WTU Files For Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its retail rates, citing inflation, high interest rates and an essential major construction program as the reasons for the action.

The official filing was made Wednesday in Cisco by Jack Kennedy, local manager

Kennedy said the application is a systemwide request higher for rates. Simultaneous filings were made in other incorporated towns for retail customers within their jurisdiction and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for an increase to retail customers outside incorporated towns. The filing with the PUC also includes customers in eight incorporated towns which have ceded jurisdiction to the PUC.

WTU filed October 15 with the Federal Energy **Regulatory Commission for** a rate increase to wholesale cooperative and municipal customers.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total revenue of \$32,256,983. This amounts to 15.4 per cent based on adjusted revenues of \$209,402,398 for a 12-month test period ending September 30, 1981.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective January 1, 1982

Kennedy said that a rate increase granted WTU last year "did not get the job done." That increase was for an average of 8.3 per cent and was only the second in the Company's entire history

"The relief you granted us has been overrun by inflation and high interest rates and the need to build additional facilities," Kennedy said. Growth in demand for electric energy, caused by a steady increase in new customers and higher usage by old customers, is forcing WTU to expand its facilities. WTU's newest power plant was completed in 1977, and since then the summer peak demand has grown to a point termed "uncomfortably close" to the system generating capacity. The current construction program includes a coalfired power station at Oklaunion, near Vernon. Although ownership of this plant will be shared by two sister companies in the Central and South West Corporation, Oklaunion will be the most costly project ever undertaken by WTU. So far, WTU has lagged well behind most of the industry in increasing its rates. A recent report from the Public Utility Commission shows WTU's rates to be second lowest in the state among investor-owned companies and fifth lowest among all utilties. Under the proposed rates, an average bill for basic residential service would be increased by 19.1 per cent. For example, a residential customer using 600 kilowatt-

hours per month would pay \$40.95, compared to \$34.39 under the present rates-a difference of \$6.56. This would include fuel costs.

Land Heritage Award The Johnson Ranch: A Land and Its People

It was an impressive ceremony in the State Capitol Rotunda on Nov. 10th when the Johnson Ranch, located about 5 mi. north of Desdemona, was given a Texas Land Heritage Award. This land was one of the first two Eastland County properties to receive this recognition, the other being the land of Pebble Hargus Boles S.E. of Eastland. Fifty one Texas families gathered in Austin this year to receive the honor, which is given to farms and ranches which have been in continuous agricultural production by the same family for 100 yrs. or more.

Those from the Johnson family who attended the Awards Presentation were: Mrs. Doyl (Lucille) Johnson, Clyde L. Johnson and wife

Dasha, and Roy Johnson.

The roll of the all the families was called, a history given, and Reagan V. Brown, Texas Agricultural Commissioner, presented each family a certificate. Clyde L. Johnson received this for the Johnson family.

A history of the Johnson family and land will be included in a Family Land Heritage publication, which will be available to the Eastland Public Library and the school Libraries. The land also becomes elgible for a State Historic marker.

Five generations of Johnsons were actually involved with the award. These include: J.S. Johnson, who homesteaded the first of the land in 1880, his son Toby Johnson, who held onto his part of the land, and Doyl

well as anyone could during Sanford Johnson, the first of the family in Eastland County, was born in Georgia in 1821. He came to Texas as early as 1847, and spent most of his young life moving from one

frontier area to another. Ir 1880 Johnson and his third wife, Martha Elizabeth (Reed) brought about 75 head of Steel Dust and Copper Bottom horses to Eastland County. They homesteaded 160 acres among the hills and sandy loam north of Desdemona, while the horses ranged out as far as Dublin. Occasionally they would round up the animals and brand the young

ones. The Johnsons cleared the land of brush and rocks, constructing a 41/2 ft. rock fence which is still standing today. They raised oats, wheat and other grains on part of the land, with livestock on the pastures. Martha Elizabeth, besides raising her family, helped with work out on the place.

The Johnsons built some fences of split rails until barbed wire was available, then they cross-fenced. They threshed grain in a trench, with the bottom covered with wagon sheets. Bundled grain was placed on the sheets, and a horse rode over it until the grain was threshed.

J.S. Johnson first constructed a log house for his family - then later a frame house with lumber hauled from Ft. Worth. In addition to ranching, Johnson operated a syrup mill, and worked at several other enterprises. He prospered as
