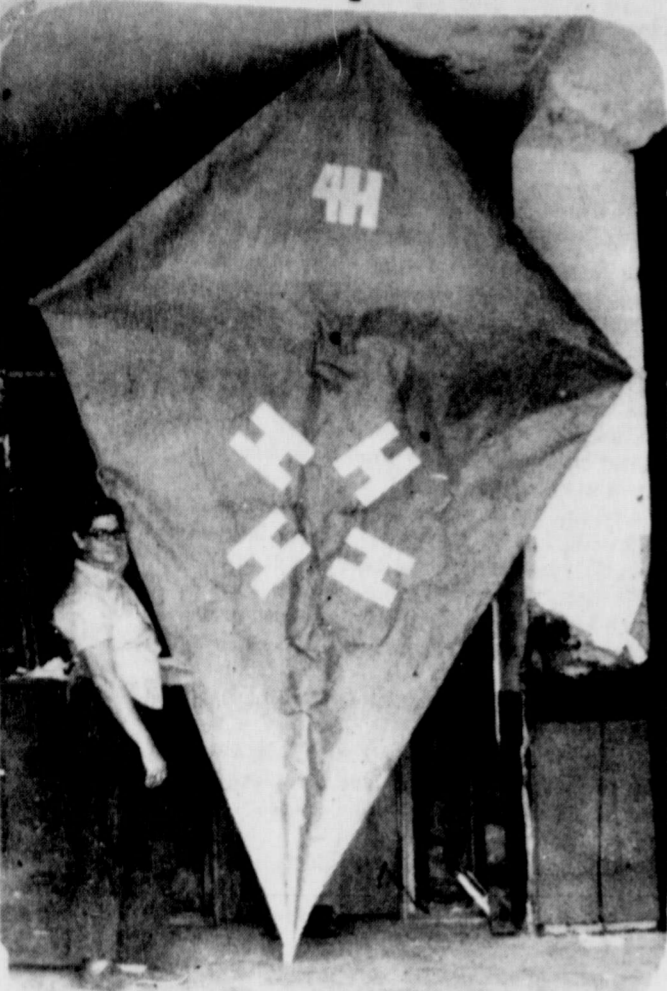


Ready To Fly

Cisco P-TO Membership Drive To End This Friday

The Cisco P-TO membership drive, which began last Friday, will continue through this Friday, it was announced by Betty McGinness, president.

Prizes will be awarded the boy and girl who sell the most memberships in each room of the primary and intermediate schools. The prizes, certificates for minkshakes from City Drug will be awarded at the first general meeting. Memberships will be available at that meeting, but will not count toward prizes.

Individual memberships cost \$1.00, and may be purchased by anyone interested in supporting these two schools, Mrs. McGinness said; membership is not limited to parents of school children. Business memberships may be bought for \$3.00, and are being sold by P-TO members.

Mrs. McGinness expressed the P-TO's gratitude to the public for their support in past years. Without it she said, the P-TO would not have been able to buy many

West Texas Produce To Close Warehouse

West Texas Produce Company, wholesaler of fruits, vegetables and restaurant supplies in this region for half a century, will close its local business at the end of September, according to an announcement this week.

The Cisco warehouse will be consolidated with the firm's Fort Worth warehouse, the announcement said. The closing was made necessary entirely by changes in economic conditions over the years, it was pointed out.

Leo Lipschitz of the Fort Worth home office said that increasing costs of trucks, automobiles, oil and gasoline

and other items have been such that operating at a profit has become increasingly difficult.

"Cisco has been a long-time friend of West Texas Produce Co. and the decision to yield to the growing economic pressure has not been easy," Mr. Lipschitz said. "We very sincerely appreciate the support and the friendships we have enjoyed in Cisco and the area our warehouse has served."

West Texas Produce Company opened here in 1928. The warehouse, located at 109 East 9th Street, is equipped with eight cold storage vaults. Delivery trucks have operated for many years out of the Cisco warehouse to points in all directions.

Mrs. Laverne Andrews has been the Cisco warehouse manager after succeeding J.C. Fletcher a few years ago.

The Cisco warehouse will be open for some 30 days after the closing date while merchandise is being moved, accounts settled and other activities are concluded, the announcement said.

Fourth Annual Lions Benefit Bowl Set In Breckenridge

Kickoff At 7:30 Saturday

The fourth annual Lions Benefit Bowl will provide plenty of excitement both on and off the field Saturday night as Cisco Junior College and Ranger Junior College tangle at 7:30 p.m. in Buckaroo Stadium in Breckenridge.

Cisco enters the contest with a 2-0 record with victories over McMurry JV and Texas Tech JV. Ranger comes in with a 1-1 slate, losing a one-point decision to

Baylor JV in the opener and rolling up a 31-0 win over Bishop College. Cisco is looking to repeat its triumph in last year's Benefit Bowl while Ranger hopes to return to the one-sided victories it enjoyed in the first two tilts.

All of the action will go on in the name of charity as the Lions Clubs of Albany, Baird, Breckenridge, Cisco, Carbon, Clyde, Eastland and Ranger stage their biggest Benefit Bowl yet. To add to

the festivities this year the Zone 9 Lions will have as their special guests Lion Governor Bob Schleider of District 2e-1 from Wichita Falls and Lions District Queen, Michele Butler of Ranger. The Governor and the Queen will sit on the Cisco side of the field the first half and will occupy a special area in the Ranger bleachers during the final episode. At half-time they will be honored in a special presentation at mid-field.

In addition, some lucky program holder will receive a \$100 bill from Michele. The remainder of the half-time will feature the Cisco Wrangler Belles and the Wrangler Band. This outstanding group has performed nationwide and has

been featured on coast-to-coast television.

All proceeds from the game go to the various Lions charities including the Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children, Lions Eye Bank, Lions-CARE, Lions International Foundation and local Lions projects such as buying eyeglasses for needy children in our own communities.

Dr. C.W. Fisk To Hold Clinic At Bible Baptist

Dr. C.W. Fisk, associate pastor of Lavon Drive Baptist Church of Garland, may be heard each evening September 28 and 29 for a soul-winning clinic at the Bible Baptist Church, West 17th and Avenue E, in Cisco. Services will begin at 7:00 p.m.

At the present time, Dr. Fisk directs the Soul-winning Program; goes soul-winning; enlists Sunday School personnel; oversees the Deaf and Spanish ministries; teaches an adult class; directs the Fisherman Club; and shares with Dr. Gary Coleman, pastor of the Lavon Drive Baptist Church of Garland, the responsibility of the entire Sunday School program.

After being at Lavon Drive Baptist Church for one year, Dr. Fisk led the Soul-winning ministry to a good increase in professions of faith and baptisms. For instance, 561 were baptized, compared to 169 the year before. The Lord continues to bless and in 1980 there were 1464 professions of faith and 574 were baptized. In the two years that Dr. Fisk has been with the Lavon Drive Baptist Church, he has been used of the Lord to personally lead 265 people to accept Christ and 205 were baptized.

Mr. Fisk was saved through the ministry of the First Baptist Church of Hammond, Indiana, on November 1, 1960. For some sixteen years, Mr. Fisk served in the First Baptist Church as bus captain, youth director, Sunday School teacher, Rescue Mission Superintendent, and associate pastor to Dr. Jack Hyles. Lobos To Rest Before Opening District Play

Tied Goldthwaite 14-14

The Lobos of Cisco High School will get a rest this week before opening District play in Eastland next Friday, October 2, against the No. 2 ranked Mavericks. The Junior High and J.V. teams will also rest this week and face Eastland next Thursday, October 1.

Cisco is now 0-2-1 for the season, following a 14-14 tie with the Goldthwaite Eagles last Friday night in Goldthwaite. The Eagles are now 1-1-1.

The Lobos changed up their offense last Friday night, forgetting about the Quail-T offense and made a more impressive showing in their yardage. The Lobo offense had a total of 382 yards, with 324 yards gained on the ground and 58 in the air.

Both teams scored in the second and third quarters, while neither was able to score in the first or last quarter.

The Eagles scored first when Eagle quarterback Chip Head connected a five-yard pass with Brent Dennis for the first touchdown ending a 16 play, 85-yard drive. The extra point kick was no good making the score 6-0 with 8:39 left in the first half of the game.

The Eastland County Appraisal District office has been advised that the Board hearings are now completed and that a full complement of appraisers will be a work

within the County by the end of the week. The Southern half of the County has been virtually completed as has most of the Cisco ISD area. After finishing up these areas, the appraisers will be moving into the Eastland area.

If you are a property owner and have not already been contacted by one of the appraisers during the last several months, please be aware that they are working within the County and are required to check on all of the property within the County. They will leave their identification card with the property owner, or in a noticeable place, if the pro-

erty owner is not at home. The appraisers are all employees of the valuation firm of McMorries and Company.

The firm has been employed by the taxing jurisdictions of the county do a re-appraisal in order for compliance by 1982 with tax legislation passed by the last two sessions of the Texas State Legislature.

The values established through this appraisal will not be used for 1981. It will be the 1982 tax year before they are used and each property owner will be notified of the classification and valuation of their property. At that time, the actual amount of taxes to be paid on the property will be determined by the governing body of each

of the individual taxing jurisdictions within the County.

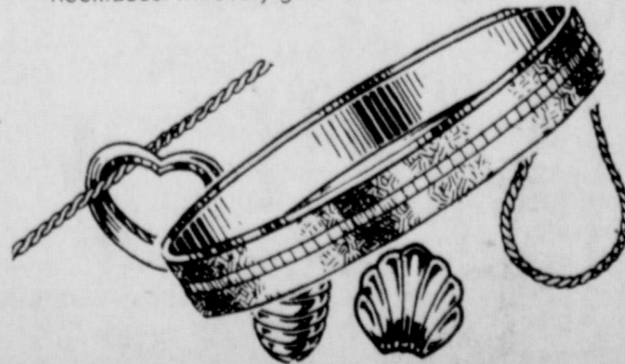

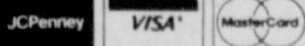

William F. Buckley Jr. To Speak At Hardin-Simmons

William F. Buckley Jr., one of the most eloquent and influential spokesmen for the conservative viewpoint in the world, will speak at 8 p.m. Thursday (Sept. 24) in Woodward-Dellis Recital Hall at Hardin-Simmons University.

The speech is free and open to the public.

Buckley, 61, has been a major force in American journalism and politics for years. He founded the National Review in 1952 after

having earlier served as associate editor of the old American Mercury. He began his weekly syndicated column "On the Right" in 1964 and expanded it to three times a week in 1964. It now appears in over 300 newspapers across the country.

In 1966 he began hosting a weekly television show, "Firing Line" that is now seen on Public Broadcasting Service as well as commercial television. Guests have included Muhammed Ali.

Truman Capote, Jimmy Carter, Bernadette Devlin, James Dickey, Allen Dulles, Daniel Ellsberg, Gerald Ford, Valery Giscard d'Estaing, Barry Goldwater, Billy Graham, Hugh Hefner, Hubert Humphrey, Jesse Jackson, Timothy Leary, Norman Mailer, Groucho Marx, Eugene McCarthy, George McGovern, Richard Nixon, Otto Preminger, Ronald Reagan, B.F. Skinner, Margaret Thatcher, George Wallace and Dame Rebecca West.

He has written 15 books, edited three others (including American Conservative Thought in the Twentieth Century) and contributed to nine more. He has contributed articles to "most American periodicals" among them Atlantic, Esquire, Life, Look, Harpers, Playboy, McCall's, Saturday Evening Post, The New Yorker and Motor Boating.

He was a Time Magazine cover story in 1967 and has been featured in Esquire, Playboy and National Observer.

His work as a journalism has won numerous honors including a television Emmy for "Outstanding Program Achievement"; a Cleveland

Amory (TV Guide) for Best Interviewer/Interviewee on Television"; "Best Columnist of the Year"; and a Distinguished Achievement Award from the University of Southern California.

He has received honorary doctorates from 16 American colleges and universities (including Notre Dame, Syracuse, Lehigh, and Saint Bonaventure).

Buckley earned a B.A. with honors from Yale University and served (1969-72) as a Presidential appointee to the five-member Advisory Commis-

sion on Information of the United States Information Agency and (in 1973) was appointed by President Nixon as the Public Member of the United States delegation to the 28th General Assembly of the United Nations.

In 1965 he ran for mayor of New York City on the Conservative Party ticket and received 13.4 per cent of the vote. His political feelings are so strong that he lists the fact that he is a "registered Republican" on his resume.

His appearance at HSU is being funded by the Cullen Fund for Faculty Enrichment.

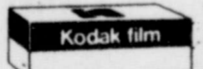

Sun Oil Proceeding With Plans For Ranger Oil Field

By Viola Payne

Charles L. Dickson, Ranger Project Manager of the Sun Production Company, has announced that Sun Oil is proceeding on schedule with the project to water-flood and restore production in the old Ranger Oil Boom Field.

At the present time the company has completed a nine-well pilot program about five miles west of the town of Ranger, in the center of the old T and P property.

Facilities are being built around the pilot area, and an 18 mile water line from the Breckenridge area to Morton Valley is 85 percent complete. This line begins about five miles east of Breckenridge on the Caddo Road, with the connection to Possum Kingdom Water being made about 100 yds. north of the Highway.

When the line is completed on the pilot program area - about 5 or 6 miles east of the Morton Valley Water Tower, the water injection will begin.

This is expected to be, at the latest, Jan. 1st. After water flooding and evaluation of the project for 6 mo. to 1 yr., Sun Production will consider the success of the program, and proceed as indicated.

It is hoped to eventually have 200 injection wells and 200 producing wells in the revitalized field.

"We have great expectations for this project," stated Dickson. "Of course there is a lot of risk and gamble with it. But so far - everything indicates success. Even the drilling we have done to define the old reservoir yielded favorable data. We hope to have other news for the people of Eastland County soon."

Eastland Co MHMR Work Center At The Crossroads

Did you know that Central Texas MHMR Center has a work activity center for mentally retarded adults in Eastland County? This center is located at 306 W. Plummer in Eastland and currently serves clients from Cisco, Eastland and Ranger. The center is open five days per week, excluding holidays, and the program is arranged to provide work orientation training in order for the clients to become productive citizens in the community. The clients live at home and are taken to and from the center in a Van.

Presently the center has two programs to enable the clients to earn wages. The primary activity is the assembly of small plumbing parts. For this work each client is paid on a piece rate based on the current minimum wage. The other activity is the collection of aluminum products for recycling. The profits from this endeavor are used for the center.

Since its inception, the Eastland Center has been fully funded by the Central Texas Mental Health Mental Retardation Center located in Brownwood. In recent months the Brownwood Center has experienced some budget restraints like all State and Federally funded programs. The direct effect of these budget reductions is that funds from Central Texas MHMR Center are adequate to support the Eastland County Workshop for only half-time for the fiscal year beginning 1 September 1981. Eastland County needs the workshop on a full time basis not half-time. Therefore the following programs are announced:

(1) A garage sale is announced for 24, 25, 26 September. This sale will be at the Center located at 306 W. Plummer. Merchandise is currently being collected. We can always use more. If you have merchandise that you are willing to donate to the center please bring it to the Center between the hours of 9:00 to 3:00 or call 629-8293 and we will arrange to pick it up.

(2) A memorial program is announced. A special account has been opened at Eastland National Bank for the receipt of Donations. What better way to remember a loved one than through a gift to help the less fortunate members of our society. Your check should be made to the order of Eastland County MHMR Memorial Fund.

(3) Future programs planned include industry sales, garage sales and direct appeals if necessary.

Senate Passes Peanut Bill

The Senate passed on September 16 a peanut bill for the years 1982-1985 after amending the proposal passed on April 30 by the Senate Agriculture Committee. Adoption of the measure followed one and one-half

days of debate on the Senate floor and lengthy deliberation and negotiations between growers and Senate farm leaders, according to Ross Wilson, National Peanut Growers Secretary. Senate action on the Bill is

only the first step. Consideration by the House of Representatives will be the next phase of the legislative process.

A Senate vote occurring early on September 16 on whether to table an amendment offered by Republican Senator Richard Lugar of Indiana that would have abolished acreage allotments and poundage quotas in 1982 served as an early warning of further difficulty, Wilson said. The Senate voted by a majority of 56 to 43 not to table Senator Lugar's amendment. That vote provided a strong implication that the Senate would vote for Senator Lugar's proposal to completely dismantle the peanut program if given an opportunity to do so. However, prior to the vote on tabling the Lugar Amendment, Georgia Republic Senator Mack Mattingly had offered a substitute to the

Lugar Amendment that growers considered much superior to the Lugar Bill, but which was inadequate as written, Wilson said. Although the Mattingly Bill calls for abolishment of acreage allotments, it would maintain poundage quotas at a minimum national level of 1.24 million tons.

Following negotiations between growers and Senator Mattingly a number of changes were made in the Mattingly Bill to insure that production of additional peanuts in excess of the farm base production or from non quota farm does not enter the domestic edible market until the supply of peanuts from quota farms within the farm base production is exhausted. Another change in the Mattingly Bill secured by growers is to call for a minimum support rate of \$596 per ton on quota peanuts to be adjusted annually based on increased production costs. Growers were unable to block a provision authored by Mattingly to transfer poundage quota across county lines within a state.

The Mattingly Bill as modified was passed by the Senate on September 16 by a vote of 51 For and 47 Against.

The Grower Group Secretary said the basic difference in the Lugar and Mattingly proposals is that Lugar would have abolished both allotments and quotas while the Mattingly Bill abolishes allotments, but retains quotas in place for the next four years. He said a prolonged effort by growers over the past 16 months had emphasized the retention of both allotments and quotas and that the same objective will be vigorously pursued in the House of Representatives where Farm Bill debate is expected to begin within a few days. It is still possible, he said, to put the present program back together in a Senate-House Conference Committee provided acreage allotments survive the House debate.

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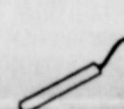
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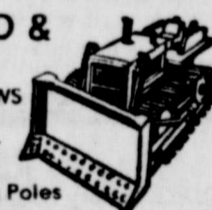

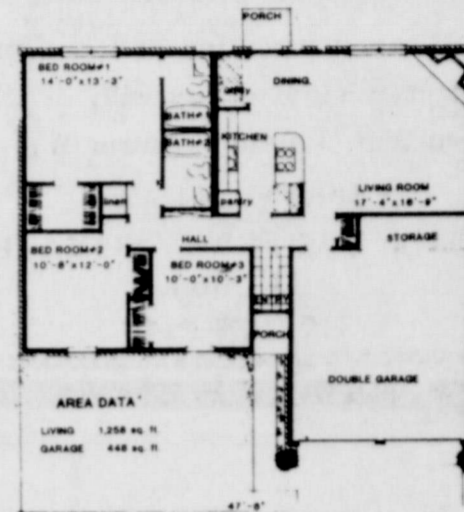

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'81 Crop Good But Not Great

This year's Eastland County peanut crop will not be an outstanding one but will produce a good overall average says Dee Gordon, County Agriculture Extension Agent. This is good news after last year's drought and short crop.

Surprisingly the amount of rainfall Eastland has received has not affected all the Seminary.

Everyone is invited to come and worship during these revival services.

1979 proved to be the biggest peanut year according to records which date back to 1960. Over \$52 pounds of peanuts were harvested in '79, according to David Martin of the A.S.C.S. office.

On the other hand 1980 saw the least amount of peanuts harvested since 1964.

While we will be enjoying a good peanut crop in Eastland County, changes are taking place in the peanut industry.

Mr. Gordon says,

"Washington's changes for the peanut program will not affect this year's crop, but there will definitely be a change after this year."

The Senate has recently passed a bill called the Mattingly Bill for the years 1982-1985. This calls for the abolishment of acreage allotments but maintains poundage quotas.

Many peanut growers went to Washington to speak up on their behalf. As a result, changes were made to the bill.

Peanuts produced in excess of the farm base production or farm quota farms can not enter the domestic edible market until the supply of peanuts from quota farms within the base production is exhausted.

The growers also secured a minimum support rate of \$596 per ton on quota peanuts, to be adjusted annually based on increased production costs.

The growers, however, were not able to block a provision authored by Mattingly to transfer poundage quotas across county lines within a state.

The senate bill is being passed to the House of Representatives. More peanut growers have gone to Washington to block the transfer poundage quotas across the county lines.

According to Mr. Gordon, this is a very important issue with the people of Eastland County.

He states, "If peanut quotas are allowed to be sold across county lines, Eastland County would lose very important agriculture dollars. These dollars are vital to the economy of our county."

Berries Of Autumn

Many trees and shrubs have had an abundance of fruit this season. Some that produce colorful berries are especially attractive. Among the plants producing these colorful fall berries are Hawthorne, Pyracantha, Crabapple, Holly, Bit-

tersweet, Euonymus, and Viburnum.

The Washington Hawthorne is a small tree that has produced orange-red fruits this season. Young trees often do not fruit heavily but, as plants become more mature, berry production becomes spectacular. Because of its thorns, Washington Hawthorne

should be pruned high, or planted where the thorns are not a hazard to passers-by or small children.

Another plant producing abundant berries this year is Pyracantha, also known as Firethorn. This spreading shrub produces large clusters of orange-red fruit along the branches. The past mild winter has left plants in good condition for an excellent display. Pyracantha is a close relative of the Apple, and is subject to some of the same diseases. Most common are scab which turns the berries black and fireblight, which may cause canes to die back.

Brilliant berries cannot be mentioned without thinking of Holly. Both deciduous and evergreen Hollies producing bright red berries make a spectacular addition to the landscape.

Two Hollies with red berries that drop their leaves are Possum Haw and Winterberry. Winterberry is a shrub but has greater cold hardiness than Possum Haw or the evergreen Hollies. Possum Haw forms a small tree, and is best suited for the North part of Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Both are heavy berry producers and hold berries well into the winter or until birds eat them.

Among the hardier evergreen Hollies are American Holly, Foster's Holly and Hybrids of Rugosa Holly such as Blue Princess and Blue Angel. Both male and female plants must be present for abundant berry production in these Hollies.

The fruits of Crabapples are also colorful. Both yellow and red varieties of

numerous sizes are available. Do not plant Crabapples close to walks or patios where the dropping fruit can get in the way.

Bittersweet is a twining vine, often growing naturally on farm fences or trees. It may make a good landscape subject for fall color where there is an adequate space available for it to climb. Both male and female plants

are necessary for berry production. Do not let it climb on desirable trees since it will twine around the branches and eventually kill them as the vines tighten and enlarge.

Not only enjoy the beauty of these berries this time of the year, but also make a list of the ones you like that would compliment your landscape for your spring

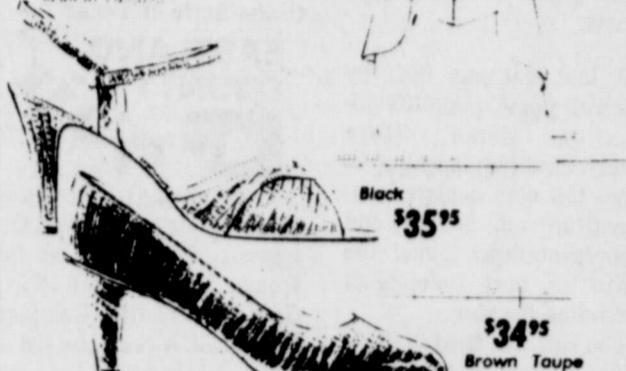

Senator Glasgow Reports



During the period between the regular sessions, interim studies on a variety of subjects are conducted by members of the Senate and House. It is normally composed of elected Representatives and citizen members who study subjects that may be of interest in the next session of the legislature. The following is a list of studies being conducted. If any of you have an interest in any of these subjects,

please contact my office in Austin and my staff will place you in contact with those conducting the study. The following studies are being conducted:
 - Special Committee on Diabetes in Texas, which will study State services for persons with diabetes.
 - Joint Committee to Study the Needs of Autistic Citizens, which will study the needs of autistic citizens and make recommendations con-

cerning the State's role in providing for these needs.

- Texas State Artist Selection Committee, which will work with the Commission on the Arts to study procedures for selecting the State artist.

- The Special Interim Committee on the Criminal Justice System of Texas, which will study the problem of crime in the State.

- Special Committee on Regional Intergovernmental Cooperation, which will attempt to determine ways to make intra-state regional cooperation more viable during the 1980's.

- Study of the Declining Numbers of Redfish and Speckled Trout, which will examine the problem that confronted the Legislature during the last session when commercial fishing of redfish and speckled trout was banned because of the declining numbers.

- Interim Committee on Evidence, which will study codification of the rules of evidence.

- Committee to Study Issues Relating to Agriculture, which will include a study on the recent grain elevator explosions, bonding or recovering of funds associated with grain elevator storage, the adequacy and timeliness of publicly funded agricultural research and development programs, labor availability and relations, transportation of agricultural commodities, the family farm and ranch security program, and water supplies.

- Committee to Study Fees and Grants, which will review and study the operations of State government, the fees and charges made by State agencies, federal grants and earned federal funds received by agencies, and the cost effectiveness of such fees, charges and funds.

- Study on Water Supply and Development which, will examine issues relating to ground water supplies.

- Study of the Application and Implementation of the Open Records Act, which will be conducted by the LBJ School of Public Affairs.

- Study of the Railroad Crossings in Texas to investigate safety at railroad crossings and the need for

- State Municipal Planning Study Committee, which will study the particular financial and planning problems of municipalities which have State owned facilities and property within their corporate limits or which may be located so near such State owned facility that such municipality is likely to be adversely affected from the location of such State owned facility.

- Committee on Quad State Project Participation, which will study the issue of Texas' possible participation in the Quad State Project, a cooperative multi-state effort to combat illegal narcotics traffic.

- Study of the Problems of Sexually Transmitted Diseases, which will study ways to combat the growing problem of these diseases.

- Study on the Health and Welfare Services provided through block grant funding, which will study the affect of the federal budget cuts on the State of Texas and its programs.

- Senate Committee on Fees and Grants, which will review and study the operations of State government, the fees and charges made by State agencies, federal grants and earned federal funds received by agencies, and the cost effectiveness of such fees, charges and funds.

- Study on Water Supply and Development which, will examine issues relating to ground water supplies.

- Study of the Application and Implementation of the Open Records Act, which will be conducted by the LBJ School of Public Affairs.

- Study of the Railroad Crossings in Texas to investigate safety at railroad crossings and the need for

State inspection of rails and rail equipment at such crossings.

- Study of the Texas Workmen's Compensation Laws.

- Study of Various Health Care Needs and Services for Texas, which will examine issues relating to family violence, health care needs of the medically indigent, rubella, autism, and other serious behavioral disorders.

- Study of the Homestead Exemption Provision in the Constitution which will determine the advisability of changing the homestead exemption provision of the Constitution to allow homeowners to negotiate for a second lien upon his homestead.

- Study on Investor Owned Water and Sewer Utility Companies, which will reivev the operations and problems relating to investor owned water and sewer utility companies to ensure that the laws relating to them meet the needs of the people of the State.

- Study of the Public Retirement Systems, which will evaluate the actual soundness of major public retirement systems and develop a reference manual of basic information of public retirement systems in Texas.

- Select Committee on Public Education, which will study the issues and concerns relating to public education of Texas, including curriculum reform, bilingual education, requirements relating to teacher competency, and alternative methods of financing.

If one ever needed a program to keep up with a subject, a person probably needs one to keep up with redistricting. The Texas Legislature has been involved in drawing the boundary lines for these different legislative bodies.

Lines are being drawn for Congressional, State Senate and State House districts. In the past Special Session, the Legislature passed a plan redrawing the Congressional lines and the plan has been signed by the Governor. Now different groups are threatening to file suit, asking that the courts stike the plan down. The main group threatening to file suit is MALDEF (A Mexican-American group). They maintain that the new south Texas district (number 27), although fifty-three percent Hispanic, was drawn in such a way as to deny the election of a Hispanic in the new district. They claim the Hispanic majority should have been greater in the newly created district.

At the opposite end of the state, in Dallas, a group is threatening a suit for just the opposite reasons, alleging use of a stratagem called "packing", i.e., the placing of a distinct group primarily in one district, thereby limiting their influence to just the one district.

The redistricting of the State Senatorial districts is presently before the redistricting board. This board is made up of the Lt. Governor, Speaker of the House, Attorney General, Comptroller and Land Commissioner.

The Senate did originally pass a plan redrawing their district lines during the Regular Session. However, to the surprise of many, the Governor vetoed the measure after the end of the Session.

The Texas Constitution provides that the redistricting board must draw the lines of the State Senate and

State House when the Legislature fails to draw the lines during the Regular Session (but the Legislature may draw the Congressional lines during a Special Session).

Therefore, the Senate lines are going to be drawn by the redistricting board. The Board has ninety days to meet after the end of the Regular Session and then sixty days to draw a plan. The Redistricting Board, for reasons explained later, is waiting the entire ninety days and plan to meet on or about August 30, 1981. Therefore, the Board would have until almost the end of October to complete a Senate plan.

The reason for the delay is the House plan, or possibly the lack of a House plan. The State House of Representatives also passed a plan during the Regular Session which was signed by the Governor. However, the plan faced a third hurdle - the courts.

A law suit was filed by several party plaintiffs including some State Representatives seeking to have the plan declared unconstitutional. Seventy-odd Representatives joined the State as part defendants defending the plan.

The suit was filed in State District Court in Austin and after six days of testimony the judge ruled that the plan was unconstitutional.

An interesting note is that the primary reason that the plan was struck down was the arbitrary division of twelve counties without a good reason. Two of these counties were in the 22nd District, Erath and Cooke Counties. Erath was divided between Representatives Gibson and Representative Hanna's districts. Cooke County was divided between Representative Finnel and Representative Coody. In Cooke County, even the largest town, Gainesville,

was cut in two.

The State has appealed the decision directly to the Texas Supreme Court where oral arguments were heard on August 25th. A decision is expected within a week.

The possibility (or likelihood) of the House plan being struck down by the State Supreme Court is the reason the Redistricting Board has delayed meeting. They feel that both plans should be done at the same time the Board will be holding public hearings across the State on the plans. Doing both at the same time would eliminate double work and expense.

Hopefully, the Board will have its plans drawn by the end of October. But do not think that this is the end. The likelihood is great that someone will challenge either or both of the plans and we could be back to square one.

This phenomena of problems with redistricting, however, is not peculiar to the 1981 redistricting or even to the State of Texas.

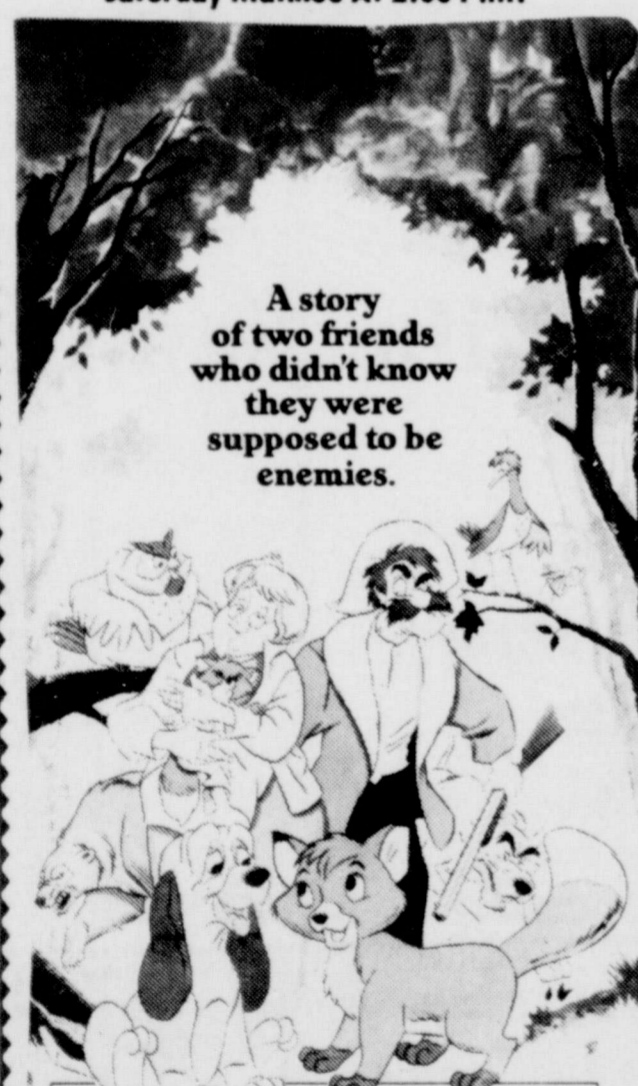

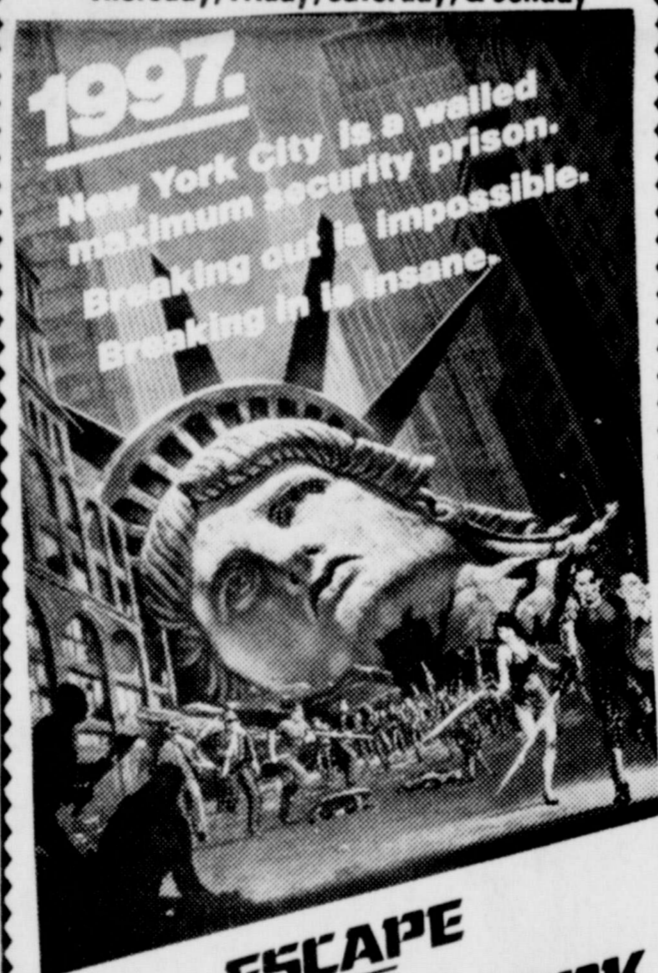

Statistics on Senate attendance & voting

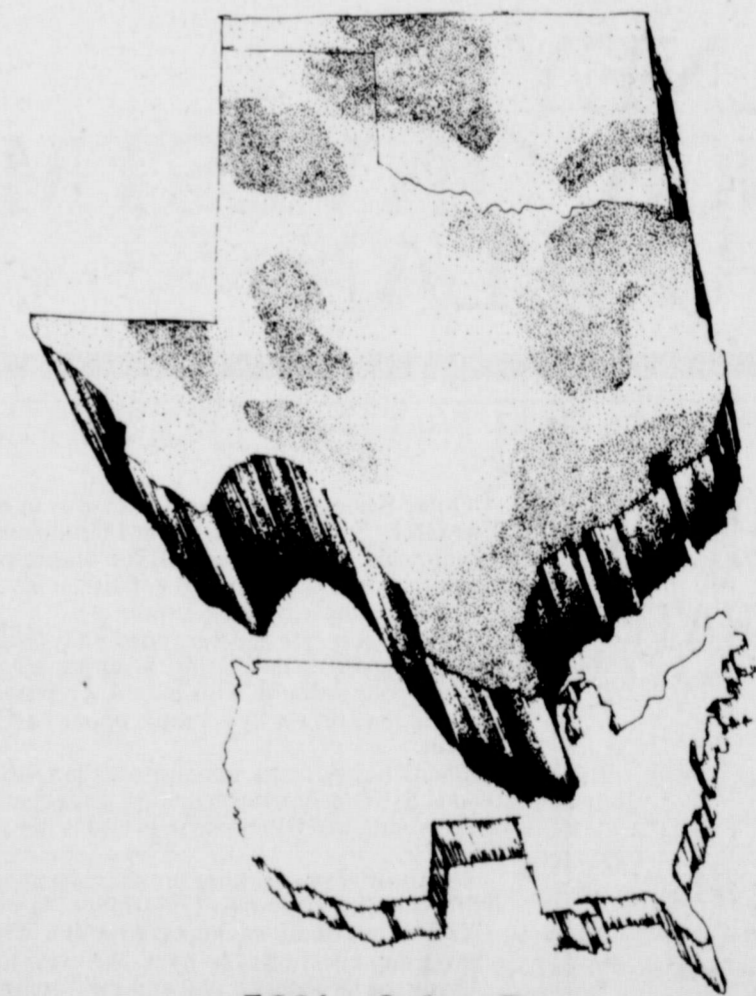
The statistics on Senate attendance and voting during the Regular Session have just been released by the office of the Secretary of the Senate.

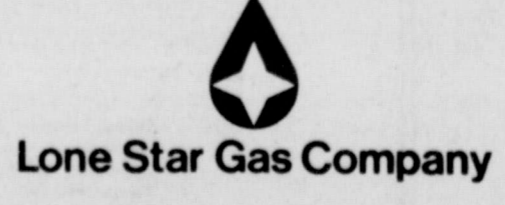

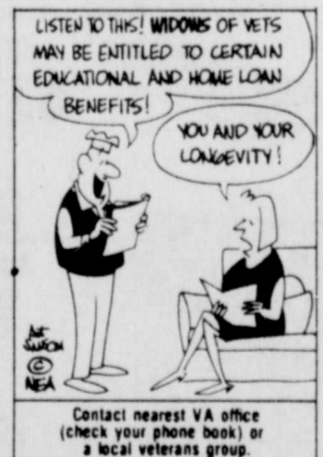
