

# King and Queen Lobo L To Be Firemen Find Missing Woman **Near Old Abilene Highway**

#### **Autopsy On Body Is Ordered**

The body of Mrs. Debra Garcia, the object of a wide search since her disappearance from work at Quickway Grocery in Cisco about 5:56 a.m. Sunday, was found near a road-side bridge on the old Abilene highway, 3 and a half miles west of Cisco at 2:35 p.m. Tuesday.

The body was found as eight Cisco Volunteer Firemen began searching area roads early Tuesday afternoon.

Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie and Fireman Joe Jarvis composed the team that located the body.

Authorities were notified by radio and District Attorney Emory Walton and Deputy Sheriff Ben Sancillo soon arrived to direct an onthe-scene investigation.

Mr. Walton said an autopsy would be held to determine the cause of death. He said Mrs. Garcia was fully dressed and that there was no visable sign of injury. The body was not moved until Justice of the Peace Carlton Holder conducted an inThe inquest result was not

immediately released. Cisco Funeral Home was to transport the body to Dallas where the autopsy was to be conducted.

Mrs. Garcia's whereabouts had been sought by Cisco Police and others for about 60 hours before the body was found.

Other firemen in three other radio equipped motor vehicles included Gerald Jackson, W.T. Eaton, Kenneth Boyd, David Gill, Bobby Ingram and Bill Webb.

Mrs. Garcia, 29, was on duty alone at the convenience store at 1104 W. 8th St. Police Chief Larry Jernigan reported that his department received a call at 5:50 a.m. Sunday to report that Jeff Cathey of Cisco had been in the Quickway and found

nobody on duty. Roy Dennis, owner of the store, posted a \$2,500 reward Monday for information leading to finding Mrs. Garcia. Mayor Eris Ritchie Tuesday added a \$500 reward on behalf of his firm Southwestern Enterprises

Police went immediately to the Quickway. Mrs. Garcia, who had been on duty during the night, was not present. Her sweater and purse were there and her car was parked outside. Bread that she had been eating and an open carton of milk were

taine Apartments No. 9 with her three year old son, Issac. She is the daughter of Mrs. L.E. (Slim) Booth of Cisco. A search of her apartment turned up nothing unusual, police said.

Mr. Jernigan said he asked Texas Ranger Gene Kea of Eastland to assist with the investigation. Sheriff Johnny Morren and his staff were also assisting. Area television stations and daily newspapers were using Mrs. Garcia's picture and asking anyone with any information to contact authorities.

Cisco Policewoman Rebecca Mendez reported that a dozen or more calls had come to Cisco police headquarters as a result of media telecasts and all were checked out with nothing of value being learned as of Tuesday morning. Police questioned a 42-year old man who reportedly had made advances to Mrs. Garcia.

The man was released. Area hunters were requested by police to be alert as they walked over pastures and wooded areas in this region and to report anything of interest they might encounter.

Mrs. Garcia had lived in Cisco more than a year. She worked for Quickway for nearly a year and resigned recently to seek a daytime job. She rejoined the Quickway staff two weeks ago while waiting for a day job to open at Thrift Mart where she was to begin work

A native of Snyder, Mrs. Garcia was born Sept. 30, 1952. She married Willia Garcia some ten years ago and was divorced from him about two years ago. Mr. Garcia, an oil worker living at Giddings, arrived in Cisco Monday. Mrs. Garcia is a member of the IH-20 Church of Christ.

Two of Mrs. Garcia's sisters, Susan White of Fort Worth and Carolyn Tuttle of Sanger, were here with her mother at the Booth home. Two other sisters were due from San Antonio. Two brothers live in Fairfield

Mrs. Tuttle, speaking for the family, told The Press that "we appreciate the thoughtfulness and help of friends and neighbors. We hope that anyone who might

have been on the streets near Quickway between 5:30 and 6 a.m. Sunday will call and report anything they might have seen. We never know when something insignifi-cant will be helpful."



ROSWELL, N.M .-- The weather was sunny, bright and a pleasant 62 degrees when the Cisco Junior College Wranglers took the field for the 16th annual Wool Bowl here Thanksgiving Day-but the blue and white Wranglers ran into a bliz-

zard. It was a blizzard of footballs and they filled the air as the arm of Snow College quarterback Dave Archer cocked 42 times. When he'd finished, he had hit on 27 of those passes for 424 yards and four touchdowns and the Wranglers limped home with

annual Turkey Day affair. CJC had opened the Wool Bowl in 1966 as one of two first teams to be invited to the event, with Taft Junior College of California as the other team. Taft won that one, 21-19. The next year, CJC returned, but, again, wound up on the short end of a 20-13 score against New

a 51-14 loss-their third in the

Mexico Military Institute. Archer's efforts earned him the Most Valuable Player award on offense while teammate Scott Killebrew, a Snow outside linebacker, won the defensive honor for his efforts

against the Wranglers. The game matched the No. passing offense in the nation, Snow, against the No. 1 pass defense team, CJC, but the statistics didn't show it. CJC had limited its opponents to only 79 yards a game through the airways while Snow had averaged 241 yards through the air with its Brigham Young-type passing attack. Snow wound up with 446 yards passing as reserve quarterback James Lowe got into the passing act, completing one of five

It wasn't a really bad offensive game for the Wranglers, who had averaged 362.3 yards a game through its 7-2 regular season. The problem came in mistakes-the Wranglers won that statistic, losing six fumbles and getting two

for 22 yards.

passes picked off in the game. The first two mistakes, both fumbles, led to Badger touchdowns and the team from Ephriam, Utah, quickly jumped out to a 14-0 lead, and within a span of only one minute and 10 seconds of the clock.

CJC rolled up 148 yards on the ground and 215 in the air with sophomore fullback Billy Richardson rushing for 96 yards on 14 carries for the majority of the Wrangler rushing attack. Quarterback John Farris, who had to leave the game early in the third quarter when he suffered a wrist sprain, completed eight of 19 passes for 156 yards and one touchdown. Reserve Johnny quarterback Yglecias, after a slow start,

completed four of 18 passes for 59 yards. Receiving the majority of the Wrangler passes was sophomore split end Barrette Douglas, who pulled down four for 96 yards, Issac McKinley caught three for 54 yards and Robbie Birdwell had two of the prettiest receptions for 44 yards, the first going 32 yards for the

initial Wrangler touchdown. Snow's leading receiver for the season, tight end Mike Drury, caught 11 passes for 167 yards and one touchdown, but it was wide receiver Kenny McKee who did the most damage to the Wranglers' highly tauted pass defense. The 5-9, 156-pound freshman from Greensboro, N.C., caught six passes for 54 yards - and three of those went for

touchdowns. Following a Richardson fumble, the Badgers wasted no time in going to the end zone as their leading rusher for the season, fullback Eddie Stinnett, bowled over from the one with 8:13 left in the first quarter. Kurt Baal booted the extra point for a

7-0 Snow lead. On the first play following the kickoff, the ball got loose again and the Badgers had it, this time on the Wrangler 24. Ten seconds later, Stin-



CCLLEGE STATION --Texas farmers and ranchers wanting to see how well the hay they harvested this year stacks up have until Dec. 11 to enter samples in the Texas State Hay Show.

The show is set for Jan. 27 at the Waco Convention Center and will feature hay samples from the 1981 crop, points out Don Dorsett, forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The Texas State Hay Show has attracted some 300 entries in past years, but this year's show has gained a lot of interest and entries could reach the 400 mark, notes Dorsett.

Producers may submit one sample in each of the seven show classes, which include coastal bermudagrass, other bermudagrasses, other perennials, mixed grasses, summer annuals, winter annuals and legumes.

Samples should be sent to Billy M. Collier, McLennan County Extension Agent, 420 North 6th St., Waco, TX 76702. Producers should include their name and address, county in which the hav was produced, and class to be entered.

In addition to hay samples from throughout the state, the show will feature a program of interest to hay prolucers, users and commercial suppliers, points out Dorsett. Keynote speaker will be Dr. Monte Rouquette of Overton, forage researther with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The show also will eature 4-H and FFA hay udging contests.

Dorsett adds that the Texas State Hay Show will culminate several days of agricultural activities in Waco. The three-day Mid-Tex Farmland and Ranch Show starts Jan 25, and the following day features meetings of the Blackland Income Growth (BIG) program and the Texas Forage and Grassland Council.

Requiring a twothirds vote would simply mean it would be very difficult to use this regretable stopgap measure except in extraordinary circumstances. Thus, the responsibility for Federal appropriations would return to the committee system where, philisophically, historically,

appropriations bills, all but foreign assistance, and House Members can say rightly that the other body has failed to produce. I certainly have no criticism of my House Appropriations Committee, and particularly not in connection with this continuing resolution. The chairman of that committee, and the House conferees, have done a responsible job. If we continue in this way, it will undermine the authority and the reputation of Congress."

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# Tilling The Soil

By Ted Brice, "The Garden Editor"

For years, man has been breaking the ground for planting by various methods. In ancient times, they used the limbs of trees, pulled or pushed by man, to break the ground. Then evolved the plow on a wheel and then pulled by a horse.

In more recent time, the tiller has come on the scene. Recently, I have received a large number of questions about tillers. Therefore, I have decided to devote this column to discussing tillers.

Tillers vary in price from the low hundreds to in excess of one thousand dollars. The optional accessories available, vary as great. The size of the tiller that you need, will vary as to the size of the job you have. One of the most asked questions is which is the best, the front or rear tines for tillers? The tillers with the rear tines will

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tiller with one hand; whereas, the front tines will shake and vibrate the operator. Another question that is often asked, is whether a belt driver tiller or a worm-gear tiller is best? There is no question that a worm-gear is best. There will be no problem with belts slipping. Another item that is of importance, is the location of the controls. They should be located where the operator can get to them easily and be able to shut the tiller off in an emergency. You must look at the safety features of the tiller before you make your purchase because you could be very seriously hurt with a tiller if you could not shut it off quickly and if the tiller did not have the various safety features such as covers, ect.

There are many options that are available for tillers such as dozer blades, bumpers, hill furrowers, row markers, as well as electric starters. There are many tillers that are being manufactured in small machine shops at very cheap prices by eliminating many safety features and that will perform one function and at

only one depth. Your Garden Editor, Ted Brice, recommends the rear tine tiller with all the safety features. In surveying the tillers that are on the market today, I have found very few that are a truly a safe machine. 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

4-H, Extension's program for youth between the ages of 9 and 19, depends almost totally on volunteers who give generously of their time, talents, facilities and money, points out the specialist. Adults and older teens lead the teach 4-H members, organize clubs and project groups, and provide facilities, equipment, supplies, recognition and

Extension's community development programs also are heavily dependent on the energies and minds of volunteers to develop stronger and better com-

"A part of Extension's conventional philosophy is to help people to help themselves'," notes Denmark. "During the process of solving their own problems and developing their own opportunities, Extension volunteers develop their abilities to help others with similar problems and opportunities.

Thus volunteers in Extension programs are really helping people to help others" while they enjoy the self-satisfaction that their involvement brings.

"In today's world of hustle and bustle, getting people to volunteer becomes more and more difficult," says .Denmark. "Most volunteers prefer specific, short-term commitments with a meaningful involvement."

So, for continued effective contributions, volunteers must be developed through a systematic approach whereby they are identified or recruited, selected for the right job, provided orientation and training, and then involved and recognized.

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

targeting of USDA dollars and personnel to conserving critical resource problem

People who are interested in the program, or potentially affected by it, are urged to comment. Responses will be accepted through January

15, 1982, and can be mailed to State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (SCS), P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas

Ron Bailey, district conservationist for SCS at Eastland said the Secretary's proposed program would concentrate more USDA assistance in areas where soil erosion and other problems threaten to reduce agricultural productive capacity and to increase agriculture production costs.

The program would use local and state conservation coordinating boards to identify critical problem areas, set priorities, and develop program for local and state action to solve the problems.

Bailey said the program is the Secretary's proposed response to the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). It is contained in an RCA Program report and a summary leaflet with response form that can be reviewed at the local SCS or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices.



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
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
