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CofC Breakfast-Go'ers Hear Of Possible City-Wide Project

Dr. Norman Wallace, president of Cisco Junior College, presented a proposal for a city-wide project in Cisco at the quarterly Chamber of Commerce breakfast. The breakfast was held Wednesday morning at the White Elephant Restaurant.

The proposed project would need the support of the entire city of Cisco, as well as encouragement from all the citizens. It would not be associated with any certain organization or group here, but would be a community project in which any willing person could become involv-



Norman Wallace **Tells Rotarians About Project**

An innovative, co-

operative and communitywide program for restoring housing of the elderly who have limited incomes was urged to the Rotary Club Thursday noon by President Norman Wallace. The program, suggested by a similar and successful project at Midland, would be entirely voluntary, both in financing and labor-except in some instances where city codes, such as respects plumbing, must be professionally met. Governmental grants and dictation would

not be involved. "We complain about government interference and public spending of tax funds in a wasteful manner on projects such as this," said Dr. Wallace, "but unless we are willing to accept a personal responsibility for the conditions that bring it about, we have no right to fuss about it." He said he knew of no project within its area of need that would be more beneficial to the community, and asked that the Rotary Club join with other service and civic organizations to set it in motion on a limited basis that could prove its effectiveness and hopefully spark a broader development. The same appeal is being taken to the Chamber of Commerce and to other Cisco clubs, he said, and he indicated that the Lions Club has already made a very favorable response.

The organization, supported by contributions of money and labor, would be governed by a board of directors chosen from the cooperating groups in carrying out its projects for restoration of sub-standard housing belonging to or being bought by persons sixty or more years of age and of limited income

The club, without a formal vote, declared its willingness to become an associated sponsor and set an item for the selection of a director on the business agenda of next weeks' Ladies Night pro-

would be to repair housing in Cisco which belongs to the elderly who are on fixed or low incomes. Such a program has been successfully in operation in Midland, Texas, since 1973 and would be the model for such a project in Cisco, although the two would not be linked

together. Such a project, if put into operation, will be entirely dependent upon Cisco for its success. Money or materials for repairs must be raised locally and local persons will need to volunteer some of their time to work on houses being repaired.

Dr. Wallace said he would like to see the project put into operation here and one house being redone next spring or summer. He said such a project would need a Board of Directors and suggested each organization in Cisco could select someone to serve on the Board.

"People taking care of their own people" is the theme of such an organization, according to Dr.

The qualifications for hav-Midland project would probably serve as the same guidelines for Cisco if the project is accepted here. Those qualifications are: Eiderly (60 years or older); Handicapped (if not elderly); own home (or in process of buying it); low income (financially unable to afford repairs - for example, receiving Social Security or Veterans Benefits).



Growing Geraniums

By Ted Brice

It has been said that geraniums which are natives of South Africa, are known and loved by more people than any other flower in the world.

Geraniums grow almost anywhere with a minimum of care and are found in most gardens. The color range for geraniums are white, pinks, brilliant red and a purplish black. Geraniums grow outdoors from year to year with little attention.

They can become shrubby plants four to five feet tall while in colder climates they are treated as small delicated annuals. The Lady Washington Geranium, also called Martha Washington may rech a height of three feet and have huge clusters of three to four-inch single

and double blossoms sometimes blotched with a darker shade on the two upper petals.

The ivy and the common geranium produce single or double flowers. The ivy geranium receives its name from the ivy shaped leaves and the trailing and sideways growth that can extend up to four feet. The common geranium which is the most popular normally grows two to three feet all but may reach and height of six feet or more.

The variety of geranium with the concentric markings on the leaves is among the common variety. Sometimes this geranium is also refered to as zonal

scents. There is not a geranium scent such as other plants have. The geranium may have a rose, lemon, peppermint, apple or nutmeg scent to mention only a few. Then the geranium may have no scent what so ever. The fragrance emanates from the leaves not the flowers.

You may use the ivy and common geranium as borders, beds and pot plants because they will bloom through out the growing season. The ivy geranium is particulary effective in hanging baskets and window boxes. They can also be used as a ground cover.

The Lady Washington is not as successful in many sections of the country as other geraniums since it

Day and Memorial Day.

Most geraniums thrive in climates with dry summers, warm days and cool nights. They do best in full sun but will grow in partial sahde if they have sun for at least half of a day. The soil should be well drained and only medium rich.

Most gardners buy geraniums as budded or flower pot plants ready to set out in the yard. It takes five months for geraniums to flower from seed therefore most plants are raised from cuttings. If you plan to grow geraniums from seed plant them 10 to 12 weeks before the last frost inside. Seedlings should be transplants to two-inch pots when the first leaves appear and shifted up to four inch pots as they

Keep the pots in a sunny location. The seeds will germinate unevenly over a period of three to eight weeks. Transfer them to the garden after the danger of frost is over sotting them one foot apart. When setting out ivy geraniums for ground cover set them out 18 inches apart and pin down the runners and they will root.

FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW THE TEXAS REAL ESTATE LICENSE ACT

"SECTION 15. The commission may, on its own motion, and shall, on the verified complaint in writing of any person, provided the complaint, or the complaint together with evidence, documentary or otherwise, presented in connection with the complaint, provides reasonable cause, investigate the actions and records of a real estate broker or real estate salesman. The commission may suspend or revoke a license issued under the provisions of this Act at any time when it has been determined that:

"(D) failing to make clear, to all parties to a transaction, which party he is acting for, or receiving compensation from more than one party except with the full knowledge and consent of all

 $^{\prime\prime}(E)$ failing within a reasonable time properly to account for or remit money coming into his possession which belongs to others, or commingling money belonging to others with his own

"(F) paying a commission or fees to or dividing a commission or fees with anyone not licensed as a real estate broker or salesman in this state or in any other state, or not an attorney at law licensed in this state or any other state, for compensation for services as a real estate agent; or

"(G) failing to specify in a listing contract a definite termination date which is not subject to prior notice; or

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Reflections in Perspective By: L W Ussery

Death seems to hold an unusual fascination for the majority of the Moslem peoples with whom we've associated. Among the Shi'ites, the date of the death of Mohammed is observed with deep mourning. Likewise the fortieth day following the date of his death. Likewise the death anniversaries of the thirteen "Imam"s who have followed the Prophet at the helm of The Faith. Also the date of the assassination of the Prophet's son-in-law and grandson. That occasion is commemorated by several days of mourning, culminating in the deep, deep mourning period of "Morraham" during which people literally whip themselves into an almost fanatic frenzy.

But the dead, themselves, following a funeral are treated quite unceremoniously. We have seen corpses, covered by a carpet, carried in an open litter on the shoulders of six or eight stalwarts leading a procession to the cemetery where the body, carpet and all, is dumped into a waiting grave. Volunteers fill the grave, and to all intents and purposes it is forgotten. By Western standards, that is. Rarely have we seen a tombstone marking the final resting place of the

In Dubai, the principal burial ground was right alongside a paved road which skirted the city along the bank of the inlet from the Gulf. Graves were marked by small slabs of coral on which there was usually no marking of any nature whatsoever to indicate the identity of the occupant. Weed grown and unkept, it presented somewhat a dismal scene. As the city grew, there was need for that space for a new thoroughfare. And said thoroughfare was constructed with total disregard to the occupants. Not all of the graveyard was paved, but a goodly slice of it became covered by a concrete slab underneath which hundreds of the Faithful await the

Perhaps it is jsut as well. After all, a body, after a period of time becomes a totally inert lump of clay. "Earth to earth ashes to ashes" is taken quite matter-of-factly.

But I prefer the American System. Once, in the course of the survey for construction of a cross-country gas pipeline the engineering crew hacked its way laboursly through a mile of dense timber and underbush only to emerge into a tiny clearing which had once been a homesite. And right smack in the center of the proposed right of way was the family burying-ground. Without a single comment (for the record) the party returned that mile to the last bend in the line, made a slight correction and re-surveyed the line in order that the sanctity of the burial plot would be undisturb-

Then there was the time on the island of Das when on a Thursday night, following the weekly movie in the "Artisan" camp a coolie stepped out onto the road in front of a lumbering truck which was loaded with yet other coolies. The man was struck and died, instantly. There was a gathering in the Staff Camp where the Arab Affairs Officer of the Oil Company was found and was summoned to proceed immediately to the quarters of the Ruler's Representative, Sheik Hamdan bin Mohammed where the body was being prepared for burial by the Mullah.

Newspaper Rates Raised

Due to increased postage and paper costs, subscription rates to this newspaper will be raised slightly effective July 1, the publisher has an-

"We've tried to keep the rates as low as possible, and probably should have raised them last Jan. 1, but we held off hoping that our costs would level off," he said. "This hasn't happened and with the pending postal increase in July, we find it is necessary to institute new subscription rates."

The less increase will be for local subscribers who will see their yearly subscription cost increased by only one dollar a year. The new rate will be \$13.00 per year, mail delivery for the two issues a week.

The out-of-county rate will go to \$16.00 per year, and in order to defray bookkeeping costs, the cost for those who continue to subscribe by the month, the monthly rate will be \$1.25 per

These are still substantial savings over the newsstand rates of 25 cents each, which will be maintained for the time being.

The average monthly postal cost for mail distribution to this newspaper is approximately \$500. But it has been learned that the customers prefer the delivery of their papers by mail which insures a dry, regular delivery, and the newspaper will continue to deliver in this man-

Newsprint is now about \$450 a ton, and the delivery charge for each van load continues to in-

The newspaper recently switched from a Tennessee newsprint to an East Texas paper made from Texas pine.

In little more than an hour, Abbas returned to the party. "How about the poor coolie?" he was asked. "Dead and buried". Was Abbas' reply. "What!" I burst out. "Already buried?" "Of Course". Said Abbas. "Dead. Isn't he?" And that ended that.

In the center of Kuwait City there is a small, triangularshaped park. Covered with grass, and with beds of well-kept and nearly arranged oleanders and periwinkes; it was once a cemetery. At the time it was used as a depository for the dead it lay just outisde the walls of the "Old Town", and its existance had been totally forgotten until the construction of a street was commended. When a profusion of skeletal remains began to appear in the excavation, an older resident came forward with the recollection of the cemetery. The city authorities ordered the direction of the street altered, and thence the park. The small supola which was erected in the center of the little park provides a favourite resting place for the passersby in the cool of the evening.

Texas Crude Oil Output Down

DALLAS-Despite a ninth consecutive year of maximum production schedules (the maximum efficient recovery rate) in nearly all of Texas' fields, the state's annual output of crude oil and condensate last year fell below the one-billion barrel mark for the first time since 1965. Moreover, a downward production trend continued for the eighth consecutive year since Texas' output peaked in 1972.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 1,220,079 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 3,334 barrels per day. Production in 1980 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 128,269,920 bar-

The total of 960-million barrels included more than 931-million barrels of crude oil. Also produced was 29-million barrels of condensate, according to figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Associa-

Last year's production level showed a drop of more than 46.5-million barrels from 1979 output and was more than 330-million barrels below 1972 proudction of almost 1.3-billion barrels. Nevertheless, production in 1980 pushed the all-time cumulative total since 1889 to almost 45.7-billion barrels of crude oil and condensate.

Edwin L. Cox, president of the Dallas-based Association, noted that despite the drop in output there is a very encouraging trend in one aspect of industry activity: Since President Carter began a gradual phaseout of crude oil price controls on June 1, 1979, a phaseout accelerated by President Reagan, the number of wells drilled in Texas has skyrocketed.

Last year's total of 18,697 wells completed was the largest number since 1957, Cox noted. This compares with 16,149 drilled in 1979 and only 7,728 drilled a decade ago in 1971. At that time, the average price of U.S. crude oil was \$3.48.

"Although exploration costs continue to increase, the industry is committed to a policy of intensive drilling in Texas. It is hoped that successes with these wells will help offset further production declines this year and in the future." Cox said.

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





The weather has been most unusual. The last half of March, April and the first half of May was very dry in Eastland County. We needed rain to have adequate soil moisture for planted crops. Finally on May 15 we receiv-

Now, we have gone through three weeks of June and it has been too wet to plant. Many of our peanut, cotton and grain sorghum crops have not been planted yet. Some have replanted

two or three times. The weather also delayed wheat harvest and hay harvest. Because of rain during the last 30 days the forage sorghum crops are the best we have seen in this county. The problem is getting these forage crops baled before they get too mature.

We are still below average in rainfall for 1981, even though we had 3.8 inches in May and 4 inches in June. Some parts of the county have had more than this amount. In Eastland we have recorded 13 inches of rain in 1981.

The cool weather the last week or 10 days has also been unusual. It is pleasant, but unusual for mid-June.

Southwestern Bell Proposes Increases In Local Rates

Pointing out that local telephone service is far from paying its own way, Southwestern Bell today proposed significant increases in local monthly rates for

Texas customers. The company asked the Public Utility Commission to approve increases of \$5.45 per month for one-party residence service, and increases up to \$14.40 per month for one-party business service. Basic party line rates also would in-

Local increases make up about 87 percent of the company's total request for \$469.8 million in new rates.

In addition to local rates. the company also asked for increases in private line service, TouchTone services, and Custom Calling charges. Also requested was implementation of a new measured service plan for local calling in exchanges served by electronic switching systems.

No increases were proposed for long distance, WATS, coin calls, Directory Assistance charges, telephone instruments, terminal equipment, one-time service connection charges, or telephone answering ser-

"Substantial local rate increases are inevitable," said

"Local service is priced well below cost. Rates for the service must cover more of the costs. The time is here for local service to begin stan-

"Increases in local service have not kept pace with increases in other goods and services," Mrs. Morton pointed out. "In fact, the basic local rate in some Texas cities and towns today is less than in 1976."

Southwestern Bell is not proposing changes in intrastate long distance rates. Long distance rates provide significant subsidy to basic local telephone service, said Mrs. Morton. "Right now in Texas she said, "rates for one-party residential service would have to be about \$16 per month higher if residence service did not receive subsidy, primarily for long distance." Morton said that competition in the long distance market will begin to drive long distance rates more toward the actual cost of providing long

distance service. Morton said that regulators years ago made the decision to price local service well below cost, and


