

Building Damaged In Bomb Explosion

City police were continuing an investigation Tuesday of a bomb explosion in the alley between Pierce Ford and Commercial Printing Co. at 10:15 p.m. Sunday.

A dozen glass window panes, about 9x12 inches in size, were shattered in the rear of the automobile agency building. Mrs. Laddie Pierce of the firm said there was no other apparent damage. Commercial Printing Co. reported no damages.

Police Chief Bill Pence said a military simulator bomb was apparently placed on the paved alley near Pierce Ford. City Policeman Steve Brackeem drove

through the alley a few seconds before the bomb exploded, Mr. Pence said. Two persons have been questioned in the case, the chief added. He said he has talked with military police at Fort Hood and the FBI has been notified. He added that there was a possibility that the FBI might take a look at the case.

Mr. Pence said a similar bomb was detonated at Lake Cisco with no damage last Thursday. City firemen went to the scene as a precautionary measure.

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Council Candidates Pledge To Govern By City Charter Rules

Nine of ten candidates for the City Council in the May 30th special election pledged full support of the city charter and to work hard for community progress in talks at a "Meet the Candidates" night program Monday night at the Laguna Corral Room.

Eris Ritchie, unopposed as a candidate for the mayor's office, accepted an invitation to serve as moderator for the meeting. Each candidate was introduced and given an opportunity to speak. This was followed by a question and answer session.

Opening the program, Mr. Ritchie told the audience that he has lived in Cisco for 22 years and considers Cisco a fine community in which to live and raise children. He spent nine years as band and music director at Cisco High School and five years in a

similar capacity at Cisco Junior College. He spent another five years at CJC as public relations director. He owns and operates his own business.

"I have had no experience in city government," Mr. Ritchie said, "but I have read the city charter and I think we can live nicely with it. I see the mayor's job as ceremonial to a large extent, and I will preside fairly and impartially and cooperate fully in every effort to make Cisco a better and more progressive community."

Civic League To Meet Thurs.

The Cisco Civic League will hold its monthly meeting at 7 p.m. Thursday, May 14, at the home of Ruth Heidenheimer, 1300 Avenue N. There will be a salad supper. An installation of new officers will be held. All members are asked to attend and bring a salad.

Luke Harrison, candidate for Place One, said he has lived here 13 years and he and his wife have four children. "I think Cisco is a 'people' town and I will work hard to help solve problems." He pledged to work "regardless of the outcome of the election."

Loyal Lundstrom, Place Three candidate, said he has lived here 10 years. He and his wife have five children and operate the Cisco Motel, the bus station and the Cisco Monument Works. "We love the people here. We can have good government with the people and the city council working together. I will work for a better Cisco regardless of the outcome."

Jay Maples, candidate for Place Two, said he is 25 years old and has lived here most of his life. He works at Oil States Rubber Co. and is the father of three children. "I am running to contribute and help make Cisco a better place to raise a family," he said. "I will always be for anything that is best for Cisco."

Bobby Rains, candidate for Place Four, said he has lived here all of his life and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Odell Rains. Attending the recent high school reunion influenced him to run for City Council, he said. "My old

friends who live elsewhere expressed such concern about our city problems that I decided to offer myself as a candidate," he said. "These former Ciscoans are really concerned and we should all be."

Leonard Tipton, candidate for Place Three, told the audience that he left Cisco in 1948 for military service. A retired military man, Mr. Tipton said he moved his wife and children to Cisco when he was ordered to Vietnam a few years ago. "My family liked it so we decided to stay when I retired," Mr. Tipton said. "Much can be accomplished if the City Council and people work together," he said. "If elected, I will do my best."

Brad Kimbrough, who was late due to attending a CJC board meeting, is a candidate for Place Two. He said he moved here with his family in 1974 and is the owner of Kimbrough Funeral Home. He is a native of Henrietta, a town about the size and with much the same problems as Cisco, he said. "My father worked for the city there and I am familiar with the problems small towns have." He is a military veteran, attended Midwestern University and Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science. He is a past president of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

During the question and answer period, the various candidates agreed:

1. The city should have a plan of work directed by the city manager who should report regularly to the City Council.
2. The city manager should reside in the City of Cisco as specified by the city charter.
3. Priorities should be given to such community needs as street improvements, park improvement, and encourage of opportunities for young people.
4. Cooperation by city officials and citizens.

Mrs. Louise Allison, only member of the present Council present, asked the candidates how they feel about state laws that require open meetings and open records. The candidates agreed that these are good laws and should be observed. The only time an executive meeting should be held, it was agreed, was to deal with personnel matters where innocent people might be hurt.

Douglas Fry, former mayor, observed that "I am pleased to see this many capable people offering to serve. We live here because we like Cisco, as many others do. It is good to have candidates who show genuine interest and concern."

Neeta Jacobs served as temporary chairman.

S.G. Clary, Orville Robinson and Lorene Hollingshead were named to the tax equalization board. The board will meet June 5 and 8 to hear anyone interested in appearing.

are placed in a special buff-colored concrete, the mixing of which is carefully timed so that the concrete will reach exactly the right stage of firmness at the time the star is scheduled to arrive.

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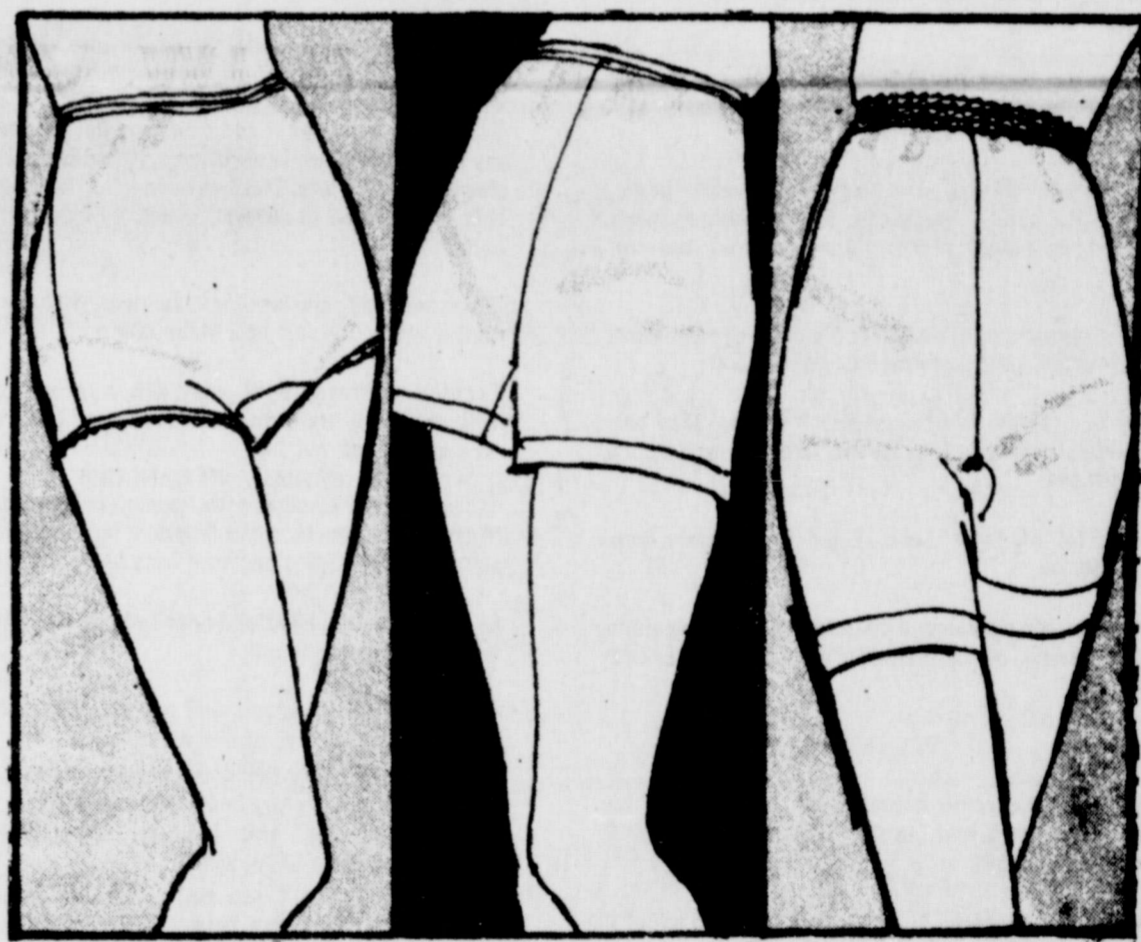

Too Soon For Control Of Pecan Nut

Recently our office has received several calls when to spray for the Pecan Nut Casebearer, reports Gordon Woolam, Extension Pest Management Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Actually it is about 2 weeks early to be spraying for this pest.

Proper timing is the key to efficient control of this insect. The insecticide should be on the trees 2 to 3 days after the first eggs hatch. At this our best prediction is that there will not be a significant population warranting control before May 23rd.

Woolam suggests that Homeowners and Growers watch the newspaper for further reports on when to spray for the Pecan Nut Casebearer and adds that spraying now would probably be stretching the effectiveness of the insecticide too far.

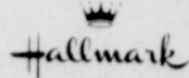

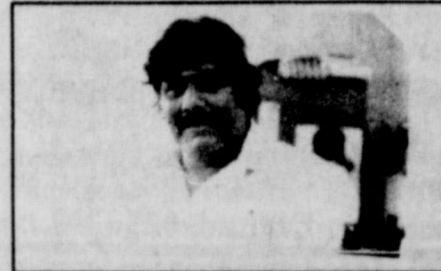
When Rockefeller was 53, it certainly appeared that he would not celebrate another birthday, but he started to practice one of God's eternal laws, and he reaped its pro-

IWU Reflections in Perspective

Under the reign of the Shah, some of the laws of Iran were considered by Westerners to be very strange. Perhaps they were suited to the Persian mentality, but foreigners viewed them as peculiar.

The basic law of motorized traffic is an example. It reads something like... "The operator of a motor driven vehicle must have his machine under control at all times". That translates, in the words of one foreigner, into... "If you hit it; you've bought it". In the event of a fatality, the driver of the vehicle considered by the investigating police to be at fault was promptly charged with manslaughter.

In the field of industry; Iranian law did not recognize the expression nor condition of an "unavoidable accident". Somebody was to be held responsible. That somebody usually was the individual in charge of the operation in which the accident occurred. Again; in the event of a fatality...the charge of manslaughter.

We had such an accident, once. The foreman of a crew which was placing large-diameter pipe on a "feed rack" where the ends were inspected for shipping damage left the scene of the work for a cup of coffee. He strictly instructed the workers to sit in the shade, and not to move any pipe during his absence. Each piece of the pipe weighed more than two tons, and when the foreman returned from his mid-morning cup the workmen had rolled just one more joint down the slightly inclined track. One unwary Iranian had caught his head between the rolling joint and the next stationary one. His skull was crushed. He had died, instantly.

The police were summoned, and the foreman was charged...with manslaughter, of course. There was another peculiarity in Iranian law. The accused did not have to appear in court. He could be represented by counsel. Our attorney answered the summons to the District Court in Bushire, and satisfactorily defended Mr. Roberts by negotiating a huge cash settlement with the heirs of the deceased.

Now under Iranian law, the right of appeal can be exercised by either party in any legal action. Someone in the family of the deceased worker did not agree with the acquittal of Mr. Roberts and appealed the verdict to the Court of Criminal Ap-

peals in Shiraz. That court upheld the verdict in the District Court, but the appellant was still not satisfied. The case was appealed to Supreme Court of Criminal Appeals in Teheran.

Long before the process of filing for appeals' hearings was completed, the project was over and it was time for Mr. Roberts to leave Iran for the United States. No deal; said Iranian Law. Mr. Roberts could not depart his country until he was finally acquitted from the charge of manslaughter. Except under a single condition. If Mr. Roberts would deposit with the Ministry of Justice in Abadan the sum of 200,000 rials, in cash, and give someone (preferably another foreigner) his power of attorney, and if that someone would accept said power of attorney...then Mr. Roberts would be permitted to leave Iran.

Our attorney, not unlike his fraternity brothers the world over promptly prepared all the necessary documents, asked me to volunteer to accept Mr. Robert's power of attorney since I had no immediate plans to leave the country for keeps, collected his fee and arranged for Mr. Roberts' exit permit. All well and good. The mills of the law were grinding, like the mills of the gods...slowly, but exceeding small.

Almost three years went by. The Roberts case had been all but forgotten when there came a telephone call from our ever-watchful attorney in Abadan. He had in hand the final decision of the Supreme Court of Criminal Appeals.

upholding all prior decision of not guilty and absolving Mr. Roberts of any and all guilt appertaining to said charge of manslaughter...and incidentally, would I come along and retrieve the cash deposit from which the attorney's fee was to be paid? I could do so, and would be on the early morning flight on the following day.

At the office of some official in the Ministry of Justice building on the following day, the ceremony was very brief. I was introduced to the official by our attorney, handshakes all 'round, and I was handed a one-page document which would authorize me to retrieve from the local bank which served as State Depository the sum of 200,000 rials. In cash.

That transaction taken care of; the attorney and I returned to his office where his fee was paid. Needless to say, the bundle of cash was much smaller with his fee removed. Over a cup of tea, the councillor observed... "Now. You are a free man". I was dumfounded at that remark. What impediment to my freedom had been removed? "Very simple. You see, Iranian Law requires someone to be held responsible in the case of anything so serious as manslaughter. When you accepted Mr. Roberts' power of attorney you likewise accepted the charge of manslaughter." Smiling; "Now that the Supreme Court has found in YOUR favour, you have been finally acquitted". "And in case...?" I began. "Exactly". I shivered throughout the return flight to Teheran.

Elmer Foster In Retirement After 40 Years With Farmers Home Administration

Elmer L. Foster retired from Farmers Home Administration in January, 1981 after forty years and four months of employment. He served as Assistant County Supervisor, County Supervisor, Construction Engineer, Assistant District Director and District Director in 92 counties of Texas ranging from Fort Worth to El Paso and from College Station to Del Rio. Only three days after graduating from Texas A&M on August 31, 1940 with a degree in agricultural education, Foster went to work for the Farm Security Administration which was later named Farmers Home Administration. That was his first job offer.

When asked the reason for his interest in agriculture, Foster replied that after graduation from high school, he farmed the family farm at Alexandria where he grew up. Selling his last bale of cotton for \$4.65 per hundred pounds in 1934 triggered his decision to enroll at Tarleton College in 1935. At Tarleton, Foster worked at whatever jobs he could find to meet expenses. On afternoons that he did not have classes, Foster, along with other students, met "Uncle Wylie," the maintenance man on the campus, to apply for available work. "Uncle Wylie" picked the workers by pointing at them saying, "You, and you, and you!" (There were five students for every job). The jobs ranged from building rock fences, knocking the edges off molded bricks, mowing lawns, unstopping comodes, fixing leaky faucets, to firing the boiler when there were blizzards and gas was short. The coal was shoveled from wheel barrows directly into the furnace. The pay was the same for all of the jobs, 30 to 35 cents per hour.

While at Tarleton, Foster made the Honor Roll even though he carried 29 hours one semester. Such a heavy load was against the rules; however, it was April before they caught up with him. After a review of his grades, it was decided to let him continue. After one year at Tarleton, funds became so short that Foster had to drop out of college and work for one year. After returning to Tarleton for one more year, he transferred to Texas A&M University where he stayed until graduation.

Arriving at A&M, Foster found that there were not enough rooms on the campus for all of the students. He stayed in a "co-op" called a Project House at Navasota and commuted to the university. The Project House was an old abandoned hotel with one kitchen, one house mother and one manager. For three months Foster worked in the kitchen and on campus. At that time the manager left and helped the house mother plan meals. Fish were bought for 15 cents a pound and hominy, 25 cents a gallon. The garbage from the kitchen was fed to hogs raised on a rented plot of ground. When the hogs reached 250 pounds, Foster and the dishwasher butchered them and cured the ham and bacon to be served in the kitchen.

Milk for the kitchen was bought from three students who rented some land near the campus to graze three cows. They milked the cows and sold this milk to the kitchen to pay for their room and board (room and board were \$15 per month). The cooks in the kitchen had the best jobs in town. They were paid three to five dollars per week and they worked only about four hours a day.

Although a set of tires and tubes for the automobile cost \$29 and gasoline 14 cents a gallon, of the 158 students in the Project House only three had cars. And those cars could more appropriately be called "jalopies."

During his last year at A&M, Foster managed the Project House, with the help of a kitchen manager and an orderly, for room and board. He worked on the campus to pay his other expenses. As he closed the Project House at 1:40 A.M., the train which ran from Houston to Dallas whistled through town (he would not dare leave the kitchen open as there were



still "bums" around from the "Brother, can you spare a dime?" depression days, even in 1940).

When Foster went to work as Assistant County Supervisor at Bonham, Tx in 1940, operating loans were made to farmers with a pilot program of five farm ownership loans. Among the approximately 360 borrowers, only two had tractors. For the majority, it was just a horse and a mule. Then, as now, loans were only made to farmers who could not qualify for bank loans. Also, in the county offices were Home Supervisors, women trained in home economics, who taught the families how to keep records, sew and can fruits and vegetables. Family budgets were drawn up. When a farmer who owned his land paid harvesting and marketing expenses, they were approximately five dollars per bale left to pay on his loan. A farmer who rented had approximately four dollars left.

Because of the food shortage during the war years (approximately 1940-1947), Food for Freedom loans were made for food production. The average was for \$75. The loans were made to purchase a milk cow, chickens, hogs, to raise a garden or to raise water-mellons, cantaloupes, peas, beans or other fruits and vegetables for sale. (A good dairy cow cost \$35 to \$37.50. Some of the farmers thought that was too high!)

After working at Bonham, Foster was promoted to County Supervisor at Grandbury. From there he was transferred to Lamesa, to Pecos and then to Belton as a Construction Inspector. From there he moved to Anson in 1952 as a County Supervisor to handle emergency drought loans. He stayed there until promoted to District Director at Abilene in 1955 (his district consisted of six counties). This was during the seven-year drought of the fifties. His district began making emergency loans in 1955. It was "hard times" for the farmers with a number of them going broke or having delinquent loans. It was immediately following a conference of Foster and one of these "hard luck" farmers that another employee of Farmers Home Ad-

ministration criticized the farmer's negative attitude. Foster replied, "Be glad you are not sitting in his seat."

Foster was transferred to Eastland as District Director in 1959 serving there until 1965 when he was moved to Coleman. He stayed at Coleman until 1971 when he was transferred back to Eastland where he remained until January, 1979.

It was in January, 1979 that Foster moved back to Abilene where he was instrumental in a restructuring program that established a separate District Office which now makes and services Community Program and Rural Rental Housing loans in 19 surrounding counties. A maze of water lines (with approximately 300,000 meters) built with funds from Farmers Home Administration wind through the state of Texas providing water to rural residents (some 50,000 of these meters are located in counties that are a part of Foster's districts).

Also located in Texas are over 500 Rural Rental Housing projects built with \$178,000,000 in loan funds from Farmers Home Administration. Low to moderate income tenants, of whom many are elderly, live in these projects. Foster showed a positive attitude toward this loan program, as well as all of the loan programs of Farmers Home Administration. A favorite comment of his was, "These people need help."

Likewise, Foster as an administrator demonstrated a positive attitude toward his subordinates. He spoke so highly of them, one to another, and of course the word got back to them. This made them believe in themselves and as a result, most of them lived up to his

expectations. Bill Lawson, Chief of Community Programs in Texas, says of Foster, "Elmer is one of the most dedicated and faithful employees that Farmers Home Administration has ever had. He was realistic in his loan making. They have stood the test of time."

Foster lives with his wife, the former Edith Allison and his daughter, Carolyn, 15 and son, John, 11 at their home on Lake Leon. Carolyn is a freshman at Eastland High School where she makes the Honor Roll and is in numerous school activities, her favorites being the band and flag corps. John is a fifth grader and an excellent student; however, sometimes school interferes with his other activities such as bike riding and swimming. For a boy of his age, he has an unusual interest in and understanding of electronics.

When asked what he plans to do now that he is retired, Foster answered, "I plan to catch up on vacations; I only had two in 40 years."

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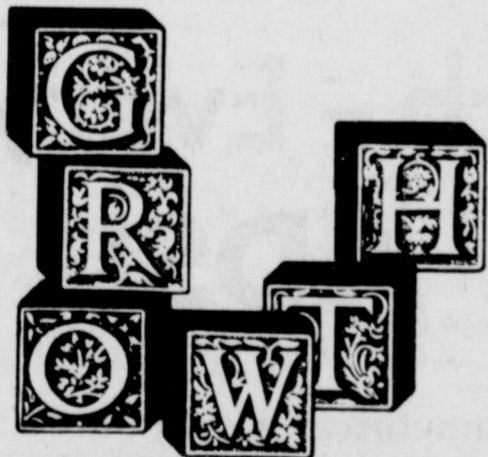
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Application Filed For Coal-Fired Generating Plant

An application has been filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity for a coal-fired generating plant to be built in North Texas by West Texas Utilities Company and two other operating companies in the Central and South West Corporation. The certificate is required before actual construction can start on the plant, which will be built on a 1,937 acre tract which WTU purchased from the fabled Waggoner Ranch eight miles southeast of Vernon and three southwest of Oklaunion. The application is for Oklaunion

Power Station Unit No. 1, which will have a net capacity of 640 megawatts. Ultimately, three units with a total capacity of 1,920 megawatts are planned. Cooling water will come from Lake Diversion, 20 miles south of the site. WTU purchased water rights in 1977 from Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2 and the City of Wichita Falls. Boiler fuel will be low sulphur western coal, probably from Wyoming mines.

Oklaunion will be the first

power plant to be jointly owned by CSW operating companies. WTU, the managing partner, will own 350 megawatts, Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi 115 megawatts, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma 175 megawatts. The other CSW operating company, Southwestern Electric Power Company of Shreveport, will not participate. PSO's participation hinges on a favorable ruling by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission

regarding an agreement between the CSW System and members of the intrastate Texas Interconnected System to install direct current interconnections across state lines.

The application states that the plant is needed to satisfy load growth of the companies and to reduce dependence on natural gas as a boiler fuel. Unit One is scheduled for commercial operation by December, 1986. Total cost is estimated at \$675,104,000.
