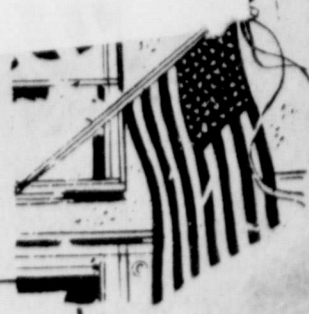

The new building will be constructed along Avenue D between West 4th and West 5th Streets. Construction is scheduled to begin within the

next two weeks and be completed by September 1982.

First National Bank To Build New Facility Here

Lee D. (Dick) Woolley, president, First National Bank in Cisco, has announced the forthcoming construction of a new banking facility to be located in downtown Cisco. Mr. Woolley said the building has been in the planning process for approximately two years.

Occupying three-fourths of a block, the new building will be located on Avenue D between West 4th Street and West 5th Street. There will be a spacious parking area at the new location.

Designed to provide for a significant expansion in

levels of service, the 12,100 square foot building will provide a 24-hour automatic teller and a covered four-lane motor bank. The spacious lobby will include space for seven tellers, private offices for loan officers, a comfortable waiting area and convenient access

to the safety deposit vault. A large community room will also be located in the front part of the new building. The very latest in telephone equipment will be utilized throughout the new structure.

Energy efficiency has been optimized by the use of

energy efficient brick, shaded windows and exterior wall and roof insulation. In addition to high-efficiency insulated glass, the building's mechanical system will have an energy saving control system that allows the use of outside-air ventilation during mild

seasons. Boone & Pope, Inc., served as designing architects and engineers for the building. The Abilene firm's design credits include the Abilene City Hall, Abilene Civic Center, Taylor County Coliseum, McMurry Student Center, and the

Southwestern Bell building now under construction in Abilene.

The structure will be built by Haney & Sivley Construction Co. of Abilene and they will also take care of the demolition work required at the future site of the building. Construction work

is scheduled to begin within the next two weeks and be completed by September 1982.

Cisco Public Schools To Begin Year Monday

The 1981-82 year for the Cisco Public Schools will start Monday, August 31. Classes will begin at 8:10 a.m.

The teachers had work days August 24-28 in preparation for the school year. The first school holiday will be Monday, September 7 (Labor Day). Thanksgiving holidays will be November 26-27. Christmas holidays will be December 21 through January 1, 1982. The spring break will be March 8-12, 1982. April 12 will also be a school holiday.

The six weeks periods will be: August 31 to October 9, 1981—first; October 12 to November 20—second; November 23 to January 15, 1982—third; January 18 to February 26, 1982—fourth; March 1 to April 16, 1982—fifth and April 19 to May 28, 1982—sixth.

Council Approves 1st Reading Of Tax Increase Ordinance

Cisco's City Council approved the first reading of a proposed ordinance to set the city tax rate at \$1.35 per \$100 of evaluation. A second reading will be held at the September 8th regular

meeting, according to city manager Michael Moore.

Mr. Moore said the city is in the process of talking to a tax attorney from Arlington about pursuing the collection of delinquent city taxes. He said the city will probably enter into a contract with the attorney by next month and begin filing cases against those who have delinquent taxes.

A new law which will go into effect after January 1st, 1982, according to Mr. Moore, will authorize cities to add an additional 15% to delinquent taxes with penalty and interest, for tax collection. The additional 15% will be the attorney's penal-

ty.

At Tuesday night's city council meeting, Pafford Ambulance Service announced it received 786 members in its membership drive here, instead of the 850 desired members. However, the service has decided to stay in Cisco for at least one year.

The council tabled a request by Southern Television Systems for a 25-year cable franchise extension. The members indicated they want to investigate the matter more before authorizing the extension.

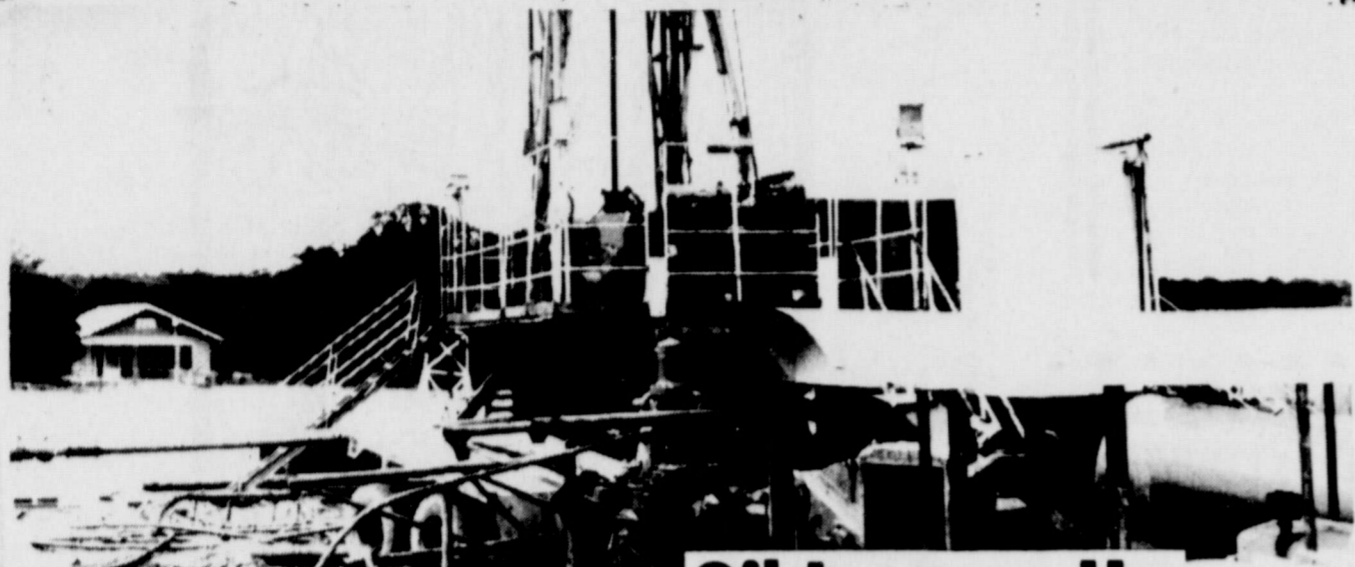

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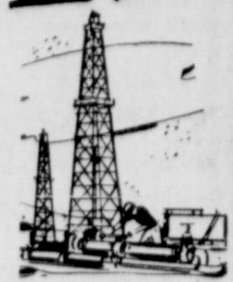

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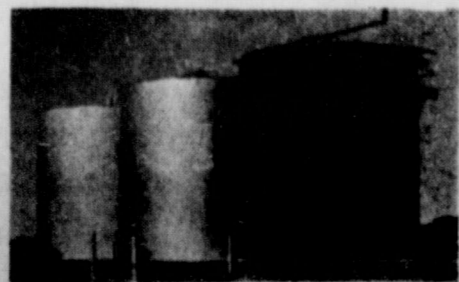
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Oil Income Up But Profits Down

Income was up but profits down during the first of 1981 for the petroleum industry according to annual reports of selected companies.

Early reports from 27 of the country's largest oil companies show profits down by 4.5 percent during the first two quarters of the year, the Oil & Gas Journal says in its Aug. 24 issue.

However, second quarter net income for the group was 8.1 percent above its level in the same quarter of 1980. Profits totaled \$15.2 billion in the first half and \$7.6 billion in the second quarter, the magazine said.

Companies making up the group range in size from giant Exxon Corporation to Clark Oil & Refining Corp. Exxon's earnings for the first half amounted to \$3.4 billion, while Clark's earnings were \$8.5 million.

In forecasting for the rest of the year, the Journal says the group's profits should increase by 2.8 percent from 1980 levels to about \$31 billion for all of 1981. That would mark a sharp slowdown in the rate of increases for the past couple of years - 28.2 percent in 1980 and 73.4 percent in 1979.

Decontrol of crude oil prices early this year boosted income

from exploration/production operations in the United States. The "windfall profits" tax, which wasn't in effect for the first two months of last year, partly offset those gains. Products prices increased, too, but not enough for refiners to recover increased costs of crude oil. Demand also continued to sag.

Strengthening of the U.S. dollar created foreign currency translation gains for most companies with major overseas operations. On the other hand, it eroded margins for foreign affiliates of some companies.

A recession in Europe coupled with a sluggish U.S. economy suppressed products demand, which already was declining as a result of rising prices.

High prices for crude and weak products demand also continued to squeeze refining operations during the first six months of 1981. Composite refiner acquisition cost of crude in the U.S. was 17 percent above its level in the comparable 1980 period. Refineries operated at less than 70 percent of capacity because of slack demand, which increased unit product costs.

Also eroding refining results were the expensive crude and product stocks refiners kept at higher than historic levels as insurance against supply interruptions. High interest rates made the practice extra costly.

On the bright side capital and exploration expenditures by U.S. oil companies continued their rapid increase during the first half, showing that company managers remain optimistic about the industry's prospects, the magazine says.

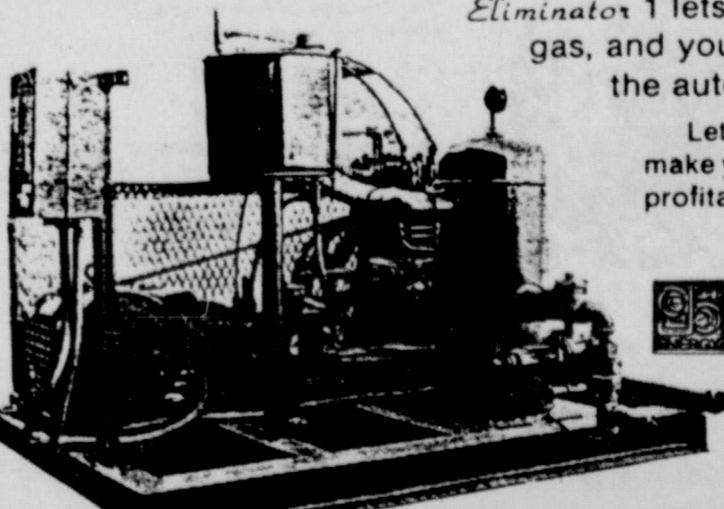

Poisons Believed To Be Killing Trees At Cemetery

The death and dying conditions of too many of the large, old oak trees, at the Cisco Cemetery, are believed to be the result of poisons used to kill weeds and grasses on and surrounding cemetery lots. These fine, beautiful trees from which came the name "Oakwood" Cemetery grew naturally, or in some cases were planted years ago in conformance to the original landscaping plan of the cemetery.

The matter is of such concern that members of the Cisco Cemetery Association, at their recent meeting, voted to erect signs at either entrance to the Cemetery, banning the use of weedkillers as well as the use of gravel as covering for burial plots, in an effort to prevent further destruction of trees. The Association's plan to plant new trees could also be affected.

Use of weed and grass killers has increased with the application of gravel covers to plots in attempts to prevent weed growth. It has been noted, however, by cemetery workers, that the gravel cover is not always satisfactory. In many cases, weeds eventually penetrate the cover, or dirt blows onto the gravel and weed and grass seeds take root.

Association workers strongly advocate grass covering as the most satisfactory and easiest kept covering. Blowsand is not satisfactory either, they have found, and usually there is plenty of good soil

available for fill, upon request to Mr. Anton White or Mr. Steve Clary.

Another matter of concern discussed at the meeting was waste of water by persons who apparently forget to turn off hydrants after watering a lot or lots and leave the water running for long periods of time or overnight.

The water lines at the Cemetery were so old and in such poor condition that for years a great deal of water was wasted throughout the year. This summer, Association workers replaced

around 13,000 feet of two inch, one and one-half, and three-quarter inch water lines extending over the area east of Jasmine Street. According to Steve Clary, about 5,000 feet more of pipe will complete this project covering the remainder of the cemetery, and hopefully, will be accompanied in the near future. There are approximately 200 hydrants installed.

Cooperation of the public is requested by the Association in careful use of water at the Cemetery.

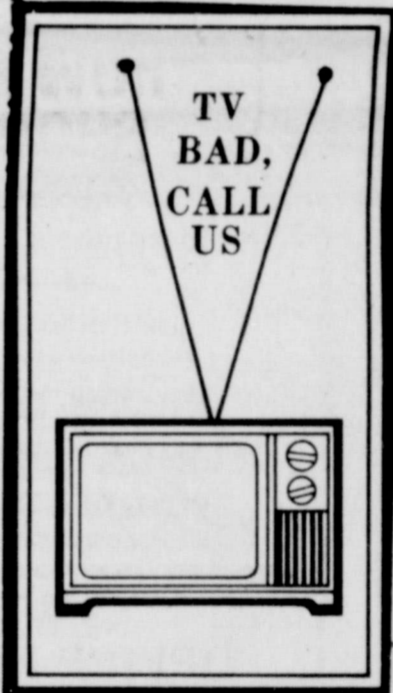

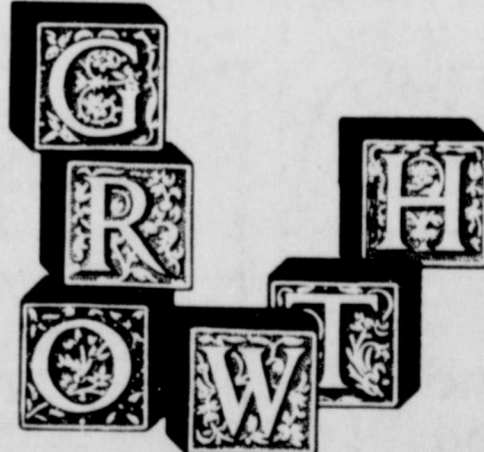

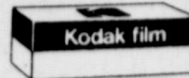

company wants us to buy a lot in this exclusive resort development. It is an offer you can't pass up! Does this sound familiar to you? Probably you have received similar telephone calls or letters from land development companies.

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Many Texans have made this trip seeking a pot of gold at the end of the rainbow and finding only aggressive sales people followed by months of filing complaints.

Formal complaints filed with the Texas Attorney General's office against developers and land sales corporations include: refusing to issue federally required property reports designed to reveal debts on the property or other liabilities, false promises of future site improvements, abusive or high pressure sales tactics, deceptive advertising and switching lots after the contract had been signed.

Land or real estate shoppers should keep the following precautions in mind:

• Beware of the developer who comes calling through mass mailings and telephone solicitations. If the property is so valuable, why are they trying so hard to sell it by mail or telephone solicitation to probably everyone on the block?

• Never buy land sight unseen.

• Do not sign anything until you or your lawyer understand all the documents.

• Learn the land's "real market value", not just its price. One way to learn the market value is by asking a reputable real estate agent in the area for prices of similar property. A better method is to have the land independently appraised.

• Get all promises of recreational facilities or services, such as roads, water and sewer in writing.

• Federal law requires developers to supply buyers with a property disclosure report before they sign a sales agreement. However, the report is worthless to buyers who fail to read it prior to signing, or those who merely flip through the document with the salesman.

• If the salesman refuses to let you take the report and sales agreement home for review, "DON'T SIGN, JUST LEAVE".

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Pears are plentiful right now. Here is a good pear marmalade you might like to try this year.

Ruby Pear Marmalade

3 cups diced ripe pears
1 orange, pulp and coarsely grated rind
1 box powdered pectin
1 cup crushed pineapple (1 9-oz. can)
1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries
4 1/2 cups sugar

Measure sugar into a dry bowl to be added later. Mix diced pears, pineapple, orange pulp and rind, maraschino cherries and powdered pectin. Bring mixture to a boil rapidly over high heat, stirring constantly. Add sugar; bring to a full rolling boil and boil exactly 2 minutes, stirring frequently. Pour into hot, sterilized jars. Leave 1/2 inch of head space. Close and process for 5 minutes in boiling water bath. Makes 5 half-pint jars.

Pecan Weevil Spray

It is now to spray pecan trees for the pecan weevil according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.

The pecan weevil is the insect responsible for the white grubs found in pecans about the time they are ready for harvest. After the grub eats the pecan kernel is eats a hole in the shell, comes out and goes into the soil.

Gordon said only light infestations of weevils have been found, but a few have been found in all parts of the county.

For the most effective control pecan trees should be sprayed within the next week and again in 10 to 14 days. Other spray applications may be needed later depending on the infestation.

Commercial growers should check their trees daily for weevil infestation. One method of checking pecan weevil infestations is jarring of the limbs. To accomplish this, place a large sheet or cloth under a tree and jar limbs with a padded pole. Weevils will drop to the ground and remain motionless for a short period of time. Some growers have traps that help determine infestations.

The pecan weevil is a brownish weevil about 1/4 inch long. It has a snout about as long as its body. One female weevil may deposit up to 60 eggs in 60 different pecans during one month.

Gordon said two to four applications of Sevin may be needed to control the weevils. Sevin should be used at the rate of 3 pounds of 80% wettable powder per 100 gallons of water. If spray is applied in small quantities mix 3 tablespoons of 80% WP Sevin per gallon of water or 4 tablespoons of 50% WP Sevin per gallon.

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GORDON SPOT

The Honeydew aphids on pecan trees are causing a lot of concern around the county. As the yellow aphid feeds on the underside of leaves, "honeydew" or sugar water is excreted by the pest. This sticky liquid falls down through the tree and is deposited on the upper leaf surface of leaves over which the aphid feeds.

The honeydew aphid does not do a great amount of damage to the trees unless the infestation is severe. If the infested trees are in your yard or near the driveway the greatest problem is the honeydew that falls on walks and cars. In this case, most people want to control the aphids.

There are several ways to control the honeydew problem. If the trees are not too large the aphids can be washed off with the use of a water hose provided you have good water pressure. Another method is to spray the trees with Malathion or Zolone or Guthion. Sevin will not kill the aphid. If you spray your trees for weevils this week and you have a honeydew problem you should mix one of the aphid insecticides with Sevin.

We are seeing more and more oak trees with drought injury. The first sign is browning of the leaf margins with the dead area progressing into the leaf and causing desiccation of leaf tissue between the veins toward the mid-rib. These leaves being to fall and in some cases the trees die. This happens even in lawns where the lawn grass is regularly watered. The oak tree roots are very deep and due to our drought for the past seven years the root zone area has dried out. The drought of 1980 was especially hard on trees. The results of last summers drought is just now showing up.

These symptoms can also

be man-made. An accumulation of salt in the soil will cause drought symptoms. Salt accumulation can develop from using irrigation water containing salts or by the use of excessive rates of inorganic fertilizer. High salt concentration simply reduces the root absorption by the root hairs and may finally result in death of the roots. This salt injury, which is a form of man-made injury, is usually more severe in dry weather than in times with adequate rainfall.

Other man-made drought injury to oak trees may be caused by soil compaction, new construction near the trees, disturbance of the soil such as plowing or adding soil, gas leaks or misuse of herbicides.

Extension Plant Pathologist Dr. Chip Lee, told us oak trees are showing these symptoms, and many are dying, throughout Central Texas. He expects trees will be dying for the next ten years as the result of the 1980 drought.

Valuable yard trees showing these drought symptoms may be helped by slow, deep soaking with good quality water. Do not over fertilize these trees as this might add to a salt problem.

New Grass Released By SCS

A new grass strain, 'Lometa' indiagrass, has been tested and released for use by livestock producers by the USDA Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Agricultural Research Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Jack Prichard, Range Conservationist for SCS at Eastland, said 'Lometa' is a superior indiagrass strain selected for use in range seedings in Central and South Texas. Present varieties available commercially are adapted only to North Texas; in central and southern parts of the state, stands are difficult to obtain and are short lived.

"Other indiagrass varieties bloom and set seed in mid-summer," Prichard said. "Lometa blooms in late October, extending the forage production period by a couple of months. Because of its late blooming trait, however, Lometa does not produce seed abundantly in North Texas."

Prichard said Lometa appears to be best adapted to medium heavy to light textured soils in areas receiving 22 inches or more of rainfall. West of this zone, the grass should be irrigated or planted

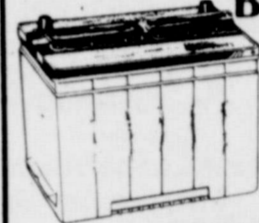
on overflow bottomland sites. Seeding rates are about 5 pounds pure live seed per acre broadcast or drilled and 1.7 pounds in 36 to 42 inch rows. Seed should be available from commercial seed producers in early 1982. The new strain was collected in 1964 from a vigorous stand of indiagrass found growing on the Kirby Ranch near Lometa by SCS personnel from Lampasas. After careful testing and evaluation at the SCS plant materials center at Knox City and in 41 plantings in 30 counties, the strain proved superior to all others.

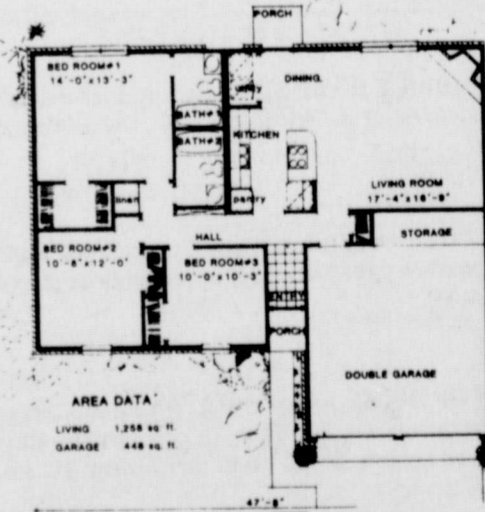
