Larry L. Jernigan, acting police chief for the past two months, was named chief of the Cisco Police Department by City Manager Mike Moore on Monday, according to an announcement.

Mr. Jernigan, 29, is a veteran of some four years in police work - all in Cisco except for a few months with the Eastland Police Department. He is a native of Cisco and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Jernigan.

The new chief attended public schools here and is a graduate of the Abilene Police Academy, which is affiliated with Texas A&M University. He lives with his wife, Connie, and their three children at 804 West 13th Street. Their children are Patricia 7, Linda 5, and Larry, Jr., 3.

"During the two months he has served as our acting chief, Larry has done a good job," Mr. Moore said. "He is mature and a good worker and I am confident that he can handle all of the responsibilities of his position. He will have my full support."

The City Council held an executive session Monday night on personnel matters and Mr. Moore informed the group of his decision to name the chief of police. The council applauded the choice.

Mr. Jernigan has been doing "double duty" since five members of the Police Department resigned Sept. 22 and while replacements were being hired.

The employment of Dave Thomas, 45, of Little Elm, Texas, as a city policeman was announced Monday. He is a veteran of police work.

Lobos Lose To Eastland; Will Take On Early In Cisco Friday

The Lobos of Cisco High School dropped their 10-AA district opener last Friday night to the No. 2 ranked Eastland Mavericks by the score of 21-7

(The Lobos will play their second home game of the season Friday night when they face Early in Cisco. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m.)

The Mavericks remain undefeated this year with a 4-0 season record, while having scored 179 points against their opponents and giving up only 10 points. The Loboes scored seven of those points. Eastland is now 1-0 in District play.

The Lobos season record dropped to 0-3-1 following their loss to Eastland, making their District record 0-1. So far, the Lobos have scored a combined 33 points against their opponents while giving up 67 points.

The first half of Friday night's game looked as though the two teams were perfectly matched and the half-time score was 7 to 7.

However, in the second half Eastland took advantage of two big turnovers and scored each time to cinch the 21-7 victory.

Early in the first quarter of Friday night's game, Eastland's quarterback Jay Hess connected a pass to Larry Blackwell on a third down and eight yards to go situation from Cisco's 14-yard line. Blackwell carried the ball into the end zone but a penalty against Eastland erased the apparent touchdown. Two plays later on fourth down. 

Driving and Surviving-The Facts and Figures

By Viola Payne

Sgt. Jerry Mathews of the Department of Public Safety in Eastland has released current information relating to the work of his Department, and how the public is cooperating with traffic laws. Sgt. Mathew's District includes Callahan as well as Eastland Counties, but these figures reflect only Eastland County patrol work. They do not include all the arrests made within City limits by Law Enforcement Officers of each town, or other arrests made by the County

All the Department figures have special meaning to Sgt. Mathews, who has been in charge of the D.P.S. here since 1968. The trends they show should be of equal interest to all citizens, for they deal with life-and-death matters which could affect anyone.

Sgt. Mathews has six patrolmen in Eastland County - Troopers Burch, Condry, Foster, Polnick, Rose, and Tone. They spend more time on the Freeway than various other roads simply because, as Sgt. Mathews says:

"That's where the major traffic is. The latest figures from the Highway Department indicate that 11 to 13

thousand people are passing down the Freeway each day. We're having an increase of about 5 per cent each year on

He adds that traffic has also increased on the secondary highways and local roads, due primarily to the rise in oil development. And Sgt. Mathews and the D.P.S. Troopers, as State Law Enforcement Officers, can be called to assist in cases other than traffic violations.

In 1980 there were about 8,500 traffic violations charges filed against person by the Eastland County Troopers, and 3,285 warnings issued. In 1979 there were approx. 7,158 charges filed, with 3,396 warnings issued. During he apprehension of these people, some wanted felons were arrested: 33 in 1980, following 26 in 1979. The Troopers also assisted 133 stranded motorists in 1980, with 164 recorded in 1979.

Speeding and the consumption of alcohol continued to be the leading causes of traffic accidents in Eastland County and elsewhere, accounting for over half of these stastics. In 1980 there were 253 total accidents in the County, comparing with 248 in 1979. Of

these 166 persons were injured in accidents in 1980, compared to 132 persons in 1969. In 1980 8 persons were killed in County-wide traffic accidents, contrasted with 5 people in 1979.

Arrests for speeding alone totaled 5530 in 1980, with 3585 in 1979. Obviously the trend to speed is up in this area, but so is enforcement.

Driving-While-Intoxicated arrests by the Troopers totaled 250 in 1980, a decrease from 327 in 1979. Sgt. Mathews takes scant comfort in this however. "I'm afraid this may not accurately reflect how much alcoholic consumption is actually taking place," he warns. "The extra effort needed for speed enforcement has kept Patrolmen on the Freeway away from the

'To begin with, either of the 1980 or 1979 figures are very bad. One intoxicated person on a road can wipe out a whole family, and we may be missing some of these drivers. A number of them may be on the streets of the towns, or may drive those secondary roads where we do not patrol as heavily.

alcohol, but under our present policy the arrest is still listed as D.W.I. in that case. Drugs and alcohol make a very potent combination and most drug users also use alcohol."

One thing the Sergeant notes is that this own Troopers have a very low accident rate, in spite of the hazardous driving they often have to do.

"They are out in all kinds of weather, on icy roads at times, and it is a common thing for them to have to run 100 M.P.H. to catch a speeder going 80 M.P.H.

'I credit the seat belts they wear at all times and the fact that they are conscious of their driving with their own survival.

'In very few instances has a dead person been found strapped in a car after an accident. More lives could be saved if people would only wear their seat belts.

'Many accidents are caused - outside of the obvious D.W.I.'s and speeding - by a driver simply getting careless - being too preoccupied to watch what he is

'Constrast the attitude of a Pilot who goes to the airport to take up his plane. He checks every thing -

mechanical parts, fuel, the whole bit.

'Eastland County is growing in activity, and traffic enforcement needs top priority here," states Sgt. Mathews. "We are sometimes asked why we don't apprehend more of the out-of-state people in trucks as well as cars - who come speeding through here. We only have the six Troopers to patrol hundreds of miles of roads - no indication from the State that anymore will be sent. If we could gain more compliance from local people on traffic laws, we would have more time to spend on people who are just traveling through the County. But first of all, people need to realize the value of the traffic laws. If that could be done, all of us would







Representative Charles Stenholm speaks out for American farmers

Government agricultural policies make it difficult for farmers to stay in business, much less make a profit, Cong. Charles Stenholm is quoted as saying in a recent Dallas Morning News article by Mark Nelson.

The article continues: WASHINGTON-Rep Charles Stenholm says a recent Wizard of Id comic strip

illustrates perfectly the

plight of American farmers. In the comic strip, which Stenholm is sending to his House colleagues as they prepare to act on a farm bill, the little king appears on the castle balcony and commends the loyal farmers for

reaping a bountiful harvest. "Your tireless efforts have enabled me to balance the budget by hiking consumer costs to the hilt while cutting your profits to the bone," the king says.

The farmers respond by throwing fruit and vegetables.

Farmers in Texas and across the country are bringing in record crops, but depressed markets, high inflation, increased costs and low prices are making for a bleak year.

Early estimates indicate that 1981 could be the worst year for farmers in two decades

Part of the problem, said Stenholm, a cotton farmer, is that too many members of Congress believe in a policy of cheap food and agree with President Reagan's philosophy: The solution is a free world market.

"It ain't people's ignorance that bothers me, it's them knowing so much that ain't so is the problem," Stenholm says, quoting Will

to income, but the housewife thinks she is being robbed when she goes to the grocery store," he said.

Stenholm believes a freemarket system will "go out the window" the first time any shortage significantly affects American consumers. As an example, he said the government opened the floodgates to important foreign beef several years ago when the price of beef in

this country went up. He said other countries, such as Japan, protect their domestic beef producers and prohibit further imports of American beef.

Stenholm said he has serious problems with the farm bill that came out of the House Agriculture Committee, which is chaired by a Texas colleague, Rep. Kika de la Garza. Stenholm said he is concerned the bill depresses commodity prices and sets loan rates that are too low.

"It will be a disaster, said Rep. Kent Hance, D-Lubbock. "I don't like anything about it."

The bill, which authorizes major farm programs for the next four years, extends basic price supports, target prices and reserves for major commodities. The bill also provides farmers with income protection against embargoes and re authorizes conservation, research, extension and certain farm credit programs.

The present farm bill expired Wednesday. The Senate already has approved a farm bill, but House Democrats decided to take the House Agriculture Committee bill to the floor instead of pushing for the Senate version.

Some experts believe continued government support is needed to guarantee stable agriculture production and to protect farmers from sharp fluctuations in their in-

President Reagan and others in the administration favor reduced federal intervention that could result in a return to a free market

But Stenholm said the bill, as approved by committee, does not address profitability in the marketplace.

'We must have programs that will enable the farmer to receive a reasonable profit on his investments," he said. "Why should we continue the same programs that have placed our farmers in such critical financial conditions?"

Stenholm believes it is folly to have an agricultural policy that makes it possible to buy products at prices below the cost of production.

But that's what happens: The average cost for a bushel of wheat last year was \$5.02, but current farm policy has resulted in wheat priced at \$3.67 a bushel.

Federal farm policy requires that the U.S. Treasury make up the difference between the actual market price and the target

Stenholm believes it would be more sound to set loan rates at a higher level to encourage farmers to store their grain until price increase. He plans to offer an amendment to that effect when the bill is delegated on the floor next week.

Hance has writeen a letter to Regan proposing that the president organize a White House Conference on Agriculture to identify current and future problems and to recommend solutions. Unless something is done



The delivery will be made similar to last year with the oxygenated plastic bags furnished with the fish. The minimum order is 50 catfish or one pound of minnows. However for orders less than 100 catfish, a \$1.00 extra charge will be made for the pastic bag.

The places for delivery have not been determined. This will be done when all fish orders have been received. Delivery will be at locations nearest to where the most fish were ordered. Possibly from 2 to 4 delivery locations in the Comanche, Dublin, DeLeon, Eastland area can be expected.

Moore stated that fish orders can be made at the Soil Conservation Service Offices in Comanche, 356-5186; Dublin, 445-2276; or Eastland, 629-1480. Payment must accompany each order when placed.






