


Fielder of the Fort Worth law firm of Perdue, Brandon, Blair and Fielder in a proposal to represent the city in delinquent tax collections. His firm deals entirely in this type of legal work, he said, and charges for services on the basis of 15% of money collected. The firm uses a computer and handles all details of the delinquent tax collection program, including sending two notices to taxpayers and filing suit after 30 days. The city reserves the right to make decisions regarding court action. The contract will begin Oct. 1 and will terminate on 30-day notice by the city or the law firm. In this connection, the

The council heard Don This would include building an evaporation reservoir or obtaining a farm site where the water would be pumped for use in irrigation. He and the city manager expect to visit with EPA officials in Austin during the coming week before the council meets at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 17, to consider the plan further and to order a public hearing on the matter.

CofC Manager Gene Abbott explained to the Council that the Texas Legislature has passed a law that enables cities to levy a hotel room occupancy tax with the proceeds to be used in promoting tourism. He said it was agreeable with local motels, which have some 75 rooms, to levy a 2% tax with the revenues expected to bring in some \$5,000 per year for the CofC to use in promoting tourism. An ordinance levying the tax was passed on first reading by a 5-1 vote.

On recommendation of the city manager, the Council approved (five for and one abstain) giving notice to the Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch that the City of Cisco is considering withdrawing ofter a notice of one year as provided by the organization's regulations.

The dispatch office is ocated at Eastland and is supported by the cities of Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and others along with some financial help from Eastland County. Ranger, which had dropped out two years ago, has come back into the organization. The City of Cisco currently is paying about \$1,200 per month for the 24-hour radio dispatch service. Mrs. Louise Allison, former member of the Council, told the group that a Cisco withdrawal would vitally affect the program. She urged Council members to visit the Dispatch center and study its mission and results before finally acting on the proposal. She noted that Ranger has returned to support the center after being out for two years. "The Dispatch is the central point for ambulance service and for reporting crime," Mrs. Allison said. She added that she had been on the center's board for several years and felt that it was doing a good job with fine results. Mayor Eris Ritchie, who presided at the meeting. noted that by giving year's notice of withdrawal, the Council was not making a final decision. CJC Wranglers Defeat SMU In Dallas By Score Of 27-14

Dallas-The Cisco Junior College Wranglers spotted the Southern Methodist University Mustang Junior Varsity seven points and then roared back to take its second game of the season Thursday night with a 27-14 victory here.

Billy Richardson, 5-10, 195-pound sophomore from Goree, scored two touchdowns and picked up 120 yards rushing on 20 carries to lead the Wranglers. Tailback Keith Pantallion contributed 70 yards on only one carry-a touchdown run. It brought his season scoring lead to three touchdowns in two games.

Jeff Apodoca got the Mustangs on the scoreboard first as he pulled in an Ned Frederick pass and raced 18 yards with 6:14 left in the opening quarter. Jeff Harrell's extra point gave SMU its only lead of the game.

Richardson got the Wranglers on the scoreboard with 10:45 left in the first half when he rambled in from the four. Kioumars Rezaie kicked the extra point to tie the score





AN ORDINANCE OF THE CISCO OF CITY ESTABLISHING THE TAX LEVY FOR. THE 1981-82 BUDGET YEAR OF CISCO, TEXAS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That for the budget year 1981-82 there is hereby levied on all of the property located in the City of Cisco, Texas, on the first day of January, 1982, and not exempted from taxation by the Constitution and statutes of the State of Texas, an ad valorem tax of \$1:35 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100% of the assessed market value of such property for the purposes listed below, such tax to be apportioned as follows:

\$1.35 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100% of the assessed market value of such property is hereby levied and assessed to provide revenue for carrying on the City government and the

current expenses thereof. SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publications as required by law,







Enter Hay In Show

If you produce hay or use hay in your farming operation, you need to read this article.

The time is now to get those hay bales turned in for the Eastland County Hay Show. This years show will be October 2nd during the annual Eastland County Fair.

Why should you be interested? Because the hay show is designed to be educational and assist you in doing a better job of producing high quality hay. It can show you the need for testing to determine the feeding value of hay you have purchased or produced. In going back to the records of the previous hay shows we find that the protein levels have consistantly risen since the beginning of the hay shows nine years ago. This indicates that the hay show has pointed out the need for high quality hay production. You may enter the hay show by contacting the voca-

BEST WESTERN

ment in your community or bringing the bale(s) to the vocational agriculture building, feed and fertilizer dealers, or implement dealers. Please tag the bales with your name and address and the type of hay. Each person may enter one bale in each of the following classes: Alfalfa and other legumes; Coastal Bermuda and other Bermudas; Sorghum-Sudan Hybrids and forage sorghums; other perennial grasses; peanut; oats and other annuals; and legume mixtures.

There is no entry fee to enter. The bales become the propety of the hay show and will be sold to help pay for the cost of testing. All entries must be in bale form, either round or square.



Nugent said Texas consumers face higher natural gas prices and probable shortages in supply unless changes are made in the federal Natural Gas Policy Act. As the act now stands, an estimated 40

percent of all U.S. natural gas will remain under federal price controls after 1985.

Most of the low-cost, price-controlled gas

AUSTIN--Texans continue to flow to other states under the federal law. The

department of Energy estimates that this socalled "old interstate" gas will cost \$1.01 per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) in 1985, compared to 93 cents per Mcf in 1978.

By contrast, old intrastate gas prices will cost Texas consumers \$3.29 per Mcf in 1985 under the NGPA.

"This is the gas you and I burn every day, and we'll be paying over three times what it costs our northern neighbors," said Nugent.

Even if state pipelines do compete successfully, Nugent said they will have to pay higher-thanmarket price for the gas. "If Texans are to burn gas, they will have to pay more than the free market price, because they will be subsidizing the costs to consumers in other states, particularly the Northeast," he said.

Other factors add to the problem, noted Nugent. Not only will intestate customers have privileged prices. they will have privileged access to new supWith few exceptions,

he said, once gas is placed in the interstate market it is forever committed to that market. In many cases, the sale of gas from a single well binds the gas from an entire field until the field is depleted and abandoned. In other words, gas can move freely from Texas markets to the interstate market, but not back again. Finally, Nugent said, federal rules effectively preclude intrastate pipelines from bidding
