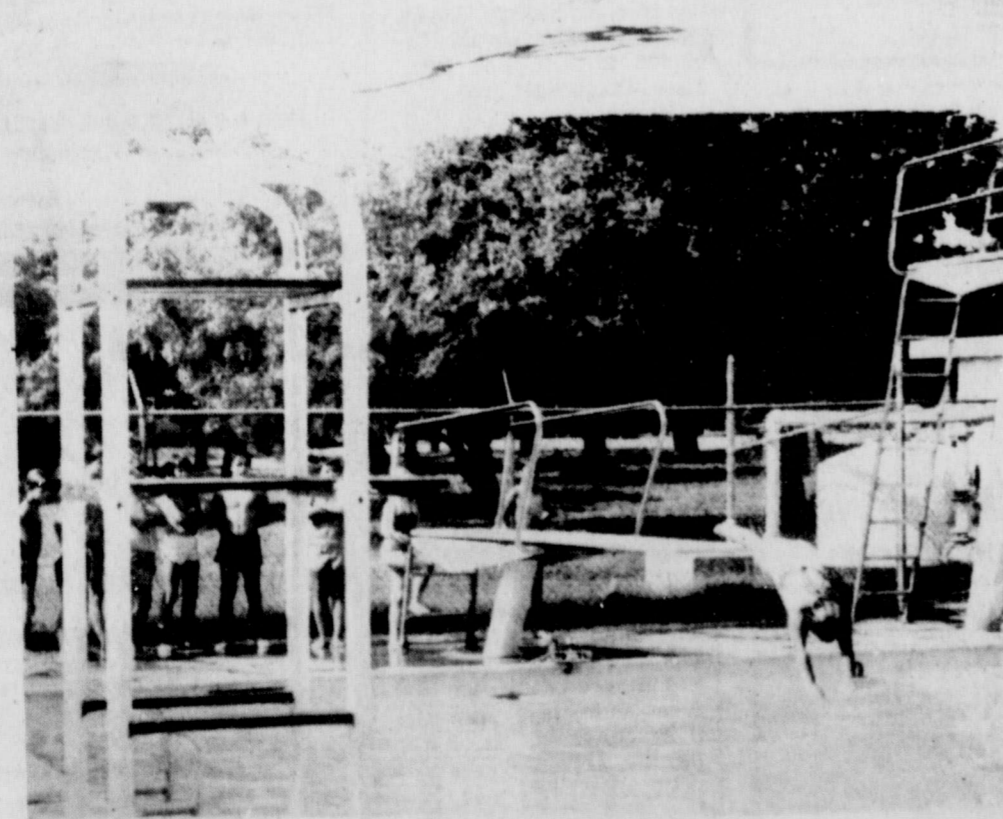
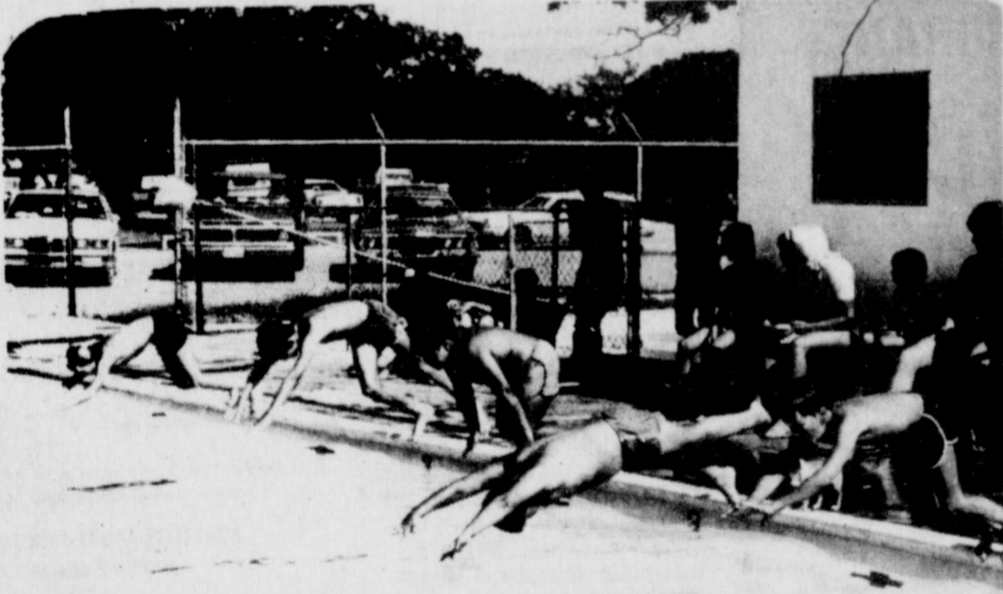
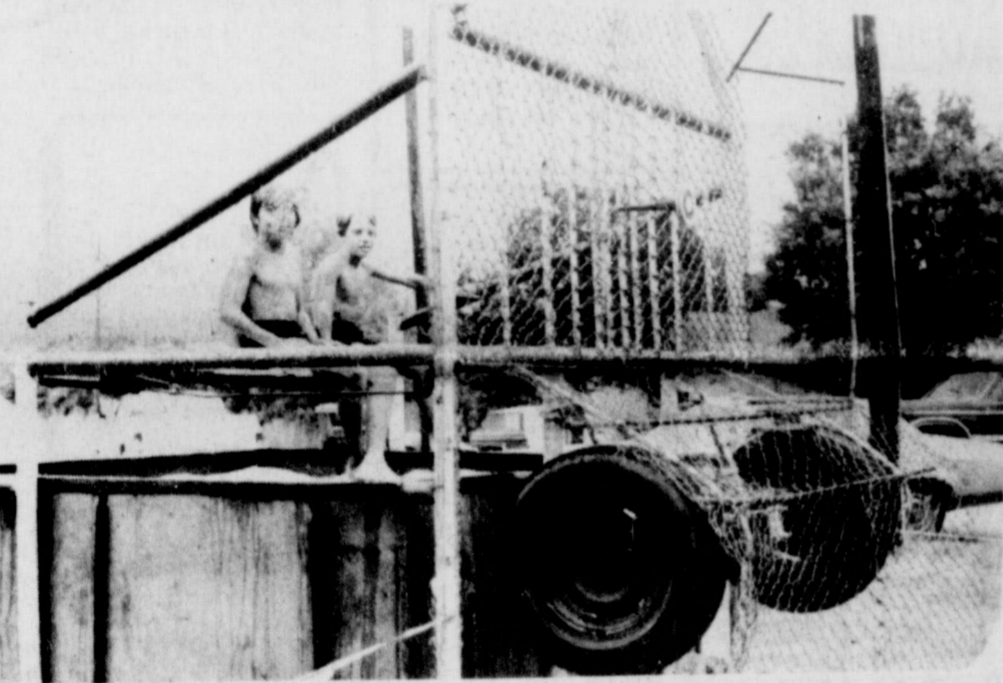

Mountain Top Pentecostal Church Pays Off Sanctuary

It has only been a few weeks ago since the Greater Mountain Top Pentecostal Church, located 10 miles south of Cisco on Highway 183, "burned" the note on their new annex, and now the church has paid off the sanctuary. The note was carried by the Rising Star Bank and was scheduled for a seven year pay-off and it was paid-off by the congregation in four years.

The congregation voted in a recent annual business meeting to appoint a "study committee" for an addition to the annex of a 30x60 dining room and family center. In a second meeting the congregation accepted the committee's recommendations and voted to proceed as the plans are finalized. This will be the third building program for the church in the past four years. Pastor John C. Jones has pastored the congregation since March 1968, into his 13th year with this church. He reports the reason for the growth the



church has enjoyed is their great love for "back to the Bible sermons" and ability to respect pastoral leadership.

Additional plans building around the "family centered church" are in the heart of the pastor. The church has built for "families" and on Friday night the families come for baseball, volleyball, indoor football, air hockey, and many, many more family activities.

Assistant to the pastor, Rev. Phil Schaefer oversees all of the family night activities as well as the "layman's prayer breakfast" at the White Elephant Restaurant every other Friday morning at 6:00, and is open to all laymen of Eastland County. In addition to these activities, Ronnie Pipkin directs the Cisco Nursing Center services each Tuesday evening at 6:00 and also works with his wife in the

church tape ministry outreach, which records each of the pastor's Wednesday Bible studies, Sunday School lessons, and two Sunday sermons, and these are available to the public, and are distributed over the nation by various orders and outreaches. The congregation is mostly made up of people in Cisco, but others attend from as far away as Abilene and Brownwood areas.

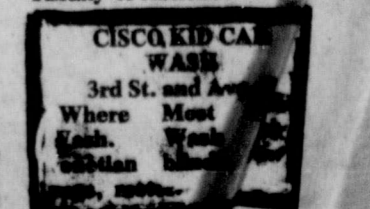

THE BEAUTIFUL COLEUS

The coleus is a tender plant with colored leaves or

attractive flowers. They are natives principally of Java and tropical Africa and belong to the Mint family, Labiateae. Coleus is the Greek for sheath, and refers to the arrangement of the stamens.

The modern varieties of Coleus with brightly colored leaves are descended from C. Blumei, which has bronze-colored, nettle-like leaves. The leaf coloring is very varied and ranges through yellow, pink, red, crimson and green. The flowers of the colored-leaved kinds are comparatively inconspicuous. These plants require a minimum temperature of fifty-five degrees and must be potted in rich, well-drained soil when grown as house or greenhouse specimens. When used for outdoor summer beds and borders they thrive in any good soil. They need full sunshine.

To keep pot specimens shapely, the tips of the shoots should be pinched occasionally to promote bushiness. Plants that have filled their containers with roots should receive applications of dilute liquid fertilizers at weekly intervals.

The most important flowering Coleus is C. thyrsoideus, a native of Central Africa and a perennial that grows to a height of three to four feet and bears bright blue flowers of great decorative value. An important point to remember about this plant is that if it becomes necessary to pick off faded leaves this should be done with an upward pull; if a leaf is removed with a downward pull a long piece of stem will be stripped from the stem and remain attached to the base of the leaf that is pulled off.

Another good flowering species is C. shirensis, which is also a native of Central Africa. It grows about three

feet tall and flowers a month or two later than C. thyrsoideus. It, too is a perennial. Its flowers are paler blue than those of C. thyrsoideus.

Coleus Fredericii, native of Angola, is an annual or biennial kind that has richly colored deep purple flowers

in the early spring. It grows to a height of three to four feet and forms well-blended bushy specimens.

The Coleus is best used in this area as border plants for our flower beds and replanted each year as a pot plant for our homes to add color. Lets color our summer with Coleus.

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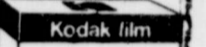

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — As we move into the second century of our history as a nation, beginning our 205th year, we move from an era of criticism to what I believe is an era of true optimism.

Many times during the past 205 years, our nation has faced problems that have seemed insurmountable. But every time a major obstacle to our country's well-being comes along, Americans have been able to reach down to their bootstraps, pull themselves up and stand tall.

There are a few basic reasons for our success as a nation.

First is the Constitution of the United States — a very simple document. In very clear terms it outlines our country's course . . . our aims and purposes. That document, written 205 years ago, is as good today as it was when the ink had just dried.

Then we look at the real foundation of America — democracy, capitalism, free enterprise, if you please. These are the cornerstones of our political foundation. We look and see that Webster defines free enterprise as freedom of private business to organize and operate profitably in a competitive system without interference from government beyond regulation necessary for protection of the public interests and to keep the national economy in balance.

Since the 1930s, however, our government has been moving in a steady course away from some of those basics and on a path of spend, spend, spend and tax, tax, tax — all to support a government philosophy of MORE, MORE, MORE.

This tremendous growth of government spending and influence has brought our country to the point where we have just about killed the goose that laid the golden egg.

The free enterprise system

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has been challenged. To understand what is happening to erode that cornerstone of our country, we should listen to a voice from the past. Professor Tyler of Edinburg University expressed it very well back in the 18th Century when he said:

"A democracy cannot exist as a permanent form of government. It can only exist until the majority discovers it can vote itself monies out of the public treasury. From that time on, the majority always votes for the candidate who promises the most benefits from the public treasury, with the result that a democracy always collapses over a loose fiscal policy, always to be followed by a dictatorship."

That need not be this country's destiny. With determination and resolve, with courage, sacrifice and hard work on the part of every citizen and every elected representative of that citizenry, the second century can be our country's brightest century.

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The President has won some important battles in his fight to bring the federal budget under control, winning crucial votes recently in both houses of Congress that will pave the way for his budget reforms.

Questions have been raised, however, about the effect a combined program of tax and spending cuts will have on our goal of a balanced budget. I'd like to show, in the limited space available, how these programs will bring about a balanced budget and how they fit in the President's overall economic program.

These tax and spending cuts do represent integral parts of the President's program. The Federal Reserve, as another part of the program, must not permit inflationary expansion of the money supply, a direction in which the independent Fed seems to be moving.

The President's proposed tax rate reductions are needed to offset rising tax rates due to the inflationary policies of the past. The tax reductions will be more than paid for, however, (1) by reductions in spending, (2) by additional revenue generated from faster economic growth and (3) by higher levels of private saving.

As to balancing the budget, that will be impossible without the tax reductions. It has become clear in recent years that the budget cannot be balanced simply by taxing at higher and higher levels.

No, what is needed is less government spending and increased production in the private sector which the tax cuts will generate. Without the tax cuts, the economy will continue to stagnate.

This continuing stagnation will increase pressure for spending on welfare programs at the same time that tax receipts are beginning to fall because of reduced work and investment.

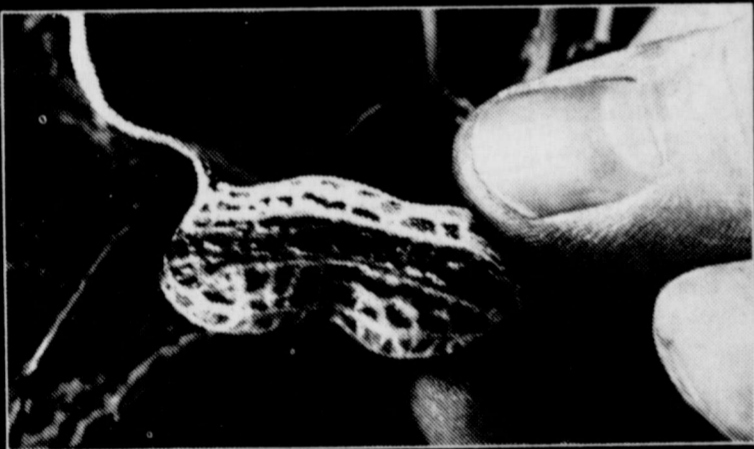
On the other hand, if tax rates are cut, the incentives mentioned earlier will stimulate additional work. Unemployment and welfare spending will fall. Tax receipts will rise. More goods will be produced, easing pressure on price levels.

Reduced inflation will ease government spending, as cost-of-living adjustments become smaller. Interest rates will also fall, lowering the burden of financing and the national debt, all leading toward a balanced budget and less inflation. Indeed, without such a program there is little hope of ever balancing the budget.

It is true that deficits will continue for the next two or three years. This is simply unavoidable given the fantastic growth in government spending programs which has occurred in the past few years.

To end the deficits any sooner than the President's economic program projects would require the absolute abolition of many essential programs, including some in the defense field.

The solution today, then, is to cut taxes and stimulate work, investment and saving. If enough saving occurs, and it is believed that it will, then the temporary governmental deficits will be financed from that saving rather than through the inflationary process of Federal Reserve money creation.

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Homemaker's Tips

by Janet Thomas

Quick pickles and relishes are made from fruits or vegetables which have not been through a brining process. Quick pickles and relishes add spice to meals and snacks. They contribute some nutritive value, contain little or no fat, and except for the sweet type, are low in calories.

Ingredients Used in Pickling - Use pure granulated salt, if available. Table salt with filler to prevent caking may make the brine cloudy. Use a high grade cider or white distilled vinegar of 4 to 6% acidity. Do not dilute vinegar unless the recipe so specifies. If you prefer a less sour product, add sugar.

White or brown sugar may be used. White gives a lighter product, but brown sugar may be the preferred flavor. Soft water is recommended to assure proper acid formation. Use fresh spices for best flavor in pickles. When whole spices are used, tie them loosely in a thin bag of cloth.

Utensils - Use stainless steel, aluminum or glass utensils.

Jars and Lids - Use jars free of cracks and chips to be assured of a good seal. Use metal bands in good condition. Metal lids with sealing compound are used only once. Wash jars in hot soapy water and rinse well. Fill jars while they are hot to 1/2 inch of top. The jars are sterilized in the waterbath process.

Hot Waterbath - Quick pickles and relishes are processed in the waterbath to inactivate enzymes that affect color, texture and flavor and to destroy organisms that cause spoilage.

Pack quick pickles or relishes in jars according to directions given in the recipe. Adjust lids according to manufacturer's directions. Immerse the hot jars in boiling water. Be sure water comes an inch or two above the jar tops. Cover the container with close-fitting lid and boil as recommended

for the given length of time. Remove jars immediately and set upright several inches apart to cool. Caution: Avoid overprocessing pickles as they will lose crispness and become soft and mushy.

RECIPES FOR THE WEEK

Chow-Chow Relish
12 1/2 lbs. green tomatoes
8 large onions
10 sweet green peppers
3 tablespoons salt
6 small hot peppers, chopped
4 cups vinegar
1 3/4 cups sugar
3 tablespoons salt
4 tablespoons dry mustard
3 tablespoons celery seed
2 teaspoons tumeric
2 tablespoons mustard seed

Chop tomatoes, onions and sweet green peppers, and sprinkle with salt. Let stand 4 to 6 hours in cool place. Drain well; add hot peppers, vinegar, sugar, salt and spices tied in thin cloth bag. Simmer 15 minutes. Remove spice bag. Pack into hot jars. Close. Process in boiling water 5 minutes. Remove spice bag. Pack into hot jars. Close. Process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Begin counting time as soon as water returns to boiling.

Dilled Okra
3 lbs. uncut young okra pods
celery leaves
6 small red hot peppers
cloves of garlic
large heads of dill or 1/2 t. dill
1 quart water
1 pint white vinegar
1/2 cup salt

Pack okra into hot pint jars with a few celery leaves, pod of pepper, clove of garlic and head of dill or dill seed in each jar. Make brine of water, vinegar and salt; heat to boiling. Pour over okra. Close jars. Process in boiling water bath 20 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as jars are placed in actively boiling water. Makes about 6 pints. Okra will shrivel as it is heated, but will become plump again a few days after being processed.

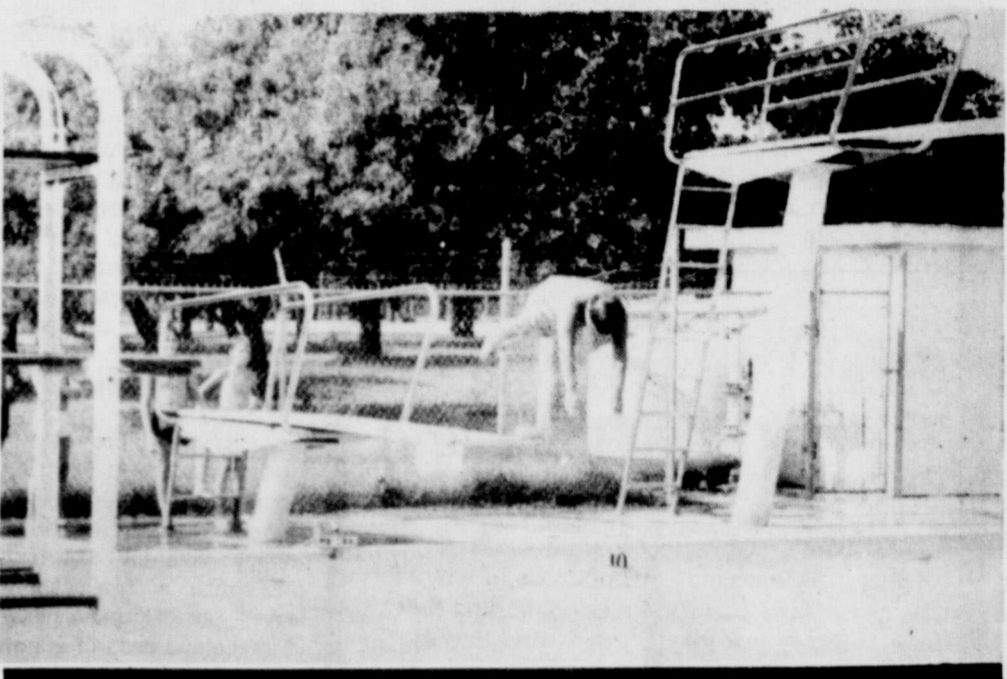
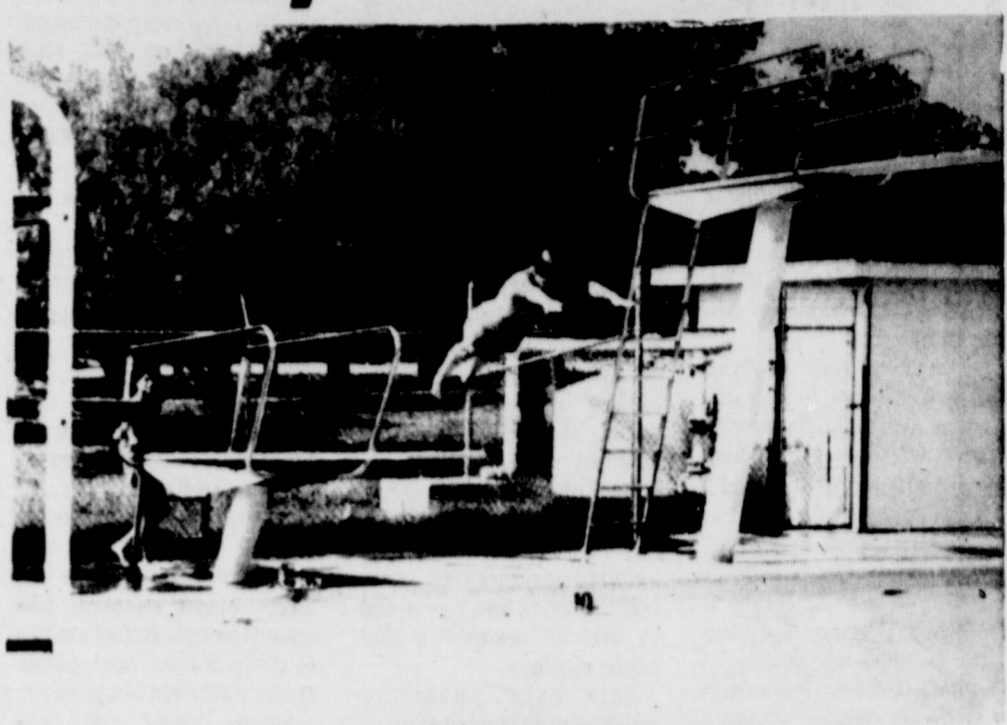

A: All hospitals and nursing homes within 60 mile radius of Cisco are covered. This includes Abilene. (Service beyond this boundary will be rendered at additional charge of \$1.00 per mile, one-way.)
- 5.Q: How long will the initial Campaign run?
A: From July 1, 1981, through July 31, 1981.
- 6.Q: How many Ambulance units will there be in Cisco?
A: There will be one (1) Ambulance, and the second Ambulance will be sent from Eastland if needed.
- 7.Q: If a family or individual does not enroll during the initial drive, when will be the next opportunity?
A: July 1, 1982, except for new residents in the area who may enroll upon arrival.
- 8.Q: When will a membership purchased in 1981 expire?
A: July 31, 1982.

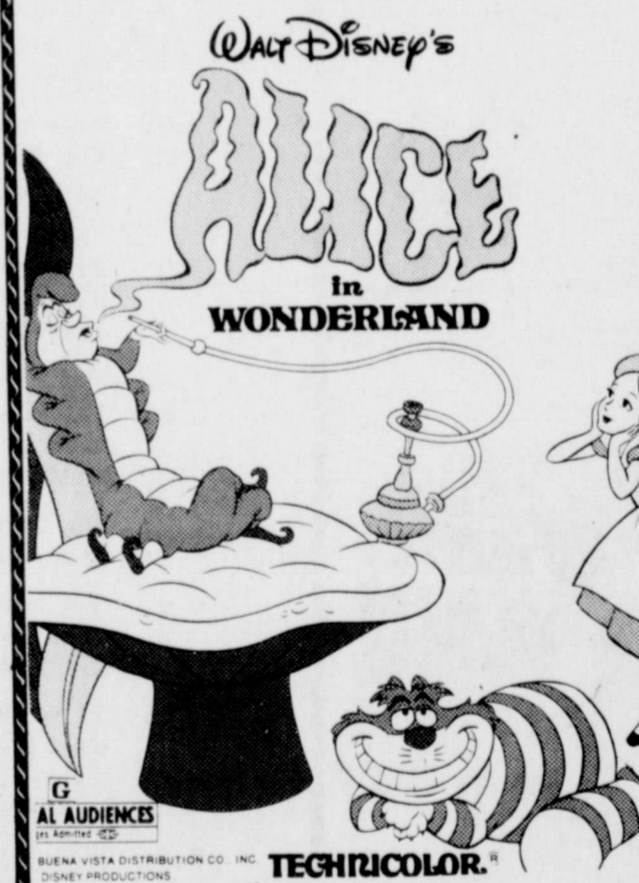

AVOCADO SELECTION, STORAGE

Avocados are not tree-ripened. Rather they're sent to market at a stage of maturity which will permit the consumer to select the degree of ripeness he wants.

Then the avocado will ripen in two to seven days if held at room temperature. After it begins to soften, refrigerate until serving time.

Peeled avocados may darken unless you use them immediately. To retard this, add lemon or lime juice, leave the seed in the container with the fruit and store in an air-tight container in the refrigerator. If

the avocado should darken in a place or two, cut that area away.

AVOCADO CHARACTERISTICS

An avocado's center or kernel is about the size of a walnut. The thick, buttery flesh of the fruit spreads like butter and is nutty in taste.

This fruit has a slightly acid flavor. Also, it contains a small amount of protein and up to 20 percent vegetable oil.

One-eighth of an avocado (about four inches in diameter) has about the same number of calories as a teaspoon of butter or margarine - about 45.

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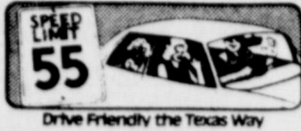

Peanut measurement rules changed for '81 crop year

PEANUTS--DRASTIC CHANGE

The measurement rules for peanuts have been drastically changed for the 1981 crop year. Regulations now provide that each farm will certify to its planted acreage of peanuts—THEN,

if the measured acreage differs from the certified acreage by more than 5%, the farm is ineligible for quota price support.

AS AN EXAMPLE

Farm A67 has a peanut allotment of 100.0 acres and the farm operator certifies to 85.0 acres of peanuts. On a random spot check, the farm measures 80.0 acres. Since the certified acreage varies from the measured acreage by more than 5%, the farm is not eligible for quota price

support. If the farm had measured 90.0 acres, the farm would not be eligible for quota price support even though the farm had underplanted the 100.0 acre allotment.

GRAIN SORGHUM/COTTON

It is also important that the planted acreage of grain sorghum and cotton be reported timely and accurately. Inaccurate reports can result in loss of program benefits such as loans, deficiency payments, disaster payments and price support.

AGRICULTURAL CONSERVATION PROGRAM

Requests for cost share for needed conservation practices are still being accepted on a continuing basis. Funds at this time are very limited.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE AVAILABLE

Due to the drastic change in the peanut and other program crop provisions we strongly recommend measurement service to those that are not certain of their exact crop acreages. Measurement service is available upon request and payment of cost. After measurement service has been performed the farm operator will be able to certify to the exact crop acreage or adjust the crop acreage should the farm be overplanted. REMEMBER measurements are guaranteed only in the year in which the acreage was determined.

FOREIGN OWNERS MUST REPORT

The Agriculture Foreign Investment Discloser Act requires that foreigners who purchase or sell one or more acres of land must file a report within 90 days of the transaction. Reports must be filed at the ASCS office in the county in which the land is located.

FINAL REPORTING DATE

The final date to report planted acreage of peanuts, grain sorghum, corn and cotton is JULY 15, 1981.

This office will be closed JULY 3 in observance of INDEPENDENCE DAY.

Dr. Cooksey stresses breakfast is important

COLLEGE STATION-- Skipping breakfast these days?

Don't. That's the advice of Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a foods and nutrition specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Breakfast is IMPORTANT," she stresses -- "to properly equip us for the day's activities."

"And when people don't eat breakfast, they're more likely to resort to skimpy, high-calorie, low-nutrition snacks by mid-morning," she adds.

A "better" idea is to try "Time-Saving Breakfast Breakthroughs," she says.

"Breakfast Breakthroughs" are Cooksey's answer to the "no-time, no-morning appetite" syndrome, she says.

"In fact, 'Breakfast Breakthroughs' are exciting as well as healthy," the specialist adds.

"One main thought behind them is that with a little imagination and advance planning, ho-hum breakfasts can turn into breakfasts extraordinary," she says.

Here are Cooksey's "Breakfast Breakthroughs":

The main key is to partially prepare your breakfast menu the night before.

1) Beat and refrigerate eggs for scrambling the next morning.

Or assemble ingredients for pancakes and waffles, measure them and set them aside.

2) Wash, peel and cut up fresh fruit or melons the night before. Combine these in your blender jar and blend. Refrigerate. In the morning, you'll have a cool vitality drink for a very different "Breakfast Breakthrough."

3) If you're getting back to basics with grains, make whole-grain muffins and breads ahead of time. Divide them into meal-size portions and freeze.

On the mornings you want these "Breakfast Breakthroughs," just heat them.

4) If you're one of those people who must be coaxed out of bed by the aroma of fresh coffee, then fill your

coffee maker with water and grounds, plug it into a timer the night before, and your cup of "enthusiasm" will be ready when you are in the morning.

5) Chop up cooked meats, fish, poultry or ham the night before and add it to your omelet for breakfast the next morning.

If you're a "peanut butter devotee," crumble cooked bacon and mix it with peanut butter for a spread on toast the next morning.

6) Grate up some of your favorite cheese the night before, and top English muffins with it -- or some other favorite topping. Muffins can be put under the broiler with the fresh topping and served up in minutes.

"With these 'Breakfast Breakthroughs' as a start -- and depending on how imaginative you are, breakfast can be a great time to wake up your taste buds and prepare yourself for a better day every day," Cooksey insists.

"Texas peaches are 'super' fresh because they are just hours off the tree," notes Hancock. "So ask your grocer or produce supplier for Texas-grown peaches for unsurpassed flavor and freshness."

Freestone varieties come into production in South Central areas in mid- to late June. The Sentinel variety is ripening in central and northern Texas and the Harvester is ready in South Texas. Ranger, Redglobe and Loring varieties will be ready soon.

"So enjoy the taste treat of the year. Sink your teeth in the best fruit available -- the Texas peach," suggests Hancock.

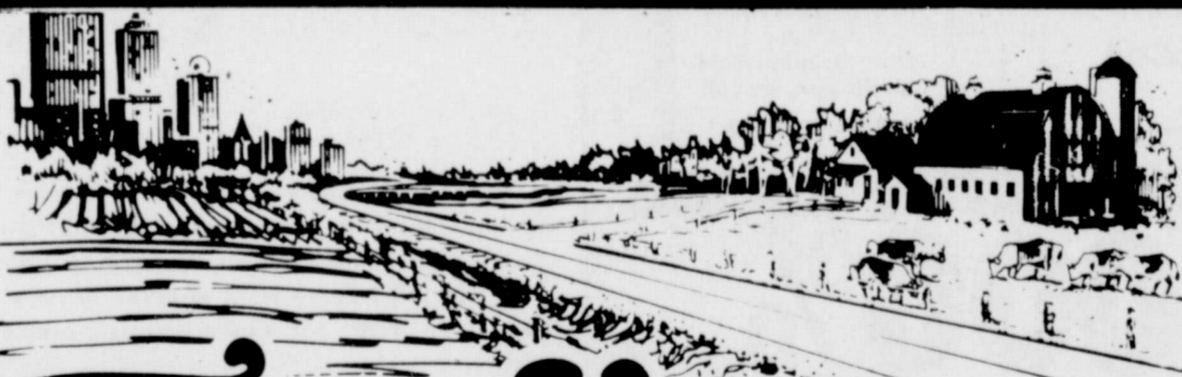

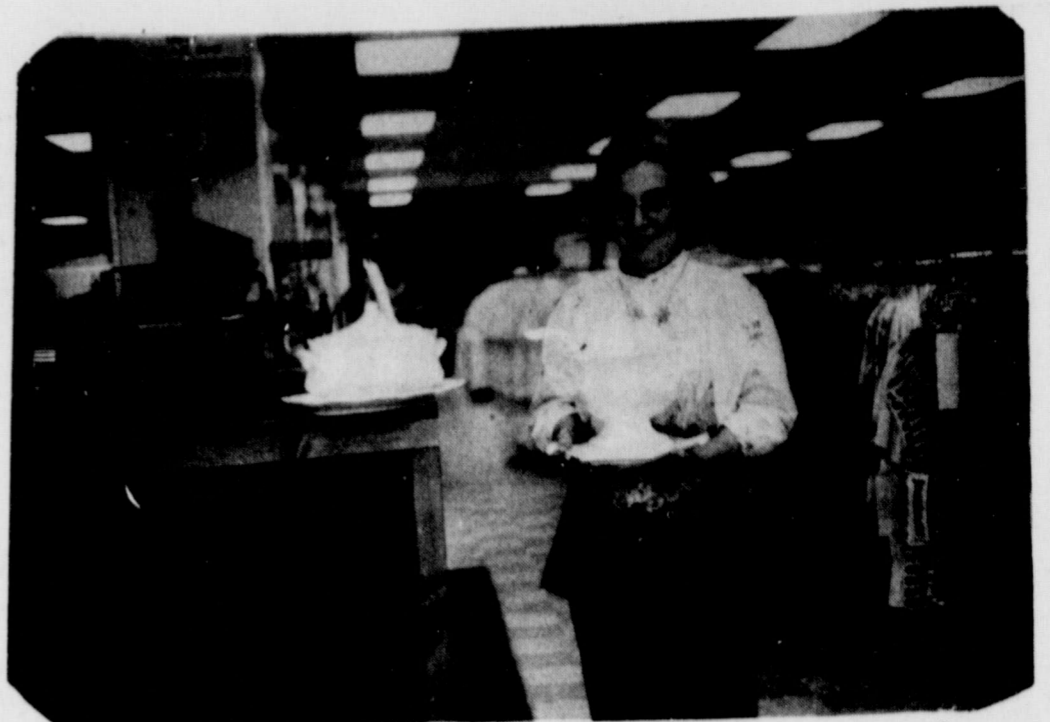
CJC Holds Band Camp Aug. 3-7

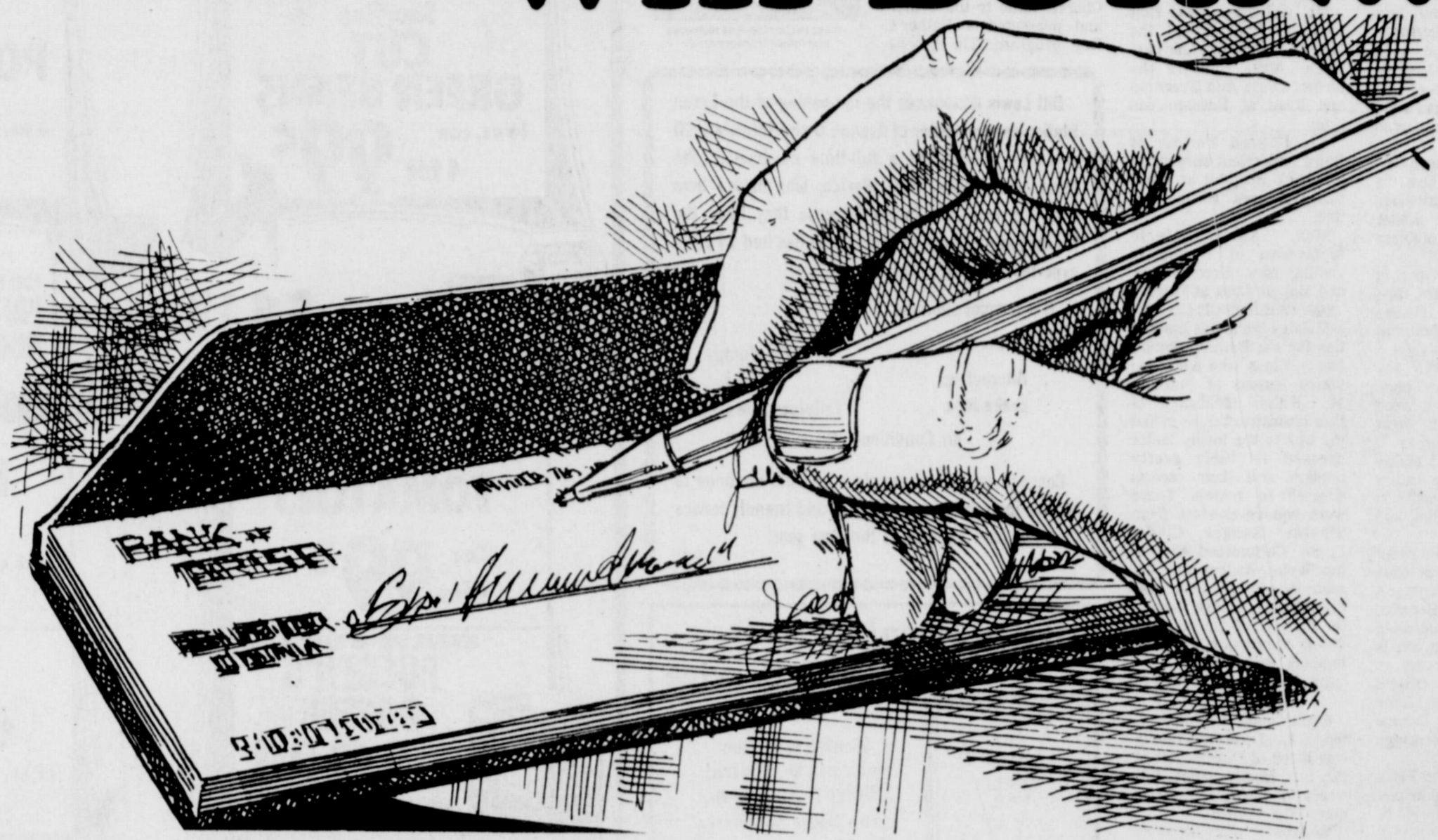
