
We need the cooperation of the people of Cisco, the city government and the hospitals to make this thing work," Rickey adds. "The community has to get behind it to make it work.'

# Research & Development Are Two Of Biggest Words In Energy Business

Research and Development are two of the biggest words in the energy business, Glen D. Churchill, president and chief executive officer of West Texas Utilities Company, declares.

In an interview with a reporter, Churchill said research and development, commonly referred to as "R&D," ranks at the top of priorities for companies involved in producing the power needed to keep America running. Nowhere is this more true than in the electric utilities area, he said.

"We're not 'just' interested in new sources of energy, we're 'vitally' interested," the WTU president said in discussing his company's R&D activities.

Churchill said that when a new, practical source of energy for conversion to electricity, or a new economically feasible method is developed, it will be done by, or at least welcomed by, the investorowned electric utility industry.

The interest of electric power companies in new energy sources didn't develop overnight. A look at the record shows the great amount of time, money and effort which has gone into research and development since Benjamin Franklin executed his kite-and-key experiment in colonial

America. If it seems more intense today than ever before, that's because it is more intense. There just isn't as much time left for the world to continue without new sources for developing power and energy to meet its needs, it is generally agreed. Even if the nation hasn't reached the "crash program" point as yet, today is no time for footdragging in the view of

energy experts.

WTU's interest in new energy sources didn't develop overnight, either, the Company president explained. Long before the perceived fuel crisis developed in the early 1970's, electric companies, including WTU, were seeking the most efficient and least costly methods of producing and distributing energy. WTU, for example, developed its generating system logically by using low-priced West Texas natural gas as boiler fuel for

its power plants. The Company's power plants (it has eight major stations) were located throughout the 52-county service area, near load centers and near the natural gas pipelines. Gas was extremely cheap, Churchill recalls,

and for many years electric rates went down instead of

The fuel adjustment provision, though long authorized to allow the utility to pass fuel cost increases to customers, never had to be utilized. Both the customers and WTU were doing well under those conditions. But the honeymoon ended

in the mid-1970's as the fuel crisis began. With gas shortages viewed as inevitable, the Texas Railroad Commission ordered utilities to begin phasing out natural gas as a boiler fuel. The state order was lifted later, but a rule under the federal Fuel Use Act still calls for eliminating gas fired plants by 1990 unless exceptions are made. WTU's current plants apparently qualify for exemptions, but it can build no new

gas-fired plants. "So, we were forced to turn to other fuels for future generation," Churchill explained. Until something better comes along, coal and nuclear are the only options. but nuclear actually is no option for WTU for several reasons. There are no suitable sites in the area, and the cost of an optimumsize plant is out of the question for a company as small as WTU, Churchill said.

Coal, then is the answer for WTU in the foreseeable future. Planning of the company's coal-fired Oklaunion plant near Vernon is complete, and actual construction is slated to start next

Fortunately for WTU and its customers, two other members of the Central and South West System will be partners in the huge Oklaunion plant, which would have been too large for WTU to build alone. Under the agreement. WTU will own 350,000 kilowatts of the first 640,000-kilowatt unit, Central Power and Light Company will own 115 and Public Service Company of Oklahoma 175. The fourth CSW company, Southwestern Electric Power Company, will not

participate. Beyond coal, WTU is taking part in a number of studies and research projects aimed at developing ew energy sources at feasible costs.

Historically, it is typical for an idea to take about 30 years to go from its initial stage to large-scale commercial reality, Churchill said. This is why most researchers hold out little hope for a real contribution from any of the exotic energy sources before the turn of the century.

But this hasn't stopped the Abilene-based company

#### from exploring these potential sources.

For the past several years, conservation "Has been preached in our advertising, brochures, by our speakers, etc." Churchill said. This, of course, is a way to save energy. And at least for the present it is a necessary, if somewhat negative, way to improve the energy outlook.

Other major efforts toward improving the overall outlook for future fuel to generate electricity for the Company's wide service area are positive in nature Churchill listed a number of these.

Gasification research in which WTU is involved is being done at the La Palma Power Station in South Texas to produce gas from coal and/or heavy oil in order to use gas-fired boilers without conversion.

Success in this field would be a major gain for WTU since its existing plants are gas-fired. This research is being done in cooperation with other companies which form Central and South West Corporation, the parent firm of WTU.

The Abilene based firm is involved in geothermal exploration in South Texas and in the Big Bend region. Again it is a joint venture with other CSW companies. A team of professors from the University of Texas at El Paso also are participating in exploration into this unique area of energy research. Solar experiments are be-

ing planned for the Paint Creek Power Station. A proposal has been prepared for Department of Energy to convert one unit of the plant to solar heat through the use of mirrors, storage facilities and other technology already known

The project is being undertaken in cooperation with Rockwell International and others, Churchill said.

West Texas Utilities is participating in fusion nuclear research through the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. Because of the tremendous cost of building nuclear plants for the foreseeable future the WTU efforts in that direction will be joint basic research only.

There have been some beneficial spinoffs from the research including organization of the Texas Energy Science Symposium for high school students.

National research by the industry is being done by the Electric Power Research Institute and WTU is a regular

participant in the institute's

Churchill and his West Texas Utilities team are convinced that they will continue to meet the challenge of the future in providing all of the power needed for home, business and industry in the 52 West Texas counties the company serves.

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## PEANUT PRICE SUPPORT THREATENED

Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller warned peanut producers in the state a move is underway in congress to destroy the peanut price support program. Amendments to the 1981 Farm Bill proposed by Congressman Peter Peyser of New York and Senator Richard Lugar of Indiana "are threats not just to the peanut program in this country, but to the entire farm price support program as well," Moeller stated.

Peyser and Lugar went to offer changes in the bill for peanuts which in l'eyser's words "begin to remove the price support system for this commodity" as stated in the Congressional Record of June 15. "With congress caught up in the budget cutting hysteria, there is a good chance an amendment like this could be adopted," Moeller remarked.

According to Moeller, critics of the commodity programs in congress are using arguments of costs savings to the government if the programs are reduced and a savings to the consumer on prices at the shelf. "What will really happen when this so called free market approach is adopted is that many peanut farmers will be forced out of business

**Grubs In Turfgrass** 

By: Gordon Woolam

One of the most common problems of Turfgrass in Texas is damage caused by the feeding of White Grubs. White Grubs are larval stages of June Beetles. They also feed on agricultrual crops such as Corn, Sorghum and Sugar Cane.

It is the White Grub stage which causes lawn damage during the Summer and Fall by feeding on the roots. Feeding of large numbers of Grubs causes lawns to turn yellow in the affected areas. Positive identification of the damage is possible when the yellowed grass can be lifted easily from the ground.

The Grubs become dormant through the Winter months living on fat reserves. In the Spring the Grub resumes feeding on organic matter. The Grub pupates (rests) for three weeks and then emerges as an adult ready to mate.

Major adult flights occur at different times of the year depending on the geographic location of the State. This is important, as it determines the critical treatment period. The flight period, in which adults are active, lasts about 11/2 weeks. After mating, the egg laying period averages 30 days. The egg will hatch in three or four weeks.

It is important to treat for White Grubs while they are in an early stage of development, the critical treatment period. Larger Grubs are difficult to control because of their size and the difficulty of getting enough insecticide down through the lawn. The critical treatment period is

about four to six weeks after egg lay. In this area it arrives during late July or early August. Lawns suspected of being infested with White Grubs should be inspected during the critical treatment period. Lawns can be checked by cutting and digging a 1-square-foot sections of sod and examining the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Sod and soil should be replaced and watered in. Take several samples at different locations in the lawn.

Treatment is usually recommended when more than four 1/4 to 1/2-inch Grubs per square foot are found. Insecticides recommended for Grub control are much less effective against eggs and large Grubs than against small Grubs. The toxicity of these insecticides is greatly reduced two to four weeks after application. Thus, insecticides applied too early

may not be effective in the soil after the eggs hatch. Granular forms of Diazinon or Dursban are recommended for the control of White Grubs. Granular forms of insecticide should be watered in with ½ to 1 inch of water.

# Homemaking Hints

If you're planning a cover of Texas bluebonnets for the home landscape next spring, seed should be planted as soon as possible.

Late summer planting is essential because bluebonnets are actually winter annuals. They germinate in late summer, and exist as a small rosette of leaves throughout the winter while developing a good root system. They then grow rapidly during the spring rainy season to produce sheets of blue flowers.

Many seeds are wasted each year due to improper planting. Just tossing the seed into a grassy area along the road or in the corner of the yard does little else than provide expensive food for birds.

Germination is a also a problem. Poor germination usually occurs unless something is done to soften the hard seed coat to allow moisture to penetrate.

The often recommended practice of puncturing the seed with a needle or ice pick will work, but is rather time consuming as well as hard on your hands. Scratching the seed coat between layers of sandpaper on a hard surface will help break the outer surface. Seed may also be soaked in water for several days prior to planting.

Since the Bluebonnet is a egume, there is some indication that better results are obtained if the seed is inoculated with a proper nitrifying bacteria. Some of the seed companies have the inoculating material available with the instructions as to how to use it.

In large scale plantings, it would probably be advantageous to use these agents. After treating, broadcast the seed on tilled soil, cover with 1/4 to 1/2 inch of soil, firm the soil, and water. Keep the soil moist until seedlings appear

- usually in a week to ten

Once established, bluebonnets seed themselves year after year, provided the seed has been allowed to mature, grass or weeds haven't become too thick and there has been sufficient rain in July and August to soften the seed coat. With a late drought, it would be advisable to soak the bluebonnet bed several times to

**Food Allergy Tests** 

Allergic reactions to foods and food-related substances sometimes pose an ever present threat to the physical and emotional well-being of you and your family.

However, you can take some simple and inexpensive steps to recognize and treat many food allergy problems. They're outlined by Dr. Doris J. Rapp in an article appearing in the summer issue of The Professional Nutritionist, a quarterly magazine published by the Foremost-McKesson Foods Group. Dr. Rapp, who practices pediatric allergy and clinical ecology in Buffalo, New York, is the author of a variety of books on allergies.

Dr. Rapp suggests indentifying suspected allergycausing foods by keeping a list of what is eaten on days of no allergic reactions and on days in which allergic reations occurs. By crossing off foods which appear on both lists, you'll probably be left with ona few foods eaten on a "bad" day, Dr. Rapp

You can then test the suspected foods by omitting each one ... one at a time ... from the diet in a five-day cycle. Reintroduce the omitted food into the diet on the sixth day. If you're sensitive to that item, you'll probably have exaggerated allergy symptoms within one hour, Dr. Rapp points out.

You must then either avoid the offending foods in all forms, or find a physician who knows how to treat food allergies with food extracts injected into the arm, or by using drops of the correct dilution extract under the

The author also reviews emergency procedures an allergy victim can use if stricken while away from home or visiting in a foreign country:

"Try to vomit. If you can't, take a cathartic, such as plain milk of magnesia, to help the food move more rapidly through the intestines

"An alternative is to take from half to full a teaspoon of baking soda in a half glass of water. Following with an additional full glass of liquid to further dilute the baking soda into the stomach. This may stop the food-related symptoms in any body location, not just in the digestive system, within about 20 minutes," Dr. Rapp advises.

In a dire emergency, advises Dr. Rapp, a hospital emergency room can relieve food for chemically-related symptoms in some patients within 10 to 20 minutes with intravenously-administered sodium bicarbonate or baking soda. And oxygen can be used to help relieve symptoms caused by food or chemical exposures which have precipitated sudden il-

Some people have allergic reations after eating innumerable food items to which they are sensitive while others are affected by eating only one or two foods. And sometimes it's not the food item which is at fault but an insecticide, preservative, additive or chemical in or on the food, Dr. Rapp says. Drugs, vitamins, mouthwash, toothpaste and similar items should also be placed on the suepect list since they contain food ingredients, she advises.

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

The U.S. Census Bureau estimates there were 1.1 million hispanics, age 55 and over or 9.2% of the total hispanic population.

However, the estimates of the hispanic association estimates the numbers to be greater than two million

elderly in the U.S. There are a variety of terms making reference to the hispanic community in the U.S. which includes Cuban-American, Mexican-American, Puerto Ricans and those from the Caribbean, Central South America and Spain.

The Mexican-American elderly comprises the largest number of hispanic elderly in the U.S. It is estimated over 800,000 of the Mexican Americans over 55 account for 10% of the total

Mexican-Americans population. The life expectancy for Mexican Americans is less than the majority of the population.

The seminar discussed most of the hispanic elderly do not have pension plans and are forced to work after

the age of 65. Many social factors were discussed concerning the elderly hispanic: for instance only 50% of the hispanic elderly receives social security compared to 75% for all other elderly; and the life expectancy for the Mexican-American is 56.7 years.

We found from the results of the seminar, as presented by David Malonado, that far too long the hispanic elderly has been ignored. The hispanic elderly, to be understood. ethnocultural background

has to be understood as it holds the key to their value systems.

The discussion at the seminar revealed the hispanic elderly of today have slowly overcome economic obstacles during their lives. They have done this by reaffirming the belief in the strength of themselves and within their culture.

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

The virus has been known only since 1978 with the first cases in this region being found in late 1979.

**A Killer of Dogs** 

According to Dr. Blazer, only a canine dog variety can get the disease, but it is highly contagious. It is transmitted by the fecus or urine of infected dogs. Flies may carry the disease from one place to another.

Parvo Virus Diarrhea is caused by a virus that destroys the lining of the small intestine. Dehydration from the diarrhea and vomiting is the major cause of death. The animal is unable to absorbe nutrients because of dehydration.

Symptoms of the disease have been listed as high fever, listlessness, vomiting, and diarrhea which often contains blood. From the time a dog is in-

fected to recovery or death is usually twenty-four hours to five days. The over all recovery rate is approximately 80%. Treatment is aimed at

prevention of dehydration and reducing inflamation of the bowels. Medication is given to control nausea with I.V. fluids and antibotics to prevent secondary infection.

Large or medium size adult dogs usually recovery often in 24-48 hours even with no treatment.

Young puppies and small or older dogs most often die. After a dog recovers its


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
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# **Eastland Centennial Memorial Library:** The Gift That Keeps Growing

Can the vision and contributions of a small group of women inspire a town to help support a Library? This has happened in Eastland, and Centennial Library - located at 210 S. Lamar - is the notable result. The facility, which is housed in a modernappearing building valued at more than \$100,000, was purchased and remodeled in the early 1970's through efforts led by the Thursday Afternoon Study Club. And now Mrs. Herman Hassell, the present Librarian, is in charge of about 19,000 books, which range from children's stories through current bestsellers to rare historical volumes.

Summer hours for the Library are from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. A small charge is made for the books, which can be kept one week. A Summer Reading Program for children is underway at this time, and this includes films. Mrs.

Eastland City's Official Historical Marker on the outside of the building, and the iron grill work and attractive planters. Then comes the large Library room, with adult youth, and children's reading areas. The children's section, besides containing hundreds of books, has pictures, toys, and a colorful table and chairs. A Conference and Reference room, to one side, has space for displaying art exhibits. There are rest rooms, a kitchen, and an Archives room with irreplacable records and material. And a background of biege wood panneling, soft green carpets, and colorful displays make the Library an inviting place to visit

The present Library had

its beginning with the Hawthorne Club of Eastland, which was organized in 1901. The ladies of this group had an ambitious project - they wanted to start a Public Library for the town. And they soon collected 700 donated books from the 1200 townspeople.

The first Librarian was Mrs. J.L. Johnson, who kept the books in her home. She was follwed by Mrs. A.H. Johnson and Mrs. Sallie Morris, who saw the project grow. In 1916 the sponsoring Hawthorne Club changed its name to the Thursday Afternoon Club, and affiliated with the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs

When Mrs. Morris left her post as Librarian the Club decided to employ Miss Cecelia Haas. So Miss Haas became the first paid Librarian, and she served in the capacity for more than thirty years. After her resignation, in 1958, Mrs. A.E. (Trudy) Cushman filled the post. Mrs. Cushman remained as Librarian until early in 1976, when she left because of ill health in her





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## **Producer Believes** Tax Increase A Mistake

The president of Texas Mid-Continent Oi! & Gas Association said Tuesday that it would be a mistake for Texas to increase severance taxes on crude oil and natural gas as proposed by Texas Attorney General Mark White.

Dallas independent producer Edwin L. Cox disagreed sharply with White's contention that raising oil and gas production taxes was "the only response" to the U.S. Supreme Court's recent

decision upholding Montana's 30-percent severance tax on coal.

"Because of the deregulation of crude oil prices and the gradual decontrol of natural gas prices, we have seen a spirited upsurge in drilling in Texas," Cox said. "This activity has created jobs in all sectors of the state's economy, located new reserves of secure oil and gas, and increased tax collections for all levels of government. We should concentrate on continuing the

favorable climate for finding and producing energy in the state, not becoming involved in a severance tax war with other mineral producing states," Cox said.


Texas consumers - both industrial and residential would bear the brunt of an increase in the gas severance tax. Texans consume two-thirds of the state's natural gas produc-

Cox said that any increase in the oil severance tax would have to be borne by Texas producers and royalty owners. It could not be passed along to consumers in others states as White ap-

parently envisions, Cox add-

"This is because the price of crude oil is determined in the world market. Texas producers are price takers, not price setters in this market," Cox said.

Cox pointed out that Texas petroleum producers have been responsible taxpayers and currently are providing about one-quarter of the state's tax revenues. In Fiscal Year 1980, for example, crude oil and natural gas production taxes alone amounted to more than \$1.5 billion, representing 24-percent of the state's net tax collections, he noted.




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

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


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
