

Community Chest Total Over \$4,000

Contributions in the annual Cisco Community Chest finance drive topped the \$4,000 mark Monday, Treasurer Ron Patton reported. Workers are seeking to raise \$13,500 as the 1982 budget requirements of some 15 organizations that work in the community.

Flood Damage Assistance Still Available Here

Persons who suffered property damage in the recent October flooding are still eligible to contact the Small Business Administration for help in financing the repair of their property.

An SBA representative was in Eastland last weekend and will return, but persons may contact the SBA Office in Breckenridge, located at 1904 W. Walker St., and/or call Breckenridge, 559-2029, 559-2033 or 559-2674, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

An SBA representative said that his office will be glad to help determine terms that will not work a hardship on the property owner, to restore the property to its pre-disaster condition.

Credit is available for large amounts to restore property for replacement of commercial quality.

Owners are asked to keep bills and estimates for repairs, including clean-up and small repairs but no major renovations.

"We can assist in many areas that the public may not even be aware of," he said. Monthly payments can be made flexible to fit the income and expenses of the applicant.

A five-month period is allowed for first re-payment and there's no penalty for paying off early. Loans for longer periods at a low interest with deferred payments, may be possible.

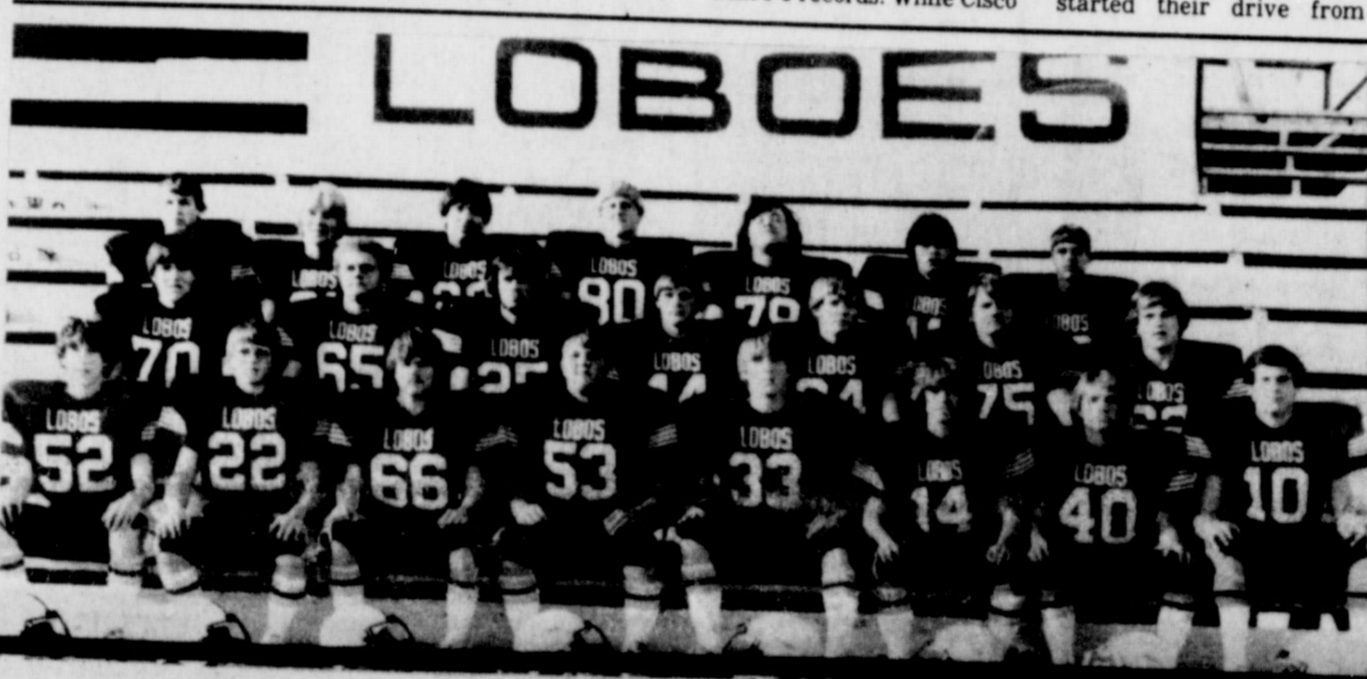
The SBA is encouraging the public not to take anything for granted but to take time to contact them.

The Lobos won the final six games of the season for a 6-3-1 record. For the year, Cisco scored 280 points while all opponents made 122 points. After the 4th game, when the Lobos got their act together, they scored 247 points in six games while the defense limited six opponents to 55 points.

Gary Speegle, senior fullback, had an impressive 7.2 yard average in carrying

the ball 160 times for 1,165 yards during the season. Jason Potter, tailback, carried 112 times for 647 yards—a 5.7 yard average.

Coach Jim Puryear said that "we, the players and coaches, would like to thank everyone for the great support given the team during the season. We are sorry that the coin did not fall the right way but we are thankful that the fans remained with us throughout the season. We hope you enjoyed the season as much as we enjoyed performing for you."

Coaches Jim Puryear, Clyde Evatt, Tom Slagle, Danny Kent and Ron Mouser, Principal Mike Turner and Supt. James Couch were to attend a meeting at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in Brownwood when officials of District 10-AA schools will meet to elect all conference teams, discuss spring track schedules and transact any other business.

The Lobo squad included nine seniors, leaving some 15 men to form the nucleus for 1982.

C.H.S. Lobos Soundly Defeat San Saba With 47-8 Victory

Lose Coin Flip To Eastland

The Lobos of Cisco High School soundly defeated the San Saba Armadillos 47-8 before a homecoming crowd here Friday night, in their final District 10-AA football competition of the year.

Later that same night in Early, the Lobos lost their chance to represent the District in a coin flip with DeLeon and Eastland.

The three teams were tied for the district championship with 6-1 records. While Cisco

was tromping San Saba, DeLeon defeated Bangs 51-14 and Eastland beat Early 34-8.

The Eastland Mavericks will represent District 10-AA in bi-district competition Friday night in Gordon Wood Stadium in Brownwood. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

The Lobos were 6-3-1 for the year.

In Cisco's Friday night game, the Lobos received the opening kickoff and started their drive from

their own 17 yard line. With Randall Rattan quarterbacking, Gary Speegle and Brian Fleming alternated on running the ball in the first three plays getting a first down and placing the ball on Cisco's 36 yard line.

On the next play, QB Rattan threw a pass to Jason Potter at San Saba's 45-yard line and Potter scampered to the one before being driven out of bounds by San Saba's Ollidio Cantu.

Rattan kept the ball on the next play and scored Cisco's first touchdown with 10:31 left in the first quarter. The extra point kick by Kenneth Preston was good making the score 7 to 0.

San Saba was unable to gain a first down with their possession of the ball and was forced to punt from behind their own 27-yard line. Pete Hibler punted the ball to the 30-yard line of Cisco.

The Lobos started their second possession and their second scoring drive from their own 31-yard line.

On the first play, QB Rattan went to the air with a pass to Larry Adams at San Saba's 33-yard line, where Adams seemed to juggle the ball but gained control of it before hitting the ground.

QB Rattan kept the next ball until he was hit and then he pitched out to Potter who raced to the ten yard line. Speegle took next handoff four yards and Potter gained one more to place the ball on the five yard line. Rattan connected a pass to Fleming on the next play for the score. The extra point kick by Preston was good for a 14 to 0 lead with 6:52 left in the first quarter.

Cisco's next scoring drive was set up when San Saba's Hibler punted the ball on a fourth down. The punt went high into the air and came back down at the original line of scrimmage, San Saba's 39.

Lobo Speegle rushed to the 18, Fleming picked up one more yard and Speegle broke loose to the five yard line. Speegle took the next handoff in for the touchdown with 55 seconds left in the first quarter.

The extra point kick by Preston was good for a 21-0 score.

In the second quarter, Cisco started a scoring drive from their own 29 yard line. Speegle, Potter and Rattan moved the ball to San Saba's 20 yard line in nine plays picking up four first downs.

A pass from QB Rattan to Fleming got the touchdown with 7:29 left in the second quarter. The extra point kick by Preston was good making the score 28 to 0.

San Saba got their only break of the game when Shawn Oliver intercepted a Lobo pass at Cisco's 49-yard line.

Quarterback Pete Hibler connected a pass to Robbie Humphrey at Cisco's 35 yard line and he raced to the eight before being pulled down by Lobo Shane Posey.

Kevin McCall dug out four more yards and John Henry busted through the Lobo defense for a touchdown. The extra point kick by Hibler was blocked by Posey, but the officials ruled Cisco was offside.

San Saba then elected to try for two points and McCall got the scoring run. With 3:12 left in the second quarter the score was 28 to 8.

The Lobos received the ensuing kick and set up another

scoring drive beginning at their own 38 yard line. Speegle, Potter and Joey Worley made yardage against San Saba in seven plays for two first downs and put the ball on the eleven yard line of San Saba.

Rattan picked up the next Lobo touchdown on a quarterback keeper play with 45 seconds remaining in the second quarter. Preston's extra point kick was no good making the first half score 34 to 8.

San Saba received the second half kickoff, but on their third play of the drive Cisco's Rattan intercepted a pass to set up another scoring drive for the Lobos.

Starting at their own 24 yard line, Lobo's Speegle, Fleming and Potter moved downfield to San Saba's five yard line.

A crucial play in the drive came about when Cisco needed 21 yards for a first down. QB Rattan connected a pass to Potter who raced for the first down and 13 extra yards.

From the five yard line, Cisco's Speegle ran for a touchdown with 7:16 left in the third quarter. A try for two extra points was no good making the score 40 to 8.

Late in the third quarter, the Lobos blocked a Hibler punt at the San Saba 23 yard line.

On the second play of the drive, Speegle rushed to the 15-yard line. Rattan then took the ball in on a quarterback keeper play for the touchdown. The extra point kick by Preston was good making the score 47 to 8 with ten seconds left in the third quarter.

Neither team was able to score in the final quarter.

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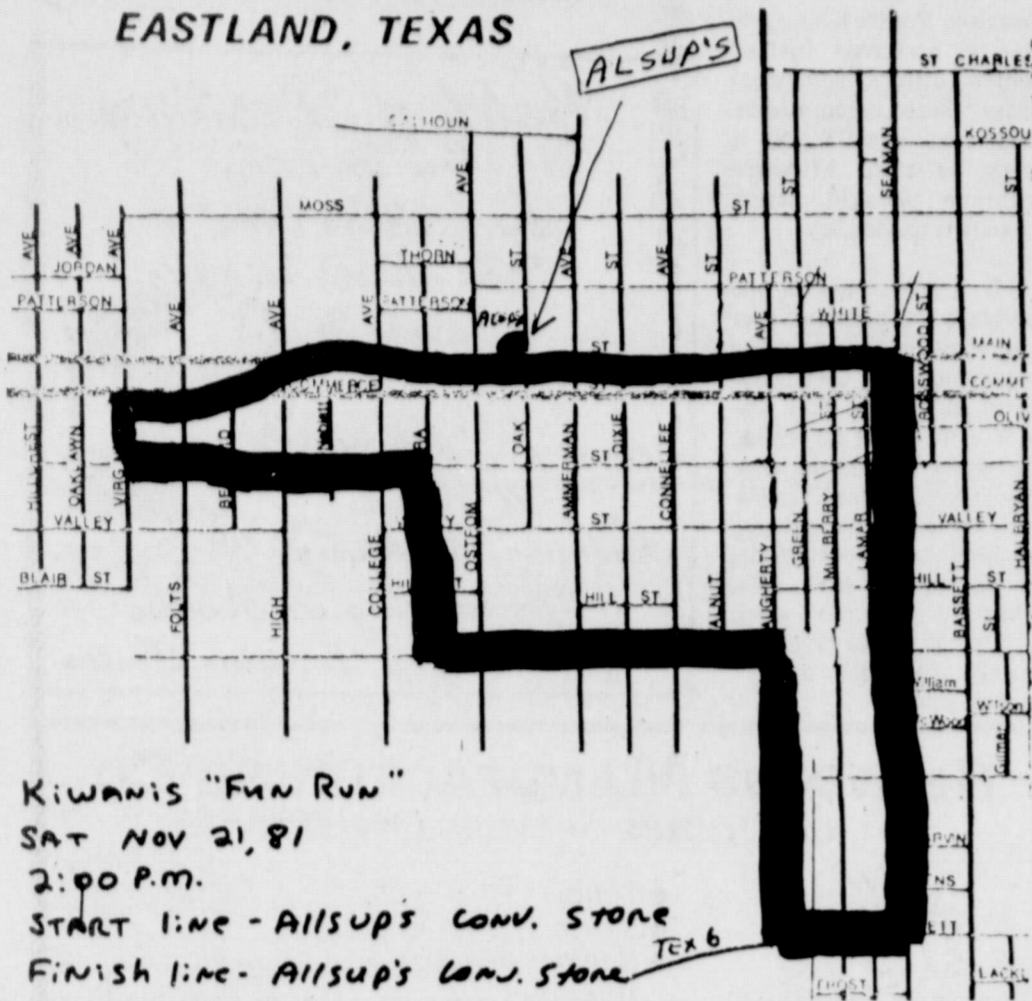

Old County Document Found

This old document was found last week while Oran King of California and Other King of Breckenridge was going through their father's (J. C. King) belongings. The bank no longer exist in Eastland and the draft is quite abit different than

those used today.

J.C. King and Mary Walcer received their marriage license from the old Eastland County Courthouse and were married in Cisco. They moved to Jones County in 1905 where he was a

farmer and horsetrader.

Mrs. King passed away in 1918 during a flu epidemic. Mr. King moved to California in 1934 and remarried. He had a total of 19 children before he passed away in 1967 in Calif. He is buried at Funston in Jones County.

'82 Tax Exemptions Must Be Filed

Eastland County property owners wishing to file for any of the many exemptions available to them for 1982 must do so between January 1, 1982 and May 1, 1982 according to recent changes in the State Property Tax Laws.

In the past, the deadline for exemptions was April 1 of each year and a request had to be filed with each individual tax office or jurisdiction. Under the new laws, the deadline was moved back one month and the granting and administration of all exemption requests for all districts within each County was placed in the hands of the County Appraisal District.

The Eastland County Appraisal District is located on the second floor of the Eastland County courthouse, the phone number is 629-8597. The Appraisal District plans to mail out exemption request forms as soon after January 1, 1982 as possible. If you have received any type of homestead exemption in the past, you should receive a new form to be filled out.

All new property owners or those who have never had an exemption before, should check to see if they will qualify for any. All property owners are urged to take advantage of the exemptions available to them for 1982 as all property within the County will have been revalued to market value according to the requirements of the property tax laws for 1982.

If you have any questions concerning eligibility or exemptions available, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District.

1. Exemption: \$5,000 Residential Homestead. Jurisdictions granting it: (School districts)
 2. Exemption: \$10,000 Over 65 Homestead.

Jurisdictions granting it: School district.

3. Exemption: \$10,000 Disability. Jurisdictions granting it: School districts

4. Exemption: Disabled Veterans. Jurisdictions granting it: All jurisdictions.

5. Exemption: Open Space Land (Ag Use). Jurisdictions granting it: All jurisdictions. T-96

Tax Appraisal Directors Are Being Selected

New boards of directors for the state's 254 county appraisal districts are being selected this month through votes cast by members of school boards, city councils and county commissioners courts.

According to Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, each of the voting taxing units in a county must determine its vote by resolution and submit it to the county clerk before Nov. 15. The governing body of the taxing unit may cast all its votes for one candidate or may distribute the votes among any number of candidates. The number of votes a given jurisdiction has is based on that jurisdiction's 1980 tax levy.

Voting taxing unit nominated candidates for positions on the board of directors in October. Names were submitted to county clerks who conduct the election process. The county clerk must count the votes, declare the winners and submit the results to all candidates and to all taxing units in the appraisal district by Dec. 1.

The elected directors will serve a two year term starting Jan. 1, 1982.

Each county appraisal district is governed by a board of at least five directors. To be eligible to serve on the board of directors, a person must be a resident of the appraisal district. The person must have resided in the appraisal district for at least two years immediately preceding the date he takes office.

Members of the boards will set policy for appraisal districts which, beginning in 1982, will provide appraisal functions and handle taxpayer exemption applications and appeals of all taxing units in the county.

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Deer Season Now Open

Deer season opened Saturday, November 14th and Eastland County hunters were ready. By Monday afternoon the Frozen Food Locker in Ranger had already prepared 52 deer and Fred Brown of Eastland had prepared 15.

As of press time, Eastland County Game Warden, Kenneth Payne, could not be reached to report on the county's activities this past weekend.

Deer hunting provides

many hours of outdoor recreation for Texas sportsman each year. Besides providing recreation, deer harvested also yield a huge resource in terms of table fare—venison.

The potential yield runs in the neighborhood of 11 million pounds of boneless deer meat annually, points out Dr. Milo Shult, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Quality of venison is not

determined solely by the culinary talents of the homemaker, Shult emphasizes. "The entire process of handling the carcass from field to table can add or detract from the desirability of the final product. The hunter, plays an important role in determining whether a deer steak is tender and tasty or tough and bad-flavored," says Shult.

A result demonstrator conducted by a group of specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service emphasized the effects of handling on deer meat quality. Thirty-six deer were collected on a permit obtained from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. These deer were treated in several ways with each group of six

deer receiving the same treatment.

"Since the hunter cannot control all factors which affect deer meat quality—for example, age of the animal harvested and the like—the treatments were designed to look at only those things which the hunter can control," says the Texas A&M University specialist.

Of the tests run on the carcasses, one of the most interesting was the taste panel test. A panel, consisting of five to eight people, was trained to evaluate meat quality, then give samples of venison from the various treatment groups.

"Only ham and backstrap muscles were used for testing and each sample was cooked to uniform internal temperature. At no time did panel members know what sample or samples they were evaluating. The panel rated each sample on the basis of flavor intensity, flavor desirability, juiciness, tenderness and overall

satisfaction," Shult points out.

Based on evaluations by the panel, following general recommendations can be made for Texas conditions, says Shult.

1. Whenever a choice is available, select a female animal for less flavor intensity (gaminess). This does not mean that male animals provide undesirable meat, but rather that most consumers may prefer the less intense flavor of the female.

2. Whenever possible place the shot in the neck or head to insure a clean, rapid kill. This prevents post-shot stress and also reduces tissue damage considerably.

3. Field dress the animal as soon as possible. If contents of the intestine or paunch have been spilled, the carcass should be rinsed with water. A publication, L-634, entitled "Field Dressing Big Game" is available from local county Extension offices and provides more information.

4. When weather permits, leaving the skin on the carcass will help conserve moisture. However, a little common sense dictates that carcasses should be skinned and covered with a fly proof bag in hot weather if a cooler is not accessible. Also, a male in the rut may have a strong urine odor on the hind legs and probably should be skinned prior to storage.

5. If the family prefers a somewhat more intense flavor which is similar to aged beef, the carcass may be hung in a locker for about a week before final processing. Again, common sense dictates storage in a clean locker which eliminates contamination of odors from poorly handled carcasses.

These recommendations are not the only way to han-

dle carcasses, Shult emphasizes. For the hunter who has a preferred method which differs somewhat from these recommendations, but whose family is very satisfied with the venison brought home, change is unnecessary.

"If a hunter has no experience in handling deer carcasses, or has had a bad experience with deer meat, these suggestions may provide a means of increasing the utilization of the deer resource. Further suggestions on care and cooking of venison can be found in the publication MP-1333, "Big Game Cooking Care" which is also available from the county Extension office," Shult reminds.

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Reappraisal Crews Still In County

The task of reappraising all of the taxable property within Eastland County continues as the work crews of McMorries and Company continue their work throughout the County. The firm has been hired to reappraise the property within the County in order for the taxing jurisdictions throughout; to be in compliance with State tax laws passed by the last two sessions of the Texas State Legislature.

Work crews have completed work in most of the Western and Southern areas of the County; although there are a few parcels still to be done in those areas. The crews working the city areas have been working in Eastland City for the last 10 days and expect the work to continue within the City for several more weeks.

Each property parcel will be visited by the field men, whose duty it will be that at time to measure the outside of the improvement upon that property and to properly classify it. This work will be done even if the property owner is not at home, but in all cases an identification card will be left for the property owner, so that they will be aware that the work has been done.

The actual value of your property will not be determined until after the first of the year as the law requires that the fair market value for each taxable piece of property within the state be determined as of January 1, 1982. Sometime this spring, hopefully around April 1, 1982, all property owners will be mailed a Notice of Reappraisal which will inform you of the new value of your property.

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Thanksgiving And Christmas Cacti

By **TED BRICE, GARDEN EDITOR**

Generally speaking the culture of the "less spiny" epiphytic cacti... Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter cacti, rhipsalis, chiapora, cryptocereus, nopalxochia bloom during the spring. Rhipsalis blooms off-and-on throughout the year. Thanksgiving and Christmas cacti will bloom during the holiday season if

raised where the amount of light they receive corresponds to the actual daylight hours during each season of the year.

This is, they will bloom on schedule and of their own accord if raised outdoors or in a greenhouse. But if they are raised indoors where they receive additional artificial light at night (i.e., in your living room) you make take appropriate measures to in-

sure that they will bloom. It is particularly important for Thanksgiving and Christmas cacti to experience a rest period at the appropriate time in order to come into flower during the holiday season. Starting around Labor Day situate your Thanksgiving/Christmas cacti in an evenly cool place where they will receive a minimum of 12 hours of darkness out of every 24 hours.

Reduce the amount of water given during this time, but don't allow the plants to dry out completely and withhold the fertilizer. After the plants finish blooming, increase the amount of light to sixteen hours. Continue to water lightly until their spr-

ing growth commences, at which time their fertilization schedule can also be resumed. The spiny-er epiphytic cacti deamia, harrisia, helleocereus, hylocereus and selenicereus bloom during the late spring and on up into early summer. Add one-half volume washed builder's sand to either commercially packaged mix or basic epiphyllum mix. They prefer stronger light than epiphyllums. Their own cultural requirements are basically the same as for the flowering jungle cacti epiphyllums.

There are several plant organizations such as Hoya Society of America, Cactus and Succulent Society of America and the Epiphyllum Society of America that can be of tremendous help for those interested in learning more about the Thanksgiving and the Christmas Cacti as well as other cacti.

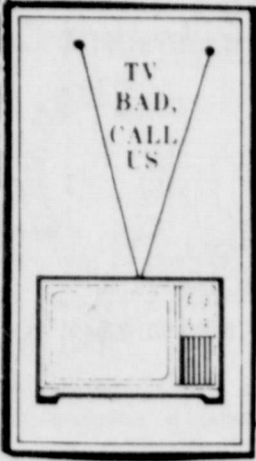

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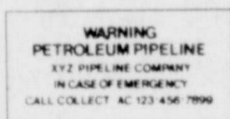
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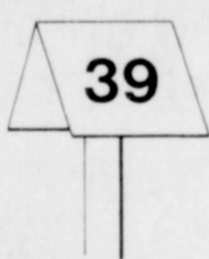

Local Economy Boosted

By 'Windfall' Changes

The economies of 24 West Central Texas counties will get a \$2.9 billion boost 1982-1986 due to recently enacted amendments to the "windfall profit" tax, according to a study released today by the West Central Texas Oil & Gas Association (WeCTOGA) in Abilene. Harry Bettis of Graham, president of WeCTOGA, estimated that independent oil producers in the 24-county area will receive \$981,916,308 in extra revenue because of the amendments. He said independents have historically spent the equivalent of 105 percent of their gross wellhead revenues in exploration-

development activities.

"Based on the established theory that for every dollar invested in an oil venture results in a \$3 benefit to the area economy, the West Central Texas area will benefit to the tune of \$2,945,748,924," Bettis said. "This is money that would otherwise have gone to the federal treasury," he said. Bettis explained that the tax rate on new oil will decline from 30 percent in 1981 to 27 ½ percent in 1982, 25 percent in 1983, 22 ½ percent in 1984, 20 percent in 1985 and 15 percent in 1986 where it will remain constant. Stripper oil (wells producing 10 barrels or less per day) will be exempted completely from the tax beginning January 1, 1983.

WeCTOGA used 1980 production figures (the most recent available) from the Texas Railroad Commission, and estimated the price of oil at \$35 per barrel. "Approximately 50 percent of the oil produced in West Central Texas is stripper oil, and about 25 percent is new oil," Bettis said. "The remaining 25 percent is old oil."

Predation Losses Point To Need For Remedy

Predators continue to inflict heavy losses to livestock, poultry and other wildlife, pointing to the need for an effective remedy.

That remedy could come in the use of toxic chemicals, but use of such materials, particularly Compound 1080, is not yet sanctioned by the Environmental Protection Agency.

However, some inroads are being made toward legalizing the use of these chemicals, points out Dr. Dale Wade, a wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Information presented at recent informal hearings may warrant the EPA to open formal hearings before an administrative law judge.

"If such hearings do come about, they would include information on the use of the 1080 toxic collar to protect sheep and goats as well as possible use of 1080 treated baits," notes Wade.

While such hearings might finally lead to an effective predator control technique for ranchers, they likely would not be completed in time to allow use of toxic chemicals during the coming

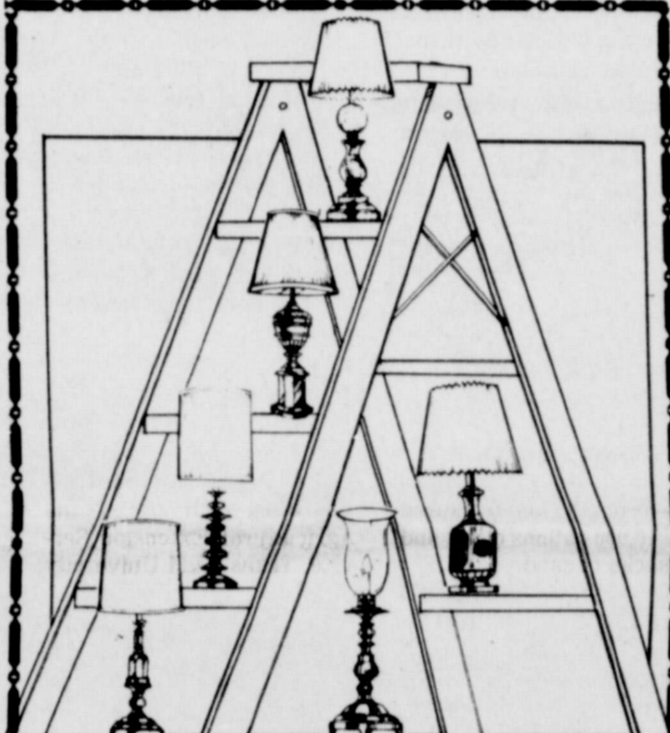

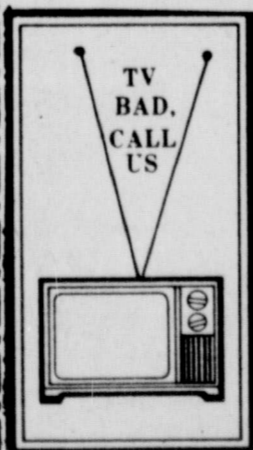

W.T.U. Receives Permission To Operate System

West Texas Utilities Company and its three sister companies in the Central and South West Corporation have received approval from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to interconnect with each other across state lines and operate as an integrated system.

The FERC in Washington authorized a proposal which will result in construction of electric transmission lines connecting the Southwest Power Pool with the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, which historically has operated strictly as an intrastate electric grid.

The proposal filed with the FERC for decision had been agreed to by all utilities affected, including Central and South West Corporation, Houston Lighting and Power Company and Texas Utilities Company.

Central and South West officials said the interconnection would be accomplished with construction of direct current (DC) facilities near Vernon in North Texas and near Victoria in Southeast Texas. The North Texas interconnection is projected for completion in 1984 and the Southeast Texas interconnection in 1985. Construction activities are expected to begin immediately following receipt of required regulatory approvals.

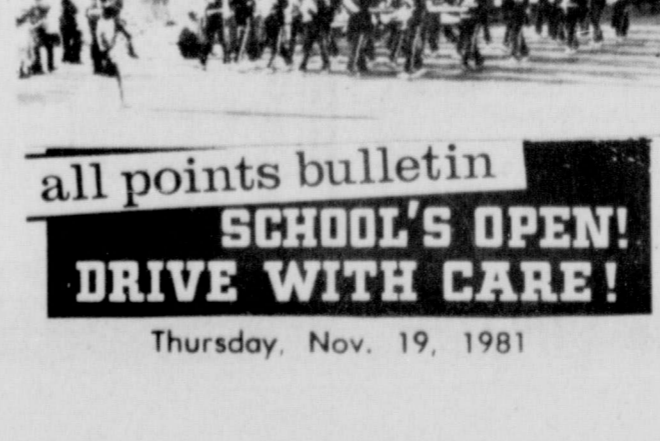
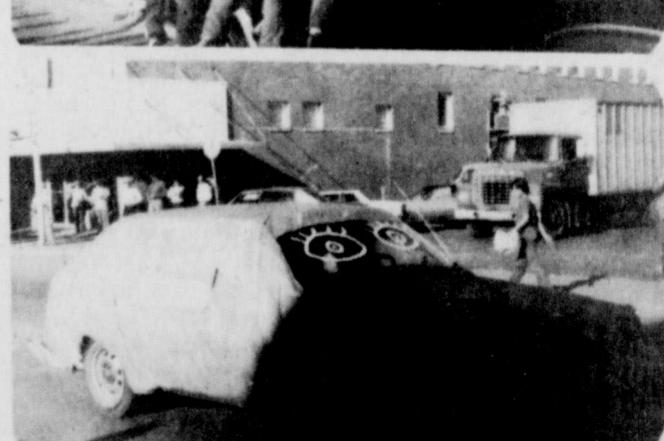
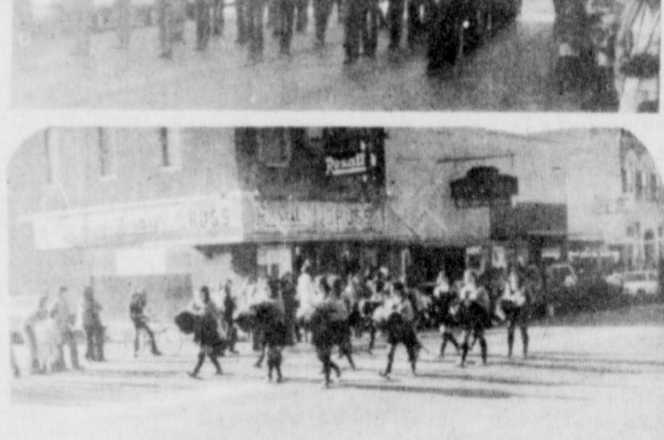
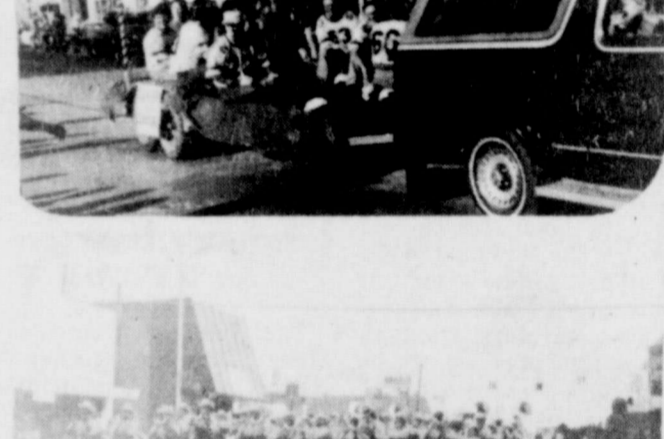
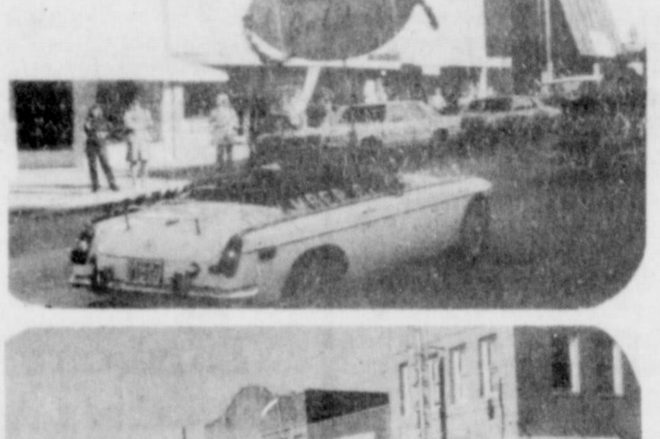
Central and South West officials expect customers of the system's subsidiaries in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas to save about

\$1.7 billion in reduced expenses between 1984 and 2000 as result of the interconnection.

The CSW companies have sought for several years to integrate the CSW system, but were unable to do so because WTU and Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi are members of ERCOT and have not been allowed to operate in interstate commerce.

The two other CSW companies are Public Service Company of Oklahoma, with headquarters in Tulsa, and Southwestern Electric Power Company of Shreveport. Both are members of the Southwest Power Pool and already are engaged in interstate commerce.

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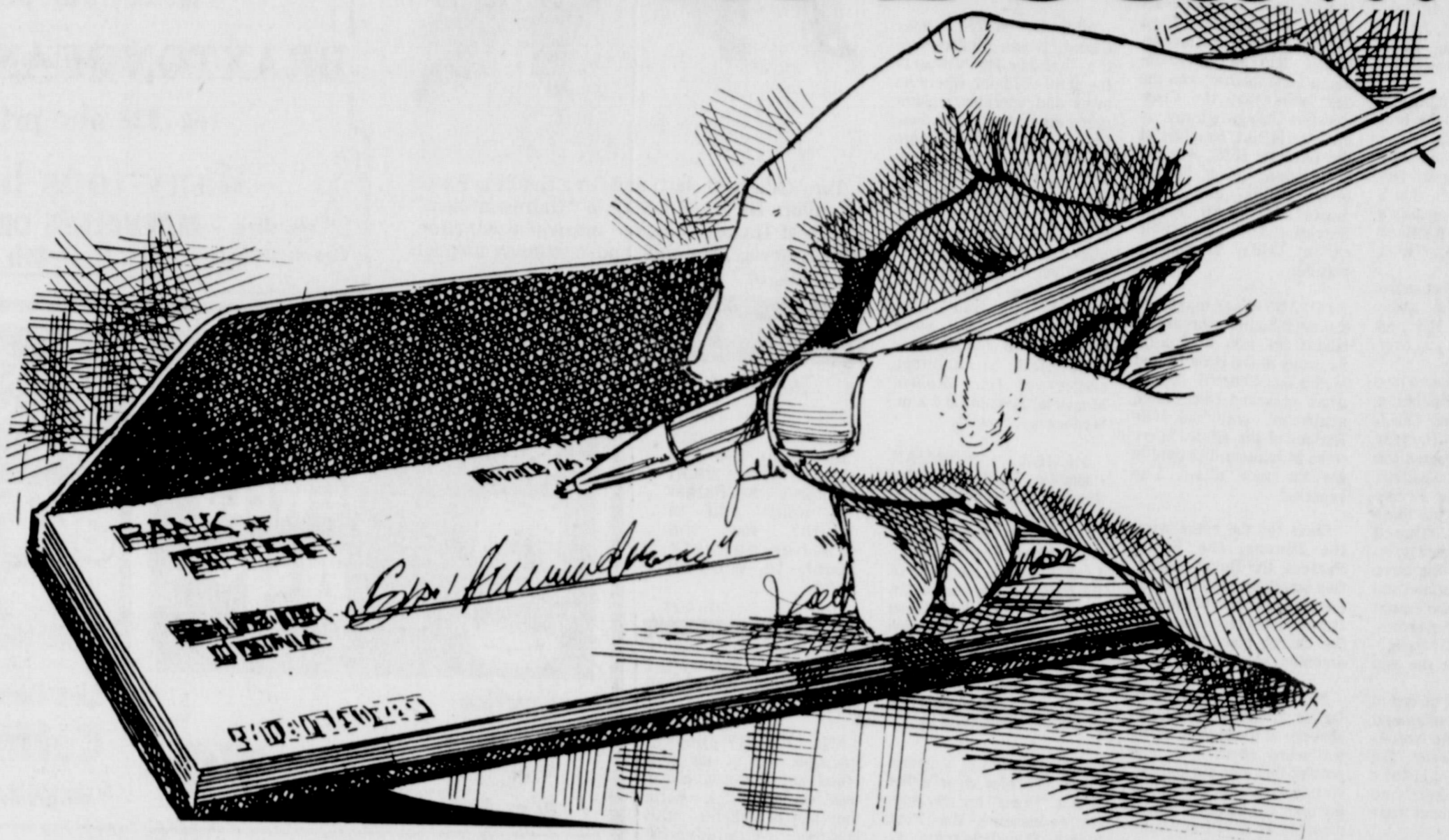
