



Dash Crofts Jams in Cisco

Dash Crofts, the local half of the internationally known Seals and Crofts duo. took part in a jam session last weekend in Cisco, but attendance was limited, and very few in town knew about it.

In fact, Crofts, though besieged by fans in large cities throughout the United States, never seems to attract much attention in town. He's just part of kin, in a way, said his father, Sutton.

A longtime resident of Cisco, Sutton Crofts saw his two sons Dash, 42, and Bob, return home last weekend for a family reunion on the occasion of Bob's

Like Dash, Bob lives in the Los Angeles area, but because they are parted by 50 miles, they don't see each other too often. Bob, retired from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, now works for the state of California.

They know who he is, and they leave

"After that thing was over, there were 500 kids out there trying to get autographs," Sutton recalled. He said his son remained behind an hour, just trying to get to them all.

Seals and Crofts, of course, were quite drummer. popular in the 1970s, but from what Crofts tells his father, the entertainment duo has seen its heydey and is now content to enjoy life a little more. 'They've kind of had their end of the

thing already," said father Crofts of Seals and Crofts' place in the music business. "and they're ready to take it easy and be with their families." Dash Crofts has indicated he may do

little more recording, since that is their "main thing," the elder Crofts said. "But they're sort of coasting

Crofts and Jimmy Seals no longer live close to each other. Crofts continues to live in the Los Angeles area, but Seals lives in Costa Rica on a "coffee farm,"

said Sutton Crofts. Geographic distances don't keep the two from communicating frequently, though, and the elder Crofts shudders to

think what the phone bills are. Crofts himself maintains a home in Mexico but has been reluctant to move

there because of the problems the Mexican government has given him on everything from furniture to banking. Seems the Mexican government wants to put a 100 percent duty on all the fur-

niture Crofts wants to move down there. The government also wants him to put a considerable sum of money in its banks. Sutton Crofts remains one of his son's biggest fans. Recalling his son's youth, he says, "When he was growing up, he

The group persuaded Crofts to join them for the rest of their tour. He and Seals, from Iraan, Texas, played with the band several more years until they wound up the only ones left.

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Failure Of Medical Practice Act Will Not Affect Doctors, Hospital

If Texas does not have a Medical Practice Act on Sept. 1, you wouldn't be able to notice the difference, the Health Freedom Council believes.

People would continue to go their usual doctors. Hospitals, clinics and physicians' offices would continue to function normally. "There would be no 'panic in the streets,' despite what the Texas Medical Association has been saying," declares Gene Mithclel, president of the Austin-based, consumer group.

The medical association has stated that "hospitals willclose and doctors will not be able to write prescriptions" if a special session of

the legislature does not pass a new licensing law by Sept.

"This is not true," said Mitchell. "The TMA is just using 'scare tactics' on the public in hopes of pressuring passage of the same law that was rejected by the legislature last week."

Doctors' licenses would not automatically expire just because the Board of Medical Examiners, licensing agent for the state, had ceased to exist, said Mitchll.

'Also, if any problems were to develop, we could expect the courts to make a reasonable interpretation of the intent of the legislature (in allowing the medical board to die) and therefore the courts would provide for continuation where needed of vital medical services,"

If there is no longer a state board to license doctors after Sept. 1, Mitchell believes that a new, private system would soon take its place.

"The mechanism is already proven," said Mitchell. "Some 22 or more private medical speciality boards now operate very successfully throughout the U.S., certifying the training and competence of the physicians who qualify. There

"Another big plus would be that practitioners specializing in prevention of disease would be on an equal would simply be another such board, this one certifying basic Texas medical practioners."

The public would greatly benefit, he said, because quality assurance under the new, private system would be based on consumer acceptance and satisfaction, com-

pared to the present method which, based on the police power of the state, is subject to discretionary enforcement and abuse.

"Consumers could then be assured of the training and competence of any health practitioner they might want to choose-yet they would also have a broader choice, unrestricted by government, of any therapy that seemed to work for them," said Mit-

footing with those who specialize in the cure of

As for "quacks" and "frauds"-those who might try to take advantage of the new freedom by, for example, posing as a "certified physician"--those people could be prosecuted for fraud under already existing Texas law.

The reason the Council fought the re-approval of the medical board, which was going through the state's "sunset" process- is that the propsoed legislation failed to outlaw several abusive practices and failed to apply standard checks and balances required of all other state agencies, said Mitchell.

"And if the TMA is concerned over what might happen if they fail to get the law they want by Sept. 1, they should also worry a little about what would happen if they were to get such a lawa law that I believe would besure to come under attack in the courts on constitutional grounds," Mitchell added.

In anticipation that the battle over a Medical Practice Act will be re-fought in a special session of the legislature later this summer, the Council is gearing up to carry its "freedom of choice in health care" message to the public in a series of informational meetings that will be held in cities throughout the state in the next few weeks, including Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth, san Antonio, Tyler, El Paso, Amarillo, Beaumont, and many others.

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

'Bill' - Not 'Will'...

Reflections in Perspective By: L W Ussery

Yes, Elizabeth, there is a Santa Claus (to paraphrase that priceless excerpt from the "New York Times"). But no, Elizabeth, there is no such person as "Will I. Ussery". Yes, child, that is your grandfather's photograph, but the name belongs to someone who insofar as I know is a figmentation of the fertile brain of the newspaper writer.

Then why, you ask, was the picture and the article accompanying it identified as that fictitious individual? Honey, I can only explain that perhaps it is the manner in which writers play with reckless abandon with the names of people. But perhaps it is my fault, after all.

You see, little one, when your grandfather was born (I cannot escape the feeling that I've told you this story before...but one of the prerogatives of age is that of repetition) he was christened "Isaac Weldon Ussery". And actually, my dear, he was never any attempt to change that name. Nor is he living under an assumed name...nor an alias. It is just one of the tricks of fate that names sort of get themselves changed around...even set aside in favour of what may be considered by one's associates to be a more befitting monicker.

Throughout my growing-up years, and for quite some time thereafter I was known to kinsmen and friends alike as either "Ike" or "Weldon". When, a few years before the birth of your father, William J. Ussery your grandmother and I moved away from the environs in which we were born and brought up, I became known for the past part by only my initial. Yes, child, that would make it "I.W." I was also known in some circles by the then quite appropriate nickname of Slim". And one courageous group even tagged me



name (never used in my presence, but which was not a source of annoyance) of "Bear Tracks"

And then your father was born. He was about the friendliest little tot you could imagine. Accompanying me on my rounds of the oil patch in my work car, he smiled and gurgled and giggled to every man who approached the vehicle, however oil-smeared. And your father, my dear, was known from the day of his birth simply as "Bill."

Now people have a way of arriving at conclusions. Someone...a District Superintendent under whom I worked at one time, as I recall...assumed that your father was a "Bill Junior" and began referring to the two of us as "Big Bill" and "Little Bill". And when Little Bill was not along, it became simply "Bill". That calling name stuck, and either followed or preceded me for the following years. For more than forty years, that is; the most of my remaining adult life.

It was a name which was easy to spell, to remember and to pronounce. I made no attempt to change it. After all, it was a name which had been used by my father and by his father....and which would be borne by my son. An honourable name, it was. I rather liked it. So; "Bill Ussery" became the name by which I was known to people on four continents and in more countries than I can remember, offhand.

It would seem that a certain publisher, feeling that the name of "Bill" could do with a degree of dignification changed it to "Will". No fault in that. Everyone, regardless of his name can do with a trace of dignity. And most especially if that introduction of dignity constitutes an improvement. Again; I file no protest.

While I continue to answer, with all the respect I can muster to the names of "Weldon" (to the few of my early-life friends who are still around), "Bill", "Bill Sahib", "Agha e Bill" "Senor Beel", and even on rare occasion "Tio Guillermo"; the Certificate of Appointment which shall adorn the wall of my newly-acquired office will identify me as the same person whom you've known for all your life: "I.W. Ussery" But what's in a name, other than a means of identity? I once knew a very prominent citizen whose wife was named

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Volumes seem to have been taxes. written concerning the problems of the marginallyemployed worker and the need to protect the employee from the abuses of the employer.

Little thought has been given, however, to the multitude of problems facing the employers of such labor, whether that employer runs a household and depends on a part-time housekeeper or a hamburger stand and hires teenagers after school.

The inclusion of such workers under the minimum wage law creates the first set of problems, with many employers simply unable or unwilling to hire workers at the standard minimum rate.

Even if the federal minimum hourly wage rates are met, the employer may well find himself in the position of the case outlined in the publication, The Exchangite, recently. The retired businessman, a widower, told of his experiences in trying to hire a part-time housekeeper. The employee had medical problems that would make it difficult to find employment elsewhere and really needed the job. And even though the employer met federal wage standards, in order to employ her legally, he was required to fill out and file 13 different state and federal forms, plus pay a total of \$442.35 a year in Federal Social Security taxes and state and federal

unemployment insurance

All of these problems were encountered, I might add, after the man had found someone willing to do the work. Many potential employees turned down the minimum wage job to live in governmentsubsidized apartments at low rentals and subsist on welfare or Social Security payments, bank interest and other types of minimal income. Their desire and will to work have been destroyed by the federal largess, he believes.

No wonder that many employers and employees now agree on wages paid in cash from hand to hand, with such income never reported. I am not justifying breaking the law, but I do understand the frustration that can lead to such a practice.

Federal rules and regulations have reached the heighth of the ridiculous. If I have work to be done and am willing to pay you to do that work; if you need work and are willing to perform the task I advertise for the pay I offer, to what degree does the government have the right to interfere? That is the question.

I sometimes think government has been determined to legislate and regulate common sense right out of the picture and has become far too successful.

We now have a golden opportunity to make significant changes in the way government affects us.

And, Elizabeth, it would be observed that while baptismal names are quite important for purposes of records; they don't mean all that much in everyday life. The good (if any) that a man does is not done by his name; it is a lasting reflection on the nature of his character.

Roy Benavidez Named Texan of The Year'

heroes of the glorious past lacks not in present-day heroes, among whom is Master Sergeant Roy P. Benavidez (Ret.) of El Camp who performed some of the most spectacular acts of bravery under fire in the Vietnam War.

For his heroism he received the nation's highest honor for personal valor, The Medal of Honor, presented by President Reagan earlier this year.

The Texas Press Association will present to him, with gratitude and pride, its most prestigious honor, The Texan of the Year Award, during special ceremonies at the association's 102nd summer convention June 26 in Fort

Sergeant Benavidez will be the 12th Texan in the association's long history to be so honored.

Benavidez will be accompanied to Fort Worth for the June 26th event by his wife, Lala, and their children, Denise, 14, Yvette, 11 and Noel, 8.

Participating in the ceremonoiy will be TPA past president, Fred Barbee, publisher of the El Campo Leader-News, and TPA's current president, James Roberts, publisher of the Andrews County News in An-

Over 400 Texas publishers,

families and guests will be on hand for the red, white and blue event at the Cowtown's new Hyatt Regency Hotel.

Benavidez, though retired after spending 22 years in the U.S. Army, is now spending most of his time talking to youth groups and schools, promoting pride in this nation and trying to rekindle old-fashioned "good, patriotism.

Benavidez has never lackthis particular patriotism, as ribbon upon ribbon on his uniform attest. The act directly responsi-

ble for his receiving The Medal of Honor was his remarkable courage, physical stamina and selfless determination to save a 12-man Special Forces Reconnaissance Team, all of which had been caught in ambush on a jungle battlefield in 1968 in South Vietnam. Benavidez was with the 5th Special Forces (Green Berets) Group. He alone volunteered to try for what seemed to be an impossible rescue - and was wounded again and agin, but managed to pull at least eight of his comrades, some also wounded, from enemy fire and get them into a second pickup aircraft which flew them to safety. The first helicopter, directed to the area by Benavidez, had been shot down by the

Most Medals of Honor are given in the field or immediately thereafter. But in the aftermath of Benavidez actions, he was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the Army's second highest

However, a number of years later, when buddies and Publisher Barbee -recalled his special heroism, they pushed for the highest. It took a few months, but when buddy after buddy stepped forward to hail Banavidez as their life-saver under the most dangerous circumstances, Reagan, in an emotional presentation earlier this year, presented him The Medal of Honor. The President broke precedent in recounting the entire saga of his jungle heroism and read the complete Medal of Honor citation.

Subsequently, Benavidez was honored by both houses of the Texas Legislature and Governor Clements declared a "Roy Benavidez Day."

TPA's other Texans of the Year, equally famous, but none of them a war-time hero of great acclaim, include the following: Earl Campbell, football great; Paul Richards, noted baseball manager; Van Cliburn, renowned pianist; Dan Blocker, T.V. star; C.B. (Tex) Thornton, industrialist; Phyllis George and Shirley Cothran, both Miss Americas; Dale Evans, entertainer/philanthropist; Allen Ludden, TV personality; Ray Berry, football great; and Alan Bean, astronaut/moon walker.

FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW

THE TEXAS REAL ESTATE LICENSE ACT

"SECTION 15. The commission may, on its own motion; and shall, on the verified complaint in writing of any person, provided the complaint, or the complaint together with evidence, documentary or otherwise, presented in connection with the complaint, provides reasonable cause, investigate the actions and records—it a real estate broker or real estate salesman. The commission may suspend or revoke a license issued under the provisions of this Act at any time when it has been determined that:

"(1) (A) the licensee has entered a plea of guilty or nolo contendere to, or been found guilty of, or been convicted of, a felony, in which fraud is an essential element, and the sime for appeal has elapsed or the judgment or conviction has been affirmed on appeal, irrespective of an order granting probation following such conviction, suspending the imposition of sentence; or

"(B) a final money judgment has been rendered against the licensee resulting from contractual obligations of the licensee incurred in the pursuit of his business, and such judgment remains unsatisfied for a period of more than six months after becoming

"(2) the licensee has procured, or attempted to precure, a real estate license, for himself or a salesman, by fined. depreparement of fact in an application for a real estate license; or

"(4) the licensee, while performing an act constituting a broker or salesman, as defined by this Act, has been guilty of:

or fraudulent action; or

"(3) the licensee, when selling, trading, or renting real property in his own name, engaged in misrepresentation or dishonest

"(A) making a material misrepresentation, or falling to disclose to a potential purchaser any latent structural defect or any other defect known to the broker or salesman. Latent structural defects and other defects do not refer to trivial or in againficant defects but refer to those defects that would be a significant

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Winning The War Against Fleas

DALLAS-Fleas seem to making it big in Texas.

Over the last five to seven years, fleas seem to have become more and more of a problem, particularly in urban and suburban areas.

Cat fleas which infest dogs or cats and readily attack

humans are the most common, says an urban entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

How do you control these rritating pests?

Flea control must include treatment of the pets and thorough treatment of the entire premises-indoor and outdoors. These three areas should be treated simultaneously to break the 'flea-cycle" and get effective control, emphasises the entomologist.

Insecticides containing carbaryl (Sevin), dischlorvos (DDVP), pyrethrin, rotenone, malathion, methoxychlor or propoxur (Baygon or Sendran) are labeled for use on animals. Dusts or powders are generally preferred over sprays for treating pets and should be used at three to four-day intervals when infestations are heavy.

Rub the dust into the animal's fur by hand. Be especially thorough around ears, between legs and around the tail. Try to avoid getting dust into the eyes, mouth and nostrils. Flea collars which contain propoxur appear to be superior to

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those which only contain dichlorvos. Be sure to read the label before using any of these products and consult a veterinarian if questions

Spray all infested outdoor areas such as the yard, porches, garages and outbuildings with chlorpyrifos (Dursban), diazinon, propoxur or carbaryl. Be sure to treat areas used by pets, and let the spray dry before pets or children are allowed to use treated areas, says Owens. Repeat the spray at two-week intervals until fleas are controlled.

Inside the home, begin control measures with thorough cleaning. Vacuum all floors and upholstery and dispose of sweepings immediately to prevent flea escape and subsequent reinfestation. Also, launder all pet bedding.

Apply an insecticde spray of chlorpyrifos (such as Rid-A-Bug) to all floor areas, under and around upholstery cushions, and to pet bedding areas. Also spray moldings, baseboards and draperies to a height of one foot above floor level. Try to avoid further vacuuming and cleaning for 10-14 days after treat-

While this insecticide should give three to four weeks of effective residual indoors, it will not rapidly knock down adult fleas. In conjunction with the residual spray indoors, homeowners might also use a nonresidual insecticide applied as a total-release aerosol or fogger, suggests the entomologist. Products containing pyrethrins, resmethrin (SBP-1382) and dichlorvos are available to

provide quick relief from indoor fleas. Again, be sure to read and follow all label directions and precautions with these products.

One final place which may require insecticide treatment is the family car, especially if your pet is a frequent rider, adds Owens.

Disease Attacks St. **Augustine**

Gordon Woolam

Recently Augustinegrass lawn was investigated and found to be infected with Gray Leaf Spot. This is an important leaf disease of St. Augustinegrass caused by a Fungus, Piricularia grisea. This disease will also less frequently attack Bermuda grass. This is a particular threat due to all the recent wet weather.

The disease is recognized by irregular brown to gray spots on the leaf blades. The common symptom is the depressed blue-gray centers of the spots that have irregular brown margins surrounded by a ring of chlorotic tissue. Lesions may also occur on the sheath and spike of infected plants.

The disease develops rapidly with abundant moisture and temperature from 70 degrees to 80 degrees F. Disease severity increases with increased Nitrogen fertilization. Newly sprigged or rapidly growing grass is more susceptible then well-established.

Gray Leaf Spot control includes watering during the day so foliage will not remain wet overnight and avoiding excessive Nitrogen fertiliazation. Effective control of Gray Leaf Spot can be accomplished with applications of Fungicide, including Maneb, Captan, or Chlorothaconil (Daconil).

Although final figures are not yet in, Texas Agricultural Extension Service estimates show cash receipts from crops at about \$3.8 billion, down only slightly from 1979. Total receipts from all agricultural commodities for 1980 are pegged at just over \$10.1 billion, almost the same as the previous year.

"These cash receipts, however, don't show the severity of damage that production levels underwent or the squeeze on net income," says Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension economist in marketing.

"Drought and higher production costs have placed serious financial hardships on many farmers. Young farmers and those depending heavily on credit or capital are under considerable financial strain. Record-high interest rates have added to the burden."

According to Anderson, hot dry conditions severly damaged crop production and caused subsequent price increases.

'Prices went up because of the small amount of crops that were available after the summer," explains Ander-

Despite weather problems, last year's crop receipts should have an agribusiness impact of about \$16 billion on the Texas economy, he says.

As far as receipts from different commodities are concerned, cotton alone brought in \$1.4 billion.

The South Plains of Texas brought in the bulk of cotton receipts with an estimated \$665 million. South Texas (mainly the Rio Grande Valley) had the second highest cotton receipts at \$163 million.

Wheat and grain sorghum ran a close race for second

Wheat, a winter and spring crop, generally escaped the drought's wrath. The

Panhandle area led the state in value of wheat produced with \$164 million while North Central Texas was second with a wheat crop of more than \$85 million.

The Panhandle also boasted the highest cash value from grain sorghum in 1980 at \$174 million. Second was the Coastal Bend with a sorghum crop valued at \$116 million.

Corn ranked fourth on the list of estimated cash receipts from crops for 1980,

totalling about \$349 million. Top producing areas were the South Plains at \$213 million and the Panhandle at \$76 million.

Rice ranked fifth in estimated cash receipts, totalling more than \$274 million. The Upper Coast is the state's major riceproducing area with receipts of \$260 million. The remainder of the crop is grown in the Coastal Bend.

Other crops that contributed much to 1980 agricultural receipts were vegetables, about \$250 million; nursery stock, \$225 million; soybeans \$104 million; peanuts, \$83 million; and hay, \$45 million.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday, Texas cities collecting the one percent city sales tax have received \$310.7 million in rebates during the first six months of 1981.

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Bullock said the June sales tax rebates to cities totaled \$28.3 million, compared to \$24.9 million during a comparable peroid in 1980.

Sales tax rebates through June of 1980 totaled \$266.9 million, according to Bullock.

Cisco's sales tax through June of 1980 is \$10,470 bringing that city's year-to-date total to \$87,417.

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



THE CISCO PUBLIC LIBRARY — A DREAM THAT CAME TRUE

Residents of Cisco and visitors to the town enjoy browsing through the Cisco Public Library, located on Ave. G and 6th Street. The facility, which is owned by the Twentieth Century Club, opens on Tuesday, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 2:00 to 5:30 p.m. Mrs. J.J. Porter the dedicated Librarian offers a number of services to the public, including a special summer program for children.

This summer films based on popular children's books are being shown each Thursday afternoon from 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. On a recent afternoon 81 children came out to enjoy the pictures.

The tan brick Library

building, constructed in 1932, is included in a recently designated historic district of Cisco. Its timeless styling - actually Spanish in appearance - has lost none of its attractiveness over the years. And past the shady pecan trees and welltrimmed front lawn everything in the building seems to speak of quality. Quality books - about 1500

volumes in all - classic fur-

nishings, and carefully

chosen decor.

There are two main rooms in the building, with smaller alcoves and numerous bookshelves. The room on the north is used as a reading room for Library patrons and a meeting place for the Twentieth Century Club, and cultural and Community Service organization. Mrs. M.D. (Louise) Allison is the current President of the

The southeast side of the larger room is arranged as a Children's Library, with scaled-down furnishings, bright pictures, and many inviting books. In one corner hangs an appealing painting of a boy named Paul H. Mitcham, who died at age 7. Paul was a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Mitcham of Cisco, and the portrait was done by an artist named Macie Hytt.

The Librarian's desk, across from the children's section, displays books by local authors. Nearby is a special bookcase containing memorial books given to the Library. These gifts, Mrs. Porter states, are always appreciated. Sometimes towns people also give cash memorial gifts in honor of a

Most visitors to the Library are apt to view it in one diminision - that of how it looks and what it offers in 1981. But Mrs. Porter has spent almost 24 years as Librarian, and she has a perspective reaching backward to the obstacles covered and forward into hopes for the future.

She speaks, first of all, of the early Twentieth Century Club, and the dreams this group had for a fine Library for Cisco. By 1932 the Club had raised the money for the present building, and their wise choice of construction is evident today. The group also provided basic funds to keep the Library in opera-

By the summer of 1957, however, the Library had several problems. The hardwood floor in the main room was falling through, and the whole interior needed remodeling. And the Librarian, a retired teacher named Mrs. J.E.T. Peters, was moving away from Cisco and could no longer run the place

Mrs. Porter, who belonged to the Twentieth Century Club, worked along with Clubwomen and other in-

terested persons to restore the interior. Before summer was over, a Twentieth Century Club leader was suggesting:

"Etta, why don't you take over as Librarian?'

At this time the last of the four Porter children was making plans to attend the University of Texas, so Mrs. Porter realized she would probably have some extra time. And her husband, a businessman, was civic minded and supportive of such a project.

So on August 1, 1957, Mrs. Porter began her work as a Librarian in the restored building. Since then there have been some changes in furnishings, rugs, and the heating and cooling systems.

'And I've lived through it all." Mrs. Porter chuckles.

From the beginning Mrs. Porter learned that the basic hours the Library is open are only the tip of the proverbial iceberg, as far as duties are concerned. There are reports to make, book ordering, research concerning books, and much correspondence. Some of this correspondence is in the field of public relations, where people want information about things in the area.

residents often come to the Library as their first place of personal information and intellectual contact. The warmth and friendliness shown them by Mrs. Porter helps make them feel welcome in the community.

A Librarian, too, must attempt to keep up with current books and reading trends, and incorporate worthwhile material into the shelves. Mrs. Porter has always had a special interest in children's literature, and constantly orders the best material available for them. Summer is the time of year when children use the library the most and adults also follow this trend.

On a year-round average the Cisco Public Library circulates around 500 books per month. All books and services are free, with the exception of a small charge on very expensive current adult books.

The Cisco Library can obtain books on loan from the Abilene Public Library, or request books on loan for individuals. The Library is participating in a program from Austin in which "talking books" are recorded on a cassette or record for



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
