### **Progress Noted In Handicapped Aids**

Considerable progress has been made during the past few years in removing barriers that prevent handicapped people from using buildings and facilities, Henry Schaefer, well known Ciscoan, told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk Wednesday noon at the White Elephant

Mr. Schaefer said that 110 Texas cities now have offices that have been established in the past two years to work on the proposition of eliminating stumbling blocks for the handicapped. These stumbling blocks include curbs without inclines for wheel chairs, buildings and rest rooms with no facilities to benefit handicapped people, and the

The speaker noted that a new state law provides a \$200 fine for parking in spaces marked for the use of handicapped people.

Mr. Schaefer said the Eastland County courthouse soon will have a door and ramp for the handicapped. He has been working with the state organization for several years and has been invited to attend meetings in Washington and New Jersey where the problems of the handicapped will be studied. Lion S. Lopez arranged the program and introduced Mr.





The Scaifes decided to look over Texas because they found the cold of Colorado and Nevada more severe than they were accustomed to. An advertisement of landfor-sale led them to Eastland County, and they bought the land. They consider it a fortunate move - and better ranch land than a lot they had traveled over.

"Everyone should see Texas," declares Ron. 'Texas is the real America. And the people - they are great. They don't even seem to notice our British accent too much.'

They moved into their house, which is two miles off the Ranger-Morton Valley Highway, in Feb. 1981 - the coldest day of the year. But the climate has improved since, and so has the remodeled house and the approx. 200 acres surrounding it, which they named Kiwi Ranch. Ron has a flock of sheep now, a crop of peanuts almost ready to harvest, and has sold produce from truck gardens. He is also customfarming for anyone who needs extra work done. And Mel is working as a Secretary in a medical clinic

in Eastland. The family belonged to the Church of England in New Zealand, and are now attending the First Methodis Church in Ranger. Their future plans include general improvements on the Scaife land, including the planting of pecan trees. Ron hopes to acquire some good cattle to go with the livestock they now have. The couple would also like to write a book especially for the people of New Zealand, telling of their experiences and detailing differences between life in America and that far-away country. But first the family wants to soak up more information about southwestern Agriculture and Texas life in



### **Aphids Attack Fall Gardens**

Gordon Woolam

Several kinds of aphids or plant lice become active in the fall when days are warm and nights are cool. These small, soft-bodied, sucking insects rapidly multiply when most gardeners think their problems are over.

A sharp eye and persistence will find aphids before they cause extensive damage. The insects often take on the color of the foliage or plant parts they are feeding on or they feed under the leaves or in developing leaf and flower

Some of the aphids' favorite plants this time of year are pansies, stock, calendulas, chrysauthemums and carnations. Aphids will also attack many fall vegetables including cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, brussel sprouts, beets and collards. Check these plants frequently during periods when daytime temperatures are mild and nighttime temperatures are colder.

Since aphids are sucking insects, their injury is not too obvious. Be suspicious of plants that are not growing as actively as they should. If leaves, stems or flowers are curled or deformed, look closely for aphids

To prevent aphid damage, you may treat the areas where you are setting out bedding plants or bulbs with granular systemic insecticide before you plant or soon after you plant. Follow directions on the label carefully.

If aphids are already a problem, spray them with malathion. Cygon (dimethoate), diazinon or Meta-Systox-R (MSR). Choose a warm, still day for spraying and apply the spray as a very fine mist.

WACO--Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller said last week's vote in the U.S. Senate on the peanut provisions of the Farm Bill "show that the majority of Senators are more concerned with window dressing than in passing a decent piece of legislation for peanut producers."

The Senate accepted a compromise version in the Farm Bill which abolishes the acreage allotment program for peanuts and allows additional production for export sales. Only those producers currently holding poundage quotas will be eligible for the quota price support of \$596 per ton.

"What has been a functional and reasonable program has been turned into a monster by the Senate. Not only have the acreage allotments been abolished for existing peanut production, the price support was lowered from \$631 to the \$596 level," Moeller said. "This is another example of the Reagan Administration not keeping its promise. The government apparently thinks they can provide a better program for peanuts than the producers themselves."



### Risk Insurance On Wheat

A new insurance plan authoruzed by Congress is now available to wheat and barley growers in Eastland County, according to Ardel M. Kalmbach, District Director of USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. A key feature of the insurance progam is designed to replace the ASCS disaster payments program, is that the government pays up to 30 percent of the premium cost.

important

feature, Kalmbach adds, is the opportunity it provides for wheat and barley growers to choose the amount of protection they want to carry. It's possible to purchase a policy that guarantees 50 percent, 65 percent or 75 percent of the local average yield. Policy holders can also select the price per bushel they want to be paid in the event of a loss. The choices are \$2.50, \$3.50,

Another

Kalmbach offers this illistration of how the insurance works: In an area where the average wheat yield as been 18.2 bushels per acre, farmers can elect to carry a policy that guarantees 9.2 bushels, 12.0 bushels or 14.0 bushels. If a wheat grower chooses the maximum guarantee of 14.0 bushels per acre and the maximum price per bushel of \$4.50, he will be paid an indemnity of \$4.50 for each bushel his yield is below 14.0 bushels per acre.

Because opf sharply higher production costs and last year's drought losses, Kalmbach points out that most policy holders are choosing insurance that protects their entire production investment. Others are carrying enough insurance to guarantee the amount of income needed to meet specific obligations, such as the repayment of bank loans or land rental payments.

The deadline to apply for 1982-crop wheat and barley insurance in Eastland County is September 30. Federal All-Risk Crop Insurance policies can be purchased from the local FCIC representative or from private insurance agents and lending institutions. Wherever purchased the protection and the cost are the same.

1) when the driver is an employee of the owner and acting within the scope of his job duties

2) when the driver is acting as an "agent" of the owner, or when the driver is on an errand or mission for the owner

3) when the owner has entrusted the auto to a known incompetent or reckless

PROTECTION OWNER

How can car owners lessen chances of being liable and how can they avoid costly lawsuits?

McCormack offers three suggestions: \*Allow only competent and

safe drivers to operate the \*Maintain the car in

highway-worthy condition. \*Have an adequate liability insurance protection policy.

HOW 'LIABILITY POLICY WORKS Liability insurance pro-

tects the insured individual (the car owner) from the risk of financial disaster resulting from his being found liable for injuries to others due to an accident, McCormack explains.

When a person buys liability insurance, his insurance company agrees to protect him against accident claims, to defend him in court, and to pay damages to the person suing the car owner, if the car owner is gound guilty.

This type of insurance does NOT provide for the car owner's OWN losses such as damage to his own car or personal injury, McCormack notes. (Another coverage. "Collision," pays for damage to the car owner's own car.)

Liability insurance, instead, protects the car owner FINANCIALLY-by defending him against the claims of those he has injured in an

Two parts usually comprise a liability insurance

property damage. Under the bodily-injury section, it protects the car owner in claims involving injury to the "other car" driver and his passengers or injury to pedestrians injured in an accident with the car

policy: bodily injury and

owner's automobile. Under the propertydamage section, the policy protects the car owner against claims which involve damage to another person's

property or automobile. HOW MUCH COVERAGE? In Texas, the minimum liability limits are 10/20/5-meaning coverage up to \$20,000 for ALL persons

injured in an accident but limited to \$10,000 for each individual and \$5,000 for property damage.

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


