

Loboes Drop Season Opener To Haskell Indians 19 to 6

The Cisco Loboes dropped their season opener to the Haskell Indians by the score of 19 to 6 here Friday night.

A field-soaking rain prior to Friday night's game seemed to make the football extra slippery and both teams fumbled numerous times. Each team lost five of nine fumbles

Although neither team got any points on the scoreboard during the first half of the game, the Loboes made at least one actual threat while Haskell made two.

Haskell's first threat followed a 33-yard drive from Cisco's 41-yard line to the eight. On a fourth down and seven yards to go, Haskell's Joe Benavides tried an unsuccessful field

Cisco's attempt at a score was sparked by Lobo Bubba Eaker recovering an Indian fumble at the Haskell 40-yard line. On the first play, Cisco quarterback Randall Rattan made six yards and seemed to hurt his hand. Back-up quarterback Doug Hendricks took over the Lobo helm and made four yards on the next play for a Cisco first down. A handoff from Hendricks to Gary Speegle netted two more yards placing the ball on Haskell's 28-yard line. On the next play, a second down with eight yards to go, QB Hendricks was hit hard before he could get rid of the ball and fumbled. Haskell's Lonnie Hise recovered the ball on the Indians' 32-yard line killing Cisco's threat.

Haskell's Lonnie Hise recovered another Cisco fumble late in the first half at Cisco's 41-yard line. Indian quarterback Albert Sherman connected with a pass to Joe Ortiz for the first down putting the ball on Cisco's 26-yard line. Indian Benavides picked up one yard on a handoff from Haskell QB Sherman. On the next play, Cisco's Rattan picked off a Haskell pass at the Loboes two yard line for the last play of the first half.

Haskell's Curtis Forehand received the second half kick-off at the Indians 20-yard line and ran it back to the 30 before being tackled. Three plays later Cisco recovered a Haskell fumble at the Indians 34-yard line.

Cisco drove to Haskell's nine-yard line in four plays with yardage made on passes from QB Rattan to Jason Potter and Larry Adams. Nine yards from the goal line, Cisco fumbled and Haskell recovered the ball.

The Indians fumbled the ball on their first play and Cisco recovered at the 15-yard line to set up the first scoring drive of the game.

A ten-yard run by Potter moved the ball to Haskell's five-yard line where a handoff to Speegle netted the touchdown. A Lobo try for two extra points resulted in an incomplete pass, making the score 6 to 0 with 9:16 left in the third quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter, Cisco recovered a fumble to stop a Haskell drive at Cisco's ten-yard line. Cisco then fumbled the ball on their first play and Haskell recovered at the 14.

Haskell QB Sherman kept the ball for two plays gaining six yards. A handoff to Benavides got the first down four yards from the goal ine. On the next handoff, this time to Jonnie Hise, Haskell scored its first touchdown. The extra point kick by Benavides was blocked, tying the score 6 to 6 with 8:23

left in the fourth quarter.

The Loboes received the ball and started their drive on Cisco's 38-yard line. A handoff to Potter gained one vard and the next play, a pass, was intercepted by Haskell's James Davis at the Loboes 38-yard line.

Six plays later, Haskell's Benavides took the ball in from two yards out to widen the Indians lead. Jonnie Hise helped move the ball during the drive since he picked up 34 yards in four carries. The extra point kick by Haskell's Mark Bailey was good making the score 13 to 6 with 5:12 left in the game

Cisco took the kick but was unable to gain a first down in four plays and was on Cisco's 37-yard line. Cisco's Rattan fumbled the ball on the punt play and Haskell recovered on Cisco's 25-yard

Handoffs to Haskell's Jonnie Hise and Benavides gained two first downs in seven plays and put the ball one yard from Cisco's goal line. Indian Benavides took the next handoff in for the touchdown. The extra point kick by Bailey was good making the final score 19 to 6 with 12 seconds left in the

Wranglers prepared for Thursday's 7:30 p.m. meeting with the Southern Methodist University Mustang Junior Varsity last Saturday with a 23-7 victory over the McMurry College

Coach Bill Anderson and his assistants used balanced running and passing attacks to offset one long scoring bomb by the Indians to post the victory in the season opener for both teams.

Anderson and his staff will be hard pressed to come up with a knowledgable game plan for the Mustangs, since they are a little known quantity. The SMU varsity posted a solid 48-0 victory over the University of Texas at Arlington Saturday, and it is well known that most junior varsities follow the same game plan of the varsity.

"They will probably run the slot-I like the varsity," says Anderson, but he hastens to add, "when you're playing them, or anybody else for that matter, you've got to be prepared for anything.

The Wrangler boss, beginning his fourth year at the helm, watched his squad from his usual perch in the top section of the press box at Chesley Field Saturday, and was pretty well satisfied with the effort-in most cases at least.

'I thought we'd catch the ball better than we did and our backs were not reacting like I wish they would. We were running a little tight. We did drop some passes and our passer wasn't as sharp as we'd like. We looked like you'd expect us to look the first game.' Efforts by tailbacks Billy

Richardson and Keith Pantallion helped keep the offense rolling throughout the game, as did starting tailback Mark Neville, who left the game early with a bruised collar bone. Richardson finished the

game as the leading rusher,

averaging 8.6 yards a carry

with 69 yards on eight car-

ries. Pantallion, who scored two of the Wrangler's three touchdowns, finished the night with 37 yards on five carries for a 7.4 average.

CJC used three quarterbacks in the victory, with sophomore John Farris having the best night passing. The South Garland graduate completed 12 of 25 passes for 128 yards. Paul Williams, Richard Davis and Johnny Yglecias each completed one pass. Yglecias suffered the only interception of the even-

Overall, the Wranglers rolled up 383 yards in total offense while holding the Indians to 108-38 yards on the ground and 70 yards in the air. The Wranglers, who finished as the No. 4 passing offense in the nation last year among junior colleges. had 180 yards passing and 203 on the ground.

Sophomore Matt Ligon finished the game as the leading receiver with three receptions for 32 yards. Richardson pulled down two for 25 yards and Barrette Douglas two for 24 yards.

McMurry got the ball first but was unable to gain more than four yards against the Wrangler defense. CJC took over at its own 38 and marched to paydirt in only eight plays. Five and 15-yard runs by Neville and a 24-yard scamper by Richardson set the Wranglers up at the Indians 13. Sidney Harper put CJC on the scoreboard with a three-yard run with 10 minutes left in the opening

quarter.

That's the way the game remained until the third quarter, but the remainder of the first half was not without excitement. Trying to field an Indian punt late in the first quarter, a Wrangler receiver couldn't hang onto the ball and an alert Don Linberry fell on it for the Indians, setting McMurry up at the CJC 35. This drive stalled on a fourth and five try when Ron King was stopped after only a yard. Then, after the next Wrangler series, Wrangler Tony Brooks stepped under a Todd

Collins pass and picked it off to stop yet another Indian drive.

Later in the second quarter, with the Indians buried deep in their own territory, Jeff Osborne got a hand on a Collins punt and Wrangler Bryan Reese scooped it up and raced the 14 yards untouched into the end zone. However, an illegal motion penalty against the Wranglers erased that six-pointer.

On their second possession of the second half, the Wranglers finally got a drive going and marched 54 yards in nine plays with Pantallion going the final yard. The touchdown was set up by runs of 11 yards by Neville and nine yards by Farris and a 12-yard pass from Farris to Ligon. Kiomars "Fred" Rezaie booted his second extra point for a 14-0 Wrangler lead with 6:11 left in the third

quarter. A three-play, 35-yard drive at the beginning of the fourth quarter pushed the Wrangler lead to 21-0. Farris again hit Ligon for a 13-yard pass to move the ball to the Indian 22 and then executed a perfect roll-out option play to Pantallion, who took the ball and raced to the goalline with

13:59 showing on the clock. Rezaie, a freshman from Sulphur Springs, had three perfect extra point kicks for the night-and one field goal try. Playing his first year of football, "Fred," as most of the CJC students and faculty call him, was a bit disappointed at a bobbled field goal try in the second qauarter. It would have been a 34-yarder had he gotten it off, but the holder couldn't handle it. Observers say "Fred" has hit from 50 yards out in practice.

The Indians finally got on the scoreboard with 8:06 left. in the game-and it took only one play. Following a 34-yard punt by Wrangler Lloyd Voight, the Indians set up at their own 38 and quarterback Todd Mund lofted one to wingback Mike Alexander, who gathered it in at the CJC 22, beating two

Wrangler defenders, and raced to the end zone. Chip Matthews then cut the lead to 21-7 with his PAT boot.

The scoring wasn't over, however. The Wranglers had backed the Indians up to their own four, and with fourth and seven, David Coffey waited for the snap just inside his own end line. The snap was bobbled, and seeing no chance at all for a kick, Coffey simply stood alone in the end zone and waited to be touched by a Wrangler. The safety provided the 23-7 winning margin

for the Wranglers. Anderson had praise for Voight, who handled the punting chores, but felt the specialty teams need work. "Our kick fielding was the most disappointing part of our game. We thought our coverage would be bad-and it was. We lost two fumbles on punts. I'd like to find somebody that could do it all the time (return punts)," he added.

Obviously, that will be one phase of the game which will command some attention as the Wranglers prepare for the Mustangs. Most coaches in small colleges feel that teams with a lot of scholarships to offer have a little more talent, and the Wranglers will have a tougher group of that type of team to play this year. Following the game with SMU, CJC will play the Texas Tech JV (Sept. 17), Ranger Junior College (Sept. 26), UT-Arlington (Oct. 1), West Texas State JV (Oct. 8), TCU JV (Oct. 16), Fort Hood (Oct. 22), New Mexico Military Institute (Oct. 31), and last year's No. 1 junior college team, Northeastern Oklahoma A&M (Nov. 7).

It was the NEO squad which handed the Wranglers their only loss in an 8-1 season in 1980.

The program, which was increased from the original 400 million barrels to 1 billion barrels, call for half the total to be in storage by Dec. 22. 





T.E. Owens was born to Zach and Florida Owens in Cherokkee County, Georgia, on the 24th of Sept., 1898. He was the youngest of four children, and his father was a farmer. Both his Mother and Father were Irish.

Like many people of that time, the Owens family heard of Eastland County through relatives, and hoped to better themselves here. They arrived in Eastland by train right after Christmas in 1898, and went to the home of an Uncle Jake Rhyne near Carbon. Soon Zach Owens rented land near Sipes Springs and Okra, and then in a community near Flatwood.

Little red haired T.E. spent his early years on these farms, where cotton, maize, and corn were grown. Then, when he was only ten years old, his father died of pneumonia.

The oldest son tried to make a living for the family, but it was not easy. They lived on several places south of Cisco, and T.E. had no chance to attend High School. In 1913 the family moved into Cisco, and by then he had to get the best jobs he could find.

This included work for the City, at the Oil Mill, and for the T.P. Railroad. But Owens was interested in barbering, and found plenty of people to practice on. Soon he found that his cutting and styling was quite acceptable, although he had not attended any of the Barber Colleges of that day.

In 1918 a man named John Swindle asked T.E. to help him in a Barber Shop. Even with haircuts at .15 cents and shaves at .10 cents T.E. found that his skill paid more than other types of work he could do.

Soon afterward Swindle sold out and moved to California, but T.E. began working for other Barbers. And during this first year of barbering he married a local girl named Lena Hall.

The Santa Claus Bank

Robbery, in Dec. 1927, was an unforgettable experience for T.E. Owens. For it just happened that he was walking near the front of the Cisco Bank when the shooting started! At first he thought the noise was only firecrackers, for there were no restrictions against fireworks in those days. But he soon learned differently, when he saw a wounded man fall and the get-away car

speed off. This violent episode was

not typical of Cisco in the 1920's - generally the town was a pleasant place to live. But then the first part of the Depression, in 1929, hit T.E. with a hard blow. For he had a home all paid for, out on 21st Street a - good place for

his wife and children - when the City voted to put a sewer line behind his home. He didn't have the extra cash to Three of T.E. Owens pay for it, so he had to mortgage the home. When the crash came, he didn't have

the money to meet his payments, and his house was foreclosed. In 1935 his wife died, leaving him with four children ages 10 to 3 - to care for. This was a very difficult time, for great-grandchildren. he needed to continue with After working for several his barber work in order to support the family. In 1939 Owens married a widow whose maiden name had been Ruby Ezzell. This young woman had a daughter, Coleen, with almost the same name as one of T.E.'s daughters. Coleen is now Coleen Strawn of

cluding Roy Wilson for 19 years, T.E. bought his own he mananged to see that the children were cared for. shop in the late 1940's. He moved to the present location about 30 years ago, and kept very busy all that time.

He has, as he says "Cut people's hair from almost everywhere - thousands of them." And during his years of barbering he has watched styles rotate around, and often come back again. He started out using scissors

and a comb, and leaving the hair bushy in the back. Then hand clippers came in, and finally electric clippers. There were the short pomps and long pomps, and finally the military-type cuts of the '40's and '50's. The Beetles, Owens says, brought in the long hair. Now the styles have settled into shaped

In the 1920's before Beauty Shops arrived, women came to Owens for their haircuts.

"I've seen the girls come in with long hair, and sit and cry when I cut it off," he chuckles. "There really isn't as much change in the cutting of women's hair as people think. I did razor cuts long ago, and Raggedy Anns.

(Layered cuts). Then there was the Sweetheart Bob short, and ponted in the back. And I used to cut children's hair - we called it a Buster Brown style, with bangs."

On prices, Owens inched them up over the years, from the low of .15 cents, until he finally reached \$1.00. By the early 1970's he began to charge \$1.50 and finally went to \$2.00, reluctantly.

"I said right then that was as high as I was ever going!" he recalls. "I always tried to consider my customers."

And suddenly, as Owens speaks of his convictions, the home where he lives, and his street, takes on a different look. It may, on the surface, appear like a number of other Cisco streets - quiet, shady, still unpaved. But there is something special about it - a man lives there who has no greed.

It was one of those times when it was hard to keep my mind on the Pastor's sermon. Here I sat in Church during the worship service, yet distracted by a question I had been asked earlier.

Will you be Church Temperance Leader this

Temperance Leader? What could a Temperance Leader really do? Just make little speeches to the Church members, and get them to subscribe to a anti-alcohol, anti-narcotic information

And, what good was the Pastor doing right now, preaching a sermon on how the human body was like a temple, and should not be destroyed by harmful things such as alcohol? Like how each bottle of beer or glass of wine a person consumed killed a certain quota of brain cells. We already knew all that. And we had all heard how over 50 per cent of all fatal accidents and 85 percent of the crime is somehow involved with alcohol and drugs. And how no one profits from the use of alcohol except the manufacturers and distributors. The State taxes collected are small in comparison to the amount spent on law enforcement, hospitalization, imprisonment, welfare and child support due to the abuse of alcohol

This was all so very true. But Pastor, I thought a bit smugly, I believe you are preaching to the wrong crowd. Which of our group is really tempted all that much to take a drink?

And the people who need to know what you are saying probably won't come to Church - and they wouldn't listen to you if you went where they are.

So we are always communicating with the wrong group - never able to reach out and help young people never able to stop the type of people who will sell anything to make a dollar.

Memories flitted through my head, tangling with the present-day data in the sermon. I have known a lot of people who used alcohol people I cared about. Maybe if I could get some of their stories down, someone would notice and decide not to take that first drink. Then they wouldn't be listed as DWI, or - worse still - DOA (Dead On Arrival). That's what almost happened to me, once upon a time, due to someone else's drink.

One beautiful June afternoon I was driving into Colorado City to see a Grandfather who was in the

hospital. My two children, in the back of the car, were also enjoying the drive. Then we heard a roar and a clatter, and saw a car bearing from behind - on my side of the highway. Obviously the driver did not intend to miss me, so I managed to whip to the right and let him graze past. While I attempted to control my car I caught a glimpse of a man's leering face (yes, a leering face) framed by an unkept mat of



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

Changes For Registration Of Livestock Brands

Attorney General Mark White has issued two Attorney General's opinions which affect and should interest everyone involved in the cattle, ranching, farming and dairy industries. Opinion MW-289 discusses certain changes in laws on the registration of livestock brands, and MW-358 further clarifies the statutes.

Article 6899j, V.T.C.S. was passed by the Legislature and became effective on August 30, 1971. Under this law and under Article 6890, V.T.C.S., all marks and brands registered after August 30, 1971 and before August 30, 1981 must be reregistered within six months of the latter date. Marks and brands must then be reregistered at subsequent tenyear intervals by the owner. All marks and brands will then be recorded with the county clerk, regardless of when they originally were recorded, within six months of August 30, 1981, August 30, 1991, August 30, 2001, etc.

Attorney General Mark White is reminding every

citizen who has registered a brand prior to August 30, 1981 that citizens must reregister each brand with the county clerk within six months in order to protect their right to it. If everyone follows the registration schedule set out by the law, county clerks will have a correct, revised set of records every ten years, and there should be no dispute about the correct ownership of livestock

To register or re-register marks and brands, the livestock owner may obtain forms either by mail or in person from his or her county clerk's office. There will be blank spaces on the form in which to describe the mark or band and the location on the animal where the brand is recorded. The forms should be mailed or delivered in person to the county clerk, who will keep the forms in an indexed bond volume or microfilm for easy reference.

quirements to notify the public of changes in the law. Under Article 6899j, the county clerk is not required to notify individual owners of cattle brands of the ten-year expiration date of their registration. However, the county clerk must publish notice of the registration date in a newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days, paying for such notice of the general county fund. Finally, when the clerk records the brands or marks, the date of record must be noted.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 3, 1981**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdevel-oped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these

bonds or notes. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date

of the amendment. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSITION 0. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution

38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor. Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Sen-ate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state firence management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984: 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general divisions, including cities, law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other retire state debt, which is applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the




