The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has warned that as many as 48 persons may die in traffic accidents this Labor Day weekend on the state's streets and highways unless drivers are especially cautious. "Otherwise," said Colonel

Jim Adams, "the 78 hour

period could be a repeat of the most recent holiday. Traffic accidents during the last July 4th weekend took a total of 60 lives, 16 more than had been estimated," he

said. Drunk driving and excessive speed were the major contributing factors in the fatal accidents recorded over the July 4th holiday, according to data furnished by the DPS Statistical Services Division.

None of the drivers or passengers killed during the July 4th holiday were wearing seatbelts. In addition, 35 percent of the these fatalities resulted from the person being ejected from the vehicle. Local DPS, Sargent

Mathews, urges motorists to wear their seatbelts to

minimize the hazard posed by careless drivers. He said safety belts should be used during city driving as well as long distance trips.

"Last year in Texas, about 1200 lives would have been saved if all occupants of passenger vehicles had used safety belts," Mathews said. The DPS Sargent said he is deeply concerned that 1981 may be another record year for motor vehicle deaths in the state.

"Unless more Texas motorists recognize the risks they face and take steps to protect themselves and others, this trend will surely continue," Mathews pointed out.

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

Cattle Brand Celebrates Birthday

Re-registeration of cattle brands is a hot topic in Eastland County - as it is in every county in the state - as the result of recent legislation requiring that brands be reregistered every ten vears.

One of the oldest cattle brands in this county celebrated its hundredeth birthday this week.

It was on Sept. 2, 1881, that the late W.T. Boyd registered his brand, the half circle over B, and the family has actively used the brand for over 90 years.

E.J. Boyd, Rt. 1 Ranger, says that the original branding iron, now on display at Eastland Centennial Memorial Library, was made by Eastland blacksmith Charlie Dabbs in the early 1880's.

The branding iron may be seen at the Library 2 to 5 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Mr. Boyd, his family ranch and the history of the brand were written up in Early EHS Gusher by Students Jim Owen and Tom Crowder. In part it said:

"When Eastland County was first settled, it was noted for its good ranch land. Large and small ranches started to pop up all over the county. One of the oldest ranches is the ranch that is now owned by F.T. Boyd. Located four miles east of Morton Valley, this ranch has always been owned by the Boyd family. The original tract consisted of about 299 acres. This land was used for farming and ranching, and the produce from this land supplied food for the family and their animals. The original brand was made by Charlie Dabbs.

is still in production today. Besides all the oil and gas that has been taken from this ranch, limestone was also an important product. Limestone from this ranch

was used to build the highway from Morton Valley to Ranger in 1925. About 100 thousand cubic yards of limestone from the B Ranch was used to build the road from Cisco to the Gulf Terminal on the Breckenridge Highway

In 1910 Mr. Boyd had a framed wooden house that was built on a turn-key job. The house was very elegant and it only cost \$1,000. The house had three bedrooms, kitchen, dining room, pantry, hall, and a big front porch. The old house was destroyed by an explosion from a gas line.

Texas Author Writes Local **Ghosts Stories**

If you believe in ghosts and go hunting them, be prepared for surprises other than the shock of possible confrontation. So advises a Texas author who has searched out this state's spectres for two years.

Kerrville historian and novelist Ed Syers, whose latest work is "Ghost Stories of Texas," singles out both the haunted house and its resident apparition as sources of unexpected discovery. The house may look as normal as yours, and its ghost is not necessarily dangerous.

"Movies always show us something foreboding, like that grim house in 'Psycho','' Syers says. 'Many of those I found were quite innocent looking. And a lot of the old places that reaked of gloom-from West to East Texas, I could lead you to them-simply turned out un-haunted.'

Some, he conceded, look haunted and are.

Their phantoms, he believes, possess very human motivation: the need to prove or disclose something, the drive to warn or protect, the refusal to accept a disagreeable eventuality-a life suddenly cut short. Nostaliga, the yearning for places of treasured memory, seems to provide the largest group.




Frances Craven Is CofC Artist of the Month


Frances is a substitute teacher in the Abilene Independent Schools and has a private art studio in her home. She teaches both adults and children.

New Methods To Raise Production

The addition of foam diverting agents and inert gasses in steam injection methods of obtaining oil is expected to increase the recovery of heavy oil from the present 40-55 percent up to 70 percent or more.

According to a report in the Aug. 31 issue of the Oil and Gas halted or slowed ex-Journal, these advance pansions of steamflood methods, which will projects. result in huge production breakthroughs, were spurred on by the decontrol of heavy oil

two years ago. Oil producers also stand at the brink of eliminating the longstanding barrier of bringing up oil from pay zones below the 2,000-foot level. In addition, the costly task of burning a barrel of lease crude to generate

the steam to produce three barrels of heavy oil may soon be left behind, according to the magazine.

Tests are also under way to find a variety of alternative fuels and methods of generating steam some of which, it is hoped, will avoid certain environmental constraints which have

One industry consultant estimates that domestic oil production by steamflooding may increase from the 300,000 barrels of crude daily in 1980 to as much as 1.5 million barrels a

day by 1991. In the meantime, steamflood technology and practics are being applied in other resource areas, such sans, as tar diatomaceous earth,

oil shale and even residual light oil. However, the emphasis of steam recovery techniques will be toward the "big leap" in heavy oil production.

Although much of the oil production boost is expected to come from California fields which provide the majority of domestic thermal heavy oil output, other steam injection work is under way in Texas.
