



and equipment, breakeven variable or operating costs are projected to average more than \$47 per ton for a three-ton per acre expected yield and almost \$51 per ton for a planned yeild of 6 tons per acre. The higher variable costs per ton for the greater yield is due to decreased fertilizer efficien-

When fixed costs such as interest, taxes, depreciation and land rent are added, total breakeven costs are more than \$55 per ton for the 3-ton per acre yeild and slightly less for the 6-ton yield. If land rent was based on the land's market value, the 6-ton yield would have a per ton breakeven price to cover total costs significantly below the breakeven price for the 3-ton yeild.

Using a budget and keeping a close check on production costs is critical in managing Coastal bermudagrass hay so as to realize a profit.

The higher the level of planned production, the more critical management becomes in assuring success and profit. Thus, producers must give careful consideration to such areas as sources of fertilizer, methods of application, and whether or not to use herbicides and insec-

A Systems Three IBM computer was donated to CJC by JRB Super Markets as the firm recently sold its stores and closed out its Brownwood headquarters offices, Dr. Norman Wallace, CJC president, told the board. The computer, which cost considerably more, has an appraised value of \$48,000. A similar computer was given by JRB Super Markets to Howard Payne University, Dr. Wallace

Plans for the 3.1 acres of land will be determined by the board, Dr. Wallace reported. It is possible that it can be used in connection with the Mobley Hilton development, he added.

"We are very grateful to Mr. J.R. Beadel of the JRB company and to the Rockwell Foundation for these very substantial gifts," Dr. Wallace said.

'The computer is a valuable addition to our business department and will add considerably to our ability to teach in the business field. We sincerely appreciate this gesture on the part of Mr. Beadel.

117 gas and 37 oil discoveries in April 1981, the Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas

Division announced today. In the year-earlier month. 83 gas and 52 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the fourth m month of the year included 46 in deep South Texas, 19 in the Refugio area, 15 in West Central Texas, 12 in Southeast Texas, six in East Texas, five in the Midland area, four in the San Antonio area, three each in East Central Texas and the San Angelo area, and two each in North Texas and the Panhandle area

Oil discoveries included six each in West Central Texas, North Texas, and the Refugio area, five in the San Antonio area, four in Southeast Texas, three each in the San Angelo and Lubbock areas, two in the Midland area, and one each in deep South Texas and the Panhandle area.

In April, operators reported 227 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applicants for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 3,359 in April, compared with 2,646 in the same period of 1980.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in April amounted to 3,585 against 2,922 a year earlier.

Operators filed 811 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 560 amended requests.

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Focus On Customers

To be effective in planning community festivals, fairs and similar events, focus on the customer, emphasized Dr. John Crompton at a recent conference for community planners at Texas A&M University.

"Find out what the people want," said Crompton, an associate professor with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas A&M's Department of Recreation and Parks. "It's not what you want that's important but what your customer wants.

"You need to sell the benefits of your product, not the product itself," he noted. "Your promotional material must convey what the benefits of your product (event) are." He pointed out that most people take part in events such as fairs and festivals because of excitement, increased selfsatisfaction and self-worth, and association with peer groups

In marketing an event or activity, Crompton listed five sets of tools to work with: clients (different groups of people), products (what you have to offer), time and place, price and promotion. "If you aren't as successful with your event as you would like to be, then you can change any one or a combination of these five items," he noted.

Crompton suggested segmenting the product or event to satisfy different client groups, such as youth, senior citizens and those of various nationalities. Various activities and events can also be planned on sociodemographic, behavorial and geographic differences.

"As far as promoting an event is concerned, the best promotional tool is for people to see the actual site," said Crompton. "Put your fair where most people will see it, where the most traffic is. This is the best, cheapest promotional tool you've

Crompton also noted the importance of adding a new dimension to your product (fair) each year and to build your promotion around it. "Bring in something new each y year and abandon old things that have turned into

Officer Si Bradford a colorful character

Boyce House in his book, "You Can Always Tell A Texan, (But You Can't Tell Him Much)", tells this story of a well known person or two around these parts of the county for many years.

We quote from page 30 in Boyce's book, "perhaps the best known name among citizens of Palo Pinto County was that of a native son, the late James C. Wilson, who served in Congress and then for many years as United States District Judge in Fort Worth. Another name mighty well known in the county was that of the late Si Bradford, noted peace officer of Strawn.

One day a long sleek autmobile, driven by a colored chauffeur in livery, rolled into Strawn. In the back seat was a distinguished - looking man, wearing a dark suit and a black hat. He was reading some important looking documents through glasses that were on a long cord.

The car cut across the middle of the block and drew up at the curb. Marshall Bradford sauntered over and addressed the owner. "Have that driver back up and go to that turning - block at the intersection and come in right."

"Oh, come now, my good fellow," the visitor said, "We are already here."

"Or," Bradford continues, as though he had not been interrupted, "I'll have to take you down to the city hall."

to take you down to the city hall."
"Surely you wouldn't do that," the other remonstrated.

"And the fine," Bradford kept on, in a level tone, "Will be \$14.95."

The stranger bristled, "Do you know

who i am?"
Si could well have put the same question for he was one of the most renowed peace officers in the annuals of the Southwest, but he merely drawled,

"No, I don't know who you are."

"Well, I'm an associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States."

Si sifted his "chaw" to the other jaw and replied, "I don't care if you're Jim Wilson himself, you'll have to obey the

law in Strawn" - end of quote.

And people did obey the law in Strawn, too, with peace officer Si Bradford around to enforce it.

Si started out peace officering in April 1900, when Strawn was a booming coal mining center.

Bradford started living in Palo Pinto County in 1883.

His favorite firearm that was his protection, was a Remington derringer which he carried constantly from the year 1900. He had many "close calls," and on one occasion the firearm proved most effective in saving his life.

This was in 1913 when he had had a feud for several months with a saloon keeper. The saloon - keeper bought him a new 45 and was boasting around town that he was going to get Bradford. It wasn't long until a man was forcibly evicted from the saloon and the saloon keeper, expecting trouble, grabbed his new 45 and went outside. Bradford was standing at the door and he warned the saloon - keeper not to come outside with the gun. The man whirled and fired and the bullet tore through Bradford's left wrist. But he quickly drew his gun with his wounded hand, and with numb fingers, managed to bring his gun to his right hand while the saloon - keeper was firing at him. Three of the saloon . keeper's bullets tore through Bradrord's left coat pocket, ripping a plug of tobacco in shreds and the derringer came through once again for Bradford, dropping the saloon · keeper, mortally wounded.

Bradford won national fame when in 1927 he tracked down three of the four Cisco "Santa Claus" bank bandits in the Battle of South Bend.

Inadequate diets may be undermining their health and weaking t their ability to live independent, selfsufficient lives.

Some estimates indicate that one-third or more of the 24.1 m million Americans age 65 and over may consistently lack basic nutrients essential to their physical and mental well being including proteins, vitamins, minerals, fiber from fresh fruits and vegetables and whole-grain cereals, and other recognized basic dietary needs.

Inflation may be increasing the toll of elderly malnutrition. Many older people are spending a larger portion of their income on heating fuel and rent, which may mean less money for

a time for socializing, and so it provides social outlets for many older people and thus deals with some of the social factors linked with bad nutrition

The national nutrition program for older people aims especially at lowincome elderly persons; older people unable to shop for food and to prepare wellbalanced meals because of disabilities or lack of skills; and older people whose feelings of loneliness, discouragement or rejection, reduce their incentive to prepare and eat their meals

Although such priorities are part of the 1972 legislation establishing the nutrition program, Congress set no eligibility limit other than the age of 60. All persons 60 and over, and their spouses, regardless of age, may participate.

The goal of the program is to help meet "the social

needs of millions of persons aged 60 or older" as well as their nutritional needs and to "reduce the isolation of old offering older Americans an opportunity to live their remaining years in dignity,' the Americans Act states.

The nutrition program has grown and expanded rapidly since its launching in 1973. The number of meals served annually has passed the 150 million mark, with about 167 million meals served in 1980--40 million of them home delivered. The proportion of meals served to home-bound older persons has been increasing rapidly.

The group meal sites, where about 76 percent of the total meals are served, are located in senior centers. churches and synagogues, housing for older people, schools, restaurants and other types of sites.

Most nutrition sites offer some social or health services, such as transporation. hearing and blood pressure tests and legal counseling, and some offer recreational and educational programs.

Every nutrition site uses volunteers. Volunteers outnumber paid staff by about eight to one--256,000 volunteers to about 32,000 paid staff nationwide.

With food costs rising steadily, so have per-meal costs in the program--from \$1.80 in 1978 to about \$2.14 in 1979, counting both food and preparation costs.

At these nutrition sites, participants are given an opportunity to make a contribution for their meals. These contributions are used in the program to provide the meals at the site at which they were donated.

*Don't make the beginning of school a topic of daily conversation during the sum-

*This summer, don't allow older children to frighten or tease the younger child with tales of how awful school is. If necessary, speak with the older children privately about their responsibility in helping the younger child go to school without fear. Try to make the older children your

several times before school

*Don't set a pattern of walking into the classroom. Goodbyes are best said at home or in the car.

*This summer, parents should make every effort for their child to meet and make friends with other children that will be entering kindergarten.

*Many non-working mothers look forward to the free time they will have once their child enters school. However, don't tell the child how much fun you are going to be having while they are in school.

*Do create a normal routine atmosphere at home the first few days of school. This does not mean that you deny or avoid the uniqueness of the first dayof school but, on the other hand, don't give the child the impression that his leaving for school is the same magnitude as "Lindbergh's solo flight over the Atlantic". Parent's responsibility is to provide reassuring support when needed, but otherwise to

'play it cool". *Don't assume that all the child's anxiety is the child's. A mother's worry and tension are highly contagious for the child.



CHS Track Stars Are Honored At Lions Luncheon



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

pleted the design of the quilt. The finished quilt measures 75 by 97 inches and is a full bed size quilt, consisting of 19 individual appliqued and embroidered blocks. The quilt begins with a lovely appliqued scene depicting the first settlement of Red Gap (Cisco's original name) and follows the development of Cisco to the 1980's. With Cisco's colorful history listed below is a brief description of other appliqued blocks on the quilt:

'First Churches' '-- The club felt that the first churches were an important part of Cisco's development and that they most certainly deserved recognition.

'Railroad Crossing''--In 1881 the original post office of Red Gap moved to what is now Cisco, named after John J. Cisco, a New York banker who financed the railroad, which started the ball rolling in the town. The two railroads depicted here are the T&P and Texas Central.

The devastating cyclone of 1893, destroyed most all of Cisco, but the "Red Front Drug Store." Because Cisco was developing so fast because of the railroads, buildings were constructed hurriedly and poorly so the

cyclone took its toll. Blacksmith Shop''--Many associate ever-present Blacksmith Shop with the town. It's not been so many years ago since Mr. Clements filled the position

of the local blacksmith. "The Cisco Kid," Cisco's own logo

Mobley Hotel"--Ciscoans are especially proud of their own Mobley Hotel, which was the first business establishment of the late Conrad Hilton. Plans are now in progress for the restoration and rennovation of the hotel by the Hilton Foundation.

"The oil derrick" is symbolic of the oil boom which hit Cisco in the 1920's. At the beginning of the 20's, Cisco claimed a population of 3,000 but soon grew to 15,000. This is the reason for Cisco's

Scene of Cisco's own "Big Dam," lake, park, zoo and one time world's largest swimming pool--self explanatory because of its uniqueness in itself. To see, but visualize its past beauty leaves one with an everlasting memory. The dam was constructed in the 1920's to fill the need for

Cisco's growing population. The lake attracted many visitors for many years.

The zoo was closed in 1930 because of the depression and its effect on finances, with the impossibility of financing the feeding and upkeep of the animals. The animals were moved to the Fort Worth Zoo at that time.

Cisco's tremendous swimming pool, up until about six years ago, also brought many visitors to Cisco, and with many by-gone experiences, remains in the memory of all who once visited there.

The "Santa Claus Bank Robbery" of 1927 has gained much attention because of its unique story. Several books on the subject are available, with many articles still in print.
