Proposals Studied

Proposals to provide the community with ambulance service after June 1st were heard by the City Council at a special meeting Monday night at City Hall. Action was delayed until the May 26th regular meeting.

The Council heard from three groups interested in providing ambulance ser-

vice, including the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital of Cisco, Brown County **Emergency Medical Service** of Brownwood, and West Ambulance Service of Fort Worth. A Breckenridge concern called and indicated an interest in talking to the

The Fort Worth firm was the only one to provide any cost figures. They said they would provide one ambulance equipped for emergency service and driver for \$3,000 per month. A second, or backup ambulance, would up the cost to \$4,600 per month.

Tim Ward of the Brownwood firm said that communities there contribute to the cost of service on the basis of the number of electric meters in each town or area. He added that his firm would be pleased to work with or out of Graham hospital here.

Councilmen expect concrete offers from the interested bidders for the service contract at the May 26th

Reflections in Perspective By: L C Will Ussery

Having spent much of my adult life in close association with the peoples of the Middle East, I feel a certain qualification to observe that the Beduoin Arab ranks very high among my favourite people.

The desert "Bedu", unlike other nationalities who are generally lumped into a single category of "Ayrab" by far too many (and uninformed or misinformed Westerners) is an almost pure ethnic race. The Turks, Persians (Iranians) and Egyptians have been conquered and almost totally overrun by centuries of invaders to the extend that the purity of their bloodlines has been highly diluted and blended by the mixture of the invading hordes.

Fiercely independent, the Beduoin Arab is sensitive, generous, courages, a loyal friend and infinitely trustworthy. This statement comes as a surprise to many who consider him to be a shifty-eyed, hawk-nosed barbarian. Living a very simple life, the Beduoin has long since eliminated all "gray areas" from his life. His attitude toward society places every issue in either a black or white category. And he considers his word to be his sacred bond.

His simplicity is demonstrated in his attire. The long white "dish-dasha" has remained unchanged for literally thousands of years. It is the most sensible dress for his desert environment; so why change? The white head scarf, or "shemagh" is not worn for show, for example. Worn with the apex of the triangle hanging loosely down the back provides shelter from the fierce rays of the sun. With the other two "tails" wrapped across his face it represents protection from blowing sand. And a complete wardrobe for a month's journey can be neatly folded and packed into his saddlebag...or into an expensive leather suitcase for a trip to

And while some of the Arabs who engage in international commerce and finance have loosely adopted the use of an assumed surname, the average Arab has but a single name which he was christened. Usually, when an Arab wishes to adopt a surname he takes the name of either his father or that of his grandfather depending upon which was the better

Have you ever noticed that frequently the name of someone will be mentioned, and followed by an interminable explanation of his family background? Such as "Why, you know Joe Blow. He's the son of Elmer Blow, who married Jim Whozis' sister". "She was Clyde Snavely's cousin"...when you never knew that Jim Whozis even had a sister.

The Arab simplifies all this by using the name, for example, of his father, such as "Ibrahim bin Suliman al Khalifa"...Ibrahim, the son of Suliman and grandson of Khalifa. That is calculated to tell you just who he is. If you didn't know his father, or had never heard of his grandfather...that was just your hard luck. Usually, you knew both his father and his grandfather, or had heard of them.

This system of naming has been followed since biblical times. Read the geneologies contained in both the Old and the New Testament. And if it was good enough four thousand years ago, it is good enough now. That demonstrates the Arab's reluctance to change. But this naming business can sometimes be a bit amusing

Three months after My Lovely Wife and our 13 year-old daughter had accompanied me to the Middle East, we made a trip to Dubai. Now, when an American makes regular visits through airports, ports of embarkation and entry, hotels and

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shops over a period of few years he becomes known. We were greeted by name and treated with considerable respect along the way. Of course, people whom we knew expected to be introduced to my beautiful companions.

Arriving at our hotel in Dubai in time for lunch, we followed the custom of a four-hour siesta. Shops are closed, for the most part, from noon until four o'clock. The custom goes back for ages, and while it can be frustrating to the do-itright-this-minute Westerner, he learns to live with it. Following the siesta we went for a stroll through the Central Bazaar. More than anything else, it resembles the cross section of an ant hill with its many allyes and passageways going off at all angles and with shops in which aything from dried mullet to exquisite handmade solid gold jewelry can be purchased the bazaar is indeed the heart of the commerce of the city.

Having been greeted by several merchants as we went along, we came out into the sunshine from one of the covered alleys to encounter a little man behind a pushcart. Parked along the side of the street, he was dressed in a sparklingly clean and snow white dishdasha with shemagh to match. Standing not an inch avove five feet, his face broke into a broad smile as he dashed from behind his pushcart from which he offered a wide variety of goods for sale. Throwing his arms around my waist, he hugged me and reached up to pull my down for a kiss on both cheeks, all the while repeating..."Bill, Sahib; Bill Sahib! Min wein hadda?" From where have come?

The little man had worked for us a couple of years before on Das Island, in the Persian Gulf. Only a sweeper and general cleanup coolie, he had saved his wages and had gone into business. And his name was Mohammed bin Mohammed al Mohammed. By now, enterprising little Mohammed is probably a bank director.

Threshold, a program of educational enrichment for 'Gifted and Talented Youth" of the Big Country, will debut at Hardin-Simmons University July 13-17 and July 20-24. But there won't be any admission tests, any check of grade point averages, any probing of IQ's to see which fifth-ninth graders are eligi-

Instead, HSU is taking the word of the parents.

"We're shying away from test scores this time because we have just as much research that says that parents are reliable indicators of a child's ability as research that says tests are the better indicators," Dr. Bertie Kingore, who is heading up the Threshold program, explained. "No parent who loves a child is going to sign up their kid knowing he'll be at the bottom of the barrel in a program like this."

So, with a parent's recommendation, \$65, and an early enough postmark (the classes are limited and will be filled on a first come-first served basis) students who will be in the fifth through ninth grades this fall can spend a week with a faculty that includes nine professors from HSU and two teachers from the Abilene Independent School District.

"This is a pilot program," Kingore admitted. "But there isn't a bone in my body that doesn't think we'll do it next year. We have an exciting program and some of our faculty members aren't even on campus this summer but are coming out just to teach the hour-and-a-half sessions!"

When Kingore arrived at HSU last fall to head up the university's Gifted and Talented Program, a summer project like this was a primary concern. "I set up a dream list of courses my experience with gifted and talented told me kids would like," she said. "Then I went to the academic deans and the department heads and asked them to recommend professors who would be interested in teaching the classes.

In most cases she didn't have to look very far-six department heads are in the batch of nine HSU professors that will be teaching.

Dr. Richard Garner, head of the chemistry department, will teach his speciality: Dr. B.W. Aston, chairman of the history department, will teach "International Powers: Contemporary Relations Between Countries"; Billie Martin, head of the Department of Physical Education and Health, will teach aerobic routines; Dr. David Buratti, director of the university's Van Ellis Theatre, will teach 'Creative Dramatics for 10-13 Year Olds"; Dr. J.G. Martin, head of the Department of Music Education and Church Music, will teach "Exploring Music"; and Dr. Cynthia Green, head of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, will teach "Puppetry Con-

struction and Production." Other classes will be taught by Dr. Edwin Hewett, associate professor in mathematics ("Daily Projects in Different Broad Math Areas"), Dr. Paul Peslak, associate professor in chemistry and physics ("Astronomy"), and Kingore, assistant professor in education ("Creativity: Developing-Utilitzing Creative Potential").

Owens Given Two Five-Year Terms

The recent death of General of the Army Omar Bradley marked the end of an era. He was the last of the great generals of World War II, a man who stood out among the ranks of many heroes.

On the occasion of his death, I was asked whether we will produce other heroes as great as he from today's

I pray daily that we will not have to, that we can maintain peace. That is the goal of our defense program -to be strong enough that we don't have to go to war.

Neither the Soviet Union nor any other potential adversary will risk pushing us into an armed confrontation as long as they are convinced we are strong enough that their venture would be unsuccessful.

It is for that reason that I and others in Congress and in the Administration are working so hard to try to rebuild our national defense system. History has shown over and over again that he who does not prepare for war is most likely to have to fight one.

Yet, that is only part of the answer to the question I was asked. I do believe that in our armed services we find the stuff from which heroes are made. Those who work to keep the peace deserve as much respect and honor as those who win the battles when the peace is broken.

It is only fitting that we pay tribute to General Bradley and those others who have fought with valor. But we should also pay tribute to those who day-to-day, with little noise and, regrettably, sometimes less praise are our defensive bulwark.

The mechanic who keeps the planes in the air, and takes pride in his work.

The infantryman who drills and trains in the mud preparing for a mission everyone hopes he won't have to

The sailor, separated from his family for months at a time, who works a 60 or 70 hour week keeping his ship in working order.

When I visit our military bases, I find heroes everywhere, at all ranks. These fine men and women believe in what they are doing.

They are frustrated because they don't have the equipment they need, or the spare parts, or the fuel or ammunition for sufficient training exercises. They wonder if the American people understand their problems -- or their contributions. They read stories attacking the calibre of our military personnel, and they take personally these

They are underpaid and overworked.

But still they work, still they train, still they believe in their missions. That, to me, is true heroism.

After visiting with these fine Americans, I feel a renewed responsibility to make sure they have what they need to do their jobs. Man for man, we have the best military in the world. But we have not provided them with the wherewithal to do as good a job as they are capable of

We have consistently failed to compensate them pro-

perly for the vital work they do. They are doing their part. We must do ours.

· Female veterans comprise one percent of the total receiving compensation from all wars.

* Eighty-four percent of the veteran population receiving compensation is under 65 years of age.

 Over 920,000 veterans receive a non-serviceconnected disability pension. In this group, 49 percent are 65 years of age or older.

. VA pays monthly survivor benefits to approximately 1.8 million surviving spouses, children and dependent parents.

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

many people not all insects are harmful or pestiferous. Only about 3% of the approximately one million known insects are pests. Of those that are left about 7% are classified as beneficials, the rest are of no consquence to

However the 3% which are pests have given the entire class of aniamsl a bad name. Everyone has had some experience with a Mosquito or Ant bite, a Cockroach scurrying across the kitchen floor, Fleas on their pet, or Tomato Horn Worm devouring their prize tomatoes.

It is because of these personal bad experiences or social conditioning that we often over react when we encounter any Insect in the yard or garden. Of course none of us want to share our Homes with any unwanted guests

Nevertheless, it should be remembered that many Insects perform valuable services for us all. Bees are involved in the tedius work of pollination of many fruit and vegetable crops. Many Insects are involved in the breakdown of dead animals and plants.

Probably the most beneficial work done by Insects is the control of other Insect populations. Insects

which feed on other Insects fall into two classes: Parasites and Predators.

The Beneficial Parasitic Insects which live on or in other Insects are usually Flies or Wasps. These Flies or Wasps lay their eggs on or in soft bodied adults (such as Aphids) or Larvae (such as Leaf Feeding Catepillars). After the eggs are hatch the Larvae of these Flies or Wasps feed on the Pest In-

The Beneficial Predator

Insects are probably better known. These Insects devour their prey. Some of the better known Beneficial Predators include Lady Bettles and their Larvae, Lace-Winged Fly or Aphid Lion, Praying Mantis, and Assassin Bugs. Many Spiders also fit into this

category. The moral of the story is you shouldn't always kill an Insect just because he's an Insect. You might be killing one that does Mankind a service. If you have any questions or have any Insects which you would like indentified, contact the county Extension Office.

Bone marrow transplants are performed primarly on leukemia and aplastic anemia patients. The Hutchsinon Center team has performed more of these procedures than any other facility world-wide. Patients have come to Seattle from 46 states and 18 countries.

Heading the Cneter's bone marrow transplantation team is E. Donnall Thomas, M.D., who pioneered this form of therapy in the 1950's and '60's. Dr. Thomas performed the first human marrow transplant in Cooperstown, New York in

More than a dozen years of Intensive research passed before enough progress had been made to warrant application of the procedure to humans suffering from leukemia and aplastic anemia.

Over the years, survival statistics have improved and **Hutchinson Center scientists** now show an overall success rate of 50-60 percent for leukemia patients and 75-80 percnt for those with aplastic anemia.

The long years of research are beginning to pay off for people like Misty Ratliff. Her disease, chronic myelogenous leukemia, was diagnosed less than two months ago. Doctors here term her prognosis as excellent because she has an identical twin and her disease is being treated in an early stage.

Out of 12 identical twins with leukemia in which transplants have been made in the past four years, ten are still in remission.

Misty is the youngest person in whom a transplant has been made.

She is now in the third week of what was expected to be the most critical threeweek period, when her own system will begin manufacturing healthy platelets as the result of the marrow transplant. Virtually all of her own platelets were destroyed by radiation prior to the transplant.

NOTICE TO **CUSTOMERS OF** HIGH TURBIDITY

Dear Customer The City of Cisco during the month of April, 1981, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria; (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU)

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, or (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date. This notification of the

public is in compliance with the Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act" as a means of keeping the public informed




