure to be built.

The village is similar in concept to practically all the rural villages of Iran, except that the principal building material is field stone instead of the usual sun-baked mud brick, Narrow, winding passageways which could hardly be called streets along which shallow trenches were dug to carry water from the spring. Those waterways serve a dual purpose; a source

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of running water and a means of garbage disposal. The total population of the village appeared to be less than 500, but each family had its own home.

Low-roofed huts, built of stone with caliche mud as mortar and mostly with a single door opening on the passageway...some with a small window...they provided shelter. And each hut shared common walls with its

And about the spring. A ditch carries the water for a short distance from the source, which is a huge crater less than a hundred feet from the edge of the cliff; the spring is something of a geological wonder. The ditch is then branched; one tributary of which leads down toward a notch in the cliff, and then down the steep slope to irrigate tiny plots of vegetables which are cultivated in stone-terraced bits and pieces of the floor of the valley. They are accessible only on foot, down a switchback trail.

The other branch of the water outfall flows through the village. After it has passed through the village the water is directed to yet another shallow basin where crops of peas, lentils, corn, some wheat and turnips are grown. The annual rainfall in Bivarzan is less than 15 inches.

To reach Bivarzan, we travelled the well-paved road which eventually reaches Rasht, on the shore of the Caspian Sea, to the small town of Lochan, where the French had built a cement factory which used the fine limestone in the plateau to the south of Bivarzan for its raw material. From Lochan, we truned off the highway down a road which lead along the stream. After a mile or two, we crossed the stream on a very crude log bridge and reached the top of the plateau via a switchback trail negotiable only by four-wheel-drive vehicles...or

Reaching Bivarzan, Abusaidi drove straight to the "Tea House", easily the largest structure in the settlement and situated somewhat on the perimeter. Perhaps it was by some means of mental telepathy, but the village Headman, Habib, was sitting outside the heavy oaken door of the tea house. "You are welcome to the house and home of Habib. My house is your home". Was the welcome of the grizzled ageless Habib. After a brief visit, we headed for the high valley for some shooting, but only after promising Habib that we should return to spend the night. That promise was made on the strength of Habib's warning that a storm was brewing beyond the mountains, and that it would express itself in very strong winds which would come howling through the pass a few miles to the north...shortly after nightfall. We would be unable to keep a tent up in the storm. It was perfectly calm at the time, but there were a few puffy clouds to be seen far beyond the pass. Habib knew his weather.

The teahouse was an experience in itself. It is the village center. During the harvest season, it is the trading center.

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705 W. Main-Eastland Call Anytime 629-2102 During off-season, it provides a social center for the villagers. With only the one door, and with only two small windows in the rear wall, the structure was perhaps forty feet square. The floor was swept and long-packed dirt, and around the wall was built a bench which was perahps two feet high and maybe three feet wide. It was on that bench that travellers would spread their bedclothes, in case they were staying overnight. I felt more secure from the occasional rat, with my sleeping bag spread on the bench.

Abusaidi and his friends had come prepared to "camp out". A portable kerosone stove appeared, and in minutes tea was brewing. Following the tea, there was scrambled eggs and warm-over mutton. With bread which was produced by Habib, and fresh fruit from Abusaidi's saddlebags, we had a pleasant repast.

Much talk followed the meal, of course. It was not often that Habib had visitors from Teheran, especially visitors as important as a bank manager. And to have a "Feranghi", a real, live American visit his village was a single honour. And if the American Agha was prepared to arise at three in the morning, Habib would have one of his men guide him to a place high in the mountains and some ten or fifteen kilometers distant where at exactly sunrise no fewer than three ibex would appear. Habib was pleased to note that the Agha had brought along his rifle. Turning out at three in the morning was not especially appealing, but after all...hadn't the Agha come to hunt? I would be ready.

We'll not go into the ibex hunt. It is a story in itself. But just as the sun rose, from a precarious perch atop a sheer cliff which dropped more than 500 feet, and just as Habib had described it...three ibex appeared. I was lucky. One of them stayed at the base of the cliff. It went back to Teheran with us, strapped to the back of the jeep.

Habib was quite impressed when he saw the game, hours and hours later. The guide flowered the story of Agha's having bagged the ibex, quite somewhat. Habib asked that he be afforded the honour of examing Agha's rifle. He'd never seen such a beautiful weapon. And perhaps it would be deadly when used against the huge black wolves which came in the winter, with the snows? And even the wily and deadly leopards which sometimes came from the mountains to slaughter the sheep, even coming inside the house through the window to kill and take away a lamb.

A few months later, in the dead of winter Absuaidi called. He had a message from Habib in Bivarzan. How the message was transmitted, I shall perhaps never know. The entire northern half of Iran was blanketed with snow, up to three feet, at higher elevations. But the message was that the leopards had come and had killed some sheep. Could the American Agha perhaps come to Bivarzan and save the sheep by killing the leopards? I could think of no way of getting there other than by helicopter, a craft which I did not have at my disposal. I should have enjoyed that, though.

But one thing came through to me in Bivarzan. The village is Habib's "house". Habib acts as arbiter for whatever disputes which may arise among the villagers. He carries the keys to the teahouse. He supervises the caretaking of the mosque. He rations the water, in the event rationing becomes

necessary. His word is final. With that in mind, his responsibilities are great. And with all the tiny huts with common walls in Habib's "house"...I think I understood the meaning of the scripture; "In my Father's house are many mansions"

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

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Recovering Windfall Taxes-Not For The Faint-Hearted!

The Windfall Tax Seminar held by the West Central Oil and Gas Association in Abilene on the afternoon of Apr. 29th was unique in several ways. For one thing, this group was not discussing how to obtain money from the Government - quite the opposite. This meeting was concerned with information as to how citizens could attempt to recover some of their own funds which had been taken from them by legislation. For W.C.T. Oil and Gas is one of several organizations in the southwest which has opposed the Windfall Profit Tax since its first inception by President Carter and the National Congress. And the Tax - like Ol' Man River, just keeps rolling along - into another Administration.

About 300 Oil Company operators and workers (mostly from Independents) and Oil Royalty owners gathered in the Civic Center for this two-hour program. The audience represented a cross-section of persons from a wide area of North Central Texas, with almost as many women attending as men. Although the material presented was often complicated, the audience was very attentive.

Glen Mitchell, President of the W.C.T. Oil and Gas Association, opened the program by introducing a panel of financial experts from the Firm of Ernst and Whinney.

countants, and persons experienced in oil and gas audit work. Most of these men had come from Dallas, Austin, and San Antonio. This Firm had prepared two comprehensive books (more than 100 pages) on the Windfall Profit Tax, and these were available to the attendees without charge. The material in these books was amplified and explained by films and talks from the auditorium stage.

The main speaker from Ernst and Whinney was a person around 40 yrs. old named Francis Durant, who deciphered facts and figures with quite a bit of zest. Mr. Durant occasionally broke away from his text to tell a good Cajun joke from his home state of Louisiana, or to express his opinion on the unbelievable complications of he Windfall Profit Tax.

"You would have to call the Windfall Profit Tax an Excise Tax," he remarked. "There is nothing else to call it! We have lived with it, through many trials and tribulations for one year, and all of us are more confused than a year ago! The Tax is a computation based on four figures - that sounds simple - but it is a monumental task to get the four figures!

'So all we can do is orient ourselves toward practical problems, such as what is being overlooked when we file for refunds.

tle knowledge is a dangerous thing. But I think even a little knowledge is better than none!

He went on to explain how difficult it is for the I.R.S. to administer this Tax law, and how requests for refunds may be impacted upon this Agency

"What I say this afternoon may sound unreasonable," Durant commented aside, "But this ----- law is unreasonable to start with!"

He explained that much

extra record keeping had been imposed on Independent Operators by the complications of the Law - record keeping which is causing the cost of energy to go even higher. It also puts the producers in someone else's hands, with the ball (and money) in the oil purchasers courts. The result is that millions of dollars are being drained away from oil producing areas - up as high as 45 per cent of what the Independent Operator makes, and from 30 to 70 per cent of the Royalty Owners checks. Some of the purchasers are increasing the tax in 1981, and the manner in which they compute it is often er-

After much discussion of what the oil operator could do to apply for his refunds, the Speaker turned to the plight of Royalty Owners. Their oil, along with that of the Operator's is classified into three Tiers:

Oil", 70 per cent taxation. 2. "Stripper Oil", taxed at 60 percent.

3. Newly discovered oil, heavy oil, and incremental tertiary oil, taxed at 30 per-

Oil which is exempt from Windfall Profit Taxation falls into five types: production from qualified governmental, or charitable interests, exempt Indian oil, "Front-end" oil, and Alaskan oil.

For the year 1980 a stopgap measure of \$1,000 credit to individual Royalty owners

income taxes have probably already filed for this credit against their taxes. Those who do not owe any income tax still have until June 15, 1981 to file a claim for a refund. Unless this claim is filed, the overpaid taxes will not be returned to the owner. So all the burden is on the citizen to reclaim his money. Anyone filing for a refund must secure proper forms from the I.R.S. or the Company which purchased his oil. The purchasing Company should also furnish an accounting for the oil bought

during 1980. Some Companies have been lax on this matter, while others have been quite detailed.

The persons conducting the Seminar had no information on what might take the place of the \$1,000 credit allowed for 1980 -- if anything. The only hopeful possibility centered around two bills pending in Washington - one in the House and one in the Senate. The House Bill is sponsored by Charles Stenholm, Kent Hance and Tom Loeffler, and the Senate Bill is spon-

John Tower. These Bi-Partisan Bills are very similar, and each would exempt an Operator 1,000 barrels a day. This would also assist the Royalty owners, for only a small percentage of Royalty holders draw checks of more than \$500.00

per month. The Seminar closed with the thought that a difficult time lies ahead concerning the Windfall Profit Tax. And part of the difficulty lies in the fact that the public has not had factual information available concerning the

matter. It is hoped to remedy that in the future.

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Death - Learning About It

COLLEGE STATION--Many of our fears about death, natural to some extent, can be dispelled-with understanding, says a family life education specialist.

Death, after all, is the final stage of growth in an individual's life," Betty Jo Smith points out.

Dr. Smith, on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, says death has been described in recent years as "the last great American taboo."

"That is, some people are afraid to talk about death, to think about death or even consider it as a final stage of life and and living," she explains.

"Fear of death, of course, is a universal fear based on a natural desire for living.

"However, it is important for people to be able to discuss these general fears and the peronal fright they feel when contemplating their own death.

"It IS important that individuals, on occasion, comtemplate the end of their own life," she continues.

WHY SUCH FEAR?

Much of the fear that some Americans have of death results from people being alienated from the process of dying, the specialist says.

"As medicine has improved over the decades, families have seen fewer and fewer of their family members die at home, in the presence of other family members or in a family atmosphere of peace and dignity, Dr. Smith explains

For example, individuals with terminal diseases or severe medical or psychological problems generally have been institutionalized and hidden from society, she notes.

"In fact, our society has increasingly 'protected' its children from death, and this is a different situation than in the first 150 years of the nation's history," Dr. Smith says

"When the United States was basically a rural society, children grew up with death – deaths of family and community members were a very real part of the agrarian lifestyle. And rural children watched farm animals and pets live and die, just as they watched the seasons bring life and death

to plants and trees.

"Now the majority of our children are no longer so lucky – they see only life or unrealistic television death means nothing.

"Many of the real life experiences which can teach children about death and hence, living, are no longer available to them," Dr. Smith emphasizes.

WHY LEARN ABOUT DEATH?

When children-or grownups-who have not learned about death are faced with their own death or the death of someone close to them, they have little experience to rely upon.

"They become frightened, an emotion that complicates the natural sadness of the loss," the specialist says. Helping others and

ourselves to grow and learn that dying and death are essential to life itself is not easy, the specialist admits.

HOW TO LEARN
In spite of the challenge, there are several things that

we can do, Dr. Smith says.

Provide children and others the opportunity to know and love animals – family pets are wonderful companions and educators.

Begin to examine your own feelings about life – and death. Share your feelings with

others who are significant in

your life.

Write a will - and contemplate giving away your most prized possessions, regardless of their monetary value. This will help in your

Skibinsky was a fast learner and was willing to try anything new. His attitude was just fantastic."

To establish himself in business, Skibinsky knocked on doors in his high rise apartment building.






