

Homes for foreign high school students wanting to come to the United States and learn about middle income American family life are being sought by area representatives of the Youth Exchange Service (YES). Rev. and Mrs. Don Jeffreys of Trinity Baptist Church, Sweetwater, are the Texas representatives of YES, based in San Clemente, California. "We want to place one or two students in the Cisco area and are looking for homes to provide temporary lodging, meals and love."

The students are carefully screened by the YES home office. "We want only the top class students from other countries in this program." The families are screened by the Jeffreys'. Single adult homes may also be acceptable to host a student. The students are between 15 and 18 years of age and because their economic backgrounds in their home countries, these students are potential national leaders in the future.



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

FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW THE TEXAS REAL ESTATE LICENSE ACT

"SECTION 15. The commission may, on its own motion, and shall, on the verified complaint in writing of any person, provided the complaint, or the complaint together with evidence, documentary or otherwise, presented in connection with the complaint, provides reasonable cause, investigate the actions and records of a real extent broken or real extent. The commission may estate broker or real estate salesman. The commission may suspend or revoke a license issued under the provisions of this Act at any time when it has been determined that:

"(1) (A) the licensee has entered a plea of guilty or nolo contendere to, or been found guilty of, or been convicted of, a felony, in which fraud is an essential element, and the time for appeal has elapsed or the judgment or conviction has been affirmed on appeal, irrespective of an order granting probation following such conviction, suspending the imposition of sentence; or

"(B) a final money judgment has been rendered against the licensee resulting from contractual obligations of the licensee incurred in the pursuit of his business, and such judgment remains unsatisfied for a period of more than six months after becoming

(2) the licensee has procured, or attempted to procure, a real estate license, for himself or a salesman, by fraud, mis-representation or deceit, or by making a material misstatement of fact in an application for a real estate license; or

"(3) the licensee, when selling, trading, or renting real property in his own name, engaged in misrepresentation or dishonest or fraudulent action; or

"(4) the licensee, while performing an act constituting a broker or salesman, as defined by this Act, has been guilty of:

"(A) making a material misrepresentation, or failing to disclose to a potential purchaser any latent structural defect or any other defect known to the broker or salesman. Latent structural defects and other defects do not refer to trivial or insignificant defects but refer to those defects that would be a significant factor to a reasonable and prudent purchaser in making a decision

"(B) making a false promise of a character likely to influence, persuade, or induce any person to enter into a contract or agreement when the licensee could not or did not intend to keep such promise; or

(C) pursuing a continued and flagrant course of misrepresentation or making of false promises through agents, salesmen, advertising, or otherwise; or . . .

Cucurbit Diseases

By: Gordon Woolam

Due to the recent rains experienced in our area, disease pressure or the likelihood of disease occurence has increased greatly. Most of the disease encountered in the garden are caused by Fungi. Fungi which attack plants utilize living or dying tissue for their nutrient requirements.

Plants in the Cucumber family (Cucumbers, Squash and Melons) are susceptible to a variety of Fungal Diseases. One of the more predominant diseases of this group is Downy Mildew caused

Pseudoperonospora Cubensis. This disease is characterized by angular yellow spots appearing on the upper side of the leaf. During periods of high moisture, the under side of the leaves, opposite of the yellow spots, becomes covered by a grayish white

This mold is actually the fruiting structures and spores of the Fungus. The spores are the reproductive

structures or "seeds" of the Fungus. The spores are more noticeable early in the morning, especially if a heavy dew is present. Spores are easily detached and carried by the wind from diseased to healthy plants.

Cool temperatures along with available moisutre are ideal for infection and disease development. Hot and dry weather will reduce or stop the disease development. Fungicide applications of Maneb should be applied before disease symptoms appear.

Another disease of Squash which occures during prolonged damp weather is Wet-Rot. This disease is caused by Choanephora Cucurbitarum. The Fungus is usually confined to the Blossom end of the Fruit. The Blossom ends of Squash Fruits turn black, water soaked, and covered by a Fungal growth that resembles numerous blackheaded pins. Under favorable conditions the Fungus may destroy the entire fruit. Diseased Fruits



Senator Glasgow Reports

By Senator Bob Glasgow

The one hundred and forty day session finally drew to a close, and I am happy to be able to go back to the District for awhile.

Of course, as you know, the House and the Senate failed to reach an agreement in Conference Committee on Congressional redistricting and the medical practices act, and this will force us to reconvene in a special session sometime this summer. Other possible subjects for special session scrutiny include the higher education construction fund, abolition of state ad valorem taxes. the water plan and changes in the Peveto tax plan.

Overall I was pleased with my legislative program as several measures that I either sponsored or cosponsored have been signed by the Governor or are awaiting signature.

Probably the most important bill of statewide significance that I carried. the oral confessions bill, passed and was signed into law. Texas is now the fiftieth state to allow oral confessions into evidence in a criminal trial. Additionally, the bill has more safeguards to prevent abuse than any other state's oral confessions law of which I am aware.

I was Senate sponsor of H.B. 364 that expanded the definition of aggravated rape in order to close loophole in that statute. Also, I was co-sponsor of S.B. 126 which enhanced the penalties for child abuse and sexual abuse of children.

Three bills that I sponsored relating to oil field equipment and crude oil thefts passed and are awaiting signature by the Governor. Another crime bill awaiting signature is a measure providing for reformation of judgments in death penalty cases.

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Two new District Courts have been created in the 22nd District, the 266th in Hood and Erath Counties and the 271st in Wise and Jack Counties. The 29th District Court moved wholly into Palo Pinto County, the 235th wholly into Cooke County and the 16th entirely into Denton County. Two new District Attorneys were created for the 266th and

Senate bill 561 providing for minimum standards for protective clothing for firemen was passed. This would set standards for clothing, boots, gas masks, etc. for full-time firemen.

Counties received some financial assistance from the state as both the lateral road fund and increased share of license receipts passed. These measures were sponsored by Senators Farabee and Traeger respectively, and I was a co-sponsor of both measures.

In the health care field I was the sponsor of the acts continuing the LVN licensing board and practices act and also the chiropractic licensing board and practices act. These two boards were subject to the Sunset Act review and necessitiated new legislation in order to continue their existence.

Local bills that I sponsored that were passed included

creation of a water district in Graham, creation of juvenile board in Palo Pinto County, amendment to Cisco Hospital Distirct dealing with leasing hospital facilities, and a bill dealing with bonded indebtedness for the Alvarado school

During this session twenty-three senate bills and seventeen house bills that I sponsored have been passed by both houses of the legislature.

Of course you have some bills that are very important and that you feel that should become law but they fail to

One was Senate Bill 197

that would have repealed a special interest bill passed in 1979 that allowed private water utility companies to include property given to them by their customers in the rate base. This has been a particular problem in the Lake Granbury, Parker County and Johnson County areas served by Tarrant Utility. The people were right but because of strong lobby and special interest pressures, the votes were against repeal of the 1979 legislation.

Another measure that failed to pass was a wrongful death act that would have allowed recovery for mental anguish and loss of companionship with a minor child is wrongfully or negligently killed. Presently, there is no recovery for wrongful death of a minor child except for funeral expenses under exceptional circumstances. This bill died in the rush on the final day.

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C.-A four-year omibus Farm Bill has been formally voted out of the House Agriculture Committee that, if passed by this Congress, is in many ways unacceptable to U.S. farmers and ranchers.

I have personally fought many of the proposals in that bill throughout the drafting process and, having failed to revise some of the more unacceptable elements, will introduce an amendment calling for the expiration of the legislation at the end of

the 1982 crop year. The Farm Bill, as approved by the Committee, does not address the current problem facing agriculture and that is profitability in the marketplace. We must have programs that will enable the farmer to receive a reasonable profit on his investments. The question that I have continued to raise is why we should continue the same programs that have placed our famrers in such critical financial conditions. We need to look at alternatives that will address this problem in a more favorable

and realistic fashion. As a farmer, I know and realize that we cannot continue to operate as we have in the past if we are to survive. We cannot produce at an unprofitable level indefinitely. We must have agriculture prices on a paying basis if we are to continue to have a plentiful supply of food and fiber.

hope that we can at least "cut our losses" to the greatest extent possible. I strongly favor a permanent change from the traditional practice of drafting new agricultural legislation in the opening days of a new administration and a new

The first few weeks of a new Congress and a new administration are very chaotic under the best of conditions and this is certainly no time to be writing legislation of the importance of the 1982 Farm Bill. Congress and its committees need several weeks to organize and to become effective. At the same time, a new administration usually takes several weeks or months to get personnel on board and even longer to determine specific policy goals.

Due to the requirements of the Congressional Budget Act, we find ourselves in the position of writing four-year legislation before any one has a good idea of what direction they want to go.

I beieve that by passing a one-year bill this session and a four-year bill next year, Congresss can give the legislation the careful consideration it deserves.

WASHINGTON, D.C. 20510 The framers of our Constitution created a new system of government they called federalism. Simply stated, this

new concept provided for a strong national government to do those things that only such a government can do defend our shores, deliver the mail, regulate currency and other truly national functions.

But while the powers of this national government were considerable in its area of responsibility, all other powers were left to the states. Thus, the states, and in turn still more local jurisdictions, were responsible and sovereign in those areas which were more appropriately handled at that

Not only was this revolutionary, but also it worked. We Americans have enjoyed the benefits of a unified national government while preserving the maximum amount of autonomy to run our own affairs at the level

But over the past half century, the federal government has slowly encroached upon powers intended for lower levels of government. It wasn't an insidious plot. Wellintentioned people saw needs and misguidedly thought only a federal law or regulation could meet them. The only became more centralized through federal taxes to pay for government off its back. federal programs, more and more things were turned over to the national government -- a classic vicious cycle.

The Reagan Administration has developed a plan to rebirth of the federalist system it invented. systematically reverse this trend, to restore federalism in its true meaning.

With the reams and reams of laws and regulations involved, it could take years to accomplish the process if only a hit or miss system was available. So the Administration has created two groups - the Coordinating Task Force on Federalism and the Presidential Advisory Committee on Federalism. The Task Force is comprised of the highest level presidential advisors and cabinet members. The Advisory Committee is composed of governors, state legislators, mayors, county officials, U.S. Senators and Representatives and private citizens. Both are chaired by Sen. Paul Laxalt of Nevada.

These people will be in a unique position to review current laws and regulations, draft proposals for new legislation and executive orders and help see that necessary actions are taken in timely fashion.



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
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
