

# Youth Charged In 4 Burglary Cases

Four recent burglary cases in Cisco were cleared up last weekend with the arrest of Robert Tipton, 19, of Cisco, according to a report Tuesday by Sheriff Johnny Morren. The youth was in the Eastland County jail and burglary charges had been filed against him, the sheriff said.

Charges were filed in Justice of the Peace Court at Gorman, and bond was set at \$10,000. Deputy Sheriff Bill Pence, who lives in Cisco, and Sheriff Morren worked on the case, assisted by

Cisco city policemen. Tipton made a statement in the case, Mr. Morren said. The case involved robberies at the J.C. Penney Company, White's Auto Store, the Sonic Drive-In, and Cisco High School. Watches taken in the Penney robbery led to the solution of the case, Mr. Morren said.

Several watches taken from Penney's, knives taken from White Auto and other items were recovered. Mr. Morren said Deputy Pence, former Cisco police chief, took the lead in investigating the case.

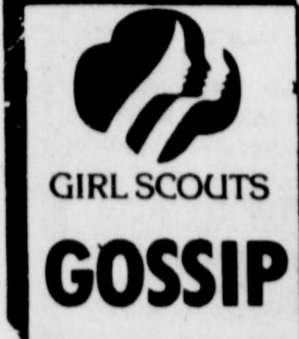
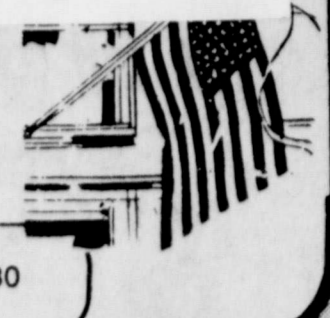

The Lobos of Cisco High School are "back in the race" for the District 10-AA title following the Eastland Mavericks 32-7 defeat at the hands of the DeLeon Bearcats last Friday. Cisco will take on the Bearcats Friday night in DeLeon with the kickoff at 7:30 p.m.

The Bearcats are 3-0 in district play and 5-1 for the season while the Lobos are 2-1 in district and 2-3-1 for the season.

Eastland is now 2-1 in district play and 5-1 for the season.

Cisco coach Jim Puryear said the fans support during the Lobo-Maverick football game October 2nd, was

greatly appreciated, and their support is being asked for again. He said the fans really give a boost to the team on the field.

Coach Puryear said all the team members are well and ready to go Friday night. He said he will probably use the regular lineup against DeLeon.

The Lobos are coming off a 42-14 win over Dublin last Friday night at Cisco's football stadium. So far in District play, Cisco has lost to Eastland and defeated Early and Dublin.

In last Friday night's game, Gary Speegle, and Larry Adams scored two touchdowns each while

## CJC To Offer Defensive Driving

Since the first American died in an auto accident in 1889, the toll of traffic deaths has soared to the range of 50,000 a year, with more than 3,000 persons a year killed on Texas roads. Statistics indicate that one out of every two drivers will be involved in a moving vehicle accident during their lifetime.

As a service to the community, Cisco Junior College and the Big Country Safety Association will offer a Defensive Driving course on a monthly basis starting in November. It is an eight-hour course for experienced drivers who want to learn how professional drivers avoid accidents.

The first course will meet on November 9, 11 and 12 from 6:30-9:30 p.m. each evening at the CJC campus in Abilene, and on each second Monday, Wednesday and Thursday of the month thereafter. Tuition and fees for the course are \$15 per person.

Over ten million people have graduated from Defensive Driving courses including over one million persons in Texas. Texas Safety Association statistics prove

that the course can significantly reduce accidents among all age groups and levels of education. Because of the reduction in accidents, persons completing the course qualify for a 10% reduction in vehicle insurance rates covering bodily injury, property damage, medical payments, and collision.

Another function of the course is that judges may refer a person to the course in lieu of paying a fine and having the traffic violation on their driving record.

The class teaches motorists how to avoid collisions, how to gauge following distances, and how to handle tailgaters, drunk drivers, pedestrians, and other highway problems. A defensive driving graduate knows what to do if the brakes fail, the accelerator sticks, or the headlights go out. The driver learns that even in situations over which he has no control, evasive tactics may save his life.

Traffic accidents are the leading cause of accidental death in Texas each year. For further information call Cisco Junior College at (915) 698-2212.

## WTU Files For Change In Wholesale Rates

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a change in wholesale rates for electric service it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality and one investor-owned distribution company.

In its filing Friday, October 16, with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, WTU estimated that the new rates will produce about \$4.3 million in additional revenue for the company during the 1982 calendar year. This amounts to an increase of approximately 10 per cent from these wholesale customers.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective on December 15. The present rates have been in effect since June, 1980. WTU also proposes to change to a fuel

adjustment clause similar to the one applied to its retail customers. No other major changes were proposed.

WTU officials said the rate change is necessary to bring the Company's earnings on sales to wholesale customers to a level that will help WTU maintain a sound financial condition and attract new capital for growth required to meet future needs of electric customers. The previous wholesale rate increase proved insufficient because of inflation, higher than anticipated interest rates, and the delay in making the rates effective.

The following wholesale customers will be affected by the filing: Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Concho Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc., Dickens Electric Cooperative, Inc.,

Laguna Hotel. Dr. Norman Wallace, CJC president, will serve as master of ceremonies. The program will include music by the CJC Chorus.

**GORDON SPOT**

by DeMarquis Gordon

Over twelve inches of rain in one week in parts of Eastland County caused problems for many. We are thankful to get enough rain to fill our lakes and ponds, but unfortunately a number of residents had flood damage in their homes.

If you had flooding around your house you should check to see if the building structure is damaged.

Examine foundations and supports for undermining. If walls or foundations have settled or cracked, uncover footings and raise, reinforce or brace any settled sections. Be extremely careful when uncovering footings, because of the possibility of cavernous washouts.

If underlying material has been washed away, fill spaces to within 12 inches of the footing with gravel or crushed rock. Fill the remaining space with concrete reinforced with steel rods. Be sure to check piers for settling or shifting.

In the event the building has shifted or the floors have settled badly, it might be necessary to install temporary bracing until extensive work can be done.

In some cases the water was high enough to damage walls. To speed up drying of flooded studding and insulation, remove all siding strips or plaster from upper and lower parts of the walls. Do no repaint walls until they are completely dry. This might take several months.

Flooded insulation may be ruined and will have to be replaced.

Remove loose plaster. After house is completely dry, repair damaged plaster on walls and ceilings. Badly damaged plaster walls can be resurfaced with gypsum board (sheet rock) or plywood.

Flooded wooden floors will dry out slowly. Don't build fires to speed up their drying, as this could cause cracking or splitting from uneven drying. To prevent further buckling and warping, drive nails where the floor tends to lift or bulge. After floors are completely dry, plane or sand them level. If the floors are too badly damaged to be refinished, lay a new floor over the old, or cover with carpet, vinyl or linoleum.

The Extension office has information to assist those who experience disasters such as floods, tornados, and wind storms. If you have questions concerning preparation for floods, what should be done when flooding occurs or how to clean up and repair after the flood, contact the county Extension Agents in the County Courthouse.

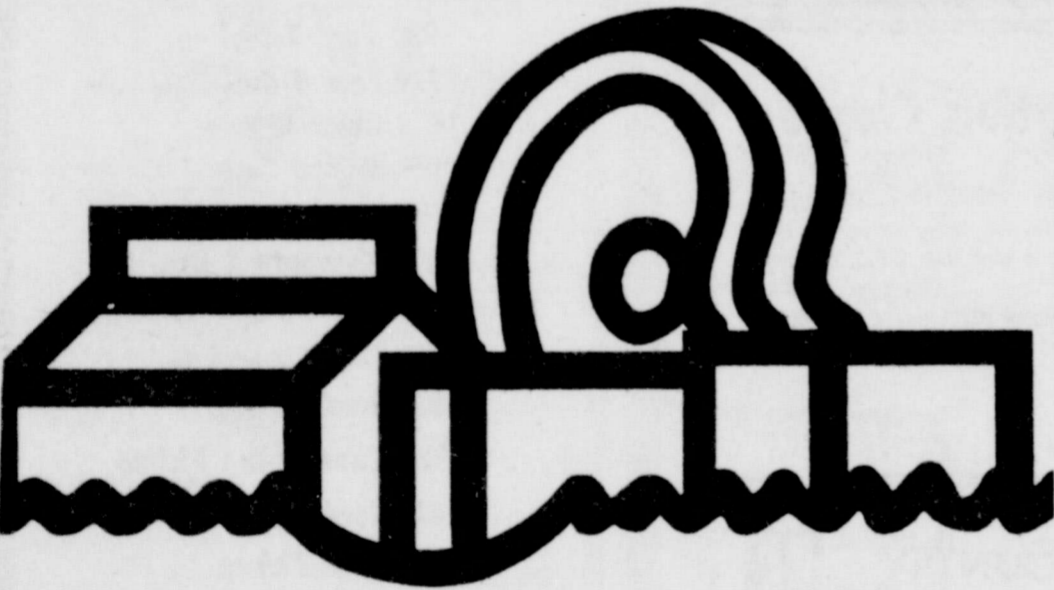

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# Families: The Future & Today's Challenges

By the year 2000, family lifestyles will be vastly different—including "jobs" for three-year-olds and many more work-at-home parents, says Dorothy Taylor, a family life education specialist.

Addressing the 1981 Town and Country Church Conference, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service on the Texas A&M University campus this

October 22, 1981

month, Taylor said families' abilities to face today's challenges will have a direct bearing on the future.

"Adaptability" is the key -- to facing today's challenges and preparing for the future with all the changes it will bring," Taylor says.

"Events will occur. Technology will progress. Change is inevitable for growth.

"It's the human who must

adapt." Facing today's challenges and the future is a challenge in itself, but it's not a fearful one, Taylor told her audience of ministers from throughout Texas.

"We have coping skills, even some new ones we haven't tried out yet," she said, emphasizing again the importance of adaptability and flexibility.

Taylor is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

According to Taylor, trends and challenges for families in the next 20 years -- by the year 2000 -- will include these:

1) Onset of "prosumers" (consumers will become producers of more of their own goods and services). For example, for medical needs, there will be increased family self-help for maintaining healthy family members, caring for sick ones and providing home care and rehabilitation for recovering ones and the elderly. Family members will perform many

tasks medical professionals have done in the past, such as administering inoculations.

2) Emphasis on closer ties between families and the school system for teaching children along with emphasis on coordinating formal education with work programs for youth. For example, the educational system will involve starting children to work at age three in jobs they are capable of doing around the home.

3) Religions and families will focus on the role of "church" as a resource. Of special interest will be how the church provides guidance and counseling, the church as a social setting for family activities (churches will be open more days a week), and, on the other hand, ways the church intrudes on family members' freedom of choice is important areas of their lives.

4) Real sharing will take place concerning deviant behavior and rehabilitation. Sharing will occur between family, community services and professionals. This

challenge may serve as a catalyst for major penal-system changes, Taylor predicts.

5) Electronic advances will create a "cottage industry" for men and women -- computers and other technological advances will enable men and women to work at home in such professions as banking, journalism, education and many others. When that happens, different challenges will have to be faced. For example, "flexitime" (arranging schedules to meet both work and family requirements) may pose challenges, along with "shared job" and "cabin fever" -- as work and home both function in the same space with parents and children all working together literally.

Fathers will become even more involved in child rearing as the "cottage industry" becomes reality, Taylor says.

Also, downtown areas of cities will decline and there will be fewer commuters.

6) Lifestyles will become less self-indulgent as shortages in energy sources, money, useable land and plant life affect the level a quality of living. There will be a greater acceptance of single parents and gay parents. Communes of the elderly may emerge, too, along with conglomerate housing for younger or newly organized families and extended families of several generations sharing the same household.

7) Child immigrants to the United States in the 1970's will have grandchildren by the year 2000. Cultures challenging the U.S. heritage will be Eastern, Hispanic and Third World in origin.

8) Cohabitation and marital lifestyles of the late 1980's, the 90's the 21st century will be opposite those of the 1960's-early 1980's. Parents will be very traditional in their approach to marriage and sex -- in-

cluding new parents and those who in past years held to non-traditional values.

9) Economic independence of women will add to increased divorce rates, but economic pressures in general and emotional needs will counter this trend with a high remarriage rate.

10) Forecasts for sexual activity is mixed. It will continue to occur both in and out of marriage with less guilt and more enjoyment. But the generation of free and/or

open-sex adherents are becoming bored and disappointed in easy-going sex without commitment.

11) Four- and five-generation families will be the norm by the year 2000. As the baby boomers become senior citizens, the population will be proportionately old. The question now regarding that fact of the future is this: who will provide care and/or service for the elder majority of the U.S. population? Taylor says. With older

adults becoming the major age group in the nation, children will lose status over the next two decades and "gray power" will surface.

12) Genetic research offers challenges for the year 2000 that are mind-boggling, Taylor notes. Test-tube babies, choosing the sex of a baby or choosing mental and physical characteristics of a fetus are just a few of the options that will open to prospective parents, the specialist says.

### Amendment 3

Amendment Number Three on the November 3rd ballot gives the voters the option of creating a state finance management committee.

The amendment would empower the Legislature to create a State finance management committee to

manage the expenditure of appropriated funds - except for constitutionally dedicated funds.

Presently, Texas has no control budget authority. There is no person, committee or agency to oversee and manage State spending once the Legislature adjourns

(the Legislature only meets for five months every two years). Thus, during the interim each State agency has sole authority over its budget, within the limits set by the Appropriations Act. No changes differing from the Appropriations Act can be made without reconvening the Legislature in a Special Session.

The committee would consist of the Governor (Chairman), Lieutenant Governor (Vice-Chairman), the Speaker of the House, and the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Finance, the Senate Committee on State Affairs, the House Committee on Appropriations, and the House Committee on Ways and Means.

According to the proposed amendment, the Legislature, through statutes and appropriations riders, could set conditions on the Committee's authority.

Supporters of the creation of the state finance committee make the following points:

(1) Government is big business in Texas. Any big business needs some budget

management - particularly when the Legislature is in session only five months every two years and not able to adequately oversee the budget during the interim period.

(2) The budgeting process creates very long lead times for estimating needed expenditures. Normally, agencies submit budget estimates at least fourteen months before the beginning of the fiscal biennium. That is twenty-six months before the start of the second year of the biennium and thirty-eight before the end of the biennium. It is unrealistic to expect the Legislature to budget well enough to meet needs or know the needs one to three years in advance.

(3) The finance committee would have the authority to meet emergencies as they rise and would have the power to shift funds from one agency to another should the need arise. Presently, the Legislature would have to meet in special session to meet unforeseen emergencies requiring a change in the State budget.

(4) With the advent of the block grant legislation passed by the Federal govern-

ment, states are given more discretion over how they spend Federal monies. This change would make a state finance committee more necessary than ever.

Opponents of the measure make the following points:

(1) The voters of Texas defeated a similar measure in 1979 by almost 400,000 votes. The amendment was defeated at the time partly because of the vastly expanded power it gave the Governor. This amendment would give this same power to the Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker. The other members of the Board, the Chairman of the Senate and House Committee are hand-picked members, selected by the Lt. Governor and Speaker respectively. A select few could effectively

over rule the majority will of the Legislature.

(2) Closely related to this is the fact that only two of the seven member board are elected statewide. Only the Governor and Lt. Governor are statewide officeholders. This could lead to a situation where officeholders of one particular area control a large part of the budgeting process. Perhaps it would be better to have other statewide officeholders such as the Attorney General, Comptroller, Agricultural Commissioner and Land Commissioner on the committee. They would then be answerable to the entire electorate of the State.

(3) By creating a joint executive-legislative budget management committee, this proposed amendment would

tamper with the fundamental constitutional principle of separation of powers. The committee would assume some of the budget management power that properly belongs to the executive branch, and also some of the budget-setting power that properly belongs to the legislative branch.

(4) There is no solid reason for legislative participation in budget management, which is essentially an administrative function. The proper function of the Legislature is to create or approve policies for the executive branch, establish a legal framework, fund programs, and then to see that those hired to run them, do so. Legislators should not be involved in exercising month-by-month controls.

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**No Early Freeze Likely This Year**

COLLEGE STATION-- Most areas of Texas will likely not get an early freeze this year.

Keith Hayes, agricultural meteorologist with the National Weather Service at Texas A&M University, says near normal temperatures likely will prevail at least through mid-November.

Freezing temperatures can be a boon to certain agricultural operations, such as cotton harvesting in western areas and the plains. Freezing temperatures at the right time can get the crop ready for harvesting. However, an early freeze can also damage cotton if the crop is late, as is the case this year in some locations.

With colder weather approaching, cattlemen must prepare for feeding their livestock and also need to remember that a frost or freeze can cause prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing sudan or sorghum pastures or crop residues. Homeowners need to think about protecting tender vegetation. Of course, all types of motor vehicles and equipment must be winterized.

To help farmers and ranchers as well as homeowners gear up for the approaching winter season, Hayes has compiled probability levels for freezing temperatures for various regions of the state, based on historical data.

The first column in the chart below indicates a 10 percent chance for a freeze by the date indicated while the second column indicates a 50 percent chance (average freeze date). The last column indicates a 90 percent chance that a freeze will occur by the date indicated.



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## Peanut Program??

The House of Representatives on October 15 adopted an amendment by Representative Stanley Lundine (D-NY) to abolish peanut allotments and quotas in 1982. Under the Lundine Amendment there would be complete open planting in 1982 and a single loan rate would be established on all peanuts by the Secretary of Agriculture. The action of the House of

Thursday, October 22, 1981

Representatives means that the Lundine Amendment and the Mattingly Amendment passed in the Senate on September 16 will be submitted to the Senate-House Conference for the years 1982-1985 will be molded. The Mattingly Amendment calls for poundage quota and a support rate of \$596 per ton on quota peanuts in 1982. Open planting under the Mattingly Bill would be restricted to additional peanuts grown beyond the farm base poundage on farms with no farm base poundage. The House action is viewed with severe disappointment by peanut growers according to Ross Wilson, Manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, Gorman, Texas. He said growers feel that the House vote to end allotments and quotas resulted in part from distortion of facts about a farm commodity program that has worked well for over four decades. He said peanut product manufacturers contributed substantially to defeat of the program by providing inaccurate and misleading information to House members. Wilson said the growers will not concentrate their efforts and hope on the Senate-House Conference Committee in their attempt to secure a workable program for the years 1982-1985.

## Senator Glasgow Reports Amendment 4

Constitutional Amendment Number Four would dedicate State revenue to water trust funds, authorize State credit guarantees for locally issued water bonds and increase the authorized interest rate ceiling on water bonds from 10% to 12%.

This amendment would dedicate one-half of the "excess State tax revenues" to water trust funds and would allow the Legislature to dedicate part or all of the remainder for other purposes.

"Excess state tax revenue" is defined as revenue in excess of the "spending ceiling". Since Texas is a pay-as-you-go (no deficit spending) state, the Legislature cannot appropriate money in excess of the estimated amount the State will take in.

Normally, the State will have revenue left over at the end of a budgeting period that is above the spending ceiling. This is the source that would be used although

the Legislature could also appropriate funds from the General Revenue Funds.

These water funds could be used for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement and flood control.

The Legislature could, by law, limit the amount of "excess revenue" to be transferred. Also, it could, by passing a statute, allow any money in the water funds to be used for other purposes as long as the money had not already been designated for use in a particular project.

The water funds could not be used to finance any project that diverted water from one river basin to another if the transfer would endanger the "reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing 50 year period within the river basin of origin."

The proposed amendment would also authorize State credit guarantees for the repayment of locally issued water or flood control bonds. State liability could not exceed \$500 million, but the amount of guarantees could be greater through "leveraging."

The amendment would also allow the Legislature to set up one or more funds for the retirement of existing State debt under general obligation bond programs. The money from the other half of the "excess funds" could be used for this purpose.

The proposed amendment would increase to 12% the

maximum interest rate on State bonds authorized but not yet issued. The Legislature, by votes of two-thirds of the membership of each House, could set a still higher limit. Most existing State bond programs have a constitutional limit of a 6% maximum interest rate.

Proponents of this plan made the following points concerning the need of passage:

(1) Texas is running out of water. No issue, not even energy, is of such critical long-term importance to the State. Texas is taking more water out of the wells than nature is replacing in underground reservoirs. Even with 69 major reservoirs and 36 planned ones, Texas will not be able to meet its water requirements beyond the year 1990 without additional water supplies. Since it takes 15 to 20 years to create a new reservoir, we must get started immediately.

(2) The creation of a water bond guaranty program and pledging up to \$500 million of the State's credit to guarantee local government bonds will allow the local governments to borrow money at lower interest rates to fund water projects while at the same time not actually tying up State money in water projects or setting aside State money in a fund so that it cannot be spent for other purposes.

(3) The creation of State bond retirement funds to pay bonds issued by the State for various purposes will allow the State to more quickly accumulate money to pay those bonds and will simultaneously make available money designated to pay those bonds for use for

other purposes.

(4) Current interest rate limitations in the constitution coupled with the period of very high interest rates presently being experienced has made it difficult or impossible to issue bonds to fund water programs, park development, the veterans' land program, and the State student loan program. These programs are vitally needed. The interest rate that may be paid on constitutional State bonds must be raised so that the bonds may be sold and the funds for these programs provided.

Opponents of the measure make the following points:

(1) "Dedicating an unknown amount of money for an unspecified project with an unknown need is bad fiscal policy," is the quote of one State senator in opposition to the plan.

The proposed amendment is so broad that it has the effect of making unknown amounts of money available for numerous unknown purposes. If State money is to be made available for water or any other purposes, the amounts to be dedicated should be specifically stated so that some limitation is placed on those amounts and the purposes for use of the money should be specifically defined so that money will be spent only for programs and projects that are necessary.

(2) The State has already created too many dedicated funds. The ability to create a water fund and other funds proposed by this constitutional amendment will only lead to the creation of more dedicated funds. Such a situation will reduce the ability of the state in future years to easily respond to its needs without imposing new

taxes and facing financial crisis.

(3) Economic uncertainty has been for the last several years, and will continue to be for some time in the future, the major problem to be faced by this state as well as the United States and the rest of the world. The state should not embark on a financing program as proposed by this amendment that will tie up funds for specific purposes and will not allow the state to maintain financial flexibility to meet problems as they arise.

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## Preparing Your Garden And Yard For Winter

Though the first freeze of winter may be only a few days off or several weeks off it is time to get ready for it. We have already had temperatures that have set many records in this area this year. You can learn a lot from Old Mother Nature about weather conditions. In observing the squirrels you will note that they are extremely busy gathering their winter feed supply. This is quite natural but this is the first year in a long time that the squirrels have not been chattering among themselves as they gathered their food. They are busy working very quietly and fast. Does this tell us that we are going to have an early winter or a hard winter? I have already seen flocks of geese going over this Southwestern area. Another factor to consider is that the trees in the Ozarks have already changed colors about three weeks ahead of schedule this year. I feel sure that we will have an early winter or a hard winter if not both.

Plant material freezes at different temperatures. Some plants freeze at 38 degrees while other plants freeze at 28 degrees or lower. Still there are tropical plants that can NOT take temperatures below 60 degrees.

For plants in your yard, a good application (2 inches deep or better) of mulch should protect your root system against a freeze. Stop all fertilizing now. This will prevent new growth that

could be nipped by a freeze. When a freeze is predicted, you should water your plants heavy the night before. This will help to protect them if it does freeze as predicted. However, some plants will need additional protection. A simple framework can be constructed to cover the particular plant that need this additional protection. You can stretch either cloth or plastic over this framework.

Remember that Hanging Baskets are very easy to freeze and are also very easy to protect from possible freeze damage. After thoroughly watering your hanging baskets pull a plastic leaf bag up over the basket and tie it at the top of the hanging wire. Leave your basket protected this way until it warms up. This should give you ample protection from the freeze.

If you have a green house at home you may want to take your plants in for the winter. You also can move large patio or tropical plants inside the green house for protection. If you do not have a home green house you can move your large patio or tropical plants inside your house or into your garage.

When you move plants inside try to give them the same amount of light that they had been getting outside, and be sure and keep them out of drafts. Don't put them around windows and doors. They can get too much light and atmospheric such as heat coming through the window glass can be very harmful to your plants. Use

Grow-lux types of lights to simulate outside conditions.

If you have to do any pruning or removing of any damage limbs at this time of the year, it is extremely important that you seal over the open wound area with a pruning paint. It is advisable not to do any pruning or limb removal now unless absolutely necessary. For your lawn, stop fertilizing now in order to prevent new young top growth. Cut your grass short and let the clippings of your next cutting and any later cutting fall on the lawn.

Do not catch them or rake them and if your lawnmower has a mulch attachment use it. This last cut grass should decay enough by the time it freezes to form a mulch for the root system of your lawn. Keep your grass cut low on a regular schedule which may mean mowing once a week until it freezes. When it is predicted to freeze water your lawn heavy the night before. This will give you added protection against the freeze. Remember NOW is the time to get ready for winter NOT the day it does freeze.

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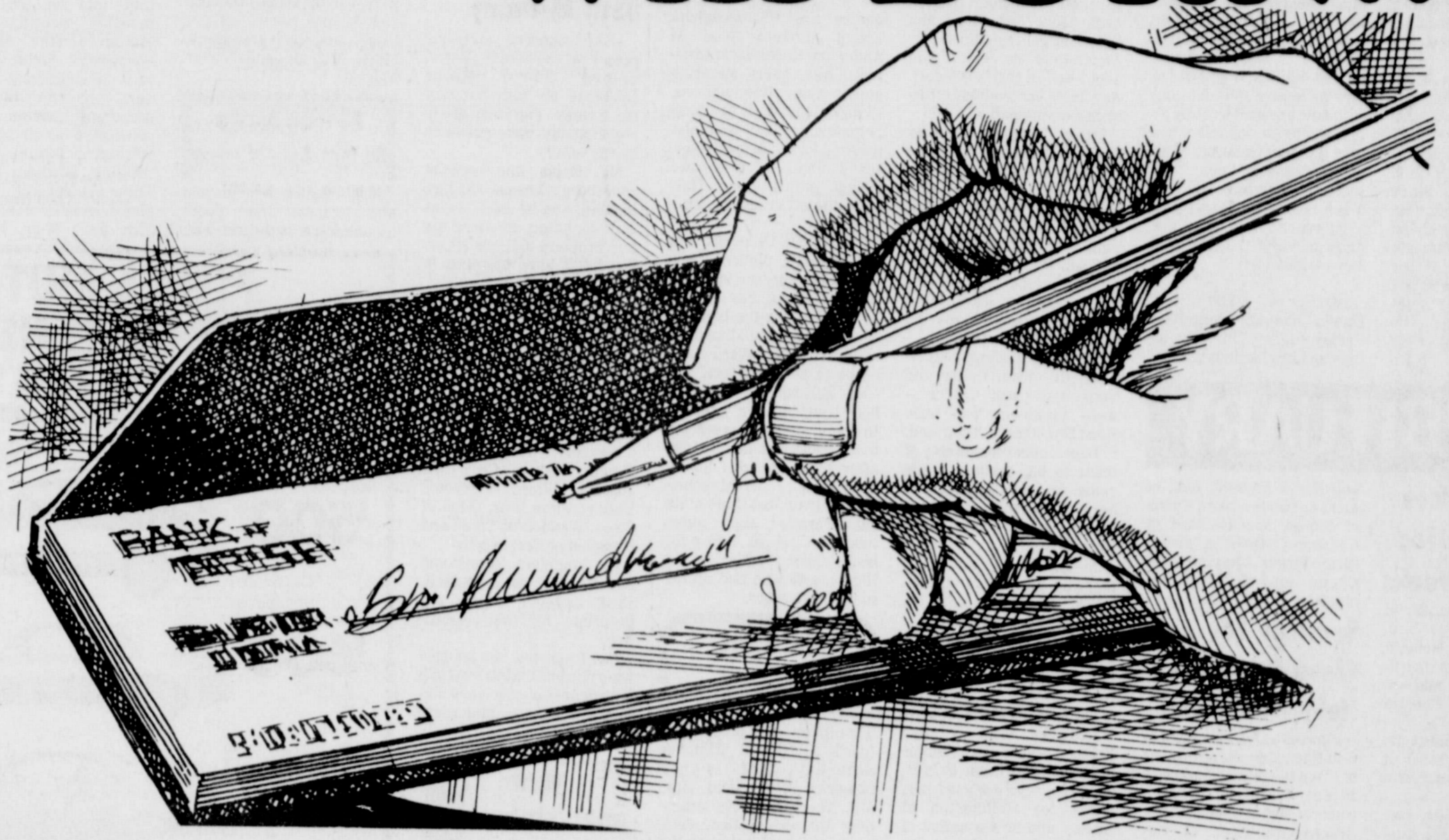
