Bharat and Kiran had lived in California for about seven years before moving to Eastland on August 15th of this year. But Bharat Bkakta's wife, who is a homemaker rather than a worker at the Restaurant, lived in India until her marraige about six months ago. Kiran, who is the younger of the brothers, is not married.

Like most people the world over, the Bhaktas are enthusiastic about their plans for the future. They hope to keep Best Western a quality place to dine, with a menu comparable to restaurants in the Metroplex and other areas. They may even add a few International dishes, such as chicken curry and similar things, as interest indicates.

"I don't know whether the people here would like the curry or peppers as hot as they serve them in India," Bharat smiles.

At the present time the Restaurant is serving mainly American food, with meals based around beef, chicken, or seafood. And a wide cross-section of people seem to be enjoying it business people, oilmen, and may travel to the Metroplex travelers from the In- or to Coleman to visit other terstate.

As the Bhakta brothers stir about with their duties at the Best Western it is difficult to realize the tremendous changes which have taken place in their lives. Bharat and Kiran were born in a small town named Pathadia, near Bombay, Southern India. Bharat enrolled in a College at Bardoli, where he studied Mechanical and Electrical Engineering.

In 1972 his parents moved to San Francisco, where his father went into business. About two years later Bharat and Kiran decided to move to the United States and work with their father.

"No, I didn't know her before that time," he explains. "I found her on this visit."

After a tradition wedding the young couple returned to the United States. This summer the opportunity came to manage the Best Western Restaurant, and they came on to Eastland.

Bharat Bhakta states that they have enjoyed it very much here - that the people have been friendly. They have found the area less crowded than California, with a hot summer climate comparable to that of Bombay. They 'haven't seen winter here yet, but are looking forward to that as just another in their long series of adventures.
