City Manager Says Cisco **Has No Security Problems**

The City of Cisco has no security problems as the result of five policemen turning in their resignations at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night, City Manager Mike Moore reported Fri-

The policemen--Terry Petree, Steve Brackeen, Wayne McGlothlin, Jerry Eudy and Jim Pence-went in a group into the City Council meeting room and laid their police badges on the desk beside Mr. Moore. They then left without a word. Earlier, Mr. Petree came in during the meeting and whispered to the city manager who excused himself for a few minutes to talk with the policeman outside the room.

The group came in some 30 minutes later to leave their badges. Mr. Moore went to the Police Chief's office when the Council called a 10-minute break after considering about half of the items on the agenda. When he returned, Mr. Moore asked for an emergency executive session of the Council after the regular agenda items were completed.

Police Chief Jerry Jernigan, Lake Patrolman C.H. (Cats) Ingram and Officer Rebecca Mendez were the other three members of the Police Department.

Mr. Moore said that Fire Marshal Bill Webb, who is certified as a police officer, has joined the police force to help during the emergency period. Billy Rains, a former police officer who is certified as a policeman, has volunteered to work during weekends.

Carl Neal, formerly of the Cisco Police Department, has been employed and will begin work early in the coming week as a regular member of the department. Mr. Moore was interviewing several applicants for the vacant posts and said he hopes to have a full staff very soon.

Mr. Moore also reported that he hopes to have a decision on or before Oct. 1 as to a new chief of police. Mr. Jernigan has been the acting chief for several weeks.

"To the best of my knowledge, Mr. Jernigan has done a good job as our acting police chief," Mr. Moore said. Several applicants were to be interviewed for the post.

After the meeting last Tuesday, Officer Petree told interviewers that the officers were resigning because of disagreements with the chief over the schedule of working hours. In a television interview on an Abilene station Wednesday night, one of the expolicemen said the disagreement was caused partly by "sexual discrimination" and that the officers planned to file a grievance with proper authorities. Mr. Moore said "this was all news to me."

Officers Brackeen and McGlothlin, who have been in police certification school for several weeks, said they planned to continue their studies, indicating that they hoped to stay in law enforcement work.

Mr. Moore said that Eastland County Sheriff Johnny Morren volunteered to assist Cisco police in any way needed. The Eastland Department of Public Safety office also called to offer the services of highway patrolmen in any emergen-

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

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



Tony White Presents Program To Rotary Club

superintendent of the now closed Boss Manufacturing plant in Cisco, brought to the Rotary Club Thursday noon his impressions of economic conditions in the Michigan-Illinois industrial area gained during a recent trip back to his home country, and the impressions were not cheer-

Decline in the automobile and related industries in that highly industrialized area have cost it much of its highly skilled population, he said. These workers are moving southward and westward into new fields of opportunity, and a growing residue of lesser skilled workers has become a cause of much concern in Kewanee, Ill., his old home town, and many similar communities where the economic emphasis has been and continues to be on manufacturing plants, particular ZU automobiles and farm machinery.

In contrast, he said, Texas is experiencing a boom of considerable proportions which is attracting thousands of technologically skilled and professional people, such as school teachers, to this state. He called upon his experience as manager of the Boss company to sound a sober note concerning the future of this trend.

'We found at the Boss plant," he said in effect, 'that whenever there was a decline in economic conditions in the north it took about six months for the effects to domino into Texas. I am wondering whether or not what is happening in the mid-western industrial areas will not in time reach into our state."

In contrast to the industrial decline, he and Mrs. White were impressed with the extent and prosperous condition of the agricultural economy, particularly the corn crop. All through the corn belt from Oklahoma north to Illinois, the fields were lush and crowded with ears of corn which promise a

Tony White, long-time crop, estimated by government surveys, that will mature into billions of bushels - enough to fill a freight train 22,000 miles in length. Ideal planting and growing conditions are responsible, he said.

White prefaced his talk with information about the Rotary Club archives on deposit with Cisco Junior College. These consist of historical records since the club's organization in 1921, including a weekly attendance roll meticulously kept. Tony, who himself served some 28 years as secretary, paid tribute to E.P. (Pansy) Crawford, first secretary of the club, for establishing and maintaining a standard of excellence which succeeding recorders have followed. Billy Reynolds is the current secretary.

He also called attention to the leadership which members of Rotary clubs have provided the community Cisco. At least four members, including Eris Ritchie at present, have served as mayors of the town, and many other members have filled positions of significant responsibility in the political and social fabric of the community, he reminded.

A project of noteworthy value in which members of the club, including White himself, are now engaged is the Cisco Cemetery Association. He said that since its reorganization is on a basis looking to self-support, the endowment fund of the cemetery has grown to \$87,000 - \$13,000 short of a goal of \$100,000. It cost, he revealed, about \$20,000 a year to maintain the burial grounds.-BAB

City Council Orders Hearing Approves Several Ordinances

The City Council ordered a public hearing on a new waste water facility, approved several ordinances and resolutions on important community matters, approved the 1981-82 city budget, called for bids on new street department equipment, and took care of other matters in a four-hour meeting Tuesday

A public hearing on the waste water matter was ordered for 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 29, at the city hall. Engineer Billy Jacobs of Abilene, who is working with the city on the project, outlined a third option that can be taken in disposing of waste water. He had previously pointed out that the water could be pumped to a farm in the area for use in irrigation or a mechanical treatment plant could be developed.

The new alternative would utilize several adjoining ponds through which the water from the sewage system would pass before eventually going into a creek as purified water.

Details of three options plus financing plans will be explained at the public hearing. The project will cost from \$930,000 for the Pond plan to about \$1,300,000 for the mechanical treatment plant. Revenue bonds would be used to finance the project, and sewage system customers would pay a regular monthly sum to retire the debt.

Development of a waste water disposal plan has been ordered by the Texas Department of Water Resources, and Mr. Jacobs and City Manager Mike Moore visited that agency in Austin last week.

The Council passed on final reading an ordinance that would provide for a penalty to defray the costs of collecting delinquent taxes. The city has entered into contract with a Fort Worth concern that will handle delinquent tax collections on a yearly basis for a fee of 15% - the amount of the

An ordinance granting Television Southern Systems, Inc., a cable franchise extension of 20 years was approved on first reading. The firm has been operating here since 1958 under a franchise. Terms of the new franchise set cable charges at their present rates and provide that council approval will be needed if rates are increased in excess of five per cent. The five per cent increases can be postponed for no more than three years without council approval. The cable company was given authority to bring in movie channels that would require customers to pay for same.

An ordinance levying a hotel occupancy tax as proposed by the Chamber of Commerce was approved. A two per cent tax will be levied beginning Oct. 1 and will be paid directly to the city by local motels. The Chamber of Commerce will use the money, expected to amount to about \$5,000 per year, to promote tourism. A resolution authorizing a contract between the city and the CofC for expending the funds was also approved.

A public hearing on the City's budget for 1981-82 was held. City Manager Moore outlined the budget, which will become effective Oct. 1, and noted that it calls for anticipated revenue of \$1,027,987 and the expenditure of a like amount. The budget was reviewed by The Press after the Sept. 8th meeting.

Following the public hearing, the Council approved the budget and an ordinance adopting it on first reading. A tax rate of \$1.35 per \$100 valuation was approved recently for the coming

A group presented a petition signed by Betty Clapp, O.R. Williams and Vina L. Blackburn of the 600 block of West 9th Street, protesting the location of a fence in the alley between their property and that of the James Wheats of 605 West 8th Street. They contented that the Wheat fence was taking in several feet of the alley. The council explained that it was powerless to act and

suggested that relief would have to come in the form of an injunction from the 91st District Court. A spokesman for the group said they would carry the matter to the

A resolution declaring and invoking the three-fourths rule and adopting policy for a seven-member governing board for the Eastland County Appraisal District was approved by a vote of four for, one against and two abstaining votes. Steve Thomas, chief appraiser for the new taxing authority, explained that the rule allows taxing entities to depart from certain regulations in the conduct of affairs of the countywide district

The Council decided to accept bids to be opened at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 21, for the purchase of a backhoe machine, a dump truck and for supplying the city with gasoline and oil. The bids will be opened by the city manager at his office and notices of the plans to purchase these items will go out soon. The Council will award contracts after considering the bids at their Oct. 27th

meeting, it was decided. An agreement between the city and the Twentieth Century Club for library services was approved by the Council. The agreements provides that a free-lending library will be maintained by the club and that the city will pay annually to the club the sum of \$1,900 - \$1,075 on Nov. 1st of each fiscal year and \$75 per month for the next 11 months.

Mrs. Louise Allison, president of the Twentieth Century Club, was present and told the Council that the club has provided the community with a free library for 81 years. Mayor Eris Ritchie noted that "I know that all of our citizens very much appreciate the work of the club in providing us with an outstanding library."

Following the regular agenda, a citizen inquired what procedure should a subscriber to the tv cable service take in the event service is interrupted. It was explained that the cable franchise provides that an office shall be maintained in Cisco by the cable company and that it would respond within 24 hours to any complaint about service. The city manager noted that patrons might register any complaints at city hall and that a record would be main-

tained. In other actions, the Council approved minutes of the regular meeting of Sept. 6th.

A financial report for the month of August was submitted by City Accountant Jean Gray. It showed general fund income for the month amounting to \$59,743. This included \$17,406 in sales taxes, \$2,603 in current \$682 in delinquent taxes, \$2,931 in franchise taxes, \$605 in court fines, \$955 for grass leases, \$930 in cabin rentals, \$25,000 in financial administration funds, and \$7,174 in sanitation charges.

General fund expenses for the month totaled \$42,964. The water and sewer fund

had income of \$31,595 and expenses of \$55,553. Miss Gray listed bills

rayable for August totalling \$47,776 out of the general fund and \$43,403 from the water and sewer fund. It was recommended by the city manager and approved by the Council that bills not be paid beginning with the new fiscal year until they were read and approved by the Council.

Mid-way in the agenda, five members of the city police department marched into the meeting room and laid their badges on the desk of the city manager. Mr. Moore visited the police officers during a brief intermission and then reported that five policemen had resigned and turned in their badges. He asked for an emergency executive session that was held following the regular meeting. A story about the police action appears elsewhere.

Mayor Ritchie and all members of the council were present, along with City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Attorney Wm. B. Wright, Jr. Some 12 people were in the audience.
