

Jernigan Named Chief Of Police

Larry L. Jernigan, acting police chief for the past two months, was named chief of the Cisco Police Department by City Manager Mike Moore on Monday, according to an announcement.

Mr. Jernigan, 29, is a veteran of some four years in police work — all in Cisco except for a few months with the Eastland Police Department. He is a native of Cisco and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Jernigan.

The new chief attended public schools here and is a graduate of the Abilene Police Academy, which is affiliated with Texas A&M University. He lives with his wife, Connie, and their three children at 804 West 13th Street. Their children are Patricia 7, Linda 5, and Larry, Jr., 3.

"During the two months he has served as our acting chief, Larry has done a good job," Mr. Moore said. "He is mature and a good worker and I am confident that he can handle all of the responsibilities of his position. He will have my full support."

The City Council held an executive session Monday night on personnel matters and Mr. Moore informed the group of his decision to name the chief of police. The council applauded the choice.

Mr. Jernigan has been doing "double duty" since five members of the Police Department resigned Sept. 22 and while replacements were being hired.

The employment of Dave Thomas, 45, of Little Elm, Texas, as a city policeman was announced Monday. He is a veteran of police work.

Another policeman was expected to be employed Tuesday.

Chief Jernigan announced Tuesday the employment of Raymond Blevins, 32, a veteran in police work, to be a Cisco city policeman. Mr. Blevins went to work Tuesday. He is a certified police officer and worked as a deputy sheriff in Throckmorton and Archer Counties for five years.

Mr. Blevins is a native of Abilene. He and his wife Christine will move to Cisco as soon as they can obtain suitable housing.

The seventh grade game will start at 5 p.m., the eighth at 6 p.m. and the junior varsity at 7:30 p.m.

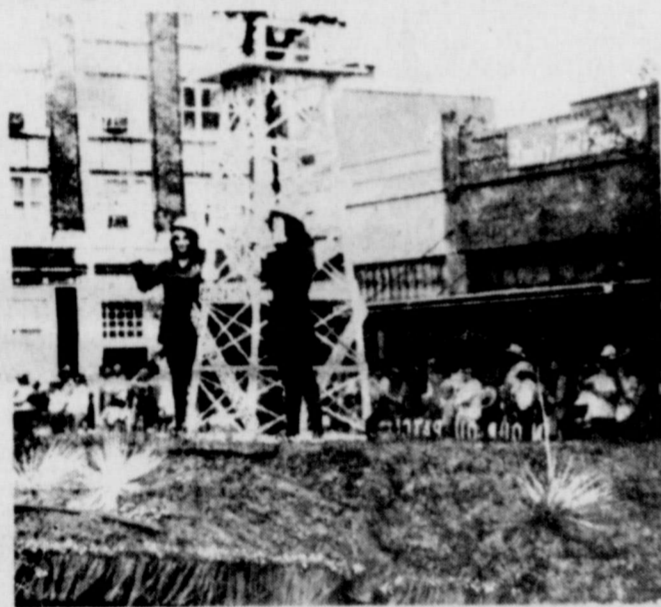

Lobos Lose To Eastland; Will Take On Early In Cisco Friday

The Lobos of Cisco High School dropped their 10-AA district opener last Friday night to the No. 2 ranked Eastland Mavericks by the score of 21-7.

(The Lobos will play their second home game of the season Friday night when they face Early in Cisco. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m.)

The Mavericks remain undefeated this year with a 4-0 season record, while having scored 179 points against their opponents and giving up only 10 points. The Lobos scored seven of those points. Eastland is now 1-0 in District play.

The Lobos season record dropped to 0-3-1 following their loss to Eastland, making their District record 0-1. So far, the Lobos have scored a combined 33 points against their opponents while giving up 67 points.

The first half of Friday night's game looked as though the two teams were perfectly matched and the half-time score was 7 to 7.

However, in the second half Eastland took advantage of two big turnovers and scored each time to cinch the 21-7 victory.

Early in the first quarter of Friday night's game, Eastland's quarterback Jay Hess connected a pass to Larry Blackwell on a third down and eight yards to go situation from Cisco's 14-yard line. Blackwell carried the ball into the end zone but a penalty against Eastland erased the apparent touchdown. Two plays later on fourth down, Cisco's Manuel Marquez and Tommy Thackerson sacked Eastland QB Hess 17 yards behind the line of scrimmage.

The Lobos took possession of the ball at their own 31-yard line but were forced to punt the ball seven plays later, after driving to Eastland's 44-yard line.

Eastland received the punt at their 15-yard line and started the first scoring drive of the game. QB Hess handed off to James Morton who gained four yards on his first carry. Morton took the next handoff from Hess and moved the Mavericks from their own 19-yard line to the Lobos 44. Alternating handoffs to Thomas Sanders and Scott Hallmark, QB Hess guided the Mavericks downfield to the 17-yard line. A handoff to Sanders topped the 56-yard drive with a touchdown. The extra point

kick by Morton was good making the score 7 to 0 with over eight minutes left in the first half.

On the Mavericks next possession of the ball, Cisco's defense only gave up six yards forcing the Mavericks to punt the ball.

Cisco took possession of the ball and started their scoring drive from Eastland's 30-yard line. Lobo quarterback Randall Rattan handed off to Gary Speegle for one yard, Jason Potter for four and Speegle for another three yards. Lacking two yards for a first down from Eastland's 22-yard line, QB Rattan scampered to the ten-yard line before being knocked out of bounds by Eastland's Leonard Garces. Ten yards from the goal line, QB Rattan handed off to Potter for three yards. Another handoff to Potter netted the seven-yard touchdown run with 1:55 left in the first half. The extra point kick by Kenneth Preston was good tying the score at 7-7, as it remained at the half.

Cisco's Potter received the second half kick-off around Cisco's ten yard line and returned it upfield to Cisco's 28-yard line. A handoff to Speegle lost three yards moving the Lobos back to their 25. Potter received the next handoff and raced 17 yards for the first down before Eastland's Phillip Bitner could pull him down at Cisco's 42-yard line. On the next play, a handoff to Speegle, the ball was knocked loose and Eastland's Morton came up with the recovery 40 yards from Cisco's goal line.

It took Eastland eleven plays to cap their 40-yard drive with their second touchdown of the night. The running abilities of Morton, Sanders and Hess, as well as the pass-catching ability of Blackwell and Sanders, moved the ball downfield for two first downs and a one-yard touchdown run by Morton. Morton also kicked the extra point making the score 14-7 with a little over seven minutes left in the third quarter.

On Cisco's next possession, the Lobos started what seemed to be a good drive from their own 20. On the first play, Potter took the handoff from QB Rattan eleven yards getting a first down. Another handoff to Potter netted seven yards, while Speegle took the ball to Cisco's 41-yard line for the second first-down of the drive. Another handoff to

Speegle got five more yards and Potter busted loose on the next play for 19 yards moving the ball to Eastland's 35-yard line; however, a holding penalty wiped out the gained yardage and placed the ball back on Cisco's 40-yard line. QB Rattan gained five yards on a keeper play but was sacked by Eastland's Hallmark on the next play for a loss of seven yards. On a fourth down and 12 yards situation, Rattan punted the ball to Eastland's 30-yard line.

Eastland started the drive from their own 33-yard line. Morton had a big hand in moving the ball downfield with six carries in the 13 plays which moved the ball to Cisco's five yard line. Also instrumental in the drive were pass receptions by Richard Ferrell and Sanders, as well as runs by Sanders and Hallmark. Eastland's Steve Simmel also kept the drive going by recovering a fumble for his team on the third play of the drive. Five yards from the goal line, a run by Morton was wiped out by a Maverick penalty moving the ball back to the ten. On the next play, QB Hess was sacked by Lobos Shane Posey and Tommy Thackerson at Cisco's 37. The Mavericks were forced to punt the ball on their next play, since it was fourth down and they needed 35 yards for a first down.

Cisco fielded the punt and started their drive from their own 11-yard line. Three plays later, a pass from QB Rattan was intercepted by Eastland's Darren Willoughby at Cisco's nine-yard line to set up the Mavericks final scoring drive.

Eastland QB Hess handed off to Morton for a six-yard gain, followed by a keeper play which netted QB Hess two yards placing the ball on Cisco's one-yard line. Sanders took the next handoff in for the touchdown with over six minutes left in the game. The extra point kick by Morton was good making the score 21 to 7.

Cisco made one last effort

to score on their next possession when they started a drive from their own 27-yard line. The biggest play of the drive for Cisco was a 32-yard screen pass from QB Rattan to Speegle, which moved the ball to Eastland's 31-yard line. A handoff to Potter gained six yards, while a pass to Joey Worley moved the ball to the 17-yard line. Three plays later, QB Rattan was sacked by Eastland's Hallmark and David Gwinn at the 34-yard line. An incomplete pass in a fourth down and 25 yards situation killed Cisco's final drive.

Eastland took possession of the ball and ran out the last minute of the game.

Cisco's defensive standouts included Gary Speegle, Danny Garcia, Shane Posey, Manuel Marquez, Brad Hawari, Tommy Thackerson, Jason Potter, Blair Boyd, Larry Adams, Mark Humphries, Bubba Eaker and Joey Worley.

Standouts on Eastland's defense were Phillip Bitner, Jimmy Humphrey, Leonard Garces, Jim Moylan, Gary Stuart, James Morton, Scott Hallmark, Larry Blackwell, Corliss Sanders, Chris Norris, Bobby Simmons, Mike Smith, Darren Willoughby, Jack Jordan and David Gwinn.

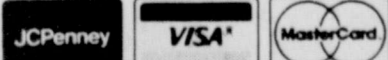

The Dallas Cowboys are a team that is yet to come together. They have been playing some of the weaker N.F.L. Teams and yet part of the team always seems to play poorly. Linebacker Mike Hegman may be able to start working out again with a cast on his arm that was broken, but will be awhile before he will return to the team. Angelo King, who replaced Hegman on the team, has impressed the coaches so much that they want to keep him on the team.

Other injuries make Jay Saldi "probable" with a sprained ankle and Danny White is ready though he has a bruised right wrist and a puncture on the left elbow.

Representative Charles Stenholm speaks out for American farmers

Government agricultural policies make it difficult for farmers to stay in business, much less make a profit, Cong. Charles Stenholm is quoted as saying in a recent Dallas Morning News article by Mark Nelson.

The article continues: WASHINGTON - Rep. Charles Stenholm says a recent Wizard of Id comic strip illustrates perfectly the plight of American farmers.

In the comic strip, which Stenholm is sending to his House colleagues as they prepare to act on a farm bill, the little king appears on the castle balcony and commends the loyal farmers for reaping a bountiful harvest.

"Your tireless efforts have enabled me to balance the budget by hiking consumer costs to the hilt while cutting your profits to the bone," the king says.

The farmers respond by throwing fruit and vegetables.

Farmers in Texas and across the country are bringing in record crops, but depressed markets, high inflation, increased costs and low prices are making for a bleak year.

Early estimates indicate that 1981 could be the worst year for farmers in two decades.

Part of the problem, said Stenholm, a cotton farmer, is that too many members of Congress believe in a policy of cheap food and agree with President Reagan's philosophy: The solution is a free world market.

"It ain't people's ignorance that bothers me, it's them knowing so much that ain't so is the problem," Stenholm says, quoting Will Rogers.

State To Hold 38 Tax Workshops

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is cooperating with the Internal Revenue Service in offering 38 Tax Practitioner Workshops across the state reports DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent. The nearest workshop to our area will be held in Stephenville on the 17th and 18th of December. These two-day workshops are specifically designed for tax practitioners who work extensively with farmers and ranchers. Topics to be covered in the general workshops are: What's new; Capital Gains and Losses; Net Operating Losses; Credits-How to Report; Tax Principle Review-parttime activities, rental and personal use of property-travel and entertainment. This year Advanced programs will be offered in Houston, San Antonio, Austin, Lubbock, and Dallas, stressing tax preparation for small business also. Topics to be discussed in the Advanced workshops are: What's New-including Windfall Profits; 351 Transfers; Dividends; Calculating Earnings and Profits; Liquidations and Redemptions; Partnerships-Transfers In; Operating the Partnership, Distributive Shares; Partnership Dissolutions and Withdrawals; Questions and Answers. This is one of the most successful Extension program. Last year over 3,000 people participated in this state-wide series. These practitioners reported filing over 850,000 tax returns. For additional information, please contact the Eastland County Extension Office for a brochure explaining more about the program and registration information.

Some experts believe continued government support is needed to guarantee stable agriculture production and to protect farmers from sharp fluctuations in their income.

President Reagan and others in the administration favor reduced federal intervention that could result in a return to a free market system.

But Stenholm said the bill, as approved by committee, does not address profitability in the marketplace.

"We must have programs that will enable the farmer to receive a reasonable profit on his investments," he said. "Why should we continue the same programs that have placed our farmers in such critical financial conditions?"

Stenholm believes it is folly to have an agricultural policy that makes it possible to buy products at prices below the cost of production.

But that's what happens: The average cost for a bushel of wheat last year was \$5.02, but current farm policy has resulted in wheat priced at \$3.67 a bushel.

Federal farm policy requires that the U.S. Treasury make up the difference between the actual market price and the target price.

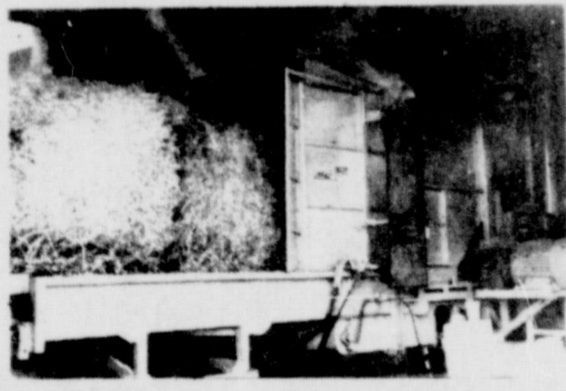
Stenholm believes it would be more sound to set loan rates at a higher level to encourage farmers to store their grain until price increase. He plans to offer an amendment to that effect when the bill is delegated on the floor next week.

Hance has written a letter to Regan proposing that the president organize a White House Conference on Agriculture to identify current and future problems and to recommend solutions. Unless something is done

to change U.S. agricultural policy, Hance said, more and more farmers will go out of business.

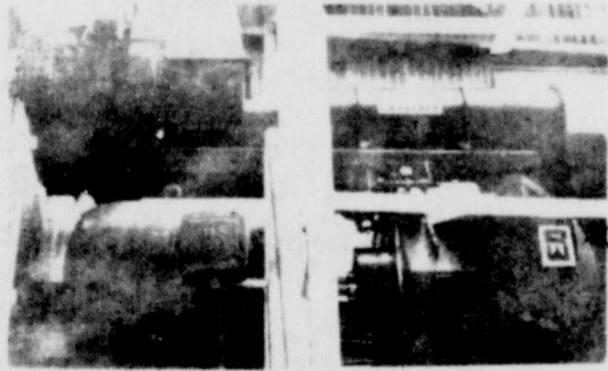
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This machine will grind a large round bale of hay in less than 5 minutes.

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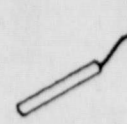

More Catfish

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District will be taking orders for delivering channel catfish and minnows again this fall, according to Norman Moore, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the SWCD.

October 30, 1981 will be the deadline for ordering fish with delivery to be in early November. The channel catfish will cost \$25.00 per hundred and the minnows will be \$6.50 per pound.

The delivery will be made similar to last year with the oxygenated plastic bags furnished with the fish. The minimum order is 50 catfish or one pound of minnows. However for orders less than 100 catfish, a \$1.00 extra charge will be made for the plastic bag.

The places for delivery have not been determined. This will be done when all fish orders have been received. Delivery will be at locations nearest to where the most fish were ordered. Possibly from 2 to 4 delivery locations in the Comanche, Dublin, DeLeon, Eastland area can be expected.

Moore stated that fish orders can be made at the Soil Conservation Service Offices in Comanche, 356-5186; Dublin, 445-2276; or Eastland, 629-1480. Payment must accompany each order when placed.

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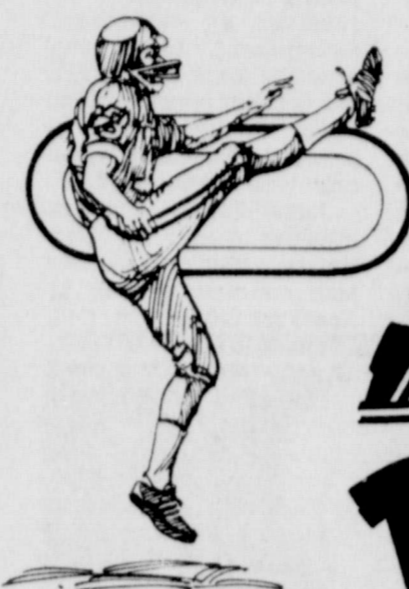
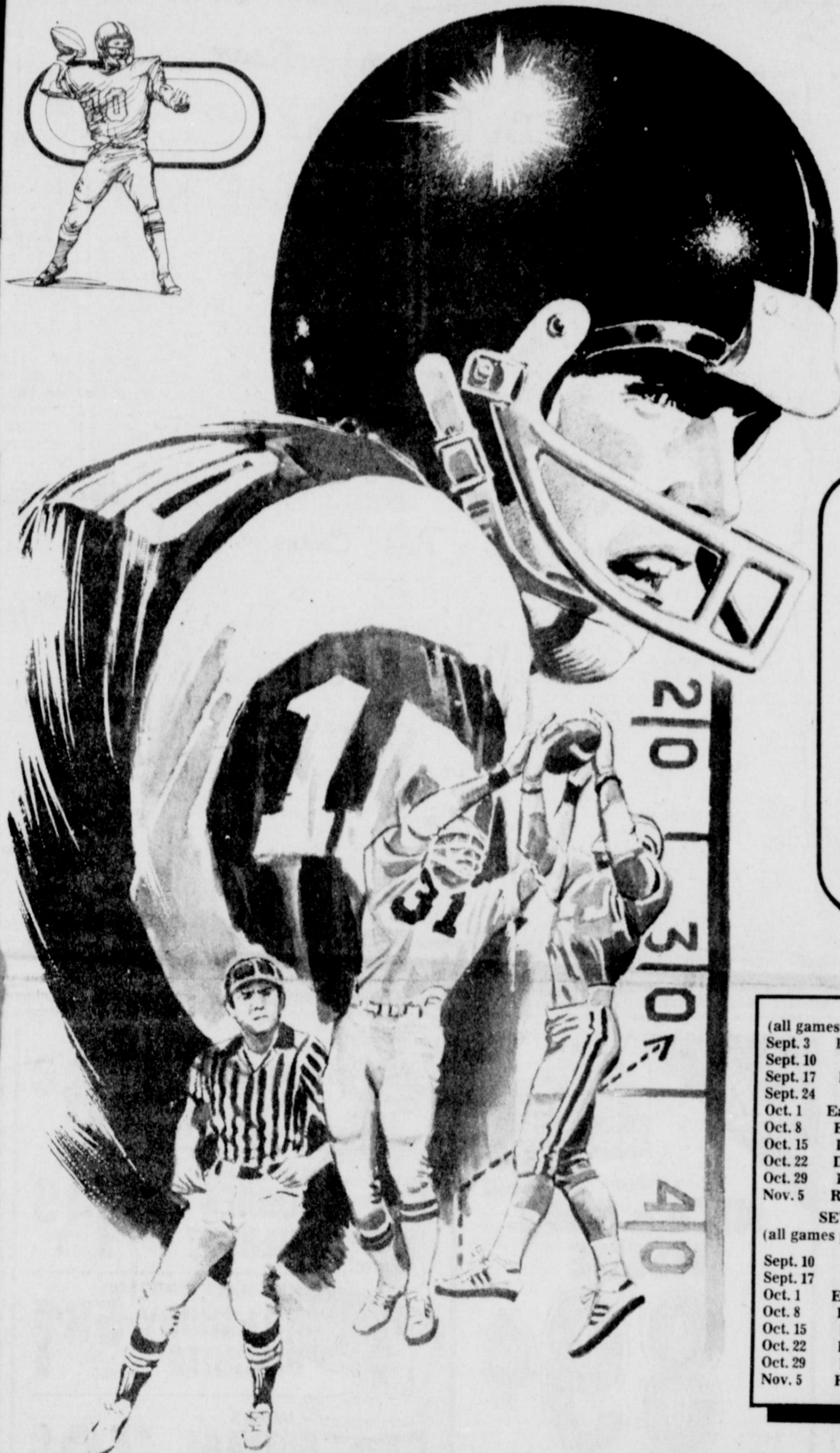
