Fire Prevention Week October 4-10

Fire Prevention Week will be observed October 4 through 10. The Cisco Fire Department has provided the following fire prevention information:

Exit Drills in the Home (EDITH)

Residential blazes are the number one cause of fire fatalities in the United States. During 1980, home fires were responsible for 70% of all fire-related injuries. These facts underline the importance of families learning how to escape a fire and regularly conducting a home exit drill.

The National Fire Protection Association is the nation's leading independent, nonprofit, technical, and educational organization dedicated to protecting lives and property from fire. The NFPA recommends that children and adults learn the eight fire safety behaviors explained below before fire strikes. The first seven are the steps of EDITH. As part of the observance of Fire Prevention Week, households are being encouraged to practice EDITH on Wednesday evening, October 7.

Install Smoke Detectors

Make sure there are smoke detectors outside each sleeping area and on each level or story of your house, including the basement. Test your smoke detectors periodically. A smoke detector senses the presence of smoke in the air and sends off a warning signal so that you can get out of the house before you are harmed.

As a backup to your smoke detectors, keep a whistle near your bed. Use the whistle to wake the rest of the household.

Plan Your Escape

Diagram escape routes from every room in your house, particularly the bedrooms since many fires start at night when people are sleeping. Know two ways out of every room. In an apartment building, located the enclosed exit stairs. Since small children and disabled family members may need assistance during a fire, choose family members to help them escape.

Test The Door For Fire

Always sleep with the bedroom door shut. A closed door holds back smoke, heat, and flames from a fire and gives you time to use an alternate route.

Before trying to escape through your bedroom door, first test the door for a fire outside. Heat rises, so feel the door as high as you can reach. If the door is warm, use your alternate escape route. If not, brace your shoulder against the door and open it slowly. Be ready to slam the door shut again if smoke or heat rush in.

If you cannot use your

alternate route, stuff cloth in cracks and vents to keep smoke out. If there is a phone in the room, call the fire department with your exact location. Signal from the window that you are inside. Wait for the firefighters to rescue you.

Practice Escaping from the Bedroom through both routes.

After testing the door (above), proceed outside through your primary route. Then practice your alternate plan. Open the window, descend a ladder or lower yourself to the ground. Slide out of a window on your stomach, feet first; hang on with both hands; bend knees when landing. Children should go out first and adults follow.

Crawl Low in Smoke
Smoke can be highly poisonous. It can damage the eyes and make breathing very difficult. When you encounter smoke in a fire, crawl on your hands and knees below the smoke line. Remember that the cleaner and fresher air is close to the floor.

Meet Outside the House

Once you are outside the house, never go back into a fire. Choose a meeting spot safely away from the house. Go there immediately and conduct a roll call to make sure everyone is out. Wait for the fire department to rescue anyone who is trapped. Call The Fire Department.

Locate the nearest telephone or fire alarm boxes so that you can report the fire from outside the house. Make sure that everyone in your family knows how to report a fire correctly. Memorize the fire department's telephone number. Practice saying the number, family name, street address and town into the telephone.

Stop, Drop And Roll To Put Out Flames

If your clothes catch on fire, stop, drop quickly to the ground, cover your face with your hands, and roll over and over to smother the flames. If a rug or blanket is close to you, wrap yourself in it and roll. Do not run. Running will make the fire worse.

For More Information

A bibliography of books and articles on many aspects of fire safety plus lists of teaching aids are available from the National Fire Protection Association. The NFPA has prepared an extensive curriculum on fire safety. Called "Learn Not to Burn," the curriculum is designed for grades K-8 and is structured around 25 key fire safety behaviors which teach children to (1) prevent fires, (2) protect themselves, their families and friends from fire, and (3) persuade others to be mindful of fire safety. 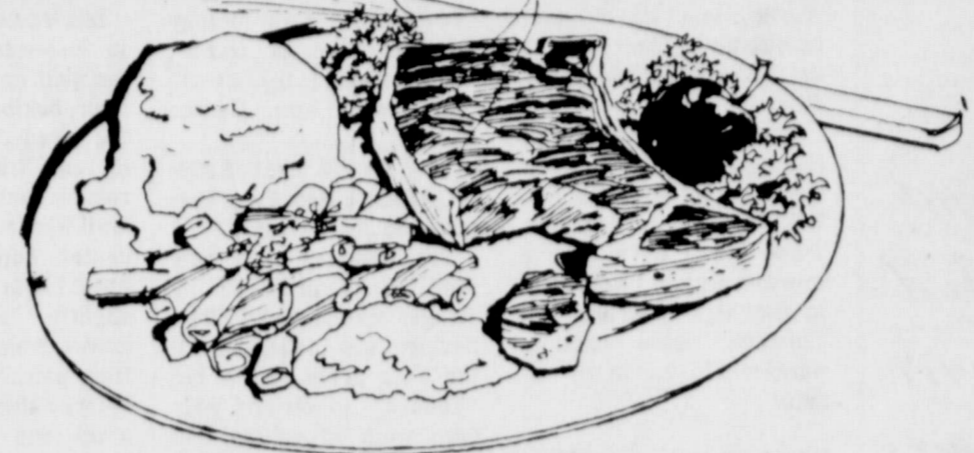

1 teaspoon ground cloves
¾ cups coarsely chopped

¾ cup raisins
Mix shortening and sugar

pumpkin and water. Blend in
flour, baking soda, salt, bak-
ing powder, cinnamon and
cloves. Stir in nuts and

Elmer Foster Fm.H.A. Retiree Honored By Employees Sept. 21

Elmer F. Foster, former District Director, was honored with a banquet by employees on September 21, 1981 at Briarstone Manor in Abilene. Foster retired in January, 1981 after forty years with Farmers Home Administration.

Special speaker was Dale King of Congressman Charles Stenholm's office. Accompanying him was his wife. King paid tribute to Elmer Foster as the most dedicated public servant he has ever known. He said that in conducting congressional investigations, he was used to people passing the buck; however, when he contacted Mr. Foster, he knew the buck stopped there.

Chairing the banquet was John D. Wolf, Jr., present District Director in Abilene, who trained as Assistant County Supervisor and County Supervisor under Elmer Foster. He said that Mr. Foster was the only supervisor he ever had who could "chew me out and make me like it at the same time."

John Barnes, Assistant State Director, was in Mr. Foster's district for a week prior to his promotion to District Director. He remembers that Foster's

prime interest at that time was in helping tenants become land owners by obtaining farm loans from FmHA when land was selling for \$40. to \$50. per acre. Foster was also pushing diversified farming to provide more than one source of income. As he counselled his County Supervisors, the Farm Ownership program was given top priority.

Bill Lawson, Chief of Community Programs, said that he has known Elmer Foster since the flag pole and water tower were taller than the buildings at Texas A&M. (They both graduated from A&M.) He praised Foster for his dedication to the improvement of rural life with better farms and better homes through water and sewer loans. In Eastland County alone, there are an estimated 2000 meters served by Rural Water Supply Corporations financed with FmHA loans. Lawson concluded, "You can't live without a drink of water."

Jack Boyd, Chief of Business and Industry Program, told about Foster, who, although a District Director, worked in the Eastland County office when they were without a County

Supervisor in order that the Staff Water Supply Corporation loan would not be delayed nor the funds lost.

Harold Kennedy, County Supervisor at Brownwood, said that he was always glad to see Mr. Foster. "If a loan turned bad, it was 'ours'; if it were good, it was 'ours.' Mr. Foster shared the responsibility."

Bennie Davis, County Supervisor at Comanche, expressed appreciation for the help that Elmer Foster gave him. "If I 'goofed up' I didn't mind telling him about it. When I talked a problem over with him, by the time I was through, I had usually found a solution. And Mr. Foster had not given me any advice!"

A watch was presented to Mr. Foster with the following engraving on the clasp:
September 3, 1940
FmHA
December 29, 1980

Those dates represent the beginning and ending dates of Foster's tenure of service with Farmers Home Administration.

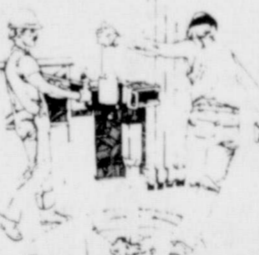

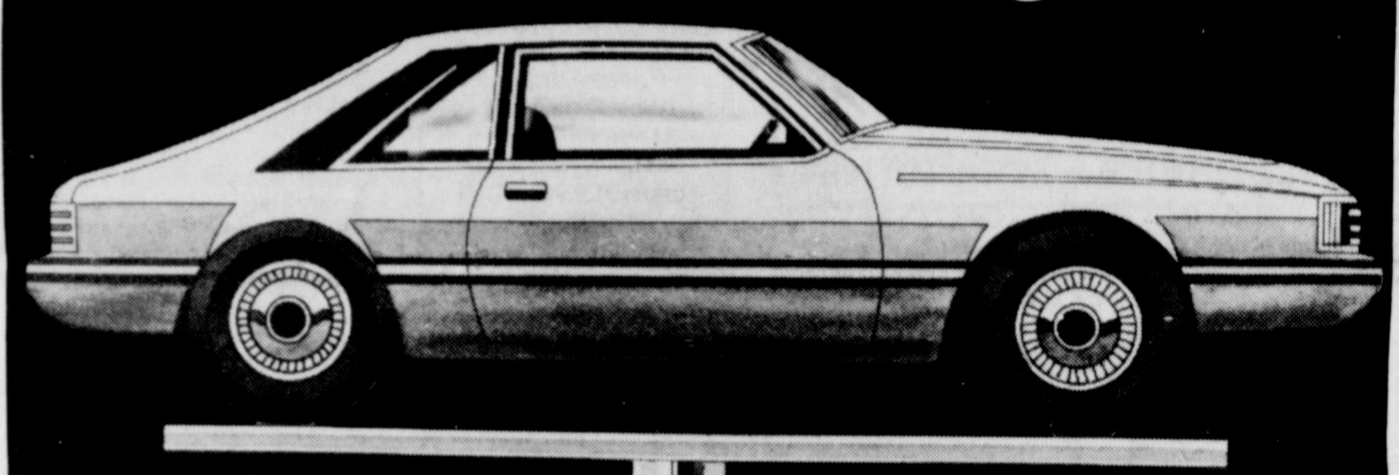



Project Pearl In China Is Success

Dear Friends of the Suffering Church,

I have marvelous news for you. Our share of Project Pearl has been completed. One million Chinese Bibles have been delivered to China. Hallelujah!

And as impossible as it seems, they were all delivered at one time!

Because you have been so faithful in prayer and in giving, I want to share with you the report I was given by our team in Asia. It is a lengthy, detailed report, but you'll not want to miss a word.

This modern-day miracle delivery was made in a secluded location along the south China coast under the light of the full moon on the evening of June 18, 1981. (We

have delayed making any of the details public until now to ensure the safety of Chinese believers transporting these Bibles to the four corners of China).

More than 20,000 Chinese gathered in the darkness to work in the receiving and distribution of the one million Bibles. Our delivery team was flabbergasted; they had expected no more than 5,000 believers. But so great is the hunger for the Word that as news of an imminent Bible delivery was passed by word of mouth, believers began to travel to the area from many districts of the region.

It took only a few hours for our delivery team of 20 men to unload the one million Bibles. They were packed in 232 packages, each weighing more than one ton. Each package contained 49 cardboard boxes of Bibles, with each box containing 90 copies of God's Word. Altogether, there were more than 11,000 boxes of Bibles in the shipment. These were all safely delivered to the Chinese believers.

Concerning the actual delivery, our team in Asia told me, "Andrew, we saw the glory of the Lord in China. Those of us on this delivery experienced the overshadowing presence and protection of the Lord."

When inside China, Chinese believers told our team, "Before you arrived, we saw visions of the Lord Jesus and His angels in this place." And how else can you explain that our team passed undetected past Chinese patrols not once, but many times? The prayer I have used so often during the past 27 years was answered again...the Lord made seeing eyes blind.

I wish I could tell you that one million Christians lived happily thereafter with their Bibles, but I cannot. It would not be true.

Four hours after our team left, Chinese soldiers arrived, alerted by the large number of people in the area.

In the confusion of the next few hours, many events occurred. Some of the boxes of Bible were thrown into the sea by the soldiers. Many of these boxes were picked up by Christian fishermen in boats and on rafts and safely taken elsewhere. Soldiers tried to burn boxes full of Bibles but had difficulty doing so. Many believers were arrested and some were beaten. All the while, Christians continued to move boxes of Bibles to secure locations amidst the confusion and darkness.

Other Bibles were apprehended at roadblocks set up by the authorities. Christians watched in despair as the soldiers poured petrol over the boxes and tried to set them ablaze. Some burned, but many were snatched back by the believers.

Despite the fierce attempts of Satan to stop "Project Pearl," which involved even more than I have reported here, the majority of the Bibles had already been moved out of the area before the soldiers arrived. In the darkness and chaos, there was no way the troops could keep more than 20,000 believers from walking away with 11,000 boxes of Bibles.

By the next day, word of the enormous delivery of Bibles had been passed on to the regional authorities from the local officers who didn't know how to handle the situation. Regional authorities in turn passed the problem on to Peking.

About the same time, some of our "Project Pearl" Bibles ended up in the hands of the local "Three-Self" government-supported church. These Christians held a praise meeting, thanking the Lord for the unexpected supply of Bibles. Their happiness was short-lived.

Soon a civil government delegation from Peking and religious leaders from Nanking (Three-Self Patriotic Movement headquarters) arrived in the area. One of their first acts was to confiscate the Bibles from the Three-Self Movement church and destroy them in front of the Christians. The religious leaders stated that these Bibles were "poison" and had to be destroyed. Christians who one day had been rejoicing were crying the next.

Later, bold Christians took a copy of the Bible printed last year by the Three-Self Movement to the authorities

along with a "Project Pearl" Bible. "Look," they said, "you say this Bible is poison (showing them a copy of the "Project Pearl" Bible), but this Bible is perfectly acceptable because you printed it. But read them—they are exactly the same!" Caught in their own trap, the officials finally agreed that the "Project Pearl" Bibles were acceptable.

They may have been acceptable, but possession of them was not. Hundreds of Christians in the ensuing days had their homes searched for "Project Pearl" Bibles and scores were beaten and taken to prison. Twenty members of one family alone were imprisoned for possession of many Bibles. Three of them were so badly beaten by the authorities that they were unable to get up off the floor. Recent reports, however, state that all the Christians imprisoned have been released. Praise the Lord!

I'm glad to state that hundreds of thousands of these "Project Pearl" Bibles are now being read by grateful Christians all over China. The Bibles were freely given to our brothers and sisters, but they paid a price for them, and I fear will continue to do so.

But was it worth the price? Chinese believers say "Yes." Already, word has reached us that hundreds have accepted Christ since we delivered one million Bibles just a few weeks ago. A letter just received from Chinese leaders has already asked us for a second million. They bear the scars of the first million—but they have found the joy of Jesus in His Word far greater than the rod of a godless regime.

Project Pearl is finished. Praise the Lord! But Open Doors involvement in China has just begun. Our original vision is still ten million Bibles for China; Project Pearl was our initial response. A request for a second million is in our hands. What will we do?

Well, what I want to do right now is shout, "China, Jesus loves you!" And then I want to send more Bibles to His name.
